MATCH NOTES – DAY 7 – SATURDAY, 18 JANUARY 2025

Emma Raducanu (GBR #61) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

Swiatek leads 3-0

Raducanu:

- Making 4th appearance at Australian Open, where she reached 2r on all three previous outings (2024, 2023, 2022)
- Is a former Grand Slam champion, becoming the first qualifier - man or woman - to lift a major title, doing so at 2021 US Open
- The only matchup between two Grand Slam champions in 3r
- Has won her two most recent matches against Top 10 players: No.9 Maria Sakkari at 2024 Wimbledon and No.5 Jessica Pegula at 2024 Eastbourne
- With a win today, could become the second British player to reach the Australian Open 4r since 1988 (when the event moved to Melbourne Park) after Johanna Konta (2016 and 2017)

Swiatek:

- Five-time Slam champion, winning Roland-Garros (2020, 2022-24) and US Open (2022)
- Best result here is semifinal run in 2022, falling to eventual R-Up Collins
- Has become the fourth player in the Open Era to make 3r for 20 consecutive Grand Slam events after Martina Navratilova, Conchita Martinez and Arantxa Sanchez Vicario
- Last time she lost to an opponent outside Top 50 was against No.76 Elina Svitolina in QF at Wimbledon 2023
- Has defeated Raducanu in their three previous meetings including once on hard court: 2023 Indian Wells
- Record in 3r matches at Australian Open stands at 4-1 (16-4 across all Slams), with the only loss here coming against Noskova in 2024

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[28] Elina Svitolina (UKR #27) vs. [4] Jasmine Paolini (ITA #4)

First meeting

Svitolina:

- Making 12th appearance at Australian Open, where she reached QF stage twice in 2019 (l. eventual champion Osaka) and 2018 (l. Mertens); also reached R16 in 2024, 2021
- Overall competing in her 44th Grand Slam main draw; she has reached at least the QF stage at all majors, with SF runs at Wimbledon in 2023 and 2019, along with the US Open in 2019, and QF at Australian Open in 2018-19
- Owns 11 singles titles on hard court, most recently Chicago 250 in 2021
- With her 2r win over Dolehide, became the first Ukrainian player - male or female - in the Open Era to secure 100 main draw wins at Grand Slam events

Paolini:

- Has the joint most Grand Slam wins of 2024 along with Sabalenka with 18 each
- In 2024 only Paolini and Gauff reached at least 4r at each of the four Grand Slams
- In 2024 became the first Italian in the Open Era to reach the women's singles R16 at all four Grand Slam events in a single calendar year: R16 at Australian Open followed by first two Grand Slam finals at Roland Garros and Wimbledon, and R16 at US Open
- First Italian player to reach 3r in five consecutive Grand Slam events since Roberta Vinci in 2023
- Could become the first Italian player in the Open Era to reach the R16 for five consecutive Grand Slam events - prior to her the record was held by Francesca Schiavone with four in a row between Wimbledon 2009 and Roland Garros 2010

[6] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #7) vs. [32] Dayana Yastremska (UKR #33)

First meeting

Rybakina:

- Finished runner-up here in 2023, the best result ever by a Kazakhstan player here (l. Sabalenka in final)
- Has reached a further Grand Slam final, lifting the title at Wimbledon in 2022
- Her previous 2r match here was her 50th Grand Slam main draw win: she is the fifth player with 50+ Slam wins since 2020 after Iga Swiatek, Aryna Sabalenka, Coco Gauff and Ons Jabeur
- Is 11-1 at the Australian Open after taking the opening set – only loss was to Aryna Sabalenka in the 2023 final (4-6 6-3 6-4)

Yastremska:

- A semifinalist in 2024 (l. Q.Zheng), which is also Ukraine's best result at Australian Open
- Has won 10 main draw matches at the Australian Open: the tournament where she has the most career wins on Tour
- Her career best win by ranking was defeating No.2 Ka.Pliskova in Wuhan 2019
- Owns two singles titles on hard court at Hua Hin 2019 and Hong Kong 2018

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[8] Emma Navarro (USA #8) vs. Ons Jabeur (TUN #39)

Jabeur leads 1-0

Navarro:

- Best result across all majors was SF run at US Open 2024 (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- First time being seeded with Top 8 seeds at a Grand Slam event at No.8
- Is the third top 10 seed in last 10 years to win three-setters in her opening two matches at the Australian Open, after Angelique Kerber (2017) and Aryna Sabalenka (2022)
- In her second Australian Open main draw is looking for her first 4r after reaching 3r in 2024 (l. Yastremska)
- Has played in 30 three-set matches at WTA level since the start of 2024, the most of any player over that span

Jabeur:

- A quarterfinalist at Australian Open in 2020, has reached the QF at all four Slams
- Overall is making 30th Grand Slam main draw appearance; a three-time Slam finalist as runner-up twice at Wimbledon (2022, 2023) and 2022 US Open
- Has defeated Navarro once before at 2022 Charleston on clay
- Since 2020, only the current Top 3 of the PIF WTA Rankings (Aryna Sabalenka, Iga Swiatek and Coco Gauff) have won more Grand Slam main draw matches than Ons Jabeur (55)
- Could reach 4r at Australian Open for the second time in her career after QF in 2020 (lost to eventual champion Sofia Kenin)

[24] Yulia Putintseva (KAZ #23) vs. [9] Daria Kasatkina (#10)

Kasatkina leads 2-1

Putintseva:

- In her 13th Australian Open main draw appearance, she has reached 3r for a fourth time after 2016 (l. Gasparyan), 2020 (l. Halep) and 2021 (l. Svitolina)
- Has won two of her previous nine Grand Slam matches versus Top 10 opponents (both at Wimbledon, in 2019 vs. Naomi Osaka and in 2024 vs. Iga Swiatek)
- Looking to her first win against a Top 10 opponent at Australian Open - she is now 0-3 against such opponents here
- In her 44th Grand Slam main draw, her best result is quarterfinal reached at Roland Garros in 2016 (l. eventual R-Up S. Williams) and 2018 (l. Keys) and also at US Open in 2020 (l. Brady)

Kasatkina:

- In her 10th Australian Open main draw, a win today would be her first 4r after 3r appearances in 2016 and 2022
- Kasatakina and Emma Navarro are the only Top-10 seeded players at the 2025 Australian Open yet to reach 4r here
- Best result across all majors was SF run at Roland Garros 2022 (l. eventual champion Swiatek)
- 6 of her 8 career titles have come on hard court, most recently Ningbo last October
- Is currently ranked No.10 (peak rank No.8 in Oct 2022); this time last year was ranked No.13

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[19] Madison Keys (USA #14) vs. [10] Danielle Collins (USA #11)

Keys leads 2-1

Keys:

- Making 11th appearance at the Australian Open; her career-best results at the event are SFs in 2015 and 2022
- Career-best Grand Slam performance was her run to the 2017 US Open final (l. Stephens)
- Has the most match wins of any player so far in 2025 with 9
- Since 2015, only Halep (6) has made more 4r appearances at the Australian Open than Keys (5)
- Is the active player from USA with the most Grand Slam wins - currently 111
- Since 2015, only Simona Halep (six) has made Australian Open fourth round on more occasions than Keys (five)

Collins:

- Making 7th appearance at Australian Open, where she was R-Up in 2022 (l. Barty), which is her best result across all majors
- Also reached SF in 2019 (l. Kvitova)
- Australian Open is the Grand Slam event where both Collins and Keys have their highest winning percentage: Keys (74.3% : 29-10) and Collins (75%: 17-6)
- Is one of the five active players from USA with more than 40 Grand Slam wins, alongside Madison Keys, Sloane Stephens, Coco Gauff and Jessica Pegula
- Has won 18 main draw matches at the Australian Open: her joint-highest tally in a single tournament (level with the Miami Open)

[15] Beatriz Haddad Maia (BRA #17) vs. Veronika Kudermetova (#75)

Tied 2-2

Haddad Maia:

- Overall is making 19th Grand Slam main draw appearance; the Australian Open is the only slam she is yet to reach R16
- Currently 26-18 in Grand Slam matches, is first Brazilian in the Open Era to secure 25+ match wins at Slams
- Defeated Kudermetova in their two most recent meetings in 2024 at Wuhan and Seoul
- Four left-handed players (Haddad Maia, Shnaider, Danilovic and Fernandez) have made the women's third round at the Australian Open for the first time since 2014 (Dellacqua, Kerber, Safarova, and Makarova)
- In 2024 only Diana Shnaider (42) won more matches than Haddad Maia (35) among left-handed players on Tour

Kudermetova:

- Making 7th main-draw appearance at Australian Open, where her previous best result was reaching 3r in 2022 (l. Sakkari) and 2021 (l. Halep)
- Looking to reach 4r at a Grand Slam for the third time in her career (2022 Roland Garros and 2022 US Open)
- Most recent victory over a Top 20 player was No.15 Liudmila Samsonova at Seoul 2024
- Lost both previous meetings against Top 20 players at the Australian Open: both in 3r, against Simona Halep in 2021 and Maria Sakkari in 2022.
- Has won one singles title on hard court at Tokyo in 2023

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[LL] Eva Lys (GER #128) vs. Jaqueline Cristian (ROU #82)

Lys leads 3-0

Lys:

- Making 2nd main-draw appearance at Australian Open, where her previous result was reaching 1r in 2023 (I. Bucsa)
- First time in her career reaching 3r at Grand Slam event; previous best result at Grand Slams was reaching 2r at 2023 US Open
- Bidding to become the first women's singles lucky loser to reach 4r at the Australian Open since the event moved to Melbourne Park in 1988
- One of two players from Germany to reach 3r along with Siegemund

Cristian:

- Making 4th main-draw appearance at Australian Open, where her best result was reaching 2r in 2022 (I. Keys)
- Previous best result at Grand Slams was reaching 2r at 2023 Wimbledon and 2022 Australian Open
- Bidding to become first Romanian player to reach 4r since Sorana Cirstea at the 2023 US Open and first at Australian Open since 2022 (Cirstea, Halep)
- Looking to secure three consecutive WTA main draw matches for the first time since reaching QF at 2024 Charleston

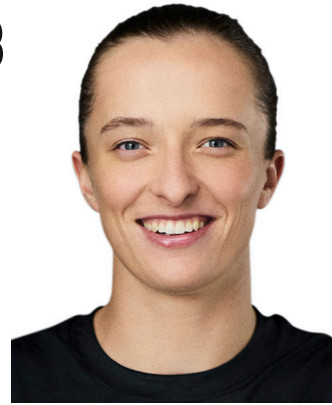

- Making her 4th main draw appearance at the Australian Open, where she has reached the 2r on all three previous outings
- One of the 18 Grand Slam champions in this year's main draw
- Has beaten Ekaterina Alexandrova and Amanda Anisimova so far this week to reach her first 3r at Australian Open
- Faces No.2 Iga Swiatek in 3r today; owns 2 wins in career over Top 10 players, defeating No.9 Maria Sakkari at Wimbledon 2024 and No.5 Pegula at Eastbourne 2024
- The only matchup between two Grand Slam champions in 3r
- Record in 3r matches at Grand Slams is 3-0
- Owns 2-3 career record against players from Poland (0-0 in 2023), with all the three losses coming against today's opponent Swiatek
- Sole hard court title came with fairytale run to US Open crown in 2021
- Only player from United Kingdom to reach 3r
- Best result by United Kingdom at Australian Open was Champion run by Virginia Wade in 1972
- Last time a player from United Kingdom reached 3r at Australian Open was 2017
- Is currently ranked No.61 (peak rank at No.10 in July, 2022); this time last year was ranked No.296, having been recovering from wrist surgery

- Is a five-time Slam champion, winning Roland Garros (2020, 2022-24) and US Open (2022); at Wimbledon, best result is making QF in 2023
- Has beaten Katerina Siniakova and Rebecca Sramkova to reach 3r - becoming the 4th player in the Open Era to make 3r for 20 consecutive Grand Slam events after Martina Navratilova, Conchita Martinez and Arantxa Sanchez Vicario
- Faces No.61 Emma Raducanu in 3r today; last time she lost to an opponent outside Top 50 was against No.76 Svitolina in QF at Wimbledon 2023
- Is undefeated in her career against players from United Kingdom (2-0 in 2025)
- Record in 3r matches at Australian Open stands at 4-1 (16-4 overall), with the only loss here coming against Noskova in 2024
- Owns 12 hard court titles, most recently 2024 Indian Wells
- One of 2 players from Poland to reach 3r (along with Frech)
- Other Polish women to make the SF here are Magda Linette in 2023, Agnieszka Radwanska in 2016 and 2014
- Is currently ranked No.2; former PIF WTA World No.1

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CAREER MILESTONES

- Returned to the courts in 2024 winning opening round matches at Auckland, Australian Open and Abu Dhabi. Went on to reach semifinals at Nottingham, as well as quarterfinals at Stuttgart, Eastbourne, Washington and Seoul. Achieved her first career Top 10 wins over No.5 Jessica Pegula at Eastbourne and No.9 Maria Sakkari at Wimbledon
- In 2023 made fourth round of Indian Wells (l. Swiatek) before falling in opening rounds at Miami and Stuttgart. Ended her season after Stuttgart and took time away to undergo minor surgery on both hands and ankle in May 2023.
- Struggled with injuries and form throughout 2022 dropping as low as No.83 after 1r exit at US Open
- Best performance came late in the year with SF run in Seoul (l. Ostapenko via ret. w/left glute injury). Also made QF at Stuttgart (l. eventual champion Swiatek) and Washington DC (l. eventual champion Samsonova) with best win-by-ranking coming over No.22 Azarenka during 3r run at Cincinnati
- Earned a career best year in 2021 jumping over 300 ranking spots and finishing the season inside the Top 20 at a career high of No.19 earning her the 2021 WTA Newcomer of the Year Award
- Reached QF at Cluj-Napoca 2 (l. Kostyuk) and made appearances at Indian Wells and Linz
- Won the US Open in only her fourth Tour-level appearance (d. fellow teenager Fernandez in F); did not drop a set and upset No.12 Bencic and No.18 Sakkari along the way to become the first qualifier to lift a Grand Slam title
- Fell 1r at San Jose (as WC, l. Zhang) and finished R-Up at WTA 125K Series event in Chicago (l. Tauson)
- At Wimbledon, became the youngest British woman in the Open Era to reach R16 (l. Tomljanovic via ret.); upset Top-50 players Vondrousova and Cirstea en route
- Made debut WTA main draw appearance at 2021 Nottingham (as WC, l. Dart in 1r)
- Ended 2020 by finishing R-Up at \$25k ITF/Sunderland-GBR
- Won title at \$25k ITF/Pune-IND in 2019
- Lifted first two ITF Circuit titles in 2018, at \$15k ITF/Antalya-TUR and \$15k ITF/Tiberias-GRE
- Owns three singles titles on ITF Circuit
- In Juniors she reached back-to-back quarter finals of Wimbledon and US Open in 2018
- Claimed five titles in 2024, making it a three-peat at Roland-Garros and also winning Doha, Indian Wells, Madrid and Rome. Crossed \$30m in prize money and qualified for her fourth WTA Finals
- Won six titles across 2023, including winning fourth Grand Slam title at Roland-Garros (d. Muchova in F) and going undefeated at the WTA Finals in Cancun (d. Pegula in F). Finished season as WTA World No.1 player for second consecutive year.
- In 2022, lifted second and third Grand Slam titles, at Roland-Garros (d. Gauff in F) and US Open (d. Jabeur in F)
- Triumph in Paris was the last of six straight titles during 37-match winning streak - joint-longest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990
- Won two titles in 2021, at Adelaide and Rome. Other highlights included QF at Roland-Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage)
- Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland-Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, l. Krejciikova/Siniakova)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland - man or woman - to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since A.Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon

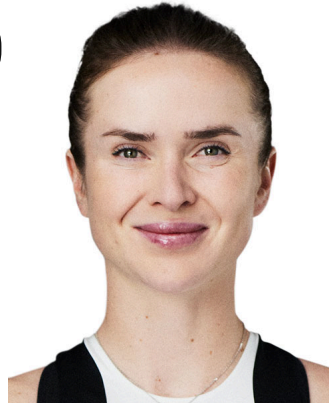

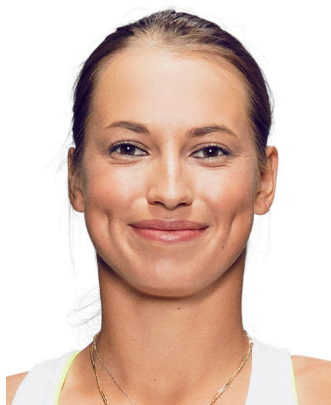
