- Aryna Sabalenka will stay as the PIF WTA World No.1; she has held the top spot since October 21, 2024. Monday, May 19 will be her 31st consecutive week atop the PIF WTA Rankings and 39th overall
- Coco Gauff will move to No.2 in the PIF WTA Rankings, equalling her career-best ranking
- Mirra Andreeva could move to No.5 by winning the title

Sabalenka leads 6-0

Sabalenka:

- PIF WTA World No.1 Sabalenka is today attempting to become the first woman to reach the SF at Indian Wells, Miami, Madrid and Rome in the same season
- Closing in on her 50th win over Top 10 players, currently has 46 such victories
- Three of her 20 career titles have come on clay all at Madrid in 2021, 2023 and 2025
- Finished runner-up here in Rome last year, falling to Swiatek
- Bidding for her 35th win of the season today
- This is her 29th tournament as the No.1 seed

Zheng:

- Has now reached the Rome QF on every outing here but never further, also making the last eight here in 2023 and 2024
- Overall this is her fourth QF of the season, and bidding for first SF of 2025 today
- Holds a 1-8 record against reigning World No.1 players; sole win came over Swiatek in the 2024 Paris Olympics SF
- Three of her 5 career Tour-level titles have come on clay: 2023 Palermo, 2024 Palermo and 2024 Paris Olympics
- Best result by a Chinese woman at Rome was runner-up showing by Li Na in 2012 (I. Sharapova)

Gauff leads 3-0

Gauff:

- Bidding to reach her third Rome SF today lost in the last four in 2021 and 2024 (falling to eventual champion Swiatek both times)
- Owns 26 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently over No.2 Iga Swiatek at Madrid SF
- One of her nine career WTA titles has come on clay (2021 Parma)
- One of 2 players from the United States to reach this week's QF (also Stearns)
- The most recent American woman to win the Rome title was Serena Williams in 2016
- During this year's clay-court swing, made Stuttgart QF and Madrid final
- Looking to become the youngest player to reach the final at both Madrid and Rome in the same season (currently Iga Swiatek in 2024)

Andreeva:

- Through to her first Rome QF (fell Ir on debut appearance last year)
- Overall this is her fifth QF of the season
- Is the youngest player to reach the Rome QF since Coco Gauff in 2021
- Owns 9 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.1 Sabalenka in 2025 Indian Wells final
- Owns 9-9 career Tour-level record against players from the United States (2-2 in 2025)
- 1 of her 3 career WTA singles titles has come on clay (2024 lasi)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Went three for three in finals in 2024, winning Auckland, Beijing and a historic first WTA Finals Riyadh title. Success in Saudi Arabia saw her win a record \$4.8m in prize money, the most ever awarded in women sprofessional sports, and defeat the World No.1 and No.2 at the same event. Posted a new career-high of No.2 in June
- Won debut Grand Slam singles crown in 2023 lifting title on home soil at US Open (d. Sabalenka in F). Picked up another three titles in 2023, marking first WTA 1000 title at Cincinnati and debut WTA 500 title at Washington DC, in addition to WTA 250 Auckland. In doubles was co-ranked No.1 with Pegula after US Open.
- In 2022, reached maiden Grand Slam final at Roland-Garros (l. Swiatek); was the youngest major finalist since Sharapova won 2004 Wimbledon
- Made Top-10 debut on September 12, 2022, following QF run at US Open (l. Garcia)
- Highlight of 2021 campaign was completing singles-doubles title sweep at Parma; defeated Q.Wang in singles final and teamed up w/McNally to win doubles
- In 2021 also reached SF at Adelaide and Rome, while at the Slams made QF at Roland-Garros and R16 at Wimbledon
- Finished R-Up in doubles at 2021 US Open (w/McNally, l. Stosur/Zhang)
- First cracked the Top 50 on February 24, 2020 at No.49, following a R16 appearance at Australian Open to tie her career best Grand Slam result during run, defeated V.Williams in 1r and her first Top-5 opponent in No.4 Osaka in 3r (l. eventual champion Kenin in 3s)
- Enjoyed breakout season in 2019, highlighted by maiden WTA singles title at Linz (as lucky loser, d. Ostapenko in F) - earned her first Top-10 win en route to title over No.8 Bertens in QF
- At 15y 214d, her title run in Linz made her youngest to win a WTA tour-level title since Vaidisova (15y 177d) won Tashkent in 2004
- Also claimed maiden WTA doubles titles at Washington, DC (w/McNally, d. Sanchez/Stollar in F) and Luxembourg (w/McNally, d. Christian/Guarachi in F)
- By winning the doubles title at Washington, DC at 15y 144d, became the youngest player to win a doubles title since May 1995 (Hingis won Hamburg at 14y 219d)
- Reached R16 at 2019 Wimbledon on Grand Slam main draw debut defeating V.Williams in 1r (l.

- Reached first two WTA finals of career in 2024 winning the title at Iasi and finishing runner-up at Ningbo
- Made first Grand Slam semifinal at 2024 Roland Garros beating World No.2 Aryna Sabalenka in the quarterfinals
- Made Top 20 debut on October 8, 2024 finishing the year at World No.16. Also won 2024 Paris Olympic silver medal in women s doubles with Diana Shnaider
- Opened 2023 season in April by winning 13 matches straight to claim back-to-back ITF titles in Switzerland; as WC, advanced to R16 at Madrid with wins over Fernandez, Haddad Maia and Linette (l. Sabalenka); subsequently made debut at Roland Garros (as qualifier, l. Gauff in 3r), Wimbledon (as qualifier, l. Keys in R16) and US Open (l. eventual champion Gauff in 2r)
- Also in 2023 reached R16 at Beijing (l. Rybakina), leading to Top 50 debut (started season just inside Top 300); voted WTA Newcomer of the Vear
- In 2022, posted 39-9 win-loss record on ITF Circuit, winning first four titles at this level
- Fell 1r on WTA main-draw debut at 2022 Monastir (as WC, l. Potapova)
- Made professional debut at W15 ITF Circuit event at Sharm El-Sheikh in February 2022
- Owns six ITF Circuit singles titles
- As a junior, finished R-Up at 2023 Australian Open (l. Korneeva)

- eventual champion Halep) followed with 3r showing at US Open (as WC, l. Osaka)
- Made WTA main draw debut as a wildcard at 2019 Miami where she earned her first WTA main draw win over good friend McNally (l. Kasatkina in 2r)
- Made professional debut in May 2018 as a qualifier into the \$25K ITF/Osprey, FL-USA
- Member of US Billie Jean King Cup team in 2022
- Former Junior World No.1 (July 2018); won 2018
 Roland-Garros girls' title (d. McNally in F) and

 Anisimova) becoming the youngest girls' singles
 finalist in tournament history at 13-years-old

- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan.
 Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
