[WC] Rebecca Marino (CAN #123) vs. [8] Emma Navarro (USA #11)

Navarro leads 2-0

Marino:

- Making 6th main draw appearance at this tournament, where her best result was reaching 4r in 2021 (l. Sabalenka)
- Has beaten Elsa Jacquemot so far this week to reach her first 2r since 2r at Auckland in 2025
- Owns two wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.15 Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova at Luxembourg 2011
- Looking to win consecutive Tour-level matches for the first time since advancing to QF at Birmingham in 2023

Navarro:

- Making 2nd main draw appearance at this tournament, where her previous result was reaching SF in 2024 (l. Amanda Anisimova)
- Holds a 2-0 career record against Marino, winning in qualifying at Cincinnati in 2023 and at WTA 125 Vancouver in 2022
- Seeking first career Tour-level win against an opponent from Canada. Is 0-4 in her career, with a record in 2025 standing at 0-1 (l. Fernandez at Doha)
- Owns two career hard court titles: Mérida in 2025 and Hobart in 2024

Maya Joint (AUS #45) vs. Leylah Fernandez (CAN #24)

Fernandez leads 1-0

Joint:

- The 19-year-old is making her tournament debut this week
- This is the 2nd straight week Joint will face Fernandez in a 1st-round match; last week, eventual champion Fernandez defeated Joint in Washington D.C. 1r
- Owns three wins in career over Top 50 players, most recently No.38 Emma Raducanu at 2025 Eastbourne (Joint went on to win that Eastbourne title)
- Contesting just her 4th career WTA 1000 main draw; so far, her only WTA 1000 main-draw match-win came at 2025 Madrid (d. Martinez Cirez)

Fernandez:

- Canadian No.1 enters event on a five-match winning streak after claiming 4th career WTA singles title last week in Washington D.C. (d. Kalinskaya in final)
- Making her 6th main-draw appearance at this event; career-best tournament result is R16 in 2023
- All of her four WTA singles titles have come on hard court (2021 and 2022 Monterrey, 2023 Hong Kong and 2025 Washington)
- Also made a Grand Slam final on hard court at 2021 US Open (l. Raducanu)
- Contesting her 36th career WTA 1000 main draw; she is a 3-time WTA 1000 quarterfinalist, most recently at 2024 Cincinnati

[4] Mirra Andreeva (#5) vs. [WC] Bianca Andreescu (CAN #187)**First Meeting****Andreeva:**

- Making her tournament debut this week
- She is a 2-time champion at WTA 1000 events, winning successive WTA 1000 titles at Dubai and Indian Wells earlier this year
- Has won 36 tour-level matches so far in 2025, 3rd-most on tour (trailing only Sabalenka and Swiatek)
- Andreeva is 0-1 vs. players ranked outside the Top 100 this year (l. No.361 Boisson in Roland Garros QF; since then, Boisson has entered the Top 50)
- Currently ranked a career-high World No.5

Andreescu:

- Making 7th main-draw appearance at this tournament, where she won the title in 2019 (d. S. Williams in final, via retirement)
- She is one of two Canadian women to win this title in the Open Era (also Faye Urban in 1969, d. Vicki Berner in all-Canadian final)
- Defeated fellow Grand Slam champion Barbora Krejčíková in 1r, capturing 1st tour-level win since she beat Sun in 's-Hertogenbosch R16 in June
- Holds 4-9 record versus players ranked inside the Top 5 at the time of their meeting; all of her Top 5 wins occurred in 2019 (including two in her title run at this event)
- She is a 2-time WTA 1000 champion (2019 Indian Wells and 2019 Toronto)

[1] Coco Gauff (USA #2) vs. Danielle Collins (USA #61)**First Meeting****Gauff:**

- Making her 5th appearance at this tournament; her career-best showings at the event are three consecutive QFs between 2021 and 2023
- Has won two WTA 1000 titles in her career, both on hard court (2023 Cincinnati and 2024 Beijing; d. Muchova in both finals)
- Gauff is 12-2 this year vs. players ranked outside the Top 50 (the two losses were to Kessler at Dubai and Bencic at Indian Wells; both players have since entered Top 50)
- Eight of her 10 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court, most recently the 2024 WTA Finals Riyadh
- Is No. 1 seed this week; has been top seed at five tournaments in her career (including at this event last year)

Collins:

- Making 4th appearance at this tournament; her most recent and career-best showing at the event is QF in 2023 (l. then-World No.1 Swiatek)
- Owns 16 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.2 Iga Swiatek at 2025 Rome
- Holds a 3-15 career record versus players ranked inside the Top 2 at the time of their meeting
- Two of her four career WTA singles titles have come on hard court (2021 San Jose and 2024 Miami); she also made a Grand Slam final on hard court (2022 Australian Open, l. Barty)
- Career-best result at a WTA 1000 event is winning the title at 2024 Miami (d. Rybakina in final)

[23] Sofia Kenin (USA #27) vs. [WC] Victoria Mboko (CAN #85)

First Meeting

Kenin:

- Making 4th main draw appearance at this tournament, where her best result was reaching SF in 2019 (l. Andreescu)
- Holds a 9-10 career record against wildcards, with a record in 2025 standing at 1-1 (d. Kvitova at Miami, l. Joint at Hobart)
- Best result on hard court this season is a pair of QF appearances at Dubai and Hobart
- Owns four career hard court titles: Lyon and Australian Open in 2020 and Guangzhou and Hobart in 2019

Mboko:

- Making main draw debut at this tournament
- Has beaten Kimberly Birrell so far this week to reach her first 2r since 2r at Washington D.C. 2025
- Owns three wins in her career over Top 50 players, most recently No.42 Anastasia Potapova at Washington D.C. 2025
- Is currently ranked No.85; this time last year was ranked No.358

CAREER MILESTONES

- Strongest results of 2024 were achieved at WTA 125s, winning Midland (d. Parks in F) and semifinal at Tampico (l. Blinkova); also claimed two ITF \$100K titles at Irapuato and Ilkley
- Best result of 2023 came on grass reaching quarterfinal at Birmingham (as qualifier, l. Zhu). Made 2r at Auckland (l. Bonaventure), Monterrey (l. Zhu), Miami (l. Gauff), Madrid (l. Mertens) and Osaka (l. Mandlik) falling out of the Top 100 by year-end.
- At 2022 Washington DC, advanced to first WTA QF in nearly four years (as qualifier, l. Saville)
- Made further QFs at Granby (l. Kostyuk) and Chennai (l. Linette), and reached three ITF Circuit finals, winning title at W60 event in Arcadia, CA
- On July 11, 2022, returned to Top 100 after a decade-long absence
- At 2021 Australian Open, won first main draw match at a Slam since 2011 Wimbledon (d. Birrell in 1r, l. Vondrousova in 2r)
- In total, made five main draw appearances in 2021, with best result coming at Montreal where she reached 3r (l. Sabalenka)

In 2019 contested Grand Slam qualifying at Australian Open and Roland Garros; comeback was hampered by a severe foot injury forcing her to miss second half of 2019 and all of 2020

- Reached QF at Quebec City (l. Watson) and won two more ITF Circuit titles to end 2018 with 49-12 record and back inside Top 200
- Returned to tennis in January 2018, winning her first 18 matches to lift a hat-trick of titles on ITF Circuit
- Decided in late February 2013 to take an indefinite break from tennis. During her break, she studied English literature at the University of British Columbia and was part of the rowing team
- Appeared in career-first WTA singles final at 2011 Memphis (ret. vs. Rybarikova w/left abdominal injury)
- Best Grand Slam result was 3r run at 2011 Roland Garros (l. Kuznetsova); broke into Top 50 following the tournament at No.45
- Made Top-100 debut on January 31, 2011
- Reached maiden WTA QF at 2010 Quebec City; recorded first Top-20 victory over No.14 Bartoli en route
- Played first WTA qualifying at 2006 Montreal and first main draw at 2008 Quebec City

- Voted 2024 WTA Most Improved Player of the Year Award, finished the year ranked No.8 with a singles record of 54-24, winning her first career title at 2024 Hobart; climbed to a year-end ranking at No.8 after finishing 2023 at No.38 (and No.143 in 2022)
- 2023 was a stand-out year, achieving a career best with semifinal at WTA 500 San Diego (l. Kenin) and ending season with a ranking of No. 32. Also reached two quarterfinals on clay; Strasbourg (l. Blinkova) and Palermo (l. eventual champion Zheng) and one semifinal on grass; Bad Homburg (l. Siniakova).
- In 2022, posted 31-18 win-loss record. At Tour-level, made 2r at Charleston (as WC, l. Jabeur), fell 1r at Monterrey (as WC, l. Zacarias) and Indian Wells (as WC, l. Anisimova), and contested qualifying at San Diego
- Elsewhere in 2022, reached three ITF Circuit finals, including lifting second career title at this level at W60 tournament in Liepaja, Latvia, while made SF at WTA 125K Series event in Vancouver
- Broke into Top 200 for the first time on March 7, 2022
- Lifted maiden ITF Circuit title at W25 event in Orlando in November 2021
- Won the NCAA division 1 women's singles title in May 2021 to earn a WC into US Open, where she fell 1r (l. McHale)
- In 2021, reached 2r at both Charleston [500] and Charleston [250]
- Fell 1r at 2020 Monterrey (l. Stephens)
- Only other events in 2020 came on ITF Circuit, ending year ranked No.463
- Owns three ITF Circuit titles in singles and one in doubles
- Fell 2r on professional debut at \$10k Charleston, SC-USA (l. Di Lorenzo) in 2015
- Began her collegiate career by winning her first 14 NCAA singles matches and moving up to a No.6 ITA ranking
- Ended 2019 at No.3 in ITF Junior rankings, following a season that included a R-Up finish at Roland Garros (l. Fernandez), a SF run at Wimbledon and victory at the Adidas Easter Bowl
- Also R-Up in girls' doubles at 2019 Australian Open w/Beck

- Owns 13 singles titles on ITF Circuit; won three titles in four weeks on ITF Circuit in autumn 2010, compiling an 18-match winning streak
- Made Top 50 debut on July 11, 2011

- Born in Toronto and moved to Vancouver at age 2 and grew up there (loves west coast). Parents own construction company in Vancouver, 'Marino General Contracting'
- Started playing at age 10 with father and brother (says that made it lots of fun). Brother was on rowing team at Cal Berkeley (on rowing team), while uncle was gold medalist for Canada in rowing at 1964 Tokyo Olympics
- Best shots are serve and forehand; favorite surface is hard; favorite tournaments are all Canadian ones and US Open
- Best tennis memories are first Top 100 win in Québec City and qualifying for main draw at 2010 US Open
- Likes watching movies and hockey (supports Vancouver Canucks)

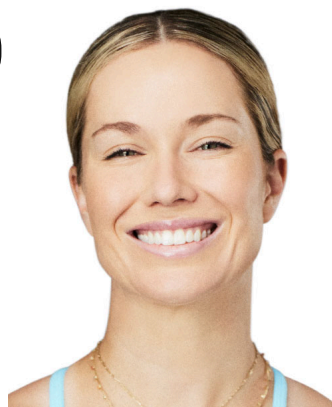

- Achieved best result of 2024 at Tokyo with runner-up (l. Zheng in final). In doubles claimed her third and fourth career titles at Abu Dhabi and Miami w/Bethanie Mattek-Sands.
