MATCH NOTES – DAY 6 – SUNDAY, MAY 11

[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. [31] Sofia Kenin (USA #31)

Sabalenka leads 3-1

Sabalenka:

- Current WTA PIF World No.1, a ranking she has held since October 21, 2024
- Has reached six finals this season, the most by a player before Roland Garros since 2013
- In the last 40 years, only three players have made 7+ WTA-level finals before the French Open: Chris Evert (1986), Steffi Graf (1989 and 1994) and Monica Seles (1991)
- Making 7th appearance at Rome, where she was R-Up in 2024 (l. Swiatek in F); also made SF in 2022 (l. eventual champion Swiatek)
- Owns 9 singles titles at WTA-1000 events, most recently Madrid 2025 last fortnight
- Has won three of their four previous career meetings (Wuhan Tianjin 2018 and Beijing 2023), however Kenin won only meeting in Rome in 2023
- Has won last 13 matches at WTA 1000 events and is looking to become first player since Iga Swiatek between Madrid and Cincinnati to win 14+ (15 in a row)

Kenin:

- Making 6th appearance at Rome, where her best result was reaching R16 in 2019 (l. Ka.Pliskova)
- Has won three of her previous nine meetings against the World No.1 - this will mark her first career meeting vs the World No.1 on clay
- Best career result on clay is R-Up run at Charleston in 2025 and Roland Garros in 2020
- Has won 17 matches so far in 2025, already more than the entire 2024 season

[30] Linda Noskova (CZE #30) vs. [7] Mirra Andreeva (#7)

Andreeva leads 2-1

Noskova:

- Is 8-14 against WTA Top 10 in her career, only one of those wins have come on clay (v Jelena Ostapenko at Stuttgart 2024)
- Bidding to reach the round of 16 on clay at a WTA 1000 event for the first time in her career, her previous four round of 16 appearances were at Cincinnati

Andreeva:

- Won 2 of the 3 head-to-head meetings at WTA level; this will be the second meeting on clay after Madrid 2024 where Andreeva won
- With a win could become the youngest player to reach the round of 16 in Rome since Coco Gauff in 2021.
- Since 2009, Andreeva could become the youngest player to reach the round of 16 in Madrid and Rome
- Only Aryna Sabalenka (19) has registered more wins than Andreeva (18) in 2025 WTA 1000 events
- Is 15-1 against players ranked No.30 or lower in WTA events during the 2025 season, her only loss came against Rebecca Sramkova at Doha 2025

[4] Coco Gauff (USA #3) vs. [32] Magda Linette (POL #32)

Gauff leads 2-1

Gauff:

- Making 6th appearance at Rome, where she was a two-time semifinalist in 2024 and 2021 (l. eventual champion Swiatek on both occasions)
- Owns two singles titles at WTA-1000 events, Beijing 2024 (d. Muchova) and Cincinnati 2023 (d. Muchova)
- Holds 16-4 record against opponents ranked outside the Top 20 during 2025 season, her last such came against today's opponent Magda Linette at 2025 Miami
- Bidding to become youngest player to reach the R16 here on four occasions, since Caroline Wozniacki in 2011
- Looking to become the youngest players to reach the Final at both Madrid and Rome in the same season (currently Iga Swiatek in 2024)
- The last time an American to win the title in in Rome was 2016 (Serena Williams)

Linette:

- Making 5th appearance at Rome, where her best result was reaching R32 in 2023 (l. Haddad Maia) and 2020 (l. Mertens)
- Looking to become first player ranked outside Top 30 to defeat a Top 5 player on both clay and hard court at WTA 1000 events since Maria Bouzkova in 2023
- Since 2000, could become the second player to defeat a Top 5 player at Rome after turning 33, along with Angelique Kerber in 2021
- Owns 1 singles title on clay at Prague in 2024

[11] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #12) vs. Bianca Andreescu (CAN #121)

Rybakina leads 3-0

Rybakina:

- A rematch of R64 match last week in Madrid, won by Andreescu
- Defeated Eva Lys in opening match to notch her 7th straight win in Rome (did not play last year due to illness)
- Is 15-1 vs. players ranked outside Top 100 (the 1 loss coming to eventual champion Bencic at 2025 Abu Dhabi)
- Contesting her 37th career WTA 1000 main draw; she is a 2-time WTA 1000 champion, winning titles at 2023 Indian Wells and 2023 Rome

Andreescu:

- Making 3rd appearance at Rome; career-best tournament showing was reaching QF on debut in 2022 (l. eventual champion Swiatek)
- Defeated Federica Urgesi and No. 20 seed Donna Vekic so far this week; victory over Vekic was her first Top 20 win of the year
- Currently ranked No.121; this time last year was ranked No.225. Reached career-high No.4 for the first time in 2019

[26] Magdalena Frech (POL #25) vs. [8] Qinwen Zheng (CHN #8)

Tied 1-1

Frech:

- Is 1-18 against Top 10 in her career, her lone win against No. xx Emma Navarro at Wuhan 2024.
- With a win would become just the third Polish player to reach the round of 16 in a clay WTA-1000 event after Agnieszka Radwanska and Iga Swiatek.
- Only two Polish players have defeated Top 10 at Rome – Iga Swiatek and Agnieszka Radwanska

Zheng

- With a win would become the second player from China to reach the round of 16 in Rome on three occasions during the Open Era after Li Na.
- Only Li Na (9) has won more main draw matches than Zheng (7) in Rome among Chinese players
- Overall, Zheng has won 18 main draw matches on Italian soil (11 in Palermo and seven in Rome): since her debut on Tour in 2021, only Iga Swiatek has more (21)
- Zheng has won 14 of her last 15 WTA main draw matches played in Italy, with only lose to Gauff in QF at Rome last season

CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan. Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid.
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- Rose to career-high No.2 in rankings on August 23, 2021
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10
- Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitová in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Shenzhen in doubles (w/Mertens), going 1-2 in the round-robin stage
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2018, lifting two titles, at New Haven (d. Suarez Navarro in F) and Wuhan (d. Kontaveit in F), winning 46 matches and finishing at No.11 in the rankings
- Achieved best result of 2024 at Tokyo with runner-up (l. Zheng in final). In doubles claimed her third and fourth career titles at Abu Dhabi and Miami w/Bethanie Mattek-Sands.
- Strongest result of 2023 was runner-up at San Diego (l. Krejčíková). Also reached SF at Hobart (l. Cocciaretto) and Guadalajara (l. Dolehide). As a qualifier, posted her best Wimbledon result with 3r (l. Svitolina). Moved 202 positions up the ranking from her 2022 year-end position (from No. 235 to No.33).
- Best results of 2022 were QF at Adelaide (l. eventual champion Barty) and Cleveland (l. Pera). Missed clay and grass swings w/right ankle injury
- Missed second half of 2021 season due to ongoing foot injury and then testing positive for COVID-19
- In opening half of the 2021 campaign, standout results were QFs at Abu Dhabi and Yarra Valley Classic, and a R16 showing at Roland Garros
- Ended 2020 at career high of No.4 which she first hit on March 9, 2020 and came away with the 2020 WTA Player of the Year Award
- In last tournament of the season, finished R-Up at Roland Garros (l. Swiatek) for her first final appearance on clay
- Reached R16 at US Open and was one of only two players (also Kvitová) to reach second week of all three Slams in 2020
- Lifted fifth WTA singles title at Lyon (d. Friedsam in F) becoming the first player in 2020 to win a second title
- Won maiden major at 2020 Australian Open (d. Muguruza in F) to become the youngest champion (21y, 80d) in Melbourne since Sharapova (20y, 283d) in 2008. Defeated No.1 Barty and home favorite in SF for third career win over a reigning World No.1
- Australian Open run helped her break into the Top 10 for the first time at No.7 on February 3, 2020
- Won 2019 WTA Most Improved Player of the Year award after winning three WTA titles at Hobart (d. Schmiedlova in F), Mallorca (d. Bencic in F) and Guangzhou (d. Stosur in F)
- Finished 2019 at No.14 as US No.2 (behind No.9 S.Williams) and leader in hard court wins (38-tied w/Barty)
- Registered back-to-back SF runs at Toronto (l. eventual champion Andreescu) and Cincinnati (l. eventual champion Keys), subsequently leading to Top 20 debut at No.20 on August 19, 2019

- Also in 2018, was R-Up at Lugano (l. Mertens) and Eastbourne (l. Wozniacki), made SF at Cincinnati, reached five QFs and produced a career-best Grand Slam run to R16 at US Open
- Entered Top 50 on April 16, 2018, after Lugano run, and Top 20 on August 27 of the same year, following New Haven title
- Broke into Top 100 at No.76 on October 16, 2017 after reaching first Tour-level final at Tianjin (l. Sharapova). Also in 2017 made SF at Tashkent (l. Babos) and lifting WTA 125k Series title at Mumbai (d. Jakupovic)
- Made Grand Slam main draw debut 2017 Wimbledon, falling in 2r (as qualifier, d. Khromacheva, l. Witthoeft)
- Fell 1r on main draw debut at 2017 Dubai (as qualifier, l. Ka.Bondarenko)
- Member of Belarus Billie Jean King Cup team that lost to USA in 2017 final - scored first Top-20 win of career with defeat of No.13 Stephens during final in Minsk
- WTA qualifying debut came at 2016 Rabat
- Lifted first three ITF Circuit titles in 2015, including a 13-match win streak towards the year's end, bringing back-to-back trophies in Antalya, Turkey
- Made debut on ITF Circuit in Minsk in 2012

- During this run, defeated No.1 Barty (Toronto) and No.1 Osaka (Cincinnati) to become first player since October 2001 to defeat World No.1s in consecutive weeks (Davenport); also became youngest American to defeat reigning No.1 in eight years (after McHale)
- Advanced to R16 at 2019 Roland Garros (d. S.Williams, l. eventual champion Barty) - became first American to defeat Serena at the majors since Stephens at 2013 Australian Open QF
- Also won maiden doubles titles in 2019 at Auckland (w/Bouchard) and Beijing (w/Mattek-Sands)
- Broke into the Top 100 on March 19, 2018 and Top 50 on October 8, 2018
- Member of US Billie Jean King Cup team from 2018-20
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2015 US Open as a wildcard (l. Duque-Marino in 1r)
- Owns four ITF singles titles and two doubles titles
- Played first matches of career on ITF Circuit in 2013, climbing to No.2 in ITF World Junior Rankings
- Represented the USA at the 2014 Youth Olympic Games and competed at the 2016 ITF Junior Masters, both held in China



- In 2024 reached a career-high ranking of No.22 by reaching her career-first final at Prague (L. Linette in final) followed by her first-ever title win at Guadalajara (d. Gadecki in final); also made QF at Wuhan (L. eventual champion Sabalenka) and at Nottingham (L. eventual champion Boulter) and achieved her best result to date at a Grand Slam (R16 at the Australian Open; L.
