MATCH NOTES - DAY 5 - THURSDAY, 15 JANUARY 2025

Rebecca Sramkova (SVK #49) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

First meeting

Sramkova:

- Has reached her first Grand Slam main draw second round after falling first at 2017 Australian Open, 2022 & 2024 Roland Garros and 2024 Wimbledon
- Made Grand Slam main draw debut here at Australian Open in 2017
- Claimed her first career singles title in 2024 on hard court at Hua Hin #2 (d. Siegemund in F)
- Has not defeated a Top 10 players after two attempts in 2024 against No.10 Ostapenko and No.4 Paolini

Swiatek:

- Five-time Slam champion, winning Roland-Garros (2020, 2022-24) and US Open (2022)
- Best result here is semifinal run in 2022, falling to eventual R-Up Collins
- Former PIF WTA World No.1 could secure the No.1 ranking again in the early stages of the tournament with early exits by Gauff and Sabalenka
- Is the only player to have reached 2r at each of the 20 women's singles Slams played since 2020
- With a Slam record of 84-18 she has the highest winning percentage among current players with 82.3%
- Is 20-2 in Slam 2r matches her last defeat at this stage was at 2019 US Open against Anastasija Sevastova

Renata Zarazua (MEX #70) vs. [4] Jasmine Paolini (ITA #4)

First meeting

Zarazua:

- Making her second Australian Open appearance after reaching 1r as a qualifier in 2024 (I. Trevisan)
- Looking to earn first Top 10 win in her third attempt, most recently against No.1 Sabalenka at Brisbane two weeks ago
- Owns 1-3 career record against players from Italy her most recent match resulting in a win over Bronzetti at Hobart last week
- Becomes the second player from Mexico in the Open Era to win a match in the Australian Open main draw after Angelica Gavaldon reached QF in 1990 and 1995

Paolini:

- Has the joint most Grand Slam wins of 2024 along with Sabalenka with 18 each
- In 2024 only Paolini and Gauff reached at least 4r at each of the four Grand Slams
- Made first two Grand Slam finals at Roland Garros and Wimbledon, and R16 at both Australian Open and US Open
- Faces a player from Mexico for the first time in a Tour level main draw match
- Is currently ranked at career high of No.4, achieved on Oct. 28, 2024; this time last year was ranked No.31

[6] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #7) vs. [WC] Iva Jovic (USA #191)

First meeting

Rybakina:

- Finished runner-up here in 2023, falling to Sabalenka in the final
- Has reached a further Grand Slam final, lifting the title at Wimbledon in 2022
- Last loss to a player outside Top 100 was No.131 Clara Burel at 2022 US Open
- One of four players to have reached Australian Open 2r each year from 2020-2025 along with Iga Swiatek, Danielle Collins and Elise Mertens

Jovic:

- Making Australian Open debut entering on a wild card
- This is her second Grand Slam main draw appearance after reaching 2r at 2024 US Open
- Faces a Top 10 player for the first time her highest win by ranking was over No.42 Magda Linette at 2024 US Open
- At 17 yr, 51 days old, is the youngest player through to R64
- Last time a player reached R32 at the Australian Open multiple times at 17 or younger was Nicole Vaidisova (2005, 2006, 2007)

[8] Emma Navarro (USA #8) vs. Xiyu Wang (CHN #108)

Navarro leads 1-0

Navarro:

- Best result across all majors was SF run at US Open 2024 (I. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- First time being seeded with Top 8 seeds at a Grand Slam event at No.8
- At Tour level has lost her three most recent matches against opponents outside Top 100 I. No.113 Birrell at Brisbane 2025, No.595 Shuai Zhang at Beijing 2024 and No.132 Anisimova at Toronto 2024
- Her sole singles title has come on hard court in Australian Hobart 2024
- Has claimed the fewest number of Grand Slam match wins among this year's Australian Open top 10 seeds with 16

Wang:

- Making 4th appearance at Australian Open fell to Navarro here 2022 in the first round, their only previous meeting
- A win today would be her first Australian Open 3r and equal her best Grand Slam result with 3r at US Open 2022 (I. Riske Amritraj)
- Owns one career win over a Top 10 player, defeating No.3 Maria Sakkari at US Open 2022
- Her sole career singles title was achieved on hard court at Guangzhou 2023

Yafan Wang (CHN #64) vs. [9] Daria Kasatkina (#10)

First meeting

Wang:

- Making 6th appearance at Australian Open, where her previous best result was reaching 3r in 2024 (I. Q.Zheng)
- Best result across all majors was 4r run at US Open 2024 (I. Badosa)
- Owns 3 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.9 Maria Sakkari at US Open 2024
- Best win by ranking was against No.5 Svitolina at Miami 2019

Kasatkina:

- Making 10th appearance at the Australian Open; her career-best showings at the event are 3r appearances in 2016 and 2022
- Has reached 2r at her last 8 Grand Slam appearances
- Is 2-3 in Australian Open 2r matches she lost at this stage last season to Sloane Stephens
- Best result across all majors was SF run at Roland Garros 2022 (I. eventual champion Swiatek)
- 6 of her 8 career titles have come on hard court, most recently Ningbo last October
- Is currently ranked No.10 (career best at No.8 in Oct 2022)

[Q] Destanee Aiava (AUS #195) vs. [10] Danielle Collins (USA #11)

First meeting

Aiava:

- As a qualifier, has beaten Greet Minnen in 1r to score her first main-draw win at a Grand Slam
- Owns one win in career over Top 20 players, against No.10 Aryna Sabalenka at 'S-Hertogenbosch 2019
- Best career result on hard court is R16 at Brisbane 2019 and 2017
- One of 3 players from Australia to reach 2r (along with Tomljanovic, Gibson)
- In 2024 only two qualifiers defeated a top 10 seeded opponent in Grand Slam events: Lulu Sun at Wimbledon vs. Qinwen Zheng and Elena Gabriela Ruse at US Open vs. Barbora Krejcikova

Collins:

- Making 7th appearance at Australian Open, where she was R-Up in 2022 (I. Barty), which is her best result across all majors
- Also reached SF in 2019 (I. Kvitova)
- Has won 12 out of the past 14 past meetings against opponents outside Top 100 since the start of 2024 season the two losses were against No.152 Gadecki at Guadalajara 2024 and No.125 Danilovic at Roland Garros 2024
- Is one of three players to have reached Australian Open 2r each year from 2019-2025 alongside Elise Mertens and Iga Swiatek

[19] Madison Keys (USA #14) vs. [Q] Elena-Gabriela Ruse (ROU #125)

First meeting

Keys:

- Making 11th appearance at the Australian Open; her career-best results at the event are SFs in 2015 and 2022
- Is on a six match winning streak after the Adelaide title last week; her only loss so far this year was to eventual champion Tauson in Auckland
- Career-best Grand Slam performance was her run to the 2017 US Open final (I. Stephens)
- Has won 8 matches so far in 2025; she is currently ranked No.1 on tour for match wins

Ruse:

- Making 2nd appearance at Australian Open, where her previous result was reaching 2r in 2022 (I. V.Kudermetova)
- Best result at Grand Slams was 3r run at 2024 US Open (I. Badosa)
- Owns 2 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.8 Barbora Krejcikova at US Open 2024
- Best result by Romanian player at Australian Open was R-Up run by Simona Halep in 2018

[15] Beatriz Haddad Maia (BRA #17) vs. Erika Andreeva (#86)

Haddad Maia leads 2-0

Haddad Maia:

- The Brazilian won first two meetings 2022 Madrid qualifying and 2021 Otocec (ITF)
- Overall is making 19th Grand Slam main draw appearance; the Australian Open is the only Slam she is yet to reach the R16
- With a win would equal her best result at Australian Open (3r in 2024)
- Currently 25-18 in Grand Slam matches, is first Brazilian in Open Era to secure 25+ match wins at Slams
- In 2024 only Diana Shnaider (42) won more matches than Haddad Maia (35) among left-handed players on Tour

Andreeva:

- Making her Australian Open main draw debut, Andreeva has now appeared in the main draw at all four Slams
- With a win, would reach the R32 at a Slam for the first time in her career
- This is her seventh meeting against a Top 20 opponent, and she is looking for her third win after defeating younger sister No.19 Mirra Andreeva at 2024 Wuhan and No.11 Danielle Collins at 2024 Monterrey

Veronika Kudermetova (#75) vs. [22] Katie Boulter (GBR #25)

First meeting

Kudermetova:

- Making 7th appearance at Australian Open, where her best result was reaching 3r in 2022 (I. Sakkari) and 2021 (I. Halep)
- Best result at Grand Slams was QF run at 2022 Roland Garros and R16 run at 2022 US Open
- Owns 3-2 career record against players from United Kingdom, most recently victory was over Harriet Dart at 2023 Tokyo
- Owns one singles title on hard court at Tokyo 2023

Boulter:

- Making 5th appearance at Australian Open; fell in opening round twice with best result coming 2019 and 2024 both 2r finishes
- Overall this is her 15th Grand Slam main draw appearance a win today would equal her best result with 3r runs at Wimbledon (2023, 2022) and 2023 US Open
- Best result on hard court is lifting the title at 2024 San Diego
- Her fourth-straight Slam playing as a seed; as the No.22 seed, this is her highest seed at a Slam

Emma Raducanu (GBR #61) vs. Amanda Anisimova (USA #35)

First meeting

Raducanu:

- Making 4th appearance at Australian Open, where she reached 2r on all three previous outings (2024, 2023, 2022)
- Is a former Grand Slam champion, becoming the first qualifier man or woman to lift a major title, doing so at 2021 US Open
- Owns 23 wins in career over Top 50 players, most recently No.31 Ekaterina Alexandrova here this week
- One of 4 players from Great Britain to reach 2r along with Boulter, Burrage and Dart last time 4 GBR players reached 2r at Australian Open was 1987

Anisimova:

- Making 6th appearance at Australian Open, where she has reached R16 three times in 2024, 2022, and 2019
- Overall is making her 20th Grand Slam appearance, with a best result of SF at Roland Garros 2019 (I. eventual champion Barty)
- Faces a player from Great Britain for the first time at Tour level
- Since the beginning of 2024, her ranking has risen from #373 the biggest rise of any player that ended 2024 in the Top 50

Ons Jabeur (TUN #39) vs. Camila Osorio (COL #59)

Jabeur leads 4-0

Jabeur:

- A quarterfinalist at Australian Open in 2020, has reached the QF at all four Slams
- Overall is making 30th Grand Slam main draw appearance; a three-time Slam finalist as runner-up twice at Wimbledon (2022, 2023) and 2022 US Open
- Is 16-4 in R64 at the Slams; has lost in R64 in last two appearances here in Melbourne (2023, 2024)
- Has won previous four meetings against Osorio; has only defeated one opponent five times throughout career (Daria Kasatkina, 5-2 record)
- Opened the season by reaching QF at Brisbane and second round at Adelaide

Osorio:

- Bidding to equal best career Grand Slam result; also reached R32 at 2021 Wimbledon
- Could become first woman from Colombia to reach R32 at Australian Open since 2004 when Fabiola Zuluaga reached the semifinals, the best result by a Colombian woman
- Defeated No.30 ranked Maria Sakkari in opening round, her first Top 40 win since 2023 Rome defeated No.28 Petra Martic (R64) and No.4 Caroline Garcia (R32)
- This is the fourth main draw appearance for Osorio at the Australian Open: only Mariana Duque Marino (five) has more in the Open Era among Colombian women

- · Only player from Slovakia in the main draw
- Best result by Slovakia at Australian Open was Runner-Up by Dominika Cibulkova in 2014
- Is currently ranked No.49; this time last year was ranked No.129

- Has beaten Katerina Siniakova so far this week to reach 2r
- Faces No.49 Rebecca Sramkova in 2r today; owns 160 wins in career over Top 50 players, most recently No.50 Katerina Siniakova in previous round
- Owns 2-0 career record against players from Slovakia, but meets Sramkova for the first time
- Owns 12 hard court titles, most recently 2024 Indian Wells
- Other Polish women to make the SF here areMagda Linette in 2023, Agnieszka Radwanska in2016 and 2014
- One of two Polish players to make 2r along with Frech
- Is currently ranked No.2; this time last year was ranked No.1

REBECCA SRAMKOVA IGA SWIATEK

CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached first three WTA finals of career in 2024, at Monastir, Hua Hin (defeated Siegemund for maiden title) and Jiujiang; finished season by guiding Slovakia to Billie Jean King Cup finals for first time since 2002; ended year in Top 50 for first time.
- Standout performance of 2023 was reaching QF at Warsaw (l. Maria). Also achieved R-Up at WTA 125 Bari on clay (l. Zidansek).
- Best result in 2022 was making 1r as a qualifier at Roland Garros (as LL, l. Kasatkina).
- Continued on ITF circuit from 2019 2021, also making 2r at Tour level at Prague 2020 (l. Jones) and again at Prague 2021 (as qualifier, l. Kuzmova).
- Reached Grand Slam main draw in 2017 at Australian Open (as qualifier, l. Duan) and won first WTA main draw match at Gstaad over Nina Stojanovic.
- Broke into Top 200 for first time in 2016 following title run at ITF Rome \$25K and also made Grand Slam debut at US Open that season (l. Karatantcheva in Q1).
- Played first WTA match in qualifying at Nottingham in 2015 (l. Zhu).
- Won first ITF title in 2013 on clay at Vrnjacka Banja \$10K.
- Began on professional circuit in 2012 at Velenje \$10K at the age of 15.

- Claimed five titles in 2024, making it a threepeat at Roland-Garros and also winning Doha, Indian Wells, Madrid and Rome. Crossed \$30m in prize money and qualified for her fourth WTA Finals
- Won six titles across 2023, including winning fourth Grand Slam title at Roland-Garros (d. Muchova in F) and going undefeated at the WTA Finals in Cancun (d. Pegula in F). Finished season as WTA World No.1 player for second consecutive year.

CAREER MILESTONES

- Returned to the courts in 2024 winning opening round matches at Auckland, Australian Open and Abu Dhabi. Went on to reach semifinals at Nottingham, as well as quarterfinals at Stuttgart, Eastbourne, Washington and Seoul. Achieved her first career Top 10 wins over No.5 Jessica Pegula at Eastbourne and No.9 Maria Sakkari at Wimbledon
- In 2023 made fourth round of Indian Wells (l. Swiatek) before falling in opening rounds at Miami and Stuttgart. Ended her season after Stuttgart and took time away to undergo minor surgery on both hands and ankle in May 2023.
- Struggled with injuries and form throughout 2022 dropping as low as No.83 after 1r exit at US Open
- Best performance came late in the year with SF run in Seoul (l. Ostapenko via ret. w/left glute injury). Also made QF at Stuttgart (l. eventual champion Swiatek) and Washington DC (l. eventual champion Samsonova) with best winby-ranking coming over No.22 Azarenka during 3r run at Cincinnati
- Earned a career best year in 2021 jumping over 300 ranking spots and finishing the season inside the Top 20 at a career high of No.19 earning her the 2021 WTA Newcomer of the Year
- Reached QF at Cluj-Napoca 2 (l. Kostyuk) and made appearances at Indian Wells and Linz
- Won the US Open in only her fourth Tour-level appearance (d. fellow teenager Fernandez in F); did not drop a set and upset No.12 Bencic and No.18 Sakkari along the way to become the first qualifier to lift a Grand Slam title
- Fell 1r at San Jose (as WC, l. Zhang) and finished R-Up at WTA 125K Series event in Chicago (l. Tauson)
- At Wimbledon, became the youngest British woman in the Open Era to reach R16 (l. Tomljanovic via ret.); upset Top-50 players Vondrousova and Cirstea en route
- Made debut WTA main draw appearance at 2021 Nottingham (as WC, l. Dart in 1r)
- Ended 2020 by finishing R-Up at \$25k ITF/Sunderland-GBR
- Won title at \$25k ITF/Pune-IND in 2019
- Lifted first two ITF Circuit titles in 2018, at \$15k ITF/Antalya-TUR and \$15k ITF/Tiberias-GRE
- · Owns three singles titles on ITF Circuit
- In Juniors she reached back-to-back quarter finals of Wimbledon and US Open in 2018

- In 2024 made first WTA 1000 final of career at Toronto, finishing R-Up to Pegula (defeated No.3 Sabalenka en route). Also enjoyed run to R16 at Australian Open, her third time reaching that stage in Melbourne
- Played a small number of tournaments in 2023 before taking a break away from the sport after Madrid in April
- Lifted second career title at Melbourne Summer Set 2 (d. Sasnovich in F) in January 2022
- In 2022, also made SF at Charleston (l. Jabeur) and five further QFs, including at Wimbledon (l. Halep)
- Ended 2021 season with 3r run at Indian Wells to secure her fourth consecutive Top-100 finish. Best results were QF runs at Parma and Bad Homburg
