[13] Beatriz Haddad Maia (BRA #16) vs. Anastasia Potapova (#31)

First career meeting

Haddad Maia:

- Making third appearance at Dubai, looking for her first career win at the event
- Has gone 2-4 against players outside the Top 20 this year including a 1r loss to No.28 Magdalena Frech last week in Doha
- In 2024 only Diana Shnaider (42) won more matches than Haddad Maia (35) among left-handed players on Tour

Potapova:

- Making third appearance at Dubai, where her best result was QF run in 2021 tying her career best WTA 1000
 result
- Looking for first Top 20 win since 2024 Stuttgart
- Has not lost opening match of a tournament yet this year
- Recently lifted the trophy at Cluj-Napoca, claiming her third career title

[10] Daria Kasatkina (#12) vs. [WC] Sorana Cirstea (ROU #79)

Series tied 2-2

Kasatkina:

- Making eighth appearance at Dubai, where her best result was R-Up run in 2018 (I. Svitolina in F)
- Has lost two matches to players outside the Top 50 this year to No.107 Polina Kudermetova at Brisbane and No.51 Ashlyn Krueger in Abu Dhabi
- At her five WTA events in 2025, has lost to an eventual finalist on three occasions: Brisbane (P. Kudermetova),
 Adelaide (Keys), and Abu Dhabi (Krueger)

Cirstea:

- Making ninth appearance at Dubai, where her previous and best result was reaching SF in 2024 (I. eventual champion Paolini) the oldest player to do so since the tournament's inception in 2001
- Won their most recent meeting at 2024 Miami
- Looking for first Top 20 win since 2024 Rome
- Fell first round at last three events played as a wildcard last time she won a match with this entry was at 2019 Madrid (d. Keys)

Victoria Azarenka (#30) vs. Anhelina Kalinina (UKR #50)

Azarenka leads 1-0

Azarenka:

- Making sixth appearance at Dubai, where her best result was R-Up run in 2010 (I. V.Williams in F)
- Won their only previous match-up at 2023 Adelaide #1 in two tiebreak sets
- Making her 97th WTA 1000 main draw appearance, equaling Wozniacki for the third-most since 2009; Has both won (205) and appeared in (282) the most matches at WTA 1000 events, since the format's beginning in 2009
- Only S. Williams (13) has won more WTA 1000 events than Azrenka (10, level with Swiatek)
- 20 of her 21 career singles titles have come on hard courts, most recently at Cincinnati (NYC) in 2020, while her first came at 2009 Brisbane

- Best career result on hard courts was SF run at Hobart this year

Andreeva:

- Making second appearance at Dubai, where she fell 1r in 2024 (I. Stearns)
- Won both of their previous meetings including in the 2024 lasi final to win her maiden WTA title
- Has won 10 of her last 11 matches against players outside the Top 20 with sole loss to No.46 Rebecca Sramkova last week in Doha
- Reached three WTA 1000 quarterfinals last year: Madrid, Cincinnati and Beijing

CAREER MILESTONES

- Won fourth career title at 2024 Seoul, her first WTA 500 title and finished runner-up in Cleveland. Also reached quarterfinals at the 2024 US Open for best career result in New York and ended the season at No.17, her third consecutive Top 20 finish
- In doubles in 2024, won seventh career title at Adelaide (with Taylor Townsend)
- Broke into Top 10 in June 2023 after a strong clay season with SF at Roland Garros and QF at Rome and Stuttgart; ended year at No.11
- Also in 2023, won third career title at WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai (d. Q.Zheng) and reached SF at Abu Dhabi and QF at Adelaide 2, Doha and San Diego
- In doubles, won titles at Madrid w/Victoria
 Azarenka (d. Gauff/Pegula) and WTA Elite Trophy
 Zhuhai w/Veronika Kudermetova (d.
 Kato/Sutjiadi)
- 2022 season highlighted by a stellar sequence of results on grass, when she became the first woman ever to win Nottingham and Birmingham back-to-back, her first career WTA titles
- Broke into the Top 20 following her run to the first WTA 1000 final at 2022 Toronto (l. Halep); also in 2022 advanced to SF at Monterrey and Eastbourne and three further QFs
- Also in 2022, won two titles at WTA 125K events in Saint Malo and Paris
- Won third doubles title at 2022 Nottingham w/Shuai Zhang (d. Dolehide/Niculescu), also reached final at Australian Open w/Anhelina Danilina (Krejcikova/Siniakova) and Guadalajara 1000 w/Danilina (l. Hunter/Stefani); earned spot at WTA Finals Fort Worth in doubles with Danilina going 1-2 in group play
- In 2021, peaked at No.80 in rankings; highlights where R16 at Indian Wells and falling 1r at Chicago 500; also played qualifying at Wimbledon and US Open and won five ITF Circuit titles in 2021
- Posted best win-by-ranking of career in 2021, defeating No.3 Karolina Pliskova during run to R16 as LL at Indian Wells. Played only on ITF Circuit in 2020 winning four titles and reaching one other final
- Highlights of 2019 were SF at Bogota and QF at Acapulco (both as qualifier); earned first Top 10 win of career over No.4 Sloane Stephens at Acapulco
- Ended 2018 at No.184, with season highlight reaching 3r at Miami (l. Ostapenko). Also made 2r at Hobart, Australian Open and Acapulco.

- Posted best Grand Slam result in 2024 by reaching R16 at Roland-Garros. Also made SF of Birmingham and Cleveland and her first WTA 1000 QF at Indian Wells
- A successful 2023 season saw her lift her second career title in Linz (d. Martic), she also reached semifinals at Stuttgart (l. Sabalenka) and Birmingham (l. eventual champion Ostapenko) and quarterfinals at Lyon (l. Zanevska), Miami (l. Pegula) and San Diego (l. Kenin). Equalled her best Grand Slam result with 3r at Roland Garros (also 3r at Australian Open in 2021) and moved up ranking to peak at No. 21 on Jun 19, 2023.
 - Had a breakthrough year in 2022, where she won her first title at Istanbul (d. Kudermetova) and finished R-Up at Prague (l. Bouzkova); broke into Top 50 following Prague (August 1, 2022)
- In 2021 reached QFs at Dubai (l. Krejcikova), Birmingham (l. Jabeur) and Nur-Sultan (l. Peterson)
- Posted three straight QFs in 2020, at Acapulco, St. Petersburg and Monterrey; did not play after the tour's resumption in August
- Finished 2019 season ranked No.93 after a season highlighted by SF at Budapest (l. Vondrousova) and Jurmala (l. Sevastova)
- Scored first Top-10 win over No.5 Kerber in 1r at 2019 Roland Garros
- In doubles, won titles at 2018 Moscow [River Cup] (w/Zvonareva) and 2019 Lausanne (w/Sizikova)
- Highlights of 2018 season were R-Up finishes at Tashkent (as qualifier, l. Gasparyan) and at Moscow [River Cup] (l. Danilovic)
- Made Billie Jean King Cup debut during 2018's defeat to Slovakia in February (l. Kuzmova)
- Reached 2r at St. Petersburg in February 2018 (l. Wozniacki). Win over Maria in 1r was first at tour level
- On ITF Circuit owns one singles and two doubles titles
- Fell 1r on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2017
 Wimbledon (as qualifier, l. Maria); at 16 years
 and three months, became youngest player to
 successfully navigate Slam qualifying since Ana
 Konjuh, who had just turned 16 when she did it
 at 2014 Australian Open
- Captured 2016 Wimbledon girls junior title, having to win final point three separate times after two challenge overrules - title lifted her to Junior World No.1. In junior doubles, posted two

- Posted first Top 100 season in 2017, finishing at No.65
- Broke into Top 100 following first Grand Slam main draw appearance at 2017 Roland Garros, earning spot as a qualifier Reached first WTA singles final at 2017 Seoul while ranked No.71 (l. No.10 Ostapenko)
- Other 2017 highlights include QF at Prague (as qualifier) and first Grand Slam main draw win at Wimbledon; defeated No.19 Sam Stosur en route to Prague QF, the first Top 20 win of career
- In doubles, won second title at Bogota w/Nadia Podoroska (d. Cepede Royg/Linette)
- Played three WTA main draws in 2016 at Rio de Janeiro, Miami and Florianopolis falling in 1r in each appearance; also played qualifying at Roland Garros and US Open
- In 2015, reached first QF of career at Rio de Janeiro while ranked No.234 losing to No.16 Sara Errani, the first Top 20 match of career; result propelled her into Top 200 for first time in career
- Also in 2015, reached 2r at Bogota and played qualifying at Charleston, Roland Garros, Nottingham and Wimbledon
- Won first WTA doubles title at 2015 Bogota w/Paula Cristina Goncalves (d. Falconi/Rogers)
- In July 2015, suffered a shoulder injury at the Pan American Games in Toronto, was forced to have surgery and miss remainder of season
- Played two WTA events in 2014 at Rio de Janeiro and Florianopolis; falling in 1r at both events as a WC
- Won first WTA match at 2013 Florianopolis as WC (d. Hsu, l. Czink)
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2012 Québec City (l. El Tabakh)
- Owns 17 ITF Circuit singles titles; made professional debut on ITF circuit in 2010


