MATCH NOTES - DAY 1 - SUNDAY, 12 JANUARY 2025

[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. Sloane Stephens (USA #84)

Sabalenka leads 4-0

Sabalenka:

- No.1 seed at a Grand Slam for first time in career
- Two-time Australian Open defending champion Hingis from 1997-99 was the last player to win three-in-a-row
- Ash Barty in 2022 was the last No.1 seed to win the title here

Stephens:

- Former Grand Slam champion, winning 2017 US Open
- This is her 51st Grand Slam main draw appearance
- Has fallen in the first round on 17 occasions at the Slams, including 4 of the last 5 visits to the Australian Open

[Q] Anca Todoni (ROU #110) vs. [5] Qinwen Zheng (CHN #5)

First meeting

Todoni:

- Making Australian Open debut at a career high ranking of No.110
- Looking for her first career Top 10 win after falling to No.2 Coco Gauff at Wimbledon 2024 in her only other meeting against such players
- Reached 2r at Wimbledon 2024 (as qualifier, I. Gauff) was her only other Grand Slam main draw appearance
- Her win over No.103 Cristina Bucsa in 1r at Brisbane 2025 was her best career win by ranking

Zheng:

- Opening her 2025 season at Australian Open
- Reached final here last year (I. Sabalenka in F); also her best career Slam result
- Most recent loss to a player outside Top 100 was against No.123 Lulu Sun at Wimbledon 2024
- Record in 1r matches at Grand Slams stands at 10-2, with the two opening losses coming at Wimbledon I. Siniakova in 2023 and I. Lulu Sun in 2024

[11] Paula Badosa (ESP #12) vs. Wang Xinyu (CHN #37)

First meeting

Badosa:

- Voted WTA Comeback Player of the Year in 2024 was ranked No.100 for Australian Open last season, now No.12
- 2025 Australian Open is her landmark 25th Grand Slam main draw appearance
- Owns three hard court titles, most recently at DC in 2024

Wang:

- Owns 7 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently overcoming No.3 Pegula at 2024 Wuhan
- Overall this is her 15th Grand Slam main draw appearance, and has made R16 at both Wimbledon (2024) and US Open (2023)
- Bidding for her 15th Grand Slam main draw win today (14-14 record), and owns a 6-8 record in Slam 1r matches (fell 1r here last year to Diane Parry)

Marie Bouzkova (CZE #42) vs. [14] Mirra Andreeva (#15)

First meeting

Bouzkova:

- Best result at Grand Slams was QF run at Wimbledon 2022 (I. Jabeur)
- Owns 18 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.15 Jelena Ostapenko and No.20 Victoria Azarenka at Brisbane 2025 en route to QF
- Best career win by ranking was against No.3 Sabalenka at Washington DC 2024, No.3 Jessica Pegula at Cincinnati 2023, No.3 Elina Svitolina at Guangzhou 2019
- Record in 1r matches at Grand Slams stands at 10-13 (1-4 at Australian Open)

Andreeva:

- Making 2nd appearance at Australian Open, where she made 4r on her tournament debut in 2024 (I. Krejcikova)
- Best result at Grand Slams was SF run at Roland Garros 2024 (I. Paolini)
- Is seeded among the Top 16 for the first time at Australian Open
- Owns 22 career wins over Top 50 players, most recently No.26 Linda Noskova at Brisbane 2025
- Record in 1r matches at Grand Slams stand at 6-1, with only loss coming against Brenda Fruhvirtova at Wimbledon 2024

[Q] Nao Hibino (JPN #143) vs. [17] Marta Kostyuk (UKR #18)

Kostyuk leads 2-1

Hibino:

- Successfully qualified by defeating Marina Stakusic, Ekaterina Makarova, and Harriet Dart
- Bidding for first Top 20 win since 2022 Prague (d. Krecjikova)
- One of three Japanese players in the draw, along with Naomi Osaka and Moyuka Uchijima

Kostyuk:

- Made first Grand Slam quarterfinal at Melbourne Park last year (I. Yastremska)
- After starting the season 0-2, bidding for first win of 2025 today
- Last loss to a player ranked outside the Top 100 on hard court was 2023 Indian Wells (I. Peterson)

Diane Parry (FRA #66) vs. [18] Donna Vekic (USA #19)

Parry leads 1-0

Parry:

- Opening her 2025 season at Australian Open
- Joint-best Slam result came here last year with run to 3r
- Also made 3r at Roland-Garros and Wimbledon in 2022
- Owns one win in career over a Top 20 player, coming over No.2 Barbora Krejcikova at 2022 Roland-Garros

Vekic:

- This is her 13th appearance at the Australian Open with best result coming in 2023 with quarterfinal run, falling to eventual champion Aryna Sabalenka
- Overall this is her 45th Grand Slam main draw appearance, and is a Slam semifinalist, reaching the last four at 2024 Wimbledon
- Has suffered five 1r exits here at Australian Open (7-5 record) and across the Slams 1r record reads 21-23

[27] Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova (#28) vs. Yuan Yue (CHN #51)

First meeting

Pavlyuchenkova:

- Making 17th appearance at Australian Open, where her best result was QF stage on three occasions in 2020 (I. Muguruza), 2019 (I. Collins), and 2017 (I. V.Williams)
- Contesting her 63rd Grand Slam main draw overall
- Career-best Grand Slam result was reaching the 2021 Roland Garros final (I. Krejcikova)

Yuan:

- Best career result at a Grand Slam came at 2022 US Open with R32 run (I. Pegula)
- Owns 12 wins in career over Top 50 players, most recently No.18 Marta Kostyuk at Brisbane 2025
- Best result by Chinese player at Australian Open was title run by Na Li in 2014

Clara Tauson (DEN #41) vs. Linda Noskova (CZE #30)

First meeting

Tauson:

- Earned the Auckland title in her 2025 season opener for her third career singles title
- Made 3r here in 2022 and features in the Australian Open main draw for a third time
- Only player from Denmark in the main draw
- Posted one Top 50 win already this season over No.21 Madison Keys are Auckland

Noskova:

- Made QF at her 2024 Australian Open debut (I. Yastremska), also her best result across Slams
- Owns 18 career wins over Top 50 players, most recently No.13 Emma Navarro on the way to winning her maiden singles title at Monterrey last season
- First time facing a player from Denmark
- Owns a 5-4 match record in Grand Slam first round matches

Yuliia Starodubtseva (UKR #100) vs. [30] Leylah Fernandez (CAN #31) Starodubtseva:

First meeting

- Made Top 100 debut on PIF WTA Rankings last fall after making her first WTA quarterfinal in Monastir and then first WTA 1000 quarterfinal in Beijing as a qualifier
- Last year, became first player in the Open Era to successfully qualify for all four Grand Slams in a single season

Fernandez:

- Opened 2025 season by notching a Top 20 win over Donna Vekic at United Cup
- One of two Canadian women in the singles draw, along with Rebecca Marino
- Last loss to a player ranked 100 or lower came at 2024 Cleveland (I. Bogdan)

Bernanda Pera (USA #89) vs. Tatjana Maria (GER #70)

Tied 1-1

Pera:

- Croatian-born American reached a career-high No.27 on the PIF WTA Rankings in 2023
- Both Hologic WTA Tour titles have come on clay
- In Australian Open debut in 2018, made the third round as a qualifier

Maria:

- One of six mothers in the draw, travels with coach and husband Charles and daughters Charlotte and Cecilia
- Made Australian Open main-draw debut in 2008
- At 37, she is the oldest player in the women's singles draw

Anna Blinkova (#75) vs. [WC] Daria Saville (AUS #112)

Saville leads 1-0

Blinkova:

- Making 8th main-draw appearance at Australian Open (9th overall), where her previous best result was reaching 3r in 2024 (I. Paolini)
- Third round is her best result across all Slams, also reaching this stage at: Wimbledon 2023 (I. Sabalenka), Roland Garros 2023 (I. Svitolina) and 2019 (I. Keys)
- Last time she lost to an opponent outside Top 100 was against No.254 Korneeva at Merida 2024

Saville:

- Making 8th main-draw appearance at Australian Open (9th overall); reaching R16 in 2016 (I. Suarez Navarro) and 2017 (I. Ka. Pliskova) are also her best results at a major
- Most recent win against a Top 100 opponent was over No.52 Stearns at Wimbledon 2024
- Record in 1r matches at Grand Slams stands at 15-18 (5-4 at Australian Open)

Cristina Bucsa (ESP #101) vs. [WC] Chloe Paquet (FRA #123)

Bucsa leads 2-1

Bucsa:

- Making 4th appearance at Australian Open, where her best result was reaching 3r in 2023 (I. Swiatek)
- Best result across all Grand Slams is 3r run at 2023 Australian Open
- One of four players from Spain in the main draw along with Badosa, Parrizas Diaz and Bouzas Maneiro

Paquet:

- Making second appearance at Australian Open, where her previous and best result was reaching 1r in 2021 (I. Sherif)
- Best Grand Slam result was reaching R32 at 2024 Roland Garros (I. Vondrousova)
- Best career result on hard court is reaching R16 at Prague and Guadalajara in 2022

- Making her 8th appearance at the AUSTRALIAN OPEN, and returning to Melbourne as two-time defending champion, having won the title in 2023 (d. Rybakina) and 2024 (d. Zheng Qinwen)
- Owns one further Slam title, as 2024 US Open (d. Pegula in F)
- Overall this is her 27th Grand Slam main draw appearance, and has also made the SF at both Roland-Garros and Wimbledon
- · Across the Slams owns a 77-23 record
- Enters 2025 Australian Open as the No.1 seed first time as the top seed at a Slam
- Barty in 2022 was the last time the No.1 seed won the title here
- Martina Hingis from 1997-1999 was the last player to win three in a row at the Australian Open
- Faces No.84 Sloane Stephens in 1r today has suffered five 1r exits at Slams, with most recent loss coming here at the Australian Open in 2020 (l. Suarez Navarro)
- Ruzici in 1977 was the last No.1 seed to lose in the 1r
- Owns 58-18 career record against players from United States of America
- Is a 16-time hard court champion, most recently winning Brisbane two wees ago
- Is currently ranked No.1; this time last year was ranked No.2
- Is currently on a 5-match winning streak following Brisbane title; longest winning streak of her career was 16 matches in 2024

- Is a Grand Slam champion, winning the US Open in 2017 (d. Keys in F)

- Overall this is her 51st Grand Slam main draw appearance, and owns a 89-49 record at this level
- Faces No.1 Aryna Sabalenka in 1r today has lost all previous 11 encounters with the reigning World No.1 player, most recently falling to Swiatek at 2024 Dubai (6-4 6-4)
- Does own two wins over the World No.2, defeating Kerber at 2018 WTA Finals and 2016 Charleston
- Owns 17 1r exits at the Slams, including on 4 of the last 5 visits to Australian Open
- 6-time hard court champion: GUADALAJARA in 2022; MIAMI in 2018; US OPEN in 2017; ACAPULCO, AUCKLAND in 2016; WASHINGTON DC in 2015
- Most recent US champion here at Australian Open was Kenin in 2020
- Today's winner will face either Kartal or Bouzas Maneiro
- Is currently ranked No.84; this time last year was ranked No.44

ARYNA SABALENKA SLOANE STEPHENS

CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan.
 Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid.
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- Rose to career-high No.2 in rankings on August 23, 2021
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejcikova/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10
- Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitova in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F).
