[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. [14] Mirra Andreeva (#15)

Sabalenka leads 3-1

Sabalenka:

- Two-time defending champion making 8th appearance at Australian Open; won 1st Grand Slam title at Melbourne Park in 2023 (d. Rybakina) and 2nd in 2024 (d. Zheng Qinwen)
- Martina Hingis from 1997-1999 was the last player to win three in a row at the Australian Open
- Plays as the No.1 seed, her first top seed at a Grand Slam
- Has started the season undefeated (8-0)
- Has won her last 17 Australian Open matches -- last loss at Melbourne Park came to Kaia Kanepi in the 2022 Round of 16; 1st player to win 17 straight at Melbourne Park since Victoria Azarenka in 2014

M.Andreeva:

- Only win over Sabalenka came at a Grand Slam, winning in three sets in the Roland-Garros QF last year
- Making 2nd main-draw appearance at Australian Open; made 4r on her tournament debut in 2024 (I. Krejcikova)
- Best result at Grand Slams was SF run at 2024 Roland Garros (I. Paolini)
- Since 2000, holds the third-best Grand Slam win rate (17-7) among players under 18
- First time for her to be seeded within Top 16 seeds, as No.14 seed
- Youngest player remaining in the draw at 17 years, 272 days old; no teenagers advanced to the R16 at the last two Slams 2024 US Open and 2024 Wimbledon
- With a win, would be the youngest woman to reach the QF at the Australian Open since 1998 (Martina Hingis, QF at 17 years, 124 days); Maria Sharapova in 2005 (QF at 17 years, 285 days) and Nicole Vaidisova in 2007 (QF at 17 years, 279 days) were slightly older

[3] Coco Gauff (USA #3) vs. Belinda Bencic (SUI #294)

Bencic leads 2-1

Gauff:

- Gauff is the fifth female player in the Open Era to win their first eight seasonal matches for three consecutive years after Margaret Court, Steffi Graff, Monica Seles and Serena Williams
- Has beaten Sofia Kenin, Jodie Burrage, and Leylah Fernandez to remain undefeated in 2025 (8-0)
- Has yet to lose a set since start her season at United Cup in Sydney
- Is the second player in the last 15 years to reach the 4th round at the Australian Open for three consecutive seasons before turning 21 after Iga Swiatek (2020-2022)
- Career-best Australian Open result is her SF run last year (I. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- Among American woman, the most Grand Slam round of 16 appearances before turning 21: Gauff (14) Tracy Austin (14) and Chris Evert (14)

Bencic:

- Making 11th appearance at Australian Open, where her previous best result was reaching 4r in 2023 (I. eventual champion Sabalenka) and in 2016 (I. Sharapova)
- Bencic won seven of her last eight Grand Slam meetings against former Major Champions (including the First Round at the Australian Open 2025 against Jelena Ostapenko) she only lost to Iga Swiatek in Wimbledon 2023 in this run
- Has beaten Jelena Ostapenko, Suzan Lamens, and Naomi Osaka so far this week to reach 4r
- Faces No.3 Coco Gauff in 4r today; leads the head-to-head 2-1
- Owns 32 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.9 Petra Kvitova at Montreal 2023
- Only Martina Hingis (153) and Patty Schnyder (101) have won more women's singles Grand Slam main draw matches than Bencic (60) among players competing for Switzerland in the Open Era
- Is currently ranked No.294 (coming back from maternity leave in October 2024); this time last year was ranked No.21

[11] Paula Badosa (ESP #12) vs. Olga Danilovic (SRB #55)

Danilovic leads 2-1

Badosa:

- Making her 6th appearance at the Australian Open; has equaled her best result (also R16 in 2022, I. Keys)
- With a win would equal her best result at a Grand Slam having reached QF at 2021 Roland-Garros (I. Zidansek) and 2024 US Open (I. Navarro)
- Faces No.55 Olga Danilovic in 4r today in their first meeting since 2019, and their fourth overall
- Has beaten Xinyu Wang, Talia Gibson and Marta Kostyuk to reach 4r
- Last Spanish woman to reach the QF at the Australian Open was Garbine Muguruza (2020, R-Up)

Danilovic:

- Making 2nd appearance at the Australian Open; previous best result was reaching 2r in 2021 (as qualifier, I. Rogers)
- First Serbian woman to reach the R16 at Australian Open since 2014 (Jankovic, R16; Ivanovic, QF)
- Last woman representing Serbia to reach QF at a Slam was Ana Ivanovic 2015 Roland Garros (SF)
- First left-hander to reach R16 at Australian Open since 2021 Vondrousova
- Has beaten Arantxa Rus, Liudmila Samsonova, and Jessica Pegula so far this week to reach 4r; win over No. 6 ranked Pegula is the highest ranked opponent Danilovic has defeated in her career

[27] Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova (#32) vs. [18] Donna Vekic (CRO #19)

Pavlyuchenkova leads 2-0

Pavlyuchenkova:

- Contesting her 63rd Grand Slam main draw overall; her career-best Grand Slam result was reaching the 2021 Roland Garros final (I. Krejcikova)
- Holds 91-62 record at Grand Slam events (153 matches); one of six active players with more than 150 women's singles major matches played along with Azarenka, Kvitova, Wozniacki, Halep and Keys
- Has beaten Yue Yuan, Anastasia Potapova and Laura Siegemund, her first Grand Slam R16 appearance since 2023 Roland Garros (QF)
- Through to R16 at the Australian Open for the 4th time also 2017, 2019, 2020 all QF appearances
- Bidding to make 1st Grand Slam hard court QF since 2023 Roland Garros
- At 33 years, 207 days old is the oldest player remaining in the draw

Vekic:

- Making 13th appearance at Australian Open, with best result in 2023 with QF run (I. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- Overall, this is 45th Grand Slam main draw, and is a Slam semifinalist, reaching last four at 2024 Wimbledon
- Through to her third career R16 at Australian Open with a win: 2023 and 2021
- Bidding to reach QF at a Slam for fourth time in career 2019 US Open (QF), 2023 Australian Open (QF) and 2024 Wimbledon (SF)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan.
 Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid.
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- Rose to career-high No.2 in rankings on August 23, 2021
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejcikova/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10
- Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitova in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejcikova/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Shenzhen in doubles (w/Mertens), going 1-2 in the round-robin stage
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2018, lifting two titles, at New Haven (d. Suárez Navarro in F) and Wuhan (d. Kontaveit in F), winning 46 matches and finishing at No.11 in the rankings

- Reached first two WTA finals of career in 2024 winning the title at Iasi and finishing runner-up at Ningbo
- Made first Grand Slam semifinal at 2024 Roland Garros beating World No.2 Aryna Sabalenka in the quarterfinals
- Made Top 20 debut on October 8, 2024 finishing the year at World No.16. Also won 2024 Paris Olympic silver medal in women's doubles with Diana Shnaider
- Opened 2023 season in April by winning 13
 matches straight to claim back-to-back ITF
 titles in Switzerland; as WC, advanced to R16 at
 Madrid with wins over Fernandez, Haddad Maia
 and Linette (l. Sabalenka); subsequently made
 debut at Roland Garros (as qualifier, l. Gauff in
 3r), Wimbledon (as qualifier, l. Keys in R16) and
 US Open (l. eventual champion Gauff in 2r)
- Also in 2023 reached R16 at Beijing (l. Rybakina), leading to Top 50 debut (started season just inside Top 300); voted WTA Newcomer of the Year
- In 2022, posted 39-9 win-loss record on ITF Circuit, winning first four titles at this level
- Fell 1r on WTA main-draw debut at 2022 Monastir (as WC, l. Potapova)
- Made professional debut at W15 ITF Circuit event at Sharm El-Sheikh in February 2022
- Owns six ITF Circuit singles titles
- As a junior, finished R-Up at 2023 Australian Open (l. Korneeva)

- Also in 2018, was R-Up at Lugano (l. Mertens) and Eastbourne (l. Wozniacki), made SF at Cincinnati, reached five QFs and produced a career-best Grand Slam run to R16 at US Open
- Entered Top 50 on April 16, 2018, after Lugano run, and Top 20 on August 27 of the same year, following New Haven title
- Broke into Top 100 at No.76 on October 16, 2017 after reaching first Tour-level final at Tianjin (l. Sharapova). Also in 2017 made SF at Tashkent (l. Babos) and lifting WTA 125k Series title at Mumbai (d. Jakupovic)
- Made Grand Slam main draw debut 2017 Wimbledon, falling in 2r (as qualifier, d. Khromacheva, l. Witthoeft)
- Fell 1r on main draw debut at 2017 Dubai (as qualifier, l. Ka.Bondarenko)
- Member of Belarus Billie Jean King Cup team that lost to USA in 2017 final - scored first Top-20 win of career with defeat of No.13 Stephens during final in Minsk
- WTA qualifying debut came at 2016 Rabat
- Lifted first three ITF Circuit titles in 2015, including a 13-match win streak towards the year's end, bringing back-to-back trophies in Antalya, Turkey
- · Made debut on ITF Circuit in Minsk in 2012

- Previously coached by Dmitry Tursunov and Didi Kindlmann
- Started playing tennis when she was 6 by an accident when her father Sergey drove by the tennis courts and decided to give it a try
- Has a sweet tooth and considers something sweet as a perfect present; loves her grandmother's cooking, and looks forward to her pancakes when she is away from home
- Has a tiger tattoo on her left arm, which earned her the nickname "The Tiger"

- Broke into Top 100 in singles on July 7, 2008 following run through qualifying to 3r at Wimbledon - and entered Top 50 on November 3 of the same year
- Reached first two WTA QFs in 2008, first on clay at Palermo and then on hard at Tokyo [Japan Open]
- Made Grand Slam debut at 2007 Wimbledon as a WC, losing 6-0 6-1 to No.10 seed Hantuchova
