[8] Emma Navarro (USA #8) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

Swiatek leads 1-0

Navarro:

- Making 2nd appearance at Australian Open, where her previous result was reaching 3r in 2024 (I. Yastremska)
- Best result across all majors was SF run at US Open 2024 (I. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- First time being seeded with Top 8 seeds at a Grand Slam event at No.8
- Has become the second player in the Open Era to make Australian Open quarterfinals with four three-setters in the first four rounds after Jelena Dokic in 2009
- Could become the youngest player from USA to register seven wins from her first eight matches at the Australian Open since Venus Williams in 1998-99
- Has spent the most of time on court so far in the women's singles main draw with a total of 10hrs & 14mins
- Has converted most break points so far with 30
- Has only faced Swiatek once before at ITF level in 2018

Swiatek:

- Five-time Slam champion, winning Roland-Garros (2020, 2022-24) and US Open (2022)
- Best result here is semifinal run in 2022, falling to eventual R-Up Collins
- With a win would become the second Polish player to reach Australian Open semifinals on multiple occasions after Agnieszka Radwanska
- The 23-year-old is the youngest woman to achieve 10 Grand Slam singles QFs since Svetlana Kuznetsova at the 2009 Australian Open
- Could become the youngest player to reach Grand Slam semifinals on seven occasions since Maria Sharapova in 2008 who had 10 such appearances
- En route to the guarterfinal, has dropped only 11 games and spent an average of 1hr 7.5mins on court per match
- Holds 6-3 career record in Grand Slam quarterfinal matches (1-0 in Australian Open QF matches)
- Was defeated by No.3 Coco Gauff in her most recent meeting against a Top 10 player at United Cup this season

Keys leads 3-2

Keys:

- Making 11th appearance at the Australian Open, where she is a 2-time semifinalist (2015 and 2022)
- Career-best Grand Slam performance was her run to the 2017 US Open final (I. Stephens)
- All of Keys and Svitolina's previous meetings have been on hard court with Keys winning the most recent at Adelaide 250 in 2022
- Has made her fourth career quarterfinal at Australian Open she only has more at Charleston (five)
- Is currently on an 9-match winning streak (Adelaide title and Australian Open QF); has won a tour-leading 11 matches so far this season
- Since 2015, only Serena Williams (16) and Simona Halep (13) have made more Grand Slam quarterfinals than Elina Svitolina (12) and Madison Keys (11)
- Since 2015, only Serena Williams (15), Aryna Sabalenka (nine) and Simona Halep (seven) have made more Grand Slam semi-finals than Madison Keys (six)
- Keys (113) and Svitolina (102) are the two players in this year's main draw to have won 100+ Grand Slam matches

Svitolina:

- Making 12th appearance at Australian Open, where she reached QF stage twice in 2019 (I. eventual champion Osaka) and 2018 (I. Mertens); also reached R16 in 2024, 2021
- Overall competing in her 44th Grand Slam main draw; she has reached at least the QF stage at all majors, with SF runs at Wimbledon in 2023 and 2019, along with the US Open in 2019, and QF at Australian Open in 2018-19
- Has reached the most Grand Slam quarterfinals (12) among active players yet to win a Slam title
- Has won 29 main draw matches at the Australian Open, equalling her highest tally in a single tournament level with Roland Garros
- Is competing in her 76th quarterfinal at WTA level events and her 53rd on hard court
- Owns 11 singles titles on hard court, most recently Chicago 250 in 2021
- With her 2r win over Dolehide, became the first Ukrainian player male or female in the Open Era to secure 100 main draw wins at Grand Slam events

- Owns 3-2 career record against players from Poland; falling to Swiatek in their only previous meeting at 2018 Charleston (ITF)
- Record in WTA QF matches stands at 9-5 (record in 2024 at Tour level was 7-2 including reaching her first Slam QF at Wimbledon and first SF at US Open)
- Her sole singles title has come on hard court at Hobart 2024
- One of 3 players from United States of America to reach QF along with Keys and Gauff
- United States of America has won Australian Open 21 times, most recently by Sofia Kenin in 2020
- Is currently ranked at her career best No.8 (first achieved in Sept 2024); this time last year was ranked No.26
- · Winner will face Keys or Svitolina in SF

- Is a five-time Grand Slam champion, winning titles at Roland Garros (2020, 2022-24) and US Open (2022)
- Has won four straight sets matches against Katerina Siniakova, Rebecca Sramkova, Emma Raducanu and Eva Lys so far this week to reach OF
- Has a 6-3 career record in Grand Slam QF matches (1-0 in Australian Open QF matches)
- Faces No.8 Emma Navarro in QF today; owns 45 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.6 Elena Rybakina at United Cup 2025
- Fell in her only meeting against a player from USA so far in 2025; Coco Gauff at United Cup
- Record in WTA QF matches stands at 35-6 (record in 2024 was 10-1 with only loss at US Open)
- 12 of her 22 tour-level titles have come on hard court, most recently 2024 Indian Wells
- · Only player from Poland to reach QF
- Other Polish women to make the SF here are Magda Linette in 2023, and Agnieszka Radwanska in 2014 and 2016
- Is currently ranked No.2; this time last year was ranked No.1. Has spent 125 weeks in her career ranked World No.1

CAREER MILESTONES

- Voted 2024 WTA Most Improved Player of the Year Award, finished the year ranked No.8 with a singles record of 54-24, winning her first career title at 2024 Hobart; climbed to a year-end ranking at No.8 after finishing 2023 at No.38 (and No.143 in 2022)
- 2023 was a stand-out year, achieving a career best with semifinal at WTA 500 San Diego (l. Kenin) and ending season with a ranking of No. 32. Also reached two quarterfinals on clay; Strasbourg (l. Blinkova) and Palermo (l. eventual champion Zheng) and one semifinal on grass; Bad Homburg (l. Siniakova).
- In 2022, posted 31-18 win-loss record. At Tour-level, made 2r at Charleston (as WC, l. Jabeur), fell 1r at Monterrey (as WC, l. Zacarias) and Indian Wells (as WC, l. Anisimova), and contested qualifying at San Diego
- Elsewhere in 2022, reached three ITF Circuit finals, including lifting second career title at this level at W60 tournament in Liepaja, Latvia, while made SF at WTA 125K Series event in Vancouver
- Broke into Top 200 for the first time on March 7, 2022
- Lifted maiden ITF Circuit title at W25 event in Orlando in November 2021
- Won the NCAA division 1 women's singles title in May 2021 to earn a WC into US Open, where she fell 1r (l. McHale)
- In 2021, reached 2r at both Charleston [500] and Charleston [250]
- Fell 1r at 2020 Monterrey (l. Stephens)
- Only other events in 2020 came on ITF Circuit, ending year ranked No.463
- Owns three ITF Circuit titles in singles and one in doubles
- Fell 2r on professional debut at \$10k Charleston, SC-USA (l. Di Lorenzo) in 2015
- Began her collegiate career by winning her first 14 NCAA singles matches and moving up to a No.6 ITA ranking
- Ended 2019 at No.3 in ITF Junior rankings, following a season that included a R-Up finish at Roland Garros (l. Fernandez), a SF run at Wimbledon and victory at the Adidas Easter Rowl
- Also R-Up in girls' doubles at 2019 Australian Open w/Beck

- Claimed five titles in 2024, making it a threepeat at Roland-Garros and also winning Doha, Indian Wells, Madrid and Rome. Crossed \$30m in prize money and qualified for her fourth WTA Finals
- Won six titles across 2023, including winning fourth Grand Slam title at Roland-Garros (d. Muchova in F) and going undefeated at the WTA Finals in Cancun (d. Pegula in F). Finished season as WTA World No.1 player for second consecutive year.
- In 2022, lifted second and third Grand Slam titles, at Roland-Garros (d. Gauff in F) and US Open (d. Jabeur in F)
- Triumph in Paris was the last of six straight titles during 37-match winning streak - jointlongest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990
- Won two titles in 2021, at Adelaide and Rome.
 Other highlights included QF at Roland-Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage)
- Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland-Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, l. Krejcikova/Siniakova)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland - man or woman - to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since A.Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Ranked No.54, she became the lowest-ranked woman to win the Roland-Garros title in the Open Era and the lowest-ranked finalist since 1977 (No.56 Mihai). At 19y 132d, is the youngest champion in Paris since Monica Seles (18y 187d) in 1992
- Also became the first player to win her debut Tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Jelena Ostapenko at 2017 Roland-Garros
- Won WTA Most Improved Player of the Year for 2020, as voted on by members of the media.
 Also won the 2020 WTA Fan Favorite Award
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.61 after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Lugano (l. Hercog) and R16 run at Roland-Garros (l. Halep). That year also reached 3r at Toronto (l. Osaka) and made 2r five times (incl. Australian and US Open)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.88 after R-Up finish at 2019 Lugano
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 Auckland
- Ended 2018 season ranked No.175 (up from No.690 in 2017), after posting 42-6 record and winning four titles on ITF Circuit

- Member of Poland's Billie Jean King Cup team, 2018-20, 2021-22
- On professional debut, came through qualifying to win title at \$10k ITF/Stockholm-SWE in 2016; owns seven singles titles at this level
- Enjoyed stellar junior career, including winning girls' singles at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Küng in F) and leading Poland to Junior Fed Cup in 2016

- In summer 2022 organised 'Iga Swiatek and friends for Ukraine' event in Krakow, which featured a mixed doubles match between Agnieszka Radwanska, Sergiy Stakhovsky, Polish junior Martyn Pawelski and herself, and was attended by Poland's First Lady, Agata Kornhauser-Duda, Elina Svitolina and Andriy Shevchenko. The occasion was watched by almost 15,000 people live and a further one million on television, raising more than half a million Euros for Ukrainian children and teenagers affected by the war
- Started playing tennis because her older sister was playing and wanted to beat her
- Enjoys rock music, including AC/DC and Pink Floyd
- Includes PZU, On, Tecnifibre, Rolex and Xiaomi in her endorsement portfolio

- Only player from Ukraine to reach QF from six in the main draw starting line-up
- Best result by Ukraine at Australian Open was SF by Dayana Yastremska in 2024
- Is currently ranked No.27 (achieved career-high ranking of No.3 in September 2017); this time last year was ranked No.23
- · Winner today will face Swiatek or Navarro in SF
