## MATCH NOTES - DAY 3- THURSDAY, MAY 8

### [WC] Elisabetta Cocciaretto (ITA #82) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

**First meeting** 

### Cocciaretto:

- Has reached the 2r here twice before, in 2023 and 2024
- Owns one Top 10 win defeated Petra Kvitova at 2023 Roland Garros
- Has a clay court title to her name, winning 2023 Lausanne (d. Burel in final)
- Win over Avanesyan in the previous round was her first Top 50 win of 2025

#### Swiatek:

- Is a three-time Rome champion, winning the title here in 2021 (d. Pliskova in final), 2022 (d. Jabeur in final), and 2024 (d. Sabalenka in final)
- Has reached QF or better at every tournament this year, but has not reached a Tour-level final yet (did reach final of United Cup, where Team Poland fell to Team USA)
- Owns a 20-1 record at Rome from 2021-2024
- Has not lost on clay to a player ranked outside the Top 50 since falling to Arantxa Rus at Rome 2020

### [6] Jasmine Paolini (ITA #5) vs. Lulu Sun (NZL #46)

### **First meeting**

### Paolini:

- Making 6th appearance at Rome, where her best result was reaching the 3r as a wildcard in 2020 (I. eventual champion Halep)
- Faces No.46 Lulu Sun in 2r today; owns 45 wins in career over Top 50 players, most recently No.40 Katie Boulter at Madrid 2025
- Since defeat in her first match at Rome in 2024 (I. Sherif in 2r), she has won eight consecutive matches to begin a WTA 1000-level event
- Seeking first Tour-level title on clay after a pair of runner-up finishes; Roland Garros in 2024 (I. Swiatek) and Palermo in 2023 (I. Qinwen Zheng)

#### Sun:

- Making main draw debut at Rome; defeated wildcard Pedone in 1r in three sets
- Faces No.5 Jasmine Paolini in 2r today; owns one win in career over Top 10 players (d. No.8 Qinwen Zheng at Wimbledon 2024)
- Is currently ranked No.46; this time last year was ranked No.132
- Best career result on clay is Round of 32 which she reached once: Rabat in 2022 as a wildcard (I. Rus)

### Bronzetti:

- Making 4<sup>th</sup> appearance at Rome, where her best result was reaching 2r as a wildcard in 2022 (I. Osorio)
- Faces No.13 Karolina Muchova in 2r today; owns two wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.13 Daria Kasatkina at Dubai 2024
- One of three players from Italy to reach 2r, joining Cocciaretto and Paolini
- Owns one Tour-level title on clay: Rabat in 2023 (d. Grabher)

### Muchova:

- Making 3<sup>rd</sup> appearance at Rome, where her best result was reaching 4r in 2023 (I. Badosa)
- Owns 9-0 career record (including United Cup) against players from Italy, with record in 2025 standing at 2-0 (d. Cocciaretto at Indian Wells, d. Paolini at United Cup)
- Looking to advance to an eighth consecutive 3r of a WTA 1000. Last time she fell short of the 3r in a WTA 1000 was Madrid in 2023 (I. Begu in 2r)
- Best career result on clay is Runner-Up which she has finished three times: Palermo in 2024 (I. Qinwen Zheng); Roland Garros in 2023 (I. Swiatek); Prague in 2019 (I. Teichmann)

### Naomi Osaka (JPN #48) vs. [9] Paula Badosa (ESP #10)

### **First meeting**

### Osaka:

- Making 6th appearance at Rome, where her best result came during a QF run in 2019 (I. Bertens)
- Recently captured her first title at any level on clay courts at Saint Malo 125 (d. Juvan in final)
- Of her 72 match wins at WTA 1000 events, only 12 have come on clay and six of those at Rome
- Since the format's introduction in 2009, she only trails Li Na (84) and Elena Rybakina (75) among players representing Asian countries for WTA-1000 match wins with (73)
- Only three Grand Slam winners in the Open Era have claimed fewer WTA match wins on clay– Barbara Jordan, Bianca Andreescu and Emma Raducanu

#### Badosa:


- Making fourth appearance at Rome, where her best result was reaching QF in 2023 (I. Ostapenko)
- Faces No.48 Naomi Osaka in 2r today; owns 78 wins in career over Top 50 players, most recently No.23 Clara Tauson at Miami in 2025
- Playing first tournament since withdrawing in the 4r at the 2025 Miami Open
- Is currently ranked No.10; this time last year was ranked No.126

#### Krueger:


- Making 2nd appearance at Rome, where her previous result was reaching 1r in 2024 (I. Frech)
- Owns a 1-7 career record against Top 10 players; her lone win came against Elena Rybakina at 2025 Miami
- Could become the first opponent against whom Jessica Pegula registers five wins without a loss at WTA level
- Best career result on a clay court is R16 which she has reached once: Charleston in 2025 (I. Navarro)
- Has not won a single set against Pegula in any of their four previous meetings

#### Pegula:

- Making 4th appearance at Rome, where her best result was reaching QF in 2021 (I. Martic)
- Has won all four matches against Ashlyn Krueger at WTA events
- Owns 117 wins in career over Top 50 players, most recently No.28 Magdalena Frech at Stuttgart in 2025
- Only lost in three opening match tournaments for consecutive appearances in WTA events: Strasbourg 2019-2021, Roland Garros 2019-2020 and US Open 2016-2019
- This will be her eighth WTA-1000 clay court main draw appearance: only lost in her first match at 2023 Rome (I. Townsend)

## **CAREER MILESTONES**

- Highlight of 2024 season was posting best Grand Slam result with a run to R16 at Roland Garros for the first time in her career (l. Gauff) and 2r at US Open. Also made SF run at Birmingham for the first time (l. eventual champion Putintseva)
- In 2023 won first WTA singles title at Lausanne in July (d. Burel in F); also reached first WTA career singles final at Hobart in January (l. Davis).
- Reached consecutive third rounds at Roland Garros (l. Pera) and Wimbledon (l. Pegula) for career-best showing at GS level. Won 125k at San Luis Potosi in April and broke into Top 30 for first time reaching No.29 in August.
- Best Tour-level result of 2022 was QF at Budapest (l. eventual champion Pera)
- At WTA 125K Series events in 2022 won title at Tampico and finished R-Up at Makarska
- Sidelined with knee injury from mid-July until end of 2021 campaign
- Posted career-high ranking of No.108 on June 28, 2021
- At 2021 Guadalajara, advanced to maiden WTA SF (as qualifier, l. Bouchard)
- Finished R-Up at WTA 125K Series event at Prague in September 2020; posted then careerhigh ranking of No.128 one week later (September 14, 2020)
- Reached maiden WTA QF at 2020 Palermo (d. No.26 Vekic in 2r, l. Kontaveit); along with Errani and Giorgi, was one of three Italians through to QF - the last time three Italians made the last eight at a tour-level event was 2015 Hobart: Giorgi, Knapp and Vinci
- Also finished R-Up in doubles at Palermo (w/Trevisan)
- Fell 1r on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2020 Australian Open (as qualifier, l. Kerber)
- Rose over 500 ranking spots in 2019, to finished campaign at No.215 having compiled a 38-16 win-loss record
- At tour level in 2019, fell 1r on WTA debut at Rome (as WC, l. Anisimova) and Palermo (as qualifier, l. Kuzmova), while won three titles on ITF Circuit
- In 2018, won maiden title on ITF Circuit at \$15K Nules-ESP
- Made Fed Cup debut for Italy in 2018, losing dead fifth doubles rubber w/Paolini during 3-2 World Group II win over Spain
- Owns four singles and one doubles title on ITF Circuit

- Claimed five titles in 2024, making it a threepeat at Roland-Garros and also winning Doha, Indian Wells, Madrid and Rome. Crossed \$30m in prize money and qualified for her fourth WTA Finals
- Won six titles across 2023, including winning fourth Grand Slam title at Roland-Garros (d. Muchova in F) and going undefeated at the WTA Finals in Cancun (d. Pegula in F). Finished season as WTA World No.1 player for second consecutive year.
- In 2022, lifted second and third Grand Slam titles, at Roland-Garros (d. Gauff in F) and US Open (d. Jabeur in F)
- Triumph in Paris was the last of six straight titles during 37-match winning streak joint-longest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990
- Won two titles in 2021, at Adelaide and Rome. Other highlights included QF at Roland-Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage)
- Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland-Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, l. Krejcikova/Siniakova)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland - man or woman - to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since A.Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Ranked No.54, she became the lowest-ranked woman to win the Roland-Garros title in the Open Era and the lowest-ranked finalist since 1977 (No.56 Mihai). At 19y 132d, is the youngest champion in Paris since Monica Seles (18y 187d) in 1992
- Also became the first player to win her debut Tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Jelena Ostapenko at 2017 Roland-Garros
- Won WTA Most Improved Player of the Year for 2020, as voted on by members of the media. Also won the 2020 WTA Fan Favorite Award
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.61 after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Lugano (l. Hercog) and R16 run at Roland-Garros (l. Halep). That year also reached 3r at Toronto (l. Osaka) and made 2r five times (incl. Australian and US Open)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.88 after R-Up finish at 2019 Lugano
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 Auckland
- Ended 2018 season ranked No.175 (up from No.690 in 2017), after posting 42-6 record and winning four titles on ITF Circuit

- Professional debut came on ITF Circuit in Italy in 2017
- Former junior World No.12 and reached the singles semifinals at the Australian Open in 2018
- Member of Poland's Billie Jean King Cup team, 2018-20, 2021-22
- On professional debut, came through qualifying to win title at \$10k ITF/Stockholm-SWE in 2016; owns seven singles titles at this level
- Enjoyed stellar junior career, including winning girls' singles at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Kung in F) and leading Poland to Junior Fed Cup in 2016



## **CAREER MILESTONES**

- In 2024 made main draw at all four majors for the first time, posting her best career Slam result at US Open with 3r (l. Samsonova). Further notable results were reaching 3r at WTA 1000s Madrid, Toronto and Beijing and peaking at a career high of No.51 in September. Also claimed first career doubles title at WTA 500 Charleston with Sloane Stephens.
- In 2023, captured first career singles title in Osaka; did not drop a set en route to the title, defeating World No.35 and top seed Zhu Lin in the final. As a result of the title run, made Top 100 debut (week of September 18, 2023).
- Also reached tour level QF at 2023 S Hertogenbosch (l. Hruncakova).
- Highlight of 2022 season was playing main draw Indian Wells, Miami, San Jose and US Open
- On ITF circuit in 2022, won title at W60 Evansville, IN, USA and reached final at W25 Sarasota, FL, USA
- In 2021, also received WC to Indian Wells, where she was defeated in 1r (l. Martincova)
- Fell 1r on Tour-level debut at 2021 US Open (as WC, l. Schmiedlova in 3s)
- Also made 2r as WC in doubles at 2021 US Open (w/Montgomery, l. Fernandez/Routliffe) WTA qualifying debut came at 2021 San Jose
- Earned wild cards into the singles and doubles draws at 2021 US Open after sweeping the USTA National Championships
- Best career result on ITF Circuit was coming through qualifying to reach SF on professional debut in 2019 at W15 event in Carson, CA, USA
- As a junior won 2020 Orange Bowl tournament as a wildcard. Also lifted girls' doubles title at 2021 US Open (w/Montgomery)

- In 2024, won two singles titles Toronto (WTA 1000) and Berlin - en route to year-end ranking of No.7, her third-straight year-end Top 10 finish; two-time runner-up at Cincinnati and US Open; joined Rosie Casals (1970), Evonne Goolagong Cawley (1973) and Serena Williams (2013) as the only women in the Open Era to make the final at the Canadian Open, Cincinnati Open and US Open in the same season
- Also qualified for the 2024 WTA Finals (withdrew during round-robin play due to left knee injury)
- Won two titles in 2023, her second WTA 1000 tournament at Montreal and also WTA 250 Seoul. Also finished R-Up at Doha, Tokyo and at the WTA Finals in Cancun.

In doubles ascended to No.1 ranking (co-ranked with Coco Gauff) after 2023 US Open.

- Achieved career-high No. 3 in October 2022 after defeating four Grand Slam champions at Guadalajara, en route to ending three-year wait for second WTA title (d. Sakkari in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Fort Worth in both singles and doubles (w/Gauff), thus becoming the first Americans to debut in singles and doubles at the season-ending showpiece since Davenport in 1994
- Reached QF at three of the four majors in 2022, breaking into Top 10 after doing so at Roland Garros (June 6, 2022)
- One of seven players to win 40 or more matches in 2022, alongside Swiatek, Jabeur, Garcia, Sakkari, Kasatkina and Bencic
- In 2021, reached the QF or better on seven occasions, including at the Australian Open
- Broke into Top 20 on November 1, 2021
- Began 2020 with runner-up finish at Auckland (l. S.Williams), other standout results were a QF at Western & Southern Open (as qualifier, l. Mertens) and a 3r showing at US Open (l. Kvitova)
- On the doubles court in 2020, reached QFs of Roland-Garros (w/Muhammad) and Cincinnati (w/Rogers)
- Won her first WTA title at 2019 Washington DC (d. Giorgi in F)
- Also in 2019, fell 1r on main draw debut at Roland-Garros (l. eventual champion Barty) and Wimbledon (l. Buzarnescu) and Miami (as a qualifier, l. Konta)
- Broke into Top 100 for the first time on February 4, 2019 following back-to-back R-Up finishes at WTA 125K Series event at Newport Beach and W100 ITF Circuit tournament in Midland-MI, USA

- Highlights of 2018 included finishing R-up as a qualifier at Quebec City (l. Parmentier in F), recording SF finish at Houston WTA 125K Series tournament (l. S.Peng) and reaching QF or better at 10 ITF events
- Did not play between January and August 2017 after undergoing hip surgery. Primarily played at ITF Circuit events for the rest of the year, winning two doubles titles with Townsend
- Played a mixture of WTA and ITF Circuit events in 2016 with highlight coming at Washington DC, where she defeated No.14 Stosur for first Top-20 win of career on her way to a SF finish (l. Davis)
- Reached 2r on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2015 US Open (as qualifier, d. Van Uytvanck, l. Cibulkova)
- Sidelined from tennis for a year and a half between 2013 and 2015 due to a right knee injury
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2009 Ponte Vedra Beach and WTA main draw debut at 2012 Indian Wells
