Sabalenka leads 4-1

Sabalenka:

- Into the Indian Wells final for a second time after achieving runner-up in 2023 (l. Rybakina)
- This is her first WTA 1000 final as World No.1 and 11th WTA 1000 final overall
- Is undefeated against Andreeva so far this season, winning both their meetings at Brisbane and Australian Open in straight sets
- Is 4-1 against Top 20 players so far this season with only loss against No.19 Keys in Australian Open final
- Since 1989, Sabalenka (2023, 2025) has become the fourth player to reach both the Australian Open and Indian Wells final in multiple seasons along with Monica Seles (1991-92), Martina Hingis (1998, 2000, 2002) and Lindsay Davenport (2000, 2005)
- Could become the fourth player to lose their first Indian Wells final and win it on the second occasion after Caroline Wozniacki, Kim Clijsters and Monica Seles
- Looking to become the fifth player to win their first WTA 1000 final as World No.1 after Caroline Wozniacki, Dinara Safina, Iga Swiatek and Victoria Azarenka since the format introduction in 2009
- Since Wuhan 2018 where she won her first WTA 1000 title, only Swiatek (10) has won more WTA 1000 titles than Sabalenka (7)



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Andreeva:

- Sabalenka is the player she has faced most in her career (5) and is also the player she has most defeats to (4)
- This is her third meeting against Sabalenka this year and looking for first win today; her only other match loss this year was to Rebecca Sramkova at Doha
- Her sole career win against Sabalenka was in the 2024 Roland Garros quarterfinal
- At 17 years old, could become the third youngest player to win the Indian Wells title after Martina Hingis in 1998 and Serena Williams 1999
- Is the youngest player to reach Indian Wells final since Kim Clijsters in 2001
- Is the fifth player to reach Indian Wells final before turning 18 years old after Monica Seles (1991), Martina Hingis (1998), Serena Williams (1999) and Kim Clijsters (2001)
- In her fourth meeting against a current World No.1, could become the youngest player to defeat the World No. 1 since Coco Gauff (Rome 2021 vs Barty by retirement) and the youngest in a completed match since Tamira Paszek (Montreal 2008 vs Ana Ivanovic)
- After defeating No.2 Swiatek in the semifinal, could become the third player in the last 40 years under the age of 18 to defeat the World No.1 and 2 in a single WTA event after Steffi Graf at Key Biscayne 1987 (Martina Navratilova and Chris Evert) and Serena Williams at US Open 1999 (Lindsay Davenport and Martina Hingis)
- Could become the youngest player to defeat the World No.1 in a WTA final since Maria Sharapova defeated Lindsay Davenport in Tokyo 2005
- Aiming to become first teenager to win Indian Wells women's singles title since Bianca Andreescu in 2019
- Since the format's introduction in 2009, is the youngest player to reach multiple and consecutive finals at WTA 1000 events
- Currently on an 11 match winning streak, is the third player to achieve more than 10 consecutive WTA match wins before turning 21 this century after Maria Sharapova and Nicole Pietrangeli
- Is 4-2 this year against Top 10 players, with both losses against Sabalenka
- Leads the Tour in number of match wins so far in 2025 with 18 (Swiatek and Keys also have 18)
- Only Clara Tauson (35hrs and 25mins) has spent more time on court in main draw WTA matches in the 2025 season than Andreeva (34hrs and 3mins)

PLAYER NOTES

- Playing her second Indian Wells final after finishing RUP in 2023 (l. Rybakina); making 6th appearance at Indian Wells, where her previous result was reaching 4r in 2024
- Contesting 54th WTA 1000 main draw of career and playing her 11th WTA 1000 final and first as World No. 1; has won 7 1000 titles, most recently 2024 Wuhan
- Has beaten McCartney Kessler, Lucia Bronzetti, Sonay Kartal, Liudmila Samsonova and Madison Keys without losing a set to reach her third final of 2025 (Brisbane, Australian Open)
- Faces No.11 Mirra Andreeva for the 3rd time this year; defeated the teenager at Brisbane SF and Australian Open 4R
- Owns a 7-1 record against seeded opponents this year
- Won 16 of her 18 WTA titles on hard court, including 2023 and 2024 Australian Open and 2024 US Open; most recent hard court title came at Brisbane in January (d. P. Kudermetova)
- Is currently ranked No.1 on PIF WTA Rankings; this time last year was ranked No.2
- She is spending her 28th and 29th weeks at World No.1 during 2025 Indian Wells
- Has won 17 matches this season, trailing only Iga Swiatek, Madison Keys, and Mirra Andreeva (all with 18) for the most on tour

PLAYER NOTES

- At 17 years old, youngest woman to reach the Indian Wells final since Kim Clijsters in 2001
- First teenager to make the Indian Wells final since Bianca Andreescu won the title in 2019 and bidding to become the 3rd-youngest player to win the title after Martina Hingis in 1998 and Serena Williams in 1999.
- Currently riding an 11-match win streak; youngest player to win 11 consecutive WTA 1000 matches since the format's inception
- Contesting her 12th WTA 1000 event and making 2nd appearance at Indian Wells where her previous result was reaching 1r in 2024 (l. Volynets)
- Has beaten Varvara Gracheva, Clara Tauson, Elena Rybakina, Elina Svitolina and Iga Swiatek so far this week to reach her second consecutive final after winning Dubai
- Faces No.1 Aryna Sabalenka for the 3rd time this season (Brisbane, Australian Open) and seeking 1st win on hard court; owns 8 career wins over Top 10 players, including 2 this week (d. Rybakina, Swiatek)
- Owns a 8-2 record against seeded opponents in 2025
- Owns a 2-1 record in WTA finals
- Earned best career hard-court result last month by winning Dubai (d. Tauson)
- Is currently No.11 on PIF WTA Rankings; this time last year was ranked No.38
- Made Top 10 debut last month after winning Dubai and will return to the Top 10 on Monday
- Has won a tour-leading 18 matches so far in 2025 (tied with Iga Swiatek and Madison Keys)
- Youngest player in the PIF WTA Rankings Top 100; 1 of 2 teenagers in the Top 100 along with 18-year-old Maya Joint
- Undefeated in tiebreaks in 2025 (5-0)

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CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan. Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid.
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- Rose to career-high No.2 in rankings on August 23, 2021
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10
- Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitová in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Shenzhen in doubles (w/Mertens), going 1-2 in the round-robin stage
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2018, lifting two titles, at New Haven (d. Suarez Navarro in F) and Wuhan (d. Kontaveit in F), winning 46 matches and finishing at No.11 in the rankings
- Reached first two WTA finals of career in 2024 winning the title at Iasi and finishing runner-up at Ningbo
- Made first Grand Slam semifinal at 2024 Roland Garros beating World No.2 Aryna Sabalenka in the quarterfinals
- Made Top 20 debut on October 8, 2024 finishing the year at World No.16. Also won 2024 Paris Olympic silver medal in women's doubles with Diana Shnaider
- Opened 2023 season in April by winning 13 matches straight to claim back-to-back ITF titles in Switzerland; as WC, advanced to R16 at Madrid with wins over Fernandez, Haddad Maia and Linette (l. Sabalenka); subsequently made debut at Roland Garros (as qualifier, l. Gauff in 3r), Wimbledon (as qualifier, l. Keys in R16) and US Open (l. eventual champion Gauff in 2r)
- Also in 2023 reached R16 at Beijing (l. Rybakina), leading to Top 50 debut (started season just inside Top 300); voted WTA Newcomer of the Year
- In 2022, posted 39-9 win-loss record on ITF Circuit, winning first four titles at this level
- Fell 1r on WTA main-draw debut at 2022 Monastir (as WC, l. Potapova)
- Made professional debut at W15 ITF Circuit event at Sharm El-Sheikh in February 2022
- Owns six ITF Circuit singles titles
- As a junior, finished R-Up at 2023 Australian Open (l. Korneeva)

- Also in 2018, was R-Up at Lugano (l. Mertens) and Eastbourne (l. Wozniacki), made SF at Cincinnati, reached five QFs and produced a career-best Grand Slam run to R16 at US Open
- Entered Top 50 on April 16, 2018, after Lugano run, and Top 20 on August 27 of the same year, following New Haven title
- Broke into Top 100 at No.76 on October 16, 2017 after reaching first Tour-level final at Tianjin (l. Sharapova). Also in 2017 made SF at Tashkent (l. Babos) and lifting WTA 125k Series title at Mumbai (d. Jakupovic)
- Made Grand Slam main draw debut 2017 Wimbledon, falling in 2r (as qualifier, d. Khromacheva, l. Witthoeft)
- Fell 1r on main draw debut at 2017 Dubai (as qualifier, l. Ka.Bondarenko)
- Member of Belarus Billie Jean King Cup team that lost to USA in 2017 final - scored first Top-20 win of career with defeat of No.13 Stephens during final in Minsk
- WTA qualifying debut came at 2016 Rabat
- Lifted first three ITF Circuit titles in 2015, including a 13-match win streak towards the year's end, bringing back-to-back trophies in Antalya, Turkey
- Made debut on ITF Circuit in Minsk in 2012

- Coached by Anton Dubrov
- Previously coached by Dmitry Tursunov and Didi Kindlmann
- Started playing tennis when she was 6 by an accident when her father Sergey drove by the tennis courts and decided to give it a try
- Has a sweet tooth and considers something sweet as a perfect present; loves her grandmother's cooking, and looks forward to her pancakes when she is away from home
- Has a tiger tattoo on her left arm, which earned her the nickname "The Tiger"
- She spends her time off with family, catching up with friends, or reading; her favorite book is "The Count of Monte Cristo"

- Sister Erika is also a professional player
- Originally from Krasnoyarsk and began playing aged six, but moved to Sochi and then Cannes, France, with sister to set up training base with coaches Jean-Rene Lisnard and Jean-Christophe Faurel
