Tied 1-1

Andreeva:

- At 17 years old, is youngest player in the PIF WTA Rankings Top 100; one of just two teenagers in the Top 100
- Could become the youngest player to reach Indian Wells final since Kim Clijsters in 2001
- Aiming to become first teenager to win Indian Wells women's singles title since Bianca Andreescu in 2019
- Is 3-2 this year against Top 10 players in 2025, winning the three most recent including defeating Swiatek in the Dubai quarterfinal
- Only three players have defeated a Top 2 player at Indian Wells prior to turning 18: Martina Hingis, Serena Williams and Kim Clijsters
- By winning the Dubai title last month, became the youngest WTA 1000 champion in the format's history and cracked the Top 10 for the first time

Swiatek:

- Two-time Indian Wells champion (2024 & 2022); is currently on a 10-match winning streak at this tournament
- Contesting her fifth Indian Wells main draw; her overall tournament win-loss record is 22-2, including 2025
- Has become the first player to reach the Indian Wells semifinal in four consecutive years
- Looking to become the first player to win the Indian Wells title on three occasions
- One of only four players to have completed the Sunshine Double, winning both Indian Wells and Miami in 2022 (also Azarenka, Clijsters & Graf)
- Could register 23 wins from 25 matches at Indian Wells, equaling Serena Williams for most wins from their first 25 matches at the event
- With a win today would register her second most wins of any tournament at Indian Wells (23), only trailing Roland Garros (35) (owns 22 wins at Australian Open)
- Contesting 34th career WTA 1000 main draw; is a 10-time WTA 1000 champion, most recently 2024 Rome
- Has won 18 Tour-level matches in 2025, tied for 1st place in main-draw match-wins this year along with Keys

Sabalenka leads 4-2

Sabalenka:

- Reaches Indian Wells semifinal for a second time after achieving runner-up in 2023 (I. Rybakina)
- Since 1989, this is the first time that the Australian Open finalists meet in the Indian Wells semifinal in the same season
- Leads the head-to-heads against Keys on hard court at 3-1
- First meeting against a Top 10 player so far this season; she lost her two most recent which were both at the 2024 WTA Finals against No.3 Gauff and No.5 Rybakina
- The World No.1 has won on 11 of the 15 occasions they have appeared in the Indian Wells semifinals
- With a win, would reach her 10th final in WTA level events since 2024, the most of any player during this period
- In the event that both Sabalenka and Swiatek reach the final, it will be the first time the top-2 face each other in the final since 2012 (Victoria Azarenka vs. Maria Sharapova)

Keys:

- Defeated Sabalenka in their only meeting so far this season at the Australian Open final
- Is undefeated against Top 10 players so far this season with a record of 5-0
- Is currently on a 16-match winning streak after claiming back-to-back titles at Adelaide and Australian Open
- In her 12th Indian Wells appearance, could equal Flavia Pennetta (12) in 2014 for the most appearances taken by a player to reach their maiden Indian Wells final
- Looking to become the first player from United States of America to win the Indian Wells title since Serena Williams in 2001
- Could become the first player to reach maiden Indian Wells final after turning 30 since Angelique Kerber in 2019
- Has served 102 aces this year (in 19 matches), the second most on Tour behind only Clara Tauson (145)
- Tied with Swiatek for most wins on Tour in 2025 (both with 18 wins)

- Making 2nd appearance at Indian Wells; last year she fell in 1r to Volynets
- After 1r bye, has beaten Varvara Gracheva, No.22 seed Clara Tauson, No.7 seed Elena Rybakina and No.23 seed Elina Svitolina so far this week to reach her third SF of 2025 (Brisbane & Dubai)
- Faces No.2 Iga Swiatek in SF today; owns 7 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.7 Elena Rybakina this week at Indian Wells
- Owns 4-2 career record against players from Poland, with record in 2025 standing at 2-0, including defeating Swiatek in Dubai QF
- Owns record of 7-2 against seeded players in 2025
- Record in WTA SF matches stands at 3-2
- Contesting 12th WTA 1000 event; became the youngest WTA 1000 champion since the tier was created in 2009 by winning the Dubai title last month (d. Tauson in F) - also her only career hard court title
- Youngest player in the PIF WTA Rankings Top 100; 17-year-old Andreeva is one of two teenagers in the Top 100 along with 18-year-old Maya Joint
- Last teenager to win Indian Wells title was Andreescu in 2019
- Is currently ranked No.11; this time last year was ranked No.38. Cracked the Top 10 at a career high of No.9 following her Dubai title last month
- Is currently on a 10-match winning streak and has won 17 matches so far in 2025 (only Keys & Swiatek have more with 18 each)

- Returns to Indian Wells as defending champion and is making fifth main draw appearance here
- Is a two-time Indian Wells champion (2022 & 2024) and also made SF in 2023; overall Indian Wells main-draw win-loss record is 22-2
- Looking to become first woman to win Indian Wells title 3 times
- One of only 4 to have completed the Sunshina Doubles, winning both Indian Wells and Miami in 2022 (also Azarenka, Clijsters and Graf)
- After 1r bye, has beaten Caroline Garcia, Dayana Yastremska, Karolina Muchova and Qinwen Zheng so far this week to reach third singles SF of 2025 (not including United Cup)
- Faces No.11 Mirra Andreeva in SF today; owns 82 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.9 Qinwen Zheng in previous Indian Wells match
- Owns 8-3 record against seeds so far this season
- Contesting 34th WTA 1000 main draw; she is a 10-time champion, most recently 2024 Rome
- 12 of her 22 career titles have come on hard court; her most recent was Indian Wells last year
- Is currently ranked No.2; this time last year was ranked No.1. Has held World No.1 ranking for 125 weeks during her career
- Is leading the Tour for match wins so far in 2025 with 18 (tied with Keys who also has 18)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached first two WTA finals of career in 2024 winning the title at Iasi and finishing runner-up at Ningbo
- Made first Grand Slam semifinal at 2024 Roland Garros beating World No.2 Aryna Sabalenka in the quarterfinals
- Made Top 20 debut on October 8, 2024 finishing the year at World No.16. Also won 2024 Paris Olympic silver medal in women s doubles with Diana Shnaider
- Opened 2023 season in April by winning 13
 matches straight to claim back-to-back ITF
 titles in Switzerland; as WC, advanced to R16 at
 Madrid with wins over Fernandez, Haddad Maia
 and Linette (l. Sabalenka); subsequently made
 debut at Roland Garros (as qualifier, l. Gauff in
 3r), Wimbledon (as qualifier, l. Keys in R16) and
 US Open (l. eventual champion Gauff in 2r)
- Also in 2023 reached R16 at Beijing (l. Rybakina), leading to Top 50 debut (started season just inside Top 300); voted WTA Newcomer of the Year
- In 2022, posted 39-9 win-loss record on ITF Circuit, winning first four titles at this level
- Fell 1r on WTA main-draw debut at 2022 Monastir (as WC, l. Potapova)
- Made professional debut at W15 ITF Circuit event at Sharm El-Sheikh in February 2022
- Owns six ITF Circuit singles titles
- As a junior, finished R-Up at 2023 Australian Open (l. Korneeva)

- Claimed five titles in 2024, making it a threepeat at Roland-Garros and also winning Doha, Indian Wells, Madrid and Rome. Crossed \$30m in prize money and qualified for her fourth WTA Finals
- Won six titles across 2023, including winning fourth Grand Slam title at Roland-Garros (d. Muchova in F) and going undefeated at the WTA Finals in Cancun (d. Pegula in F). Finished season as WTA World No.1 player for second consecutive year.
- In 2022, lifted second and third Grand Slam titles, at Roland-Garros (d. Gauff in F) and US Open (d. Jabeur in F)
- Triumph in Paris was the last of six straight titles during 37-match winning streak - jointlongest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990
- Won two titles in 2021, at Adelaide and Rome.
 Other highlights included QF at Roland-Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage)
- Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland-Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, l. Krejcikova/Siniakova)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland man or woman to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since A.Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Ranked No.54, she became the lowest-ranked woman to win the Roland-Garros title in the Open Era and the lowest-ranked finalist since 1977 (No.56 Mihai). At 19y 132d, is the youngest champion in Paris since Monica Seles (18y 187d) in 1992
- Also became the first player to win her debut Tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Jelena Ostapenko at 2017 Roland-Garros
- Won WTA Most Improved Player of the Year for 2020, as voted on by members of the media.
 Also won the 2020 WTA Fan Favorite Award
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.61 after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Lugano (l. Hercog) and R16 run at Roland-Garros (l. Halep). That year also reached 3r at Toronto (l. Osaka) and made 2r five times (incl. Australian and US Open)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.88 after R-Up finish at 2019 Lugano
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 Auckland
- Ended 2018 season ranked No.175 (up from No.690 in 2017), after posting 42-6 record and winning four titles on ITF Circuit

- Member of Poland's Billie Jean King Cup team, 2018-20, 2021-22
- On professional debut, came through qualifying to win title at \$10k ITF/Stockholm-SWE in 2016; owns seven singles titles at this level
- Enjoyed stellar junior career, including winning girls' singles at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Kung in F) and leading Poland to Junior Fed Cup in 2016

- In summer 2022 organised 'Iga Swiatek and friends for Ukraine' event in Krakow, which featured a mixed doubles match between Agnieszka Radwanska, Sergiy Stakhovsky, Polish junior Martyn Pawelski and herself, and was attended by Poland's First Lady, Agata Kornhauser-Duda, Elina Svitolina and Andriy Shevchenko. The occasion was watched by almost 15,000 people live and a further one million on television, raising more than half a million Euros for Ukrainian children and teenagers affected by the war
- Started playing tennis because her older sister was playing and wanted to beat her
- Enjoys rock music, including AC/DC and Pink Floyd
- Includes PZU, On, Tecnifibre, Rolex and Xiaomi in her endorsement portfolio

CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan.
 Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid.
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- Rose to career-high No.2 in rankings on August 23, 2021

- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejcikova/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Shenzhen in doubles (w/Mertens), going 1-2 in the round-robin stage
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2018, lifting two titles, at New Haven (d. Suarez Navarro in F) and Wuhan (d. Kontaveit in F), winning 46 matches and finishing at No.11 in the rankings
