MATCH NOTES – DAY 3 – TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 18

[Q] Eva Lys (GER #87) vs. [4] Jasmine Paolini (ITA #4)

First career meeting

Lys:

- Making debut main draw appearance at Dubai in just second WTA 1000 main draw of career
- Win over Irina-Camelia Begu in 1r was first career main draw win at a WTA 1000 event
- Holds 0-2 record against Top 10 players (both of those losses were to Iga Swiatek, at 2022 Stuttgart and 2025 Australian Open)
- Best result by a German player at Dubai was Julia Goerges' runner-up showing in 2012 (I. Radwanska)

Paolini:

- As defending champion, making her third main draw appearance in Dubai; won first WTA 1000 title here last year
- Last year became second Italian to win the Dubai title after her current doubles partner Sara Errani captured the title in 2016
- Since winning the title last year, has gone 20-3 against players outside the Top 50
- A loss today would be worst by-ranking since falling to No.225 Daria Saville at 2023 Hamburg

Victoria Azarenka (#34) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

Swiatek leads 3-1

First career meeting

Azarenka:

- Making sixth appearance at Dubai, where her best result was R-Up run in 2010 (I. V.Williams in F)
- Making her 97th WTA 1000 main draw appearance, equaling Wozniacki for the third-most since 2009; has both
- won (206) and appeared in (283) the most matches at WTA 1000 events since the format's beginning in 2009
 Only S. Williams (13) has won more WTA 1000 events than Azarenka (10, level with today's opponent Swiatek)
- Seeking her first win over a plaver ranked inside the Top 2 since 2016 Indian Wells final (d. No.1 S. Williams)

Swiatek:

- Making fifth appearance at Dubai; career-best showing at the event is finishing runner-up in 2023 (I. Krejcikova in final); also made SF last year (I. Kalinskaya)
- Best result by a Polish woman at Dubai was Agnieszka Radwanska's run to the title in 2012
- Has not dropped opening match of a tournament since 2021 Cincinnati
- Lost last week to No.37 Jelena Ostapenko in SF however before that, had won previous 20 matches against players outside the Top 20

[3] Coco Gauff (USA #3) vs. McCartney Kessler (USA #53)

Gauff:

- Has reached at least the quarterfinals in three of her four previous Dubai appearances with best result being semifinal performance in 2023
- Has won her last 36 matches against players ranked outside the Top 50 (most recent loss to a player ranked below No.50 was to No.128 Sofia Kenin at 2023 Wimbledon)
- Contesting her 38th career WTA 1000 main draw; she is a two-time WTA 1000 champion (2023 Cincinnati and 2024 Beijing)
- Fell last week in Doha to Marta Kostyuk in 2r after a 1r bye; has not suffered back-to-back opening match losses since 2022 Australian Open and 2022 Dubai



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Kessler:

- Making her Dubai debut this week
- Defeated last week's Doha champion, Amanda Anisimova, in 1r for first career Top 20 win in four attempts and first WTA 1000 main draw victory of career
- No.3 Gauff is the highest ranked player she has faced in career; holds 0-2 career record vs. Top 10 players (I. No.9 Maria Sakkari at 2024 Wimbledon and No.9 Daria Kasatkina at 2024 Tokyo)
- Is currently ranked No.53; this time last year was ranked exactly 100 spots lower at No.153

[7] Qinwen Zheng (CHN #8) vs. Peyton Stearns (USA #46)

Zheng:

- Reached QF here last year tying best result by a player from China at Dubai (I. Swiatek)
- Looking for just second win of the year; fell 2r last week in Doha to Ons Jabeur after a 1r bye, the same player who today's opponent beat in 1r here yesterday
- Has not lost back-to-back opening matches since losing 1r at Berlin, Eastbourne and Wimbledon in 2023
- Career best WTA 1000 result was reaching final at 2024 Wuhan (I. Sabalenka in F)

Stearns:

- Looking for back-to-back main draw wins for the first time this year
- Holds 0-3 record against Top 10 players this year (0-10 career record) with losses to No.9 Daria Kasatkina at Brisbane, No.8 Emma Navarro at Australian Open and No.7 Elena Rybakina at Doha
- Best win by-ranking of career was beating No.13 Daria Kasatkina at 2024 Roland Garros and 2024 US Open
- Owns 2-0 career record against players from China

[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. [Q] Veronika Kudermetova (#50)

Sabalenka:

- Is a three-time quarterfinalist at Dubai reaching the final eight in 2020, 2021 and 2023
- Fell 2r last week in Doha after a 1r bye was her first time dropping the opening match of a tournament since doing so here last year; has not lost back-to-back opening matches since 2022 Indian Wells and Miami
- A loss today would be worst by ranking since losing to No.132 Amanda Anisimova at 2024 Toronto
- Owns seven WTA 1000 titles including two last year at Cincinnati and Wuhan

Kudermetova:


- Is a former finalist here finishing runner-up in 2022 (I. Ostapenko in F)
- Has won their last two meetings both at Berlin in 2022 and 2023
- Owns 0-5 record against World No.1s; best win by-ranking of career comes against No.2 Iga Swiatek at 2023 Tokyo and beating today's opponent ranked No.2 at 2023 Berlin
- One of four qualifiers to reach 2r; best result by a qualifier at Dubai was Runner-Up run by Anna Kalinskaya last year

- Faces No.4 Jasmine Paolini in 2r today; holds 0-2 record against Top 10 players (both of those losses were to Iga Swiatek, at 2022 Stuttgart and 2025 Australian Open)
- Best win by-ranking of career was over No.26 Sorana Cirstea at 2023 Cluj Napoca
- Owns 0-1 career Tour-level record against players from Italy (0-0 in 2025)
- Best career Tour-level results on hard court are two SF performances (2023 Cluj-Napoca and 2024 Monastir)
- Only player from Germany in this week's main draw

- A loss today would be worst by-ranking since falling to No.225 Daria Saville at 2023 Hamburg
- Has not dropped opening match of a tournament since 2024 Rome
- Owns 8-3 career tour-level record against players from Germany (0-0 in 2025)
- Both of her singles titles have come on hard court (2021 Portoroz and 2024 Dubai)
- Only player from Italy in this week's main draw
- Last year became second Italian to win Dubai title; the first was her current doubles partner Sara Errani, who captured the title in 2016
- Is currently ranked a career-high No.4; this time last year was ranked No.26
- Contesting her 29th career WTA 1000 main draw; along with her Dubai title last year, she has made two additional WTA 1000 QFs (2023 Cincinnati and 2024 Wuhan)
- So far this year, ranked inside the Top 10 on tour in percentage of return games won (44.8%) and percentage of return points won (47.8%)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Standout results of 2024 came in the second half of the season with semifinals at Budapest (l. eventual champion Shnaider) and Monastir (l. eventual champion Kartal); also made QF at Osaka (l. Ito) and reached a career high ranking of No.105 in September
- Reached first career SF at 2023 Cluj Napoca (l. Korpatsch) and QF at Hamburg (l. Rus); defeated No.1 seed Sorana Cirstea at Cluj Napoca for first Top 30 win of career
- Also in 2023, made Grand Slam main draw debut at Australian Open as a qualifier and reached 2r at US Open as a qualifier
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2022 Stuttgart reaching 2r as a qualifier and defeated No.38 Viktoria Golubic in 1r while ranked No.342 (l. Swiatek); also in 2022 reached 2r at Lausanne, fell 1r at Hamburg and contested qualifying at Berlin, Wimbledon, US Open and Tallinn
- Contested first WTA qualifying rounds at Hamburg and Linz in 2021
- Won first ITF Circuit singles title at W25 event in Altenkirchen, Germany in March 2020; owns three ITF singles titles
- Made professional debut on ITF Circuit in United States in 2016

- Breakout 2024 season saw her win the biggest title of her career at WTA 1000 Dubai and also reach her first Grand Slam finals, finishing R-Up at Roland-Garros and Wimbledon. Qualified for her first WTA Finals in singles and doubles, broke into the Top 10 for the first time in her career and finished the season as the World No.4
- Finished 2023 by breaking into Top 30 for first time, achieving No. 29 on Oct 23, 2023 after becoming runner-up at Monastir (l. Mertens). Also achieved runner-up at Palermo and SF at Zhengzhou (l. Zheng both times) as well as QFs at Lyon (l. Garcia) and Cincinnati as a qualifier (l. eventual champion Gauff). Enjoyed two Top 10 wins (No.10 Garcia and No.4 Rybakina).
- In 2022, finished R-Up at Cluj-Napoca (l. Blinkova), while made back-to-back SF at Palermo (l. Bronzetti) and Warsaw (l. eventual champion Garcia)
- Also reached QF at Lyon (l. Yastremska), Portoroz (l. eventual champion Siniakova) and Parma (l. Kovinic)
- Broke into Top 50 on January 31, 2021
- Posted near-Top 50 season finish in 2021 after capturing first WTA singles title of career at Portoroz (d. Riske in F)
- Strong season finish also brought SF run at Courmayeur(l. eventual champion Vekic) and QF effort at Linz (l. Halep); posted best win of season over No.18 Mertens en route to 3r at Indian Wells (l. Pegula)
- Also in 2021 won the WTA 125K event in Bol, Croatia (d. Rus in F) and was R-Up at the same level in Saint Malo (l. Golubic) Captured first WTA doubles title in 2021, at Hamburg(w/Teichmann)
- In 2021, for first time in career, contested the full suite of all four Grand Slam events; reached 2r at Roland Garros and US Open, equalling best previous Slam result
- In 2020, reached 2r four times at WTA tournaments, including Roland Garros (l. Kvitova)
- Highlights of 2019 included QF showings at Guangzhou and Palermo, a SF run at the WTA 125K Series event at Karlsruhe, lifting seventh, eighth and ninth ITF Circuit titles of her career, at \$60KBrescia-ITA, \$25K ITF/Curtiba-BRA and \$100K ITF/Tokyo-JPN, and qualifying for maiden Grand Slam main draw at Roland Garros (l. Kasatkina in 1r)

- Ended 2018 ranked No.180, with season highlight a maiden WTA singles QF at Prague (d. No.15 Kasatkina, l. Zhang)
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2017 Bastad (l. Suarez Navarro in 1r) and also fell 1r at Guangzhou and in qualifying a further three times
- Part of Italy's Billie Jean King Cup team 2017-19
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2015 Rome
- Made professional debut on ITF Circuit in Italy in 2011


OTHER INFORMATION

- Resides in Bagni di Lucca and trains in Forte dei Marmi, Italy
- Father is Ugo Paolini, mother is Jacqueline Gardiner and brother is William Paolini. Grandmother lives in Lodz, Poland. Mother is of Ghanaian/Polish descent

- Only S. Williams (13) has won more WTA 1000 events than Azarenka (10, level with today's opponent Swiatek)
- Defeated Anhelina Kalinina in Monday's 1r, coming back from a 6-2, 5-2 deficit; aiming for back-to-back wins for first time this season
- Faces No.2 Iga Swiatek in 2r today; owns 81 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.3 Elena Rybakina (via retirement) and No.9 Maria Sakkari at 2024 Berlin
- Holds 8-26 career record against players ranked inside Top 2 at time of meeting; her most recent Top 2 win came over No.1 S. Williams in 2016 Indian Wells final
- Owns 22-10 career tour-level record against players from Poland (0-0 in 2025)
- 20 of her 21 career singles titles have come on hard courts, most recently at Cincinnati (NYC) in 2020, while her first came at 2009 Brisbane
- Is currently ranked No.34; this time last year was ranked No.27. Held World No.1 ranking for a total of 51 weeks during 2012 and 2013

- Has not lost opening match of a tournament since 2021 Cincinnati (l. No.20 Jabeur in 2r after 1r bye)
- Lost last week to No.37 Jelena Ostapenko in SF hoever before that, had won previous 20 matches against players outside the Top 20
- 12 of her 22 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court, most recently 2024 Indian Wells
- 1 of 3 players from Poland in this week's main draw and the only one contesting the 2r (Frech and Linette lost 1r)
- Best result by Poland at Dubai was Agnieszka Radwanska's title run in 2012
- Is currently ranked No.2; this time last year was ranked No.1. Has spent 125 total weeks ranked World No.1 during her career
- So far this season, ranks No.3 on tour in percentage of service games won (79.9%)

- Best results in 2024 were reaching SF at Brisbane (l. Sabalenka), Miami (l. Rybakina) and Berlin (l. Kalinskaya). Made 4r at Australian Open (l. Yastremska). 





- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan. Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
