MATCH NOTES – DAY 6 – FRIDAY, AUGUST 1

Naomi Osaka (JPN #49) vs. [22] Jelena Ostapenko (LAT #26)

Osaka leads 2-0

Osaka:

- Saved two match points in previous round against No.16 Liudmila Samsonova for first time winning a match from match point down since 2021 Australian Open which she went on to win
- Best result at this event was reaching QF at Toronto in 2019 (l. S. Williams)
- Looking to reach Round of 16 at a WTA 1000 event for the third time this year also at Miami (l. Paolini in R16) and Rome (l. Stearns in R16)
- Leads Tour in first serves won (74.1%) and service points won (63.3%); and is second in service games won (78.9%, behind only Rybakina)

Ostapenko:

- Making ninth appearance at this tournament, where her previous best results were reaching R16 in 2019 (l. Bouzkova) and 2024 (l. Townsend)
- After 1r bye, beat Renata Zarazua for first match win in Montreal in career; all previous wins at this event happened in Toronto
- One of two players from Latvia to reach third round (Anastasija Sevastova plays defending champion, Jessica Pegula today)
- Won two hard court titles last year at Linz and Adelaide; owns one hard court WTA 1000 title in career at 2022 Dubai

Anastasija Sevastova: (LAT #386) vs. [3] Jessica Pegula (USA #4)

Tied at 1-1

Sevastova:

- Making fifth main draw appearance at this event and first since 2021 due to maternity leave followed by an ACL tear last year
- Her best result was reaching QF while ranked No.19 in 2018 (l. Stephens)
- Owns ten Top 10 wins in career most recently over No.9 Serena Williams in BJK Cup action in 2020, and most recent Top 10 win at a WTA event was beating No.6 Naomi Osaka at 2018 Beijing
- Best career result on hard courts was R-Up run at 2018 Beijing which is also her career best run at a WTA 1000 event

Pegula:

- Making fifth main draw appearance as the two-time defending champion winning the title in 2023 (d. Samsonova in F) and 2024 (d. Anisimova in F)
- Also reached SF in her only two other appearances in 2021 and 2022
- Has only lost three Tour-level matches against players outside the Top 300 in career including earlier this year to No.361 Lois Boisson at Roland Garros

- During last year's North American summer hard court swing reached won the title at Toronto and finished R-Up at US Open and Cincinnati

[5] Amanda Anisimova (USA #7) vs. Emma Raducanu (GBR #33)

Raducanu leads 2-0

Anisimova:

- Making 4th appearance at the tournament, where her previous result was reaching F in 2024 (in Toronto, l. Pegula in champion match)
- Career best result at a WTA-1000 event was title run at Doha 2025 (d. Ostapenko in F)
- Besides Doha 2025, owns a second title on hard court at Melbourne 250 #2 in 2022
- Is currently ranked at career-high No.7 (achieved on July 14); this time last year was ranked No.176

Raducanu:

- Her best result at a WTA-1000 event was QF run at Miami (l. eventual R-Up Pegula)
- Owns 3 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.10 Emma Navarro at Miami 2025
- Her 1 tour-level singles title has come on hard court: the 2021 US Open (first qualifier to win a Grand Slam title in Open Era)
- Opened this year's North American summer hard-court swing with 1st SF of the year in Washington (l. Kalinskaya)

Eva Lys (GER #69) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

Swiatek leads 2-0

Lys:

- Has beaten Leolia Jeanjean and Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova to reach 3r, her best result across all WTA-1000 events
- Faces No.3 Iga Swiatek in 3r today; has failed in all her previous six attempts against Top 10 opponents
- Career best win by ranking was over No.26 Cirstea at Cluj-Napoca 2023
- Best career result on hard court is SF run at Monastir 2024 and Cluj-Napoca 2023
- Is currently ranked No.69 (peak rank at No.55 on July 14, 2025); this time last year was ranked No.112

Swiatek:

- After 1r bye, has beaten Hanyu Guo in her first match after winning Wimbledon 2025
- Faces No.69 Eva Lys in 3r today; record against opponents outside Top 50 stands at 90-3 since the start of 2022 season, with the only loss in 2025 to No. 140 Eala at Miami
- Owns 11-0 career record against players from Germany, having played and defeated today's opponent Lys in both of their previous meetings
- Owns 12 singles titles on hard court, most recently Indian Wells and Doha in 2024
- Has won 43 matches so far in 2025; she is ranked No.2 on tour for match wins, behind Aryna Sabalenka (47)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Returned to play in 2024 following maternity leave and reached the QF at Doha and 's-Hertogenbosch, as well as R16 at Rome and Beijing
- Played 2022 Tokyo in September before taking a 15 month break to give birth to daughter Shai in early July 2023
- In 2022 had success at Miami, where she fell to Swiatek in the final, her first final since the 2021 Australian Open. Also reached the semifinals at Melbourne 250 #1 (withdrew before semifinal with Kudermetova w/abdominal injury)
- Won 2021 Australian Open (d. Brady in F) to become first woman since Seles in the early 1990s to win each of her first four Grand Slam finals - is the 16th woman to win four or more majors in the Open Era
- At 2020 US Open, came from a set and a break down to Azarenka and win third Grand Slam title of career
- Also last season was R-Up at Western & Southern Open - withdrew w/left hamstring injury before final against Azarenka
- Won second Grand Slam at Australian Open (d. Kvitova in F); became first Japanese player to reach World No.1 ranking following the tournament
- In addition, won back-to-back titles for first time in her career at Osaka (d. Pavlyuchenkova in F) and Beijing (d. Barty in F); defeated No.1 Barty in Beijing final for second career victory over world No.1 (also beat Halep at 2018 Indian Wells)
- Enjoyed break-out season in 2018, posting a 40-20 record resulting in a No.5 (first Top 10 season), up from No.68 in 2017
- Won the first two titles of her career in 2018, at Indian Wells (d. Kasatkina in F) and debut Grand Slam crown at US Open (d. S.Williams in F)
- En route to the Indian Wells title, defeated five-time major champion Sharapova, and A.Radwanska, Ka.Pliskova and Halep. Only set dropped all fortnight was against Sakkari in R16
- Reached one further final in 2018, at Tokyo [PPO] (l. Ka.Pliskova)
- In reaching R16 at 2018 Australian Open, became youngest Japanese player to reach R16 at a Slam since Sugiyama at 1995 Roland Garros (19y, 342d) and the youngest player from Japan to reach R16 in Melbourne since Date in 1990 (19y, 122d)
- Book-ended 2017 season with QF showings at Auckland and Hong Kong; other highlights
- Won seventh and eighth titles of career in 2024 at Adelaide and Linz. In doubles won first Grand Slam title at 2024 Australian Open and qualified for 2024 WTA Finals Riyadh (both with Lyudmyla Kichenok)
- Won sixth career title at 2023 Birmingham (d. Krejcikova in F) and reached SF at Rome; in doubles achieved R-Up at Doha (w/L.Kichenok)
- At 2022 Dubai, lifted fifth career singles title (d. Kudermetova in F); finished R-Up at Eastbourne (l. Kvitova) and Seoul (l. Alexandrova) as well as SF at St. Petersburg and Doha
- Won two doubles titles in 2022 at Birmingham and Cincinnati (both w/L.Kichenok); qualified for WTA Finals reaching SF Lifted first grass court title at 2021 Eastbourne (as WC, d. Kontaveit in F)
- In 2021, also finished R-Up at Luxembourg (l. Tauson), made SF at Indian Wells (l. Azarenka), reached QF at Rome and represented Latvia at the Tokyo Olympics (l. Vesnina in 1r)
- Won doubles title at 2021 Moscow (w/Siniakova)
- Highlights of 2020 season included three Top 10 wins and reaching QF at Strasbourg
- Finished R-Up in doubles w/Dabrowski at 2020 Doha (l. Hsieh/Strycova)
- 2019 season saw her capture third career title at Luxembourg (d. Goerges in F) right after finishing R-Up at Linz (l. Gauff)
- Also R-Up in mixed doubles at 2019 Wimbledon w/Lindstedt
- 2018 campaign highlighted by finishing R-Up at Miami (l. Stephens); beat No.9 Petra Kvitova and No.4 Elina Svitolina to register multiple Top 10 wins in the same tournament for the first time
- Reached SF at 2018 Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Kerber) to become first Latvian woman to reach final four at All England Club
- Achieved career-high ranking of No.5 on March 19, 2018
- In doubles won title at 2018 Doha (w/Dabrowski)
- Enjoyed career-best season in 2017, finishing the year in the Top 10 for the first time (at No.7); was No.44 at end of 2016 (first Top 50 finish) and No.79 at end of 2015 (first Top 100 finish)
- Champion at 2017 Roland Garros (d. Halep in F) becoming first woman to win first tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Barbara Jordan at 1979 Australian Open. Also became the first unseeded player to lift the trophy in the Open Era and the first Latvian player to reach the championship match at a Grand Slam

- included 3r runs at Wimbledon and US Open
- Scored first Top 5 win of career when she defeated No.5 V.Williams at 2017 Hong Kong. Upset win over defending champion and No.6-ranked Kerber at 2017 US Open marked first career Top 10 win
- Voted 2016 WTA Newcomer of the Year; highlight was career-first WTA final at Tokyo [PPO] (L. Wozniacki). Also reached QF on three occasions and 3r at Australian Open, Roland Garros and US Open
- Ranked No.406, made WTA main draw debut at 2014 Stanford. As an alternate, won through qualifying (achieving first WTA qualifying wins), and came from match point down to shock No.19 Stosur in 1r of main draw, before losing to No.18 Petkovic in 2r
- Made WTA qualifying debut at Quebec City in 2013 (L. Dabrowski)

- Followed up title run with QF appearance at 2017 Wimbledon; also won title at Seoul (d. Haddad Maia in F) and reached final at Charleston (L. Kasatkina)





CAREER MILESTONES

- Standout results of 2024 came in the second half of the season with semifinals at Budapest (l. eventual champion Shnaider) and Monastir (l. eventual champion Kartal); also made QF at Osaka (l. Ito) and reached a career high ranking of No.105 in September

Reached first career SF at 2023 Cluj Napoca (l. Korpatsch) and QF at Hamburg (l. Rus); defeated No.1 seed Sorana Cirstea at Cluj Napoca for first Top 30 win of career

- Also in 2023, made Grand Slam main draw debut at Australian Open as a qualifier and reached 2r at US Open as a qualifier
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2022 Stuttgart reaching 2r as a qualifier and defeated No.38 Viktoria Golubic in 1r while ranked No.342 (l. Swiatek); also in 2022 reached 2r at Lausanne, fell 1r at Hamburg and contested qualifying at Berlin, Wimbledon, US Open and Tallinn
- Contested first WTA qualifying rounds at Hamburg and Linz in 2021
- Won first ITF Circuit singles title at W25 event in Altenkirchen, Germany in March 2020; owns three ITF singles titles
- Made professional debut on ITF Circuit in United States in 2016

- Claimed five titles in 2024, making it a three-peat at Roland-Garros and also winning Doha, Indian Wells, Madrid and Rome. Crossed \$30m in prize money and qualified for her fourth WTA Finals
- Won six titles across 2023, including winning fourth Grand Slam title at Roland-Garros (d. Muchova in F) and going undefeated at the WTA Finals in Cancun (d. Pegula in F). Finished season as WTA World No.1 player for second consecutive year.
- In 2022, lifted second and third Grand Slam titles, at Roland-Garros (d. Gauff in F) and US Open (d. Jabeur in F)
- Triumph in Paris was the last of six straight titles during 37-match winning streak - joint-longest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990
- Won two titles in 2021, at Adelaide and Rome. Other highlights included QF at Roland-Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage)
- Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland-Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, l. Krejickova/Siniakova)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland - man or woman - to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since A.Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Ranked No.54, she became the lowest-ranked woman to win the Roland-Garros title in the Open Era and the lowest-ranked finalist since 1977 (No.56 Mihai). At 19y 132d, is the youngest champion in Paris since Monica Seles (18y 187d) in 1992
- Also became the first player to win her debut Tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Jelena Ostapenko at 2017 Roland-Garros
- Won WTA Most Improved Player of the Year for 2020, as voted on by members of the media. Also won the 2020 WTA Fan Favorite Award
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.61 after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Lugano (l. Hercog) and R16 run at Roland-Garros (l. Halep). That year also reached 3r at Toronto (l. Osaka) and made 2r five times (incl. Australian and US Open)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.88 after R-Up finish at 2019 Lugano
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 Auckland
- Ended 2018 season ranked No.175 (up from No.690 in 2017), after posting 42-6 record and winning four titles on ITF Circuit

- Member of Poland's Billie Jean King Cup team, 2018-20, 2021-22
- On professional debut, came through qualifying to win title at \$10k ITF/Stockholm-SWE in 2016; owns seven singles titles at this level
- Enjoyed stellar junior career, including winning girls' singles at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Kung in F) and leading Poland to Junior Fed Cup in 2016
