MATCH NOTES – DAY 4 – WEDNESDAY, 15 JANUARY 2025

[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. Jessica Bouzas Maneiro (ESP #54)

First meeting

Sabalenka:

- No.1 seed at a Grand Slam for first time in career
- Two-time Australian Open defending champion – Hingis from 1997-99 was the last player to win three-in-a-row
- Ash Barty in 2022 was the last No.1 seed to win the title here
- Owns a 12-5 career record against players from Spain; her last defeat was at the 2021 WTA Finals by Paula Badosa. Her 2024 record stands at 3-0 with all three victories against Badosa (Stuttgart win was via ret.)
- With opening round win over Stephens, has now won 15 consecutive matches on Rod Laver Arena, the 10th best all-time on the court; she is 16-2 on RLA with only losses to Serena Williams (2021, R16) and Ashleigh Barty (2018, R128)
- Owns 17-4 record in R64 matches at Slams, winning last 15; her last R64 loss came at 2020 US Open (l. Azarenka)

Bouzas Maneiro:

- Making Australian Open main draw debut
- This is her fifth career Grand Slam main draw appearance, posting her best results in 2024 with 3r at 2024 Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Krejčíková) and US Open (l. eventual R-Up Pegula)
- Owns a 1-3 career record against Top 10 players with her sole win against No.6 Marketa Vondrousova at 2024 Wimbledon
- Last Spanish woman to defeat a WTA World No.1 was Sara Sorribes Tormo (d. Ashleigh Barty at 2021 Olympics)
- Last Spanish woman to defeat a WTA World No.1 at a Slam was Garbine Muguruza (2017 Wimbledon)

[3] Coco Gauff (USA #3) vs. Jodie Burrage (GBR #39)

Gauff leads 1-0

Gauff:

- Undefeated (6-0) and has not lost a set (12-0) in the 2025 season; began the year by leading Team USA to the United Cup title; Gauff went 5-0 in singles, 2-0 in mixed doubles and was named Tournament MVP
- Has a chance to move to PIF WTA World No.1 for the first time in her career after the Australian Open; her only path to the top spot is to win the title AND with No.1 Sabalenka losing before the semifinals and No.2 Swiatek not advancing to the third round.
- Career-best Australian Open result is her SF run last year (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)

Burrage:

- Entered main draw with Special Ranking No.85
- Contemplated retirement after missing six months last year due to wrist surgery and ankle injury; PIF WTA Ranking fell outside Top 300 in October
- First-round win was her first at a Grand Slam since 2023 US Open

Laura Siegemund (GER #97) vs. [5] Qinwen Zheng (CHN #5)

First meeting

Siegemund:

- Making 8th appearance at Australian Open, where her previous best result was reaching 3r on two occasions: in 2023 (l. Garia) & in 2016 (l. Beck)
- Is 4-7 in R64 matches at the Slams
- This is her 27th Grand Slam appearance with her best result at 2020 Roland Garros with quarterfinal (l. Kvitova)
- Owns 10 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.5 Maria Sakkari at Stuttgart 2022
- Has a 6-4 career record against players from China, with record in 2025 standing at 0-1 (l. Gao Xinyu at United Cup)
- At 36 years, 328 days old, is second oldest women in the draw behind only Tatjana Maria (37 years, 171 days)

Zheng:

- Opening her 2025 season at Australian Open with a first round win over qualifier Anca Todoni
- Reached final here last year (l. Sabalenka in F); also her best career Slam result
- Has a career match record of 3-2 against players from Germany (all three wins came in 2024, two losses were in 2022)
- Last loss to a player with a lower ranking than Siegemund was against No.123 Lulu Sun at Wimbledon 2024
- Currently ranked at a career high of No.5 achieved in November 2024

[7] Jessica Pegula (USA #6) vs. Elise Mertens (BEL #34)

Mertens leads 3-0

Pegula:

- Today's match is a showdown between last week's tournament runner-ups, with Pegula in Adelaide (l. Keys) and Mertens in Hobart (l. Kessler)
- Bidding for her 1st career win over Mertens (0-3); has won only one set in prior three meetings
- Has made quarterfinals or better at five of her last eight hard-court Grand Slam appearances, including first Grand Slam final at the US Open last fall (l. Sabalenka)

Mertens:

- Saved two match points in her first-round win over Viktorija Golubic on Monday
- Owns 10 Top 10 wins, with her last coming against Pegula at 2023 Roland Garros
- Made first and only Grand Slam semifinal here at Melbourne Park in 2018 (l. eventual champion Wozniacki)

[11] Paula Badosa (ESP #12) vs. [WC] Talia Gibson (AUS #150)

First meeting

Badosa:

- Voted WTA Comeback Player of the Year in 2024 – was ranked No.100 for Australian Open last season, now No.12
- Owns 10-4 record in R64 at the Slams
- In 2024 was 2-2 vs. opponents ranked No.150 or lower, including a loss to No.442 Amanda Anisimova at the Australian Open (R32)
- Owns 4-3 career record against players from Australia - fell in most recent meeting against Tomljanovic at 2022 Cincinnati
- Owns three hard court titles, most recently at Washington DC in 2024

Gibson:

- Playing in her first Grand Slam main draw 2r after making 1r debut here last season
- Facing a Top 20 player for the first time; previously fell to No.44 Marie Bouzkova at 2025 Brisbane in her only meeting against a Top 50 player
- Currently ranked No.150 after climbing as high as No.125 (Nov 11, 2024); this time last year was ranked No.228
- Last time an Australian wildcard reached the R32 in Melbourne was 2022 (Maddison Inglis, R32)
- There are 4 wildcards through to R64, the most at the Australian Open since 1992 (7)

[WC] Ajla Tomljanovic (AUS #114) vs. [12] Diana Shnaider (#13)

First meeting

Tomljanovic:

- Defeated Serena Williams in Williams' last professional match during quarterfinal run at 2022 US Open (one of three QF appearances)
- Making her 10th appearance at Melbourne Park and bidding to make the third round at the Australian Open for the first time today
- Bidding for her 1st Top 20 win since 2022 Cincinnati (d. V. Kudermetova)

Shnaider:

- Currently No.13 on PIF WTA Rankings; this time last year was ranked No.92. Reached career-high of No.12 last year after winning four singles titles
- Winner of today's match will make her first Australian Open third round
- Played collegiate tennis at North Carolina State university before turning pro in 2023; won four WTA titles last season

[14] Mirra Andreeva (#15) vs. Moyuka Uchijima (JPN #63)

First meeting

M.Andreeva:

- Making 2nd main-draw appearance at Australian Open, where she made 4r on her tournament debut in 2024 (l. Krejčíková)
- At 17 years, 272 days old, is second youngest player through to R64; only Iva Jovic (17 yr, 51 days) is younger
- Last player to reach R32 at Australian Open multiple times at 17 or younger was Nicole Pietrangeli (2005, 2006, 2007)
- Best result at Grand Slams was SF run at 2024 Roland Garros (l. Paolini)
- Best career result on hard court is R-Up run at Ningbo in 2024 (l. Kasatkina in F)
- As No.14 seed, first time for her to be seeded within Top 16 seeds

Uchijima:

- Making 2nd main-draw appearance at Australian Open, where her previous result was 1r in 2023 (l. Pera)
- Best result at Grand Slams is run to 2r at 2024 US Open (l. Niemeier) and 2024 Roland Garros (l. Sabalenka)
- Looking to earn first Top 20 win against No.15 M.Andreeva today
- Best career result on hard court is QR run at Monastir in 2022 (l. eventual champion Mertens)
- One of 2 players from Japan to reach 2r (Naomi Osaka); last time a Japanese woman reached R32 at the Australian Open was 2022 (Osaka, R32)

Jule Niemeier (GER #93) vs. [17] Marta Kostyuk (UKR #18)

First meeting

Niemeier:

- Making second main draw appearance at Australian Open, previously playing 1r in 2023 (l. Swiatek).
- This is her tenth Grand Slam main draw with her best result at 2022 Wimbledon with QF (l. Maria)
- Owns 5 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.9 Maria Sakkari at Bad Homburg 2024

Kostyuk:

- Made first Grand Slam quarterfinal at Australian Open last year (l. Yastremska)
- Owns 5-1 career record against players from Germany (only loss was to Laura Siegemund at 2019 Luxembourg)
- Last loss to a player ranked with a lower ranking than Niemeier was to No.127 Daria Snigur at 2024 Nottingham

[LL] Harriet Dart (GBR #112) vs. [18] Donna Vekic (CRO#19)

Dart leads 1-0

Dart:

- Making 5th main-draw appearance at Australian Open, where her best result was run to 2r in 2020 (l. Halep)
- Best result at Grand Slams was run to 3r at Wimbledon in 2024 (l. Xinyu Wang) and 2019 (l. Ashleigh Barty)
- The last time a lucky loser advanced to R32 at the Australian Open was 2018 (Bernarda Pera, R32)
- Owns 2 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently against No.9 Daria Kasatkina at US Open 2022
- Best career result on hard court is SF run at Cluj-Napoca in 2024 (l. eventual champion Ka.Pliskova)
- There are two lucky losers through to R64, the most at the Australian Open since 1997

Vekic:

- Making 13th appearance at Australian Open, with best result in 2023 with QF run (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- Overall, this is 45th Grand Slam main draw, and is a Slam semifinalist, reaching last four at 2024 Wimbledon
- Owns 6-9 career record against players from United Kingdom, with record in 2025 standing at 0-0
- Three-time hard court champion: Monterrey in 2023; Courmayeur in 2021; Kuala Lumpur in 201
- Only player from Croatia in the 2r

Olga Danilovic (SRB #55) vs. [25] Liudmila Samsonova (#21)

First meeting

Danilovic:

- Making 2nd appearance at Australian Open, looking for her first 3r at Australian Open
- Has beaten Arantxa Rus in 1r, raising her record in 1r matches at Grand Slams to 6-1, with the only loss coming at Wimbledon 2024 (as LL, l. Todoni)
- Best win by ranking was against No.10 Collins at Roland Garros 2024
- Owns one singles title on hard court at Guangzhou 2024

Samsonova:

- Making 6th appearance at Australian Open, having reached her 4th second round after doing so in 2023 (l. Vekic), 2022 (l. Vondrousova) and 2021 (l. Muguruza)
- With a win today would be her first 3r at Australian Open
- Best result across all majors was 4r run at Wimbledon 2021 (l. Ka. Pliskova), US Open 2022 (l. Tomljanovic), US Open 2024 (l. Swiatek)
- Owns 3 singles title on hard court - Tokyo, Cleveland, Washington DC in 2022

Naomi Osaka (JPN #51) vs. [20] Karolina Muchova (CZE #20)

Muchova leads 2-1

Osaka:

- Making 9th appearance at Australian Open, where she was a two-time champion in 2019 (d. Kvitova) and 2022 (d. Brady); also won US Open in 2018 and 2020
- In 2r matches at Australian Open record stands at 6-1 (overall 16-4), with only loss coming against Konta in 2017
- All of her seven career singles title have come on hard court, most recently Australian Open 2021

Muchova:

- Making 5th appearance at Australian Open, where her previous best result was reaching SF in 2021 (l. Brady)
- Best result across all majors was R-Up at Roland Garros 2023 (l. Swiatek in F) ; also reached SF at US Open 2024 (l. Pegula)
- Her sole career singles title has come on hard court at Seoul 2019

[27] Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova (#32) vs. Anastasia Potapova (#36)

Series tied at 1-1

Pavlyuchenkova:

- Making 17th appearance at Australian Open, where her best result was QF stage on three occasions in 2020 (l. Muguruza), 2019 (l. Collins), and 2017 (l. V. Williams)
- Contesting her 63rd Grand Slam main draw overall; her career-best Grand Slam result was reaching the 2021 Roland Garros final (l. Krejckikova)
- Among players in the draw, only Azarenka (making 66th Slam appearance) has made more Slam appearances
- Has won 9 singles titles on hard court: Hong Kong, Monterrey in 2017, 2013, 2011-10; Linz in 2015; Moscow, Paris in 2014; Istanbul in 2010
- Currently ranked No.32 (reached career high ranking No.11 on Nov.8, 2021); this time last year was ranked No.46

Potapova:

- Making 7th appearance at Australian Open, where her previous best result was 3r in 2021 (l. S. Williams)
- Best result across all majors was 4r run at Roland Garros 2024 (l. Swiatek)
- Best win by ranking was against No.2 Kontaveit at Praque 2022
- Owns one singles title on hard court at Linz 2023

- Barty in 2022 was the last time the No.1 seed won the title here
- Martina Hingis from 1997-1999 was the last player to win three in a row at the Australian Open

- Has fallen at 2r stage at a Grand Slam on 4 occasions, most recently at 2020 US Open (l. Azarenka) - also fell in 1r on 5 occasions
- Faces No.54 Jessica Bouzas Maneiro in 2r today
- Owns 12-5 career record against players from Spain and was undefeated in 2024 at 3-0 with all three meetings against Badosa
- Is a 16-time hard court champion, most recently winning Brisbane two weeks ago
- Is currently ranked No.1; this time last year was ranked No.2
- Is currently on a 6-match winning streak following Brisbane title (d. P.Kudermetova in F)

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2024 posted best career Grand Slam results with R32 at Wimbledon and US Open (at Wimbledon, she beat the defending champion Marketa Vondrousova in the opening round, before falling to the eventual 2024 champion Barbora Krejckikova in R32)
- In 2024, also claimed first WTA 125 title at Antalya.
- In 2023, won one ITF W60 in Rome. Earned a spot at Grand Slam qualifying for the first time at 2023 US Open (l. Babos) and 2023 Roland Garros (l. Ferro).
- Earned first ITF title at Madrid \$15K in 2020 on clay.
- Made professional debut in January 2018 at \$15K ITF/Hammamet 2, Tunisia.
- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan. Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
