**[6] Madison Keys (USA #8) vs. [11] Karolina Muchova (CZE #14)**

**Keys leads 1-0**

### **Keys:**

- Best result at a WTA 1000 event was title run at Cincinnati 2019 (d. Kuznetsova)
- Is looking to reach QF at Canadian Open for the second time in her career after 2016 (nine years ago) - she would have the longest gap in the Open Era between her first two QF at the event (level with Ana Ivanovic)
- Is looking to reach her 15<sup>th</sup> WTA 1000 QF
- Only Aryna Sabalenka (1513) has made more winners in 2025 than Madison Keys (1286) - excluding team events
- Owns five singles titles on hard court: Australian Open and Adelaide 2025, Adelaide 250 in 2022, Cincinnati 2019 and Stanford 2017

### **Muchova:**

- Best WTA 1000 result was R-Up at Beijing 2024 (l. Gauff in F) and Cincinnati 2023 (l. Gauff in F)
- Has equalled her best career result at the Canadian Open by reaching R16 (also in 2023, lost Iga Swiatek)
- Looking to reach her 7th WTA 1000 QF, after having made the first on clay (Madrid 2021), she reached all the following five on hard court
- Owns one win this season against Top 10 opponents, defeating Jasmine Paolini at the United Cup
- Owns one singles title on hard court at Seoul 2019

## Naomi Osaka (JPN #49) vs. Anastasija Sevastova (LAT #386)

Sevastova leads 3-2

### **Osaka:**

- Could equal her best career result at the Canadian Open by reaching QF after having lost at this stage at 2019 Toronto to S.Williams
- Among players from Japan, only Ai Sugiyama (13) has made more WTA 1000 QFs than Osaka (11) since the format's introduction in 1990
- With a win today would equal her longest winning streak this season in WTA level events (four also in Auckland, en route to the final)
- Has won 19 matches so far in 2025; is looking to equal her total tally of matches won in the entire 2024 season (20)
- Among players with 10+ WTA 1000 matches played in 2025, only Rybakina (74.3%) holds a higher first serve points won percentage than Osaka (73.5%, 440/599) this season

### **Sevastova:**

- Could become the fourth player in the Open Era to reach QF at the Canadian Open after having turned 35, after Louise Brown (1968 and 1969), Benita Senn (1968 and 1969) and S.Williams (2019)
- Looking to reach QF at the Canadian Open for the second time in her career after 2018 (seven years ago): in the Open Era, only Ana Ivanovic (nine years), Martina Navratilova and Sylvia Hanika (eight years each) would have a longer gap between their first two QF at the event - Keys could reach her second QF nine years after her first (in 2016)
- Looking to reach her first QF at a WTA 1000 event for the first time since Miami 2021

## [16] Clara Tauson (DEN #19) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #3)

Swiatek leads 2-0

### **Tauson:**

- In her second main draw appearance at the Canadian Open (lost in 1r to Paula Badosa last season at Toronto)
- Is looking to becoming the second Danish to reach QF at the event after Caroline Wozniacki (2010, 2012, 2014 and 2017)
- Looking to her second career WTA 1000 QF, after Dubai earlier this season (en route to final)
- Among players with 10+ WTA 1000 matches played in 2025, only Rybakina (78.4%) and Sabalenka (78.0%) have a higher serving game won percentage than Tauson (77.5%, 138/178) this season
- Is currently ranked at a career-high No.19 (achieved on July 14, 2025)

### **Swiatek:**

- Her best previous tournament result was in 2023 with SF (l. eventual champion Pegula)
- The Canadian Open is one of the two WTA 1000 events Swiatek has appeared without ever reaching the final, along with Cincinnati
- Has won 18 of her last 19 WTA 1000 R16 matches, only losing to Alexandrova at Miami last season
- Is the player with the joint-most hard court WTA level wins in 2025 (23, equaling Sabalenka)
- Only Sabalenka (21) and Mirra Andrejeva (20) have won more WTA 1000 main draw matches than Swiatek in 2025 (19)

**[5] Amanda Anisimova (USA #7) vs. [10] Elina Svitolina (UKR #13)**

**Svitolina leads 3-1**

***Anisimova:***

- Is appearing as Top 10 seed in a WTA 1000 main draw for the first time in her career
- Has reached her third R16 at the Canadian Open after 2021 and 2024, equalling her best career result at the event when held in Montreal (I. Karolina Pliskova in 2021)
- Has reached an 11th career WTA 1000 R16 and her third of 2025, after Doha and Miami
- Has claimed her 50th career WTA 1000 match win, becoming the ninth American to achieve the feat since the format's introduction in 2009
- Has claimed the most WTA level match wins of any player since the start of the grass swing in June (14) - Anisimova holds a win-loss record of 14-3 over that span

***Svitolina:***

- Looking to reach her 4th QF at the Canadian Open (after 2017, 2018 and 2019) - among current players, only Victoria Azarenka has more (five)
- Could reach her fourth WTA 1000 QF of the season after Indian Wells, Madrid and Rome, equalling Sabalenka and M.Andreeva - only Swiatek has more (already five before the Canadian Open)
- Has won 12 of the 17 returning games so far at the Canadian Open 2025, 70.6%: only Tauson has a higher percentage so far in the tournament (71.4%)
- Only Rybakina (86.7%) has a higher first serve points won percentage at the Canadian Open 2025 than Svitolina (81.6%)
- En route to R16, only Tauson (six) and Swiatek (eight) have dropped fewer games than Svitolina (nine)

## CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2024, won eighth career title at Strasbourg (d. Collins in F dropping only three games). Reached SF at Madrid (l. eventual champion Swiatek) and Eastbourne (l. Fernandez), and another QF at Rome (l. eventual champion Swiatek). At Grand Slams, reached 4r at Wimbledon (l. Paolini, retired in 3r set due to left thigh injury), made 3r at Roland Garros (l. Navarro) and US Open (l. Mertens).
- In 2023, won seventh career title at Eastbourne (d. Kasatkina in F), reached SF at US Open and reached four QFs including Wimbledon; also qualified for WTA Elite Trophy in Zhuhai (0-2 in group play)
- At 2022 Adelaide, won first title in over two years (d. Riske in F), followed by SF run at Australian Open - best Slam showing since 2018
- Other highlights in 2022 were SF at Cincinnati and two further QF runs, including at Indian Wells
- In Grand Slam play, 2021 season was highlighted by R16 run at Wimbledon (l. Golubic). Finished campaign inside Top 100 for ninth successive year, but outside Top 20 for first time since 2014
- Ended 2020 ranked No.16, with best result being R-Up finish at Brisbane (l. Ka. Pliskova)
- Lifted biggest title of career during 2019 season at WTA 1000 Cincinnati (d. Kuznetsova in F); afterwards returned to Top 10 for first time since week of June 25, 2018
- Also won title at Charleston (d. Wozniacki) and reached QF at 2019 Roland Garros (l. Barty), one of three Americans to make last eight (also Anisimova and Stephens) - the first time since 2004 (Capriati, S.Williams and V.Williams) Reached three SFs in 2018 at Charleston, Roland Garros and US Open
- Reached first Grand Slam final in 2017 at US Open, losing to Sloane Stephens in 10th all-American final in the Open Era. At 22, became the youngest Flushing Meadows finalist since 19-year-old Caroline Wozniacki lost to Kim Clijsters in 2009 Also in 2017, won third WTA title at Stanford (d. Vandeweghe)
- Enjoyed first Top-10 year-end finish in 2016 (at No.8), was youngest player in Top 20; won second title at Birmingham (d. Strycova) and reached final at Rome (l. S.Williams) and Montreal (l. Halep)
- Broke into Top 10 on June 20 as first American to make Top-10 debut since S.Williams in 1999
- Made WTA Finals debut at Singapore in 2016, going 1-2 in round-robin play
- Started 2024 season by reaching QF (l. Keys) at Eastbourne, her first event since US Open 2023. Reached two finals at Beijing (l. Gauff in F) and Palermo (l. Zheng in F). Made consecutive SF at US Open (l. Pegula) and reached another SF at Ningbo (l. M. Andreeva, retired in 2nd set).
- Enjoyed break-out season in 2023, reaching debut Slam final at Roland-Garros (l. Swiatek), debut WTA 1000 final at Cincinnati (l. Gauff) and made Top 10 debut in August. Also secured debut qualification for WTA Finals but did not compete due to injury.
- Best result in 2022 was QF showing at Tallinn (l. Kanepi). Also made 3r at Roland Garros and 2r at Ostrava.
- Back, abdominal and ankle injuries restricted her to just four tournaments in first half of 2022.
- Broke into Top 20 for first time in career in 2021, peaking at No.19 (May 17).
- Posted best result at the Grand Slams with SF run at Australian Open (l. Brady) and matched best return at Wimbledon by making QF (l. Kerber, made QF in 2019). Also made last eight at Madrid (l. Pavlyuchenkova).
- Defeated the World No.1 and No.2 during 2021, defeating No.1 Barty at Australian Open and No.2 Osaka at Madrid (only other player to manage this was Badosa).
- Broke into Top 20 for first time in career in 2021, peaking at No.19 (May 17).
- Posted best result at the Grand Slams with SF run at Australian Open (l. Brady) and matched best return at Wimbledon by making QF (l. Kerber, made QF in 2019). Also made last eight at Madrid (l. Pavlyuchenkova).
- Defeated the World No.1 and No.2 during 2021, defeating No.1 Barty at Australian Open and No.2 Osaka at Madrid (only other player to manage this was Badosa).
- Posted best result at US Open by reaching R16 in 2020 - handed V.Williams her first-ever opening round loss in New York in 22 appearances, then saved three MPs vs. Cirstea in 3r, before falling to eventual R-Up Azarenka.
- Finished 2019 season in rich vein of form, winning 18 of last 24 matches, including capturing maiden WTA title at Seoul (d. Linette in F), SFs at Zhuhai (l. eventual champion Sabalenka) and Moscow (l. Pavlyuchenkova) and maiden major QF at Wimbledon (l. Svitolina)
- During run to last eight at 2019 Wimbledon upset No.3 Ka.Pliskova in R16 to record her first

- Represented USA at 2016 Rio Olympics, reaching SF (l. Bronze medal match to Petra Kvitova)
  - Qualified for WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai in 2015, 2018-19; went 1-1 in round-robin stage on all three appearances, with best result SF run in 2018 (withdrew before match vs. Muguruza w/left knee injury)
  - Advanced to maiden major SF at 2015 Australian Open (l. eventual champion S.Williams); broke into Top 20 following conclusion of tournament, on February 2
  - Also in 2015, reached second career title at Charleston (l. Kerber) and reached QF at Wimbledon
  - Won first career title at 2014 Eastbourne (d. No.9 Kerber in F); was second-youngest player to win a WTA title in 2014, (after Vekic at Kuala Lumpur); also, youngest American to win a title since Vania King in October 2006 (17y 254d at Bangkok)
  - Broke into Top 100 at beginning of 2013 season and finished the year No.39; highlights were SF at Osaka, QFs at Sydney, Charleston and Birmingham and 3r at Australian Open and Wimbledon
  - Earned first Top 20 win over No.17 Lucie Safarova while ranked No.135 at 2013 Sydney; then earned first Top 10 win over No.5 Na Li as LL at Madrid
  - In 2012, reached 2r at Miami and played main draw at Australian Open, Memphis and Cincinnati; also won two titles on ITF circuit
  - Earned first Grand Slam win at 2011 US Open (d. Craybas, l. Safarova in 2r), also played main draw at Miami and contested qualifying at Indian Wells
  - Won first title on ITF circuit at 2010 \$10k/ITF Cleveland, OH, USA; also contested qualifying at US Open in 2010 Member of USA's Billie Jean King Cup team in 2014, 2016, 2018-19, 2022
  - Made professional debut in 2009 and Tour-level debut at 2009 Ponte Vedra Beach (as WC, d. Kudryavtseva, l. No.10 Nadia Petrova); was seventh youngest player to win a WTA main draw match at 14y 48d and youngest since Hingis in 1994
- Top 10 victory; following the tournament, broke into Top 50 at No.43 on July 15, 2019
  - First WTA final appearance came during R-Up finish on home soil at 2019 Prague (l. Teichmann) - made Top 100 debut at No.74 following the tournament (May 6, 2019)
  - Advanced to maiden WTA QF at 2019 Doha (as qualifier, l. Svitolina)
  - Billie Jean King Cup debut came during 4-0 World Group play-off win over Canada in 2019
  - Reached 3r on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2018 US Open (as qualifier, d. No.12 Muguruza in 2r, l. Barty in 3r)
  - Fell 1r on WTA main draw debut at 2017 Seoul (as qualifier, l. Hon)
  - Won second - and most recent - career ITF Circuit title in 2016 and posted 39-18 win-loss record; at tour-level fell in qualifying at US Open
  - Played first events of career on ITF Circuit in Croatia in 2013

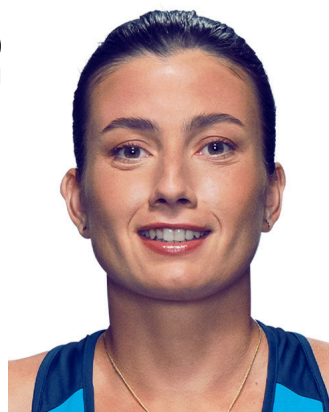

## CAREER MILESTONES

- Returned to play in 2024 following maternity leave and reached the QF at Doha and 's-Hertogenbosch, as well as R16 at Rome and Beijing
- Played 2022 Tokyo in September before taking a 15 month break to give birth to daughter Shai in early July 2023

In 2022 had success at Miami, where she fell to Swiatek in the final, her first final since the 2021 Australian Open. Also reached the semifinals at Melbourne 250 #1 (withdrew before semifinal with Kudermetova w/abdominal injury)

- Enjoyed break-out season in 2018, posting a 40-20 record resulting in a No.5 (first Top 10 season), up from No.68 in 2017
- Won the first two titles of her career in 2018, at Indian Wells (d. Kasatkina in F) and debut Grand Slam crown at US Open (d. S.Williams in F)
- En route to the Indian Wells title, defeated five-time major champion Sharapova, and A.Radwanska, Ka.Pliskova and Halep. Only set dropped all fortnight was against Sakkari in R16
- Reached one further final in 2018, at Tokyo [PPO] (l. Ka.Pliskova)
- In reaching R16 at 2018 Australian Open, became youngest Japanese player to reach R16 at a Slam since Sugiyama at 1995 Roland Garros (19y, 342d) and the youngest player from Japan to reach R16 in Melbourne since Date in 1990 (19y, 122d)

- Played two tournaments in 2024, reaching quarterfinals at Cluj-Napoca (l. Cristian) and Austin (l. Schmiedlova via ret.)

- Played first events of career on ITF Circuit in 2006

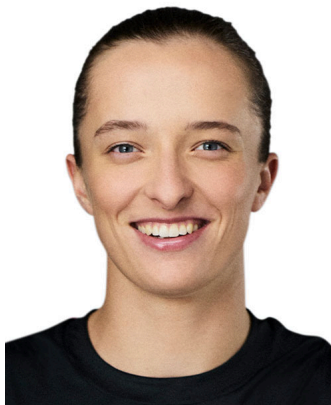

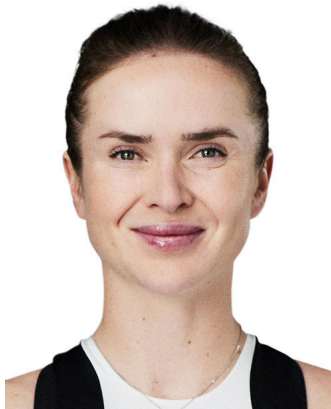

- Opened 2020 with SF showing at Auckland, going on to reach 3r at US Open, Roland Garros and Doha; during Doha run, earned third career Top 10 win over No.7 Svitolina (l. Kuznetsova in 3r due to walkover)
- Finished 2019 ranked No.24 - the youngest of three teenagers in the Top 50 (also Andreescu and Yastremska)
- Posted career best Grand Slam result with SF run at 2019 Roland Garros - first player (man or woman) born in 2000s to advance to this stage of a major. Scored maiden win over a Top 5 player during 2019 Roland Garros, upsetting No.3 and defending champion Halep in QF
- Result boosted her into Top 50 for first time at No.26 on June 10, 2019
- Won maiden title at 2019 Bogota (d. Sharma in F); at 17y 222d was the youngest American to win a title since S.Williams at 1999 Indian Wells (17y 169d)
- Made Top 100 debut at No.95 on September 17, 2018, after reaching first WTA final at Hiroshima (as qualifier, l. Hsieh)
- Also in 2018, upset No.9 Kvitova to become the joint-youngest player to reach R16 at Indian Wells, along with Majoli, who made SF in 1994 (both aged 16 years, 199 days)

- Returned to the Tour in April 2023, following birth of daughter Skai. Won Strasbourg (d. Blinkova) for a second time (also in 2020) before achieving Grand Slam results of QF at Roland Garros (l. Sabalenka) and SF at Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Vondrousova)
- 2022 season reached 3r at Australian Open (l. Azarenka) and QF at Monterrey (l. Osorio), before going on maternity leave in spring
- Highlight of 2021 was lifting 16th career title at Chicago [250]. Also made SF at Miami, Stuttgart and the Olympics (won bronze medal)
- Won her 14th and 15th titles in 2020, firstly at Monterrey (d. Bouzkova in F) and then Strasbourg (d. Rybakina in F)
- Contested her 30th consecutive major at 2020 Australian Open (streak broke by skipping 2020 US Open). Is a two-time semifinalist at Grand Slam level, at 2019 Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Halep) and 2019 US Open (l. S.Williams). Became the first woman from Ukraine to reach a major SF; on the men's, Medvedev made that stage at Roland Garros in 1993 (SF) and 1999 (R-Up)
- Highlight of 2019 was reaching the title match as defending champion at the Shiseido WTA Finals (l. Barty)
- In 2018, won 13th - and most prestigious - career title at 2018 WTA Finals (d. Stephens in F), after going 3-0 during round robin stage. Ended year ranked No.4. Also won titles at Rome (as defending champion, d. No.1 Halep in F), Dubai (as defending champion, d. Kasatkina in F) and Brisbane (d. Sasnovich in F)
- Enjoyed standout 2017, finishing year at No.6, winning a tour-leading five titles and posting second-most wins (53, behind Wozniacki with 60). Season culminated by qualifying for WTA Finals in Singapore, becoming first Ukrainian woman to qualify for the season-ending tournament in singles (fell at round robin stage with 1-2 record)
- In 2017, became first player to win three Premier 5 titles in a single season (Dubai, Rome, Toronto), since such tournaments were introduced in 2009

- Reached three finals in 2016, winning Kuala Lumpur (d. Bouchard in F) and R-Up at New Haven (l. A.Radwanska) and Zhuhai (l. Kvitova)
- Other 2016 season highlight was QF at Rio Olympics
- Owns two career doubles titles: 2014 Istanbul (w/Doi) and 2015 Istanbul (w/Gavrilova)
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2012 Baku (lost in 1r but went on to win title there in both 2013 and 2014)
- Ukrainian Fed Cup Team, 2012-15, 2017, 2020
- Played first ITF Circuit events of career in 2008
- Junior highlights include winning 2010 Roland Garros girls' title at age 15 (d. Jabeur in F)
