Katerina Siniakova (CZE #46) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

First meeting

Siniakova:

- Overall this is her 42nd Grand Slam main draw appearance, and 40th consecutive Slam appearance
- Made Grand Slam main draw debut here at Australian Open in 2014
- In doubles, is a nine-time Slam champion, including two titles at the Australian Open, in 2022 and 2023 (both with Krejcikova)
- Owns a 1-6 record vs. World's Top 2 players, winning against No.1 Osaka at 2019 Roland-Garros
- Has won only one of her last seven singles matches at the Australian Open
- Currently the PIF WTA World No.1 ranked player in doubles; including the week of Jan 13 and Jan 20 (during Australian Open), will increase her career weeks at No.1 to 135 total weeks 5th most all-time

Swiatek:

- Five-time Slam champion, winning Roland-Garros (2020, 2022-24) and US Open (2022)
- Best result here is semifinal run in 2022, falling to eventual R-Up Collins
- Former PIF WTA World No.1 could secure the No.1 ranking again in the early stages of the tournament with early exits by Gauff and Sabalenka

[3] Coco Gauff (USA #3) vs. Sofia Kenin (USA #81)

Kenin leads 2-1

Gauff:

- Is 18-3 in R128 matches at the Slams, including 4-1 at the Australian Open; has won 10 of her last 11 first round matches with only loss in that stretch at 2023 Wimbledon
- There are 19 Americans in the draw
- Has a chance to move to PIF WTA World No.1 for the first time in her career after the Australian Open; her only path to the top spot is to win the title AND with Sabalenka losing before the semifinals and Swiatek not advancing to the third round.
- Career-best Australian Open result is her SF run last year (I. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- Has won her last 33 matches against players ranked outside the Top 50; her most recent loss to a player ranked below No.50 was her 2023 Wimbledon loss to Kenin
- Directly after that loss to Kenin, Gauff went on an 18-1 run through the 2023 summer hard-court swing, culminating in her first Grand Slam title at the 2023 US Open
- Opened 2025 season by leading Team USA to the United Cup title; in that event, Gauff went 5-0 in singles, 2-0 in doubles and was named Tournament MVP



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Kenin:

- Former champion won her first Grand Slam title at the 2020 Australian Open, defeating Gauff in R16 and Muguruza in the final
- She is the most recent player representing the United States to win the Australian Open in singles
- Has a 4-10 record against players ranked inside the Top 3; her last Top 3 win came over then-No.2 Aryna Sabalenka at 2023 Rome
- 3rd straight year she is facing a Grand Slam champion in Australian Open 1r (l. Azarenka in 2023 1r; l. Swiatek in 2024 1r)
- Is 17-9 in R128 at the Slams, including 3-4 at the Australian Open; she has lost in the opening round in Melbourne the last three appearances (2022, 2023, 2024)
- Has four Top 5 wins, including most recently at 2020 Australian Open when she defeated the No.1 Ashleigh Barty

[WC] Maya Joint (AUS #118) vs. [7] Jessica Pegula (USA #7)

First meeting

Joint:

- Making Australian Open main-draw debut; fell in the final round of qualifying last year (l. eventual semifinalist Yastremska)
- Made Grand Slam and tour-level main-draw debut at 2024 US Open as a qualifier and reached 2r (d. Siegemund in 1r; I. Keys)
- Faces No.7 Jessica Pegula in 1r today; this will be her first match vs. a current Top 10 player (0-2 vs. Top 20 players)
- Made first tour-level QF and SF last week at Hobart International

Pegula:

- Making 6th main-draw appearance at the Australian Open, where she reached three consecutive QFs from 2021 through 2023
- Posted her career-best Grand Slam performance at last year's US Open, making 1st major singles final (I. Sabalenka)
- Went 8-2 vs. players ranked outside the Top 100 last year (l. Krunic in 's-Hertogenbosch; l. Raducanu in Eastbourne)
- Started 2025 season last week in Adelaide, where she finished runner-up (I. Keys)



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[10] Danielle Collins (USA #11) v. [Q] Daria Snigur (UKR #139)

First meeting

Collins:

- R-Up in 2022 (I. Barty) at Australian Open, which is her best result across all majors
- Also reached SF in 2019 (I. Kvitova)
- Owns 6-0 record in 1r matches at Australian Open; overall at the Slams she is 19-9 in R128
- Owns two singles titles on hard court at Miami 2024 and San Jose 2021

Snigur:

- Making 2nd appearance and looking to her first main-draw win at Australian Open
- Best result at a Grand Slam was 2r run at Wimbledon 2024 (I. Ostapenko) and US Open 2022 (I. Marino)
- Owns 3 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.17 Marta Kostyuk at Nottingham 2024
- Best career win by ranking was against No.7 Halep at US Open 2022 (only Top 20 win on hardcourt)

[12] Diana Shnaider (#13) vs. Elisabetta Cocciaretto (ITA #55)

Cocciaretto leads 3-1

Shnaider:

- Making 3rd main-draw appearance at the Australian Open, where her career-best result is the 2023 2r (I. Sakkari)
- Is currently ranked No.13; this time last year was ranked No.92. Reached career-high of No.12 last year
- 4-2 win-loss record in Grand Slam 1r matches (1-1 record in Australian Open 1r matches)
- Career-best Grand Slam result was reaching R16 at last year's US Open (I. eventual finalist Pegula)

Cocciaretto:

- Making 5th main-draw appearance at Australian Open; reached the 2r for the first time last year
- Owns 4 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.13 Jelena Ostapenko at 2024 Birmingham
- Career-best Grand Slam performance is reaching R16 at Roland Garros last year (I. Gauff)
- One of 3 players from Italy in this week's main draw (also No.4 seed Paolini and Bronzetti)

Belinda Bencic (SUI #421) v. [16] Jelena Ostapenko (LAT #17)

Series tied at 1-1

Bencic:

- Making 11th appearance at Australian Open, where her previous best result was reaching 4r in 2023 and 2016
- Best result across all Grand Slams was SF run at US Open 2019 (I. eventual champion Andreescu)
- Is 26-7 in R128 at the Slams, including 8-2 at Australian Open winning her last six after falling in opening round in 2017
- Last Top 20 win came at 2023 Montreal, defeating No.9 Petra Kvitova; her last Top 20 win at a Slam was at 2021 US Open (d. No.8 Iga Swiatek)
- 6 out of her 8 career singles titles have come on hard court, most recently Abu Dhabi 2023
- Currently ranked No.421 (coming back from maternity leave in Oct 2024); this time last year was ranked No.21



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Ostapenko:

- Making 10th appearance at Australian Open, where her previous best result was QF run in 2023 (I. Rybakina)
- One of the 18 Grand Slam champions in this year's field winning Roland Garros in 2017 (d. Halep in F)
- Owns 5 singles titles on hard court Linz, Adelaide in 2024; Dubai in 2022; Luxembourg in 2019; Seoul in 2017
- Owns 23-12 record in R128 at the Slams, including 6-3 at Australian Open

Lucia Bronzetti (ITA #78) vs. [21] Victoria Azarenka (#22)

First meeting

Bronzetti:

- This is her 13th Grand Slam main draw appearance best Slam result is making 3r at US Open in 2023
- Made Grand Slam main draw debut here at Australian Open in 2022, falling to Barty in 2r
- An Italian woman has made the quarterfinal here four times, most recently Pennetta in 2014
- Is 3-9 in opening round of a Slam (1-2 at Australian Open)

Azarenka:

- Making her 17th appearance at Australian Open, the fourth most among active players
- Her two Slam titles came here, winning the title in 2012 (d. Sharapova) and 2013 (d. Li Na)
- 2025 Australian Open marks 67th Grand Slam main draw appearance, and owns a 163-62 record across the majors
- Owns a 50-14 main draw record here at Melbourne Park, the Slam where she has the most wins
- Is 54-11 in Grand Slam opening rounds, including 13-3 in Melbourne; has won 12 of last 13 R128 at the Slams with only loss coming at 2023 Roland Garros
- Among players in the draw has played more Grand Slam matches (225; next most is Keys, 154) and won more Grand Slam matches (163; next most is Keys, 109) than any other player

Anhelina Kalinina (UKR #48) vs. Ons Jabeur (TUN #40)

Jabeur leads 2-0

Kalinina:

- Best result across the Slams came here with 3r run in 2023
- Record in Slam 1r matches stands at 9-7, including falling at three of the Slams last year at this stage (exception being US Open)
- Today's winner will face Osorio or Sakkari in next round

Jabeur:

- Is a three-time Slam runner-up, losing the finals at Wimbledon in 2022 (to Rybakina) and 2023 (to Vondrousova) and 2022 US Open (to Swiatek)
- Overall this is her 30th Grand Slam main draw appearance
- Jabeur is 20-9 in opening rounds at the Slams, including 4-3 at Australian Open; after losing in the opening round in her first three appearance at the Australian Open, she has won her last four in R128 in Melbourne
- Is currently ranked No.40; this time last year was ranked No.6



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Naomi Osaka (JPN #50) vs. Caroline Garcia (FRA #56)

Tied 2-2

Osaka:

- Former two-time champion here, lifting the title in 2019 (d. Kvitova in F) and 2021 (d. Brady in F)
- Fell in 1r last year here at Australian Open to today's opponent Garcia
- Is 22-5 in R128 at the Slams, 7-1 at Australian Open
- Is currently ranked No.50; this time last year was ranked No.831 (having recently returned from maternity leave)
- Opened 2025 season by reaching Auckland final (retired vs. Tauson w/stomach injury)

Garcia:

- Overall this is her 51st consecutive Grand Slam main draw appearance the longest active streak among players
- Is 34-16 in R128 at the Slams, including 9-4 at Australian Open
- Playing first match today since reaching the semifinals at Guadalajara in September
- Best result across the Majors as semifinal run at 2022 US Open

[WC] Ajla Tomljanovic (AUS #116) vs. Ashlyn Krueger (USA #54)

First meeting

Tomljanovic:

- Making her landmark 10th main draw appearance at the Australian Open, entering on a wildcard
- Defeated Serena Williams in Williams' last professional match during quarterfinal run at 2022 US Open (one of three QF appearances)
- Has reached 2r here in Melbourne five times but no further

Krueger:

- Appearing the Australian Open main draw for the second time after 1r exit in 2024
- Contested all the Slams across the same season in 2024 for the first time in career
- Owns one hard court title, at Osaka in 2023

Zeynep Sonmez (TUR #93) vs. [WC] Talia Gibson (AUS #150)

First meeting

Sonmez:

- Making first main-draw appearance at Australian Open
- Best Grand Slam result was R128 at 2024 Roland Garros (as a qualifier, I. Navarro)
- Best career result on hard court is lifting the title at Merida in 2024 (d. Li in F)
- With a win would be the first Turkish woman to reach R64 at the Australian Open in the Open Era

Gibson:

- Making second main-draw appearance at Australian Open, where her previous and best result at a Grand Slam was reaching 1r in 2023 (I. Burel)
- Best career result on hard court is R32 at Hobart in 2023 (I. Maria)
- Australia has won Australian Open 16 times, most recently by Ashleigh Barty 2022
- Is currently ranked No.150; this time last year was ranked No.228



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[Q] Destanee Aiava (AUS #195) vs. Greet Minnen (BEL #94)

Minnen leads 1-0

Minnen:

- Making 5th main-draw appearance at Australian Open, where her best result was reaching 2r in 2020 (I. Rybakina)
- Best result across all Slams is run to 3r at US Open in 2023 and 2021
- Best career result on hard court is semifinal run at Guangzhou in 2023 and Prague in 2021
- Best result by Belgian player at Australian Open was title run by Kim Clijsters in 2011, Justine Henin in 2004

Aiava:

- Making 5th main-draw appearance at Australian Open, where her previous result was reaching 1r in 2021 (I. Stosur)
- Looking to earn first main draw win at a Grand Slam
- Best career result on hard court is R16 at Brisbane in 2019 and 2017
- Is currently ranked No.195; this time last year was ranked No.208

CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached two WTA singles finals in 2024, at Cleveland and Guangzhou; additionally, champion at WTA 125 event at Lleida (d. Sherif in F). In doubles, finished year-end No.1 for fourth time after winning five titles: Dubai (w/Hunter); an eighth Grand Slam at Roland Garros (w/Gauff) and ninth at Wimbledon (w/Townsend); Prague (w/Krejcikova); and Guangzhou (w/Zhang). 

- En route to the Indian Wells title, defeated fivetime major champion Sharapova, and A.Radwanska, Ka.Pliskova and Halep. Only set dropped all fortnight was against Sakkari in R16
- Reached one further final in 2018, at Tokyo [PPO] (l. Ka.Pliskova)
- In reaching R16 at 2018 Australian Open, became youngest Japanese player to reach R16 at a Slam since Sugiyama at 1995 Roland Garros (19y, 342d) and the youngest player from Japan to reach R16 in Melbourne since Date in 1990 (197, 122d)
- Book-ended 2017 season with QF showings at Auckland and Hong Kong; other highlights

- 2024 season highlight was making SF at Guadalajara (l. eventual champion Frech). Also reached QF at Miami (l. eventual champion Collins)
