

MATCH NOTES - DAY 3 - TUESDAY, 14 JANUARY 2025

[Q] Wei Sijia (CHN #117) vs. [4] Jasmine Paolini (ITA #4)

First meeting

Wei:

- Making first Grand Slam main-draw appearance at Australian Open
- Looking to earn first Top 10 win in first meeting against Paolini today
- Best career result on hard court is run to R16 at Jiujiang and Guangzhou in 2024

Paolini:

- Making 6th main-draw appearance at Australian Open, where her previous and best result was reaching 4r in 2024 (I. Kalinskaya)
- In 2024 became the first Italian in the Open Era to reach the women's singles R16 at all four Grand Slam events in a single calendar year
- Made first two Grand Slam finals at Roland Garros and Wimbledon, and R16 at both Australian Open and US Open
- Both of her career titles have come on hard court at Dubai in 2024 and Portoroz in 2021
- Is currently ranked at career high of No.4, achieved on Oct. 28, 2024; this time last year was ranked No.31

[6] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #7) vs. [WC] Emerson Jones (AUS #293)

First meeting

Rybakina:

- Finished runner-up here in 2023, falling to Sabalenka in the final
- Has reached a further Grand Slam final, lifting the title at Wimbledon in 2022
- Owns impressive 18-3 record in Slam 1r matches, last loss coming at 2022 US Open

Jones:

- Making Grand Slam main draw debut at the Australian Open, entering on a wild card
- Contested qualifying here in 2024, falling 1r to Hon
- Only other Tour outings saw her also fall in qualifying at 2023 Hobart and reach R16 at 2025 Adelaide last week (I. Kasatkina)

[8] Emma Navarro (USA #8) vs. Peyton Stearns (USA #46)

Navarro leads 4-1

Navarro:

- Best result across all majors was SF run at US Open 2024 (I. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- First time being seeded with Top 8 seeds at a Grand Slam event at No.8
- Her sole singles title has come on hard court in Australian Hobart 2024
- Is currently ranked at her career best No.8 (first achieved in Sept 2024)

Stearns:

- With a win today would be her first main-draw win at Australian Open, also her first career Top 10 win after failing the eight previous attempts
- Best win by ranking was against No.13 Kasatkina at Roland Garros 2023 and US Open 2024
- Is currently ranked No.46 (close to her peak rank No.43, achieved in Sept 2024)

Viktoriya Tomova (BUL #58) vs. [9] Daria Kasatkina (#10)

First meeting

Tomova:

- Making 5th main-draw appearance at the Australian Open; she reached 2r for the first time last year
- Has an 0-10 career record against Top 10 players
- Has a 5-10 win-loss record in Grand Slam 1r matches, and has never advanced beyond the 2r of a Grand Slam
- Seeking first win of 2025 after 0-2 start to season

Kasatkina:

- Making 10th appearance at the Australian Open; reached career-best 3r in 2016 and 2022
- This season, made R16 at Brisbane (I. eventual finalist P. Kudermetova) and QF at Adelaide (I. eventual champion Keys)
- Career-best Grand Slam result is reaching SF at 2022 Roland Garros (I. eventual champion Swiatek)
- So far this year, 2-1 against players ranked outside the Top 50 (I. P. Kudermetova in Brisbane)

[19] Madison Keys (USA #14) vs. Ann Li (USA #84)

First meeting

Kevs:

- Making 11th appearance at the Australian Open; her career-best results at the event are SFs in 2015 and 2022
- Comes in on a 5-match winning streak after Adelaide title last week; her only loss so far this year was to eventual champion Tauson in Auckland
- 2017 US Open finalist Keys boasts 40-5 career win-loss record in Grand Slam 1r matches
- Has not lost a Grand Slam 1r match since 2021 US Open (I. Stephens in rematch of 2017 US Open final)

Li:

- Making 4th main-draw showing at the Australian Open and first since 2022; career-best Australian Open result is 2021 3r (I. Sabalenka)
- Holds 2-9 career record against Top 20 players; most recent Top 20 win came over No.7 Anett Kontaveit at 2022 Miami
- To start this season, made R16 at both Auckland and Hobart (d. fellow American Stephens in back-to-back events)
- Most recent woman to win Australian Open representing USA is Sofia Kenin in 2020; Kenin beat Li in 2r en route to title

[13] Anna Kalinskaya (#16) vs. [Q] Kimberly Birrell (AUS #101)

First meeting

Kalinskaya:

- Returns to Melbourne after making maiden Grand Slam QF appearance in 2024; had lost in opening round at first four appearances here
- Overall, this is 18th Grand Slam main draw appearance; reached R16 twice in addition to 2024 Australian Open (QF), also reached R16 last year at Wimbledon
- This is 4th consecutive Grand Slam as a seed; as No.13 seed, playing at her highest seed at a Slam

Birrell:

- Making 6th appearance at Australian Open; best result in Melbourne has been a 3r finish in 2019 her best career result at a Slam
- Recorded second career Top 20 in opening tournament of 2025 season as she defeated No.8 Emma Navarro at Brisbane en route to QF
- Reached 5th career QF at Brisbane with all five QF appearances coming in her last 18 tournaments
- One of 8 players from Australia in the draw, most since 2022

[15] Beatriz Haddad Maia (BRA #17) vs. [Q] Julia Riera (ARG #146)

First meeting

Haddad Maia:

- Making 6th appearance at the Australian Open; posted career-best 3r result last year (I. Timofeeva)
- Seeking 1st win of 2025 after 2 losses at United Cup and a loss to eventual champion Keys in Adelaide
- Has 13-5 win-loss record in Grand Slam 1r matches (4-1 in Australian Open 1r matches)
- 2 of her 4 career WTA titles have come on hard court (2023 Zhuhai and 2024 Seoul)

Riera:

- In her first matches of 2025 season, successfully qualified for her Australian Open main-draw debut
- Facing a Top 20 opponent for the first time; her career-best win by ranking came over No.21 Ekaterina Alexandrova at 2024 Brisbane
- Contesting her 3rd Grand Slam main draw (played Roland Garros and Wimbledon last year); seeking 1st Grand Slam main-draw victory

Rebecca Marino (CAN #98) vs. [22] Katie Boulter (GBR #25)

Boulter leads 2-0

Marino:

- Overall, this is her 19th Grand Slam main draw appearance; best result has been 3r finishes at 2011 Roland Garros and 2022 US Open
- Made first Australian Open main draw appearance 14 years ago
- Faces her second Top 50 opponent of the season after defeating No.40 Lulu Sun at Auckland; that win snapped a 7-match skid vs Top 50 opponents
- The last time Marino won consecutive matches vs. Top 50 opponents was at 2021 Montreal

Boulter:

- Boulter won both previous match-ups in straight sets
- Her fourth-straight Slam playing as a seed; as the No.22 seed, this is her highest seed at a Slam
- Overall this is her 15th Grand Slam main draw appearance at a Slam with best finish being 3r runs at Wimbledon (2022, 2023) and 2023 US Open
- 1 of 4 British women in the Australian Open Draw along with Emma Raducanu, Sonay Kartal and Jodie Burrage; it is the most British women in an Australian Open draw since 2021
- The last time three British women reached the second round at the Australian Open was 1991 (Burrage is already through to second round)

Camila Osorio (COL #59) vs. [31] Maria Sakkari (GRE #30)

Sakkari leads 2-0

Osorio:

- Making 4th main-draw appearance at Australian Open; career-best showing is 2r in 2023 (I. No.1 seed Swiatek)
- Owns 8 wins in career over Top 30 players, most recently No.28 Dayana Yastremska at 2024 Paris Olympics
- Best Australian Open singles result by a Colombian woman is SF run by Fabiola Zuluaga in 2004

Sakkari:

- Making 10th appearance at the Australian Open; career-best results are R16 showings in 2020 and 2022
- 3-0 career tour-level record against Colombians (2 wins over Osorio; 1 win over Emiliana Arango)
- 24-11 win-loss record in Grand Slam 1r matches (7-2 in Australian Open 1r matches)
- Career-best Grand Slam results are SF showings at 2021 Roland Garros and 2021 US Open

[26] Ekaterina Alexandrova (#31) vs. Emma Raducanu (GBR #61)

First meeting

Alexandrova:

- She has reached the 3r here three times, most recently in 2023
- 2025 Australian Open marks 31st Grand Slam main draw appearance her best result across the Slams was R16 at 2023 Wimbledon
- Was due to face Raducanu at 2024 Wimbledon in 1r but withdrew due to injury (illness)

Raducanu:

- Has reached 2r on all three previous outings at Australian Open
- Is a former Grand Slam champion, becoming the first qualifier man or woman to lift a major title, doing so at 2021 US Open
- Has only two 1r Slam losses to her name, both coming at US Open, in 2022 and 2024

Anhelina Kalinina (UKR #48) vs. Ons Jabeur (TUN #39)

Jabeur leads 2-0

Kalinina:

- Best result across the Slams came here with 3r run in 2023
- Record in Slam 1r matches stands at 9-7, including falling at three of the Slams last year at this stage (exception being US Open)
- Today's winner will face Osorio or Sakkari in next round

Jabeur:

- Is a three-time Slam runner-up, losing the finals at Wimbledon in 2022 (to Rybakina) and 2023 (to Vondrousova) and 2022 US Open (to Swiatek)
- Overall this is her 30th Grand Slam main draw appearance
- Jabeur is 20-9 in opening rounds at the Slams, including 4-3 at Australian Open; after losing in the opening round in her first three appearance at the Australian Open, she has won her last four in R128 in Melbourne
- Is currently ranked No.39; this time last year was ranked No.6

Veronika Kudermetova (#75) vs. Olivia Gadecki (AUS #106)

First meeting

Kudermetova:

- Making 7th appearance at Australian Open, where her previous best result was reaching 3r in 2022 (I. Sakkari) and 2021 (I. Halep)
- Best result across all majors was QF run at Roland Garros 2022 (I. Kasatkina)
- Owns one singles title on hard court at Tokyo 2023

Gadecki:

- Making 3rd appearance at Australian Open, where her previous best result was reaching 2r in 2023 (I. Kostyuk), which is also her best result across all majors
- Owns 6 wins against Top 100 opponents, among which 3 wins have come at Guadalajara 2024 d. No.11 Collins, No.99 Trevisan and No.80 Osorio en route to title (I. Frech in F)
- Best career result on hard court is Runner-Up at Guadalajara 500 in 2024
- Best career win by ranking was against No.4 Kenin at Phillip Island Trophy 2021

CAREER MILESTONES

- Registered first Top 150 season in 2024. As WC, d. Ruse in 1r at Beijing for first WTA main draw win (l. Haddad Maia in 2r); subsequently d. Sramkova in 1r at Guangzhou for first Top 100 win (l. Wang Xiyu in 2r). Earlier in season, qualified at Hua Hin (l. Gao in 1r). Won three singles titles from five finals on ITF Circuit. Played in qualifying at all four majors.
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2023 Nanchang (as qualifier, l. Birrell in 1r); won one singles title on ITF Circuit, from three finals, and a doubles title.
- Won first six ITF Circuit titles in 2022, as well as first eight doubles titles, all of them in Monastir, Tunisia.
- Did not play on circuit in 2020 and 2021.
- Continued to play on ITF Circuit in China in 2019, reaching one QF.
- Played first matches of career on ITF Circuit in China in 2018.

- Breakout 2024 season saw her win the biggest title of her career at WTA 1000 Dubai and also reach her first Grand Slam finals, finishing R-Up at Roland-Garros and Wimbledon. Qualified for her first WTA Finals in singles and doubles, broke into the Top 10 for the first time in her career and finished the season as the World No.4
- Finished 2023 by breaking into Top 30 for first time, achieving No. 29 on Oct 23, 2023 after becoming runner-up at Monastir (l. Mertens). Also achieved runner-up at Palermo and SF at Zhengzhou (l. Zheng both times) as well as QFs at Lyon (l. Garcia) and Cincinnati as a qualifier (l. eventual champion Gauff). Enjoyed two Top 10 wins (No.10 Garcia and No.4 Rybakina).
- In 2022, finished R-Up at Cluj-Napoca (l. Blinkova), while made back-to-back SF at Palermo (l. Bronzetti) and Warsaw (l. eventual champion Garcia)
- Also reached QF at Lyon (l. Yastremska), Portoroz (l. eventual champion Siniakova) and Parma (l. Kovinic)
- Broke into Top 50 on January 31, 2021
- Posted near-Top 50 season finish in 2021 after capturing first WTA singles title of career at Portoroz (d. Riske in F)
- Strong season finish also brought SF run at Courmayeur(l. eventual champion Vekic) and QF effort at Linz (l. Halep); posted best win of season over No.18 Mertens en route to 3r at Indian Wells (l. Pegula)
- Also in 2021 won the WTA 125K event in Bol, Croatia (d. Rus in F) and was R-Up at the same level in Saint Malo (l. Golubic) Captured first WTA doubles title in 2021, at Hamburg(w/Teichmann)
- In 2021, for first time in career, contested the full suite of all four Grand Slam events; reached 2r at Roland Garros and US Open, equalling best previous Slam result
- In 2020, reached 2r four times at WTA tournaments, including Roland Garros (l. Kvitova)
- Highlights of 2019 included QF showings at Guangzhou and Palermo, a SF run at the WTA 125K Series event at Karlsruhe, lifting seventh, eighth and ninth ITF Circuit titles of her career, at \$60KBrescia-ITA, \$25K ITF/Curtiba-BRA and \$100K ITF/Tokyo-JPN, and qualifying for maiden Grand Slam main draw at Roland Garros (l. Kasatkina in 1r)
- Ended 2018 ranked No.180, with season highlight a maiden WTA singles QF at Prague (d. No.15

Kasatkina, l. Zhang)

- Made WTA main draw debut at 2017 Bastad (l. Suarez Navarro in 1r) and also fell 1r at Guangzhou and in qualifying a further three times
- Part of Italy's Billie Jean King Cup team 2017-19
 Made WTA qualifying debut at 2015 Rome
- Made professional debut on ITF Circuit in Italy in

- Is currently ranked No.7; this time last year was ranked No.3


