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[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs [24] Liudmila Samsonova (#25) Sabalenka:

Tied 2-2

- Sabalenka won two of their previous WTA Tour level main draw meetings, including their most recent encounter at Cincinnati in 2024, only match between them to go in two sets and under two hours, and Adelaide in 2023
- Has won the title in each of the previous two tournaments she defeated Samsonova (Adelaide in 2023 and Cincinnati in 2024)
- In the 17 occasions where the World No.1 has featured in the quarterfinals of Indian Wells, only once has she lost (Rubin d. Hingis in 1999)
- This is the second time since 2016 that the Top 2 seeds both advanced to the quarterfinals at Indian Wells; the last time the Top 2 seeds met in the Indian Wells final was 2012 - No.1 seed Victoria Azarenka def. No.2 seed Maria Sharapova

Samsonova:

- Owns wins over Sabalenka at Guadalajara in 2022 and Montreal in 2023
- Is 4-9 against Top 5 players, winning against Sabalenka and Rybakina twice against each
- Bidding to secure first win against a World No.1 having lost previous three meetings with all losses coming in against Swiatek
- Only Madison Keys (123) has registered more winners than Samsonova (85) at Indian Wells this year
- Bidding to reach third WTA 1000 semifinal, following Montreal and Beijing in 2023, and her second semifinal of the 2025 season following Adelaide
- Would move into Top 20 if she wins today's match-up

[WC] Belinda Bencic (SUI #58) vs [5] Madison Keys (USA #5)

Bencic:

- This is their fifth meeting and first since 2022 Charleston
- Bidding to become first wild card to reach the semifinals at Indian Wells since 2019 (Andreescu, Won)
- Bidding to become only second wild card to defeat a Top 5 player at Indian Wells after Martina Hingis defeating Davenport in 2006
- Is the lowest ranked player left in the singles draw, currently ranked at No.58 on the PIF WTA Rankings; will return to the Top 50 after Indian Wells, projected to climb to No.45 with QF, No.38 with SF; would move into Top 25 if she wins the title

Keys:

- Holds two wins against Bencic on the WTA Tour level main draw matches, with her taking the win at their only hard-court encounter at Doha in 2021
- With a win would become the fourth player to reach their first semifinals in the singles draw at Indian Wells after turning 30, following Vesnina in 2017, Pennetta in 2014, and Navratilova in 1990
- Is the fifth player aged 30+ in the Open Era with 15 hard court wins in a row on the WTA Tour, following Billie Jean King, Evert, Navratilova and S. Williams
- In her 12th appearance, Keys is hoping to reach her first semifinal at Indian Wells, equaling Pennetta in 2014 for the most appearances taken by a player to make their maiden semifinal at Indian Wells
- Keys has served 100 aces this year (in 18 matches), the fourth most on Tour behind only Clara Tauson, Elena Rybakina and Linda Noskova
- Tied with Swiatek for most wins on Tour in 2025 (both with 17 wins)

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[8] Zheng Qinwen (CHN #9) vs [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2) Q.Zheng:

Swiatek leads 6-1

- While Swiatek won the first six matches in the series, Zheng defeated Swiatek in 2024 Olympic semifinals
- Making 3rd appearance at Indian Wells and is through to the QF for the first time
- Best result at a WTA 1000 event was runner-up at Wuhan 2024 (I. Sabalenka in F); also reached SF at Beijing 2024 (I. Muchova)
- Is into her first quarterfinal since a runner-up showing at last year's WTA Finals (I. Gauff in final)
- Owns 10 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently round-robin wins over No.4 Jasmine Paolini and No.5 Elena Rybakina at the 2024 WTA Finals
- Is now the Chinese player with the fourth-most wins in WTA 1000 events (33) since the format introduction in 2009; she eclipses Zheng Jie who has 30 wins
- Best results by a Chinese player at Indian Wells were SF runs by Li Na in 2007 and 2014

Swiatek:

- Two-time Indian Wells champion (2024 & 2022); is currently on a 9-match winning streak at this tournament
- Contesting her fifth Indian Wells main draw; her overall tournament win-loss record is 21-2, including 2025
- It's been 23 years since a woman lost just 6 games on way to Indian Wells QF. With a string of set scores 6-2, 6-0, 6-0, 6-2, 6-1, 6-1- Swiatek has matched Monica Seles' feat of just 6 games lost in 2002
- Looking to become the first player to win the Indian Wells title on three occasions
- One of only four players to have completed the Sunshine Double, winning both Indian Wells and Miami in 2022 (also Azarenka, Clijsters & Graf)
- Contesting 34th career WTA 1000 main draw; is a 10-time WTA 1000 champion, most recently 2024 Rome
- Since the format was introduced in 2009, Swiatek (82.0%, 105-23) trails only Serena Williams (84.1%, 148-28) for winning percentage at WTA 1000 events
- Has won 17 Tour-level matches in 2025, tied for 1st place in main-draw match-wins this year along with Keys

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[9] Mirra Andreeva (#11) vs [23] Elina Svitolina (UKR #23) Andreeva:

First meeting

- At 17 years old, is youngest player in the PIF WTA Rankings Top 100; one of just two teenagers in the Top 100.
- Youngest player to reach the Indian Wells quarterfinals since 17-year-old Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova in 2009
- Aiming to become first teenager to win Indian Wells women's singles title since Bianca Andreescu in 2019
- Andreeva is 13-1 this year against players ranked outside the Top 20 (the one loss was to No.46 Rebecca Sramkova in Doha)
- By winning the Dubai title last month, became the youngest WTA 1000 champion in the format's history and cracked the Top 10 for the first time
- Currently on the longest winning streak of her career, is the youngest player to win 9 consecutive WTA matches since Coco Gauff in May 2021, and the youngest to win 9 consecutive WTA 1000 matches

Svitolina:

- Making her 11th appearance at Indian Wells, with her best result coming in 2019 with semifinal run (l. eventual champion Andreescu)
- She is a 4-time WTA 1000 champion (a perfect 4-0 in WTA 1000 finals, at 2017 Dubai, 2017 Rome, 2017 Toronto and 2018 Rome)
- Into her 21st career WTA 1000 quarterfinal, and her first since 2021 Rome
- Has reached her second quarterfinal of the season (also Australian Open QF, where she lost to eventual champion Madison Keys)
- Best results by Ukrainian women at Indian Wells are SF runs by Svitolina in 2019 and Marta Kostyuk last year

- After 1r bye, has beaten Mccartney Kessler, Lucia Bronzetti and Sonay Kartal so far this week to reach her third QF of the season (following Brisbane and Australian Open)
- Faces No.25 Liudmila Samsonova in QF today; owns 189 wins in career over Top 50 players, most recently No.48 Mccartney Kessler
- Coming into Indian Wells, she lost against two Top 50 players - No.26 Alexandrova in Doha and No.38 Tauson in Dubai
- At Indian Wells, she has lost to three players ranked below her - as No.3 lost to No.46 Paolini in 2022, and as No.2 lost to No.10 Rybakina in 2023 and No.23 Navarro in 2024
- Holds two wins against Samsonova, including the most recent encounter at Cincinnati in 2024; only in this match Sabalenka won in two sets and under 2h, all of their other encounters were in three sets and over 2h
- Owns 114–59 career record against seeds, with a record in 2025 standing at 5–1, only loss came in against No.19 Keys at Australian Open
- 16 of her 18 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court, most recently Brisbane earlier this year
- Is No. 1 seed this week; has been top seed at 25 tournaments in her career
- Is currently ranked No.1; this time last year was ranked No.2
- She is spending her 28th and 29th weeks at World No.1 during 2025 Indian Wells

- Holds two wins against Sabalenka, from Montreal in 2023 and Guadalajara in 2022

- Three of her five career titles came in on hard court - Tokyo, Cleveland and Washington DC, all in 2022
- Is currently ranked No.25; this time last year was ranked No.15

- Is playing to reach her third WTA 1000 SF, following Montreal and Beijing

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ARYNA SABALEN<u>KA</u> LIUDMILA SAMSONOVA

CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan.
 Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid.
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- Rose to career-high No.2 in rankings on August 23, 2021
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejcikova/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10
- Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitova in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejcikova/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Shenzhen in doubles (w/Mertens), going 1-2 in the round-robin stage
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2018, lifting two titles, at New Haven (d. Suarez Navarro in F) and Wuhan (d. Kontaveit in F), winning 46 matches and finishing at No.11 in the rankings

- In 2024, won one title at 's-Hertogenbosch (d. Andreescu in final); also reached SF at Abu Dhabi (l. eventual champion Rybakina); notably reached the QF at Cincinnati (l. eventual champion Sabalenka) and 4r at US Open (l. Swiatek)

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MIRRA ANDREEVA ELINA SVITOLINA

CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached first two WTA finals of career in 2024 winning the title at Iasi and finishing runner-up at Ningbo
- Made first Grand Slam semifinal at 2024 Roland Garros beating World No.2 Aryna Sabalenka in the quarterfinals
- Made Top 20 debut on October 8, 2024 finishing the year at World No.16. Also won 2024 Paris Olympic silver medal in women s doubles with Diana Shnaider
- Opened 2023 season in April by winning 13 matches straight to claim back-to-back ITF titles in Switzerland; as WC, advanced to R16 at Madrid with wins over Fernandez, Haddad Maia and Linette (l. Sabalenka); subsequently made debut at Roland Garros (as qualifier, l. Gauff in 3r), Wimbledon (as qualifier, l. Keys in R16) and US Open (l. eventual champion Gauff in 2r)
- Also in 2023 reached R16 at Beijing (l. Rybakina), leading to Top 50 debut (started season just inside Top 300); voted WTA Newcomer of the Year
- In 2022, posted 39-9 win-loss record on ITF Circuit, winning first four titles at this level
- Fell 1r on WTA main-draw debut at 2022 Monastir (as WC, l. Potapova)
- Made professional debut at W15 ITF Circuit event at Sharm El-Sheikh in February 2022
- · Owns six ITF Circuit singles titles
- As a junior, finished R-Up at 2023 Australian Open (l. Korneeva)

- Achieved runner-up in her opening tournament of 2024 at Auckland (l. Gauff in F) before finishing R16 at Australian Open (l. Noskova, retired due to low back injury). Reached QF at Wimbledon (l. Rybakina), 4r at Roland Garros (l. Rybakina) and 3r at US Open (l. Gauff). Ended season after US Open
- Returned to the Tour in April 2023, following birth of daughter Skai. Won Strasbourg (d. Blinkova) for a second time (also in 2020) before achieving Grand Slam results of QF at Roland Garros (l. Sabalenka) and SF at Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Vondrousova)
- 2022 season reached 3r at Australian Open (l. Azarenka) and QF at Monterrey (l. Osorio), before going on maternity leave in spring
- Highlight of 2021 was lifting 16th career title at Chicago [250]. Also made SF at Miami, Stuttgart and the Olympics (won bronze medal)
- Won her 14th and 15th titles in 2020, firstly at Monterrey (d. Bouzkova in F) and then Strasbourg (d. Rybakina in F)
- Contested her 30th consecutive major at 2020
 Australian Open (streak broke by skipping 2020
 US Open). Is a two-time semifinalist at Grand
 Slam level, at 2019 Wimbledon (l. eventual
 champion Halep) and 2019 US Open (l.
 S.Williams). Became the first woman from
 Ukraine to reach a major SF; on the men's,
 Medvedev made that stage at Roland Garros in
 1993 (SF) and 1999 (R-Up)
- Highlight of 2019 was reaching the title match as defending champion at the Shiseido WTA Finals (l. Barty)
- In 2018, won 13th and most prestigious career title at 2018 WTA Finals (d. Stephens in
 F), after going 3-0 during round robin stage.
 Ended year ranked No.4. Also won titles at Rome
 (as defending champion, d. No.1 Halep in F),
 Dubai (as defending champion, d. Kasatkina in F)
 and Brisbane (d. Sasnovich in F)
- Enjoyed standout 2017, finishing year at No.6, winning a tour-leading five titles and posting second-most wins (53, behind Wozniacki with 60). Season culminated by qualifying for WTA Finals in Singapore, becoming first Ukrainian woman to qualify for the season-ending tournament in singles (fell at round robin stage with 1-2 record)
- In 2017, became first player to win three Premier 5 titles in a single season (Dubai, Rome, Toronto), since such tournaments were introduced in 2009

- One of five players to make Top 10 debut in 2017, after winning Dubai in February (also Ostapenko, Garcia, Mladenovic and Vandeweghe). Peaked in rankings at No.3 on September 11, 2017
- On four occasions could have reached World No.1 - at 2017 US Open, then needed to win 2017 Beijing (fell QF), then needed to triumph at 2017 WTA Finals (fell in group stage), or reach final at 2018 Australian Open (fell in QF)
- End to 2016 season also saw her reach first SF at Premier Mandatory level at Beijing (l. A.Radwanska) Qualified for 2016 WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai for the second time (l. Kvitova in F)
- Reached three finals in 2016, winning Kuala Lumpur (d. Bouchard in F) and R-Up at New Haven (l. A.Radwanska) and Zhuhai (l. Kvitova)
- Other 2016 season highlight was QF at Rio Olympics
- Owns two career doubles titles: 2014 Istanbul (w/Doi) and 2015 Istanbul (w/Gavrilova)
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2012 Baku (lost in 1r but went on to win title there in both 2013 and 2014)
- Ukrainian Fed Cup Team, 2012-15, 2017, 2020
- Played first ITF Circuit events of career in 2008
- Junior highlights include winning 2010 Roland Garros girls' title at age 15 (d. Jabeur in F)
