TOP 2 SEEDS:

- The Top 2 seeds are through to the Australian Open semifinals for since 2018 (Halep vs Wozniacki).
- If both Sabalenka and Swiatek advance to the final, it would be the first time the Australian Open final featured the Top 2 seeds since 2018.
- Since 2000, the Australian Open final has featured the Top 2 seeds five times – 2000, 2003, 2004, 2015, 2018

PIF WTA WORLD NO.1 RANKING ON THE LINE

- Either Sabalenka or Swiatek will depart Melbourne with the PIF WTA World No.1 Singles Ranking
- If Sabalenka loses in the semifinal, then Swiatek will return to No.1
- If Sabalenka and Swiatek meet in the final, the winner will take claim to the No.1 Ranking



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PIF WTA TOP 10 RANKING WATCH

- Both Madison Keys and Paula Badosa will return to the PIF WTA Top 10 following their success at the Australian Open
- Keys was last in the Top 10 the week of January 9, 2023; since dropping out of the Top 10, Keys has maintained a Top 25 ranking before booking her return after the tournament
- Badosa was last in the Top 10 the week of October 17, 2022; since then, her ranking dipped as low as No.140 (the week of May 20, 2024)

Sabalenka leads 5-2

Sabalenka:

- Two-time defending champion, winning the title here in 2023 (d. Rybakina in final) and 2024 (d. Qinwen Zheng in final)
- Martina Hingis from 1997-1999 was the last player to win three in a row at the Australian Open
- With a win could become the first player to make three finals in a row at the Australian Open since Serena Williams (2015-2017) and the youngest since Martina Hingis (1997-2002).
- Playing as the No.1 seed, her first top seed at a Grand Slam
- Is the first World No. 1 to reach the Women's Singles semifinals at the Australian Open since Ash Barty in 2022
- Needs to finish one round better than Iga Swiatek to retain PIF WTA World No.1 Ranking
- The first player to reach eight Women's Singles Grand Slam semifinals in a 10-Majors span (US Open 2022)
- Is the opponent against whom Paula Badosa has played (seven) and lost (five) the most career matches
- Holds a 5-2 record head-to-head against Paula Badosa at WTA level, with Sabalenka winning their only previous meeting at a Grand Slam event, at Roland Garros (3r) last year
- Is the first player to win 19+ consecutive matches at the Australian Open since Martina Hingis (27 consecutive wins at the event between 1997 and 2000).
- Could become the third player in the last 10 years to win 20+ consecutive matches in a Women's Singles Major after Serena Williams (US Open and Wimbledon) and Iga Swiatek (French Open).
- Sabalenka (84.4%, 27-5) trails only four players in the Open Era for Women's Singles win rate at the Australian Open - Steffi Graf, Monica Seles, Martina Hingis and Serena Williams.

Badosa:

- Competing in her first Grand Slam semifinal
- Her win over Gauff in the previous round was her first win over a Top 10 player at a Grand Slam
- Owns a 2-1 record against Sabalenka on hard courts
- Aiming to win consecutive WTA top 10 wins for the first time since defeating Maria Sakkari and Aryna Sabalenka in the Round Robin at the WTA Finals in 2021 in Guadalajara
- Could become the third-oldest player to defeat the No.1 player at the Australian Open, younger only than Serena Williams and Angelique Kerber (since 1975)
- In the past 40 years, she is now the second-oldest Spanish female or male to reach a maiden Singles semifinal at a Grand Slam - younger only than Roberto Bautista Agut in Wimbledon 2019
- Is the fourth Spanish player in the Open Era to reach a Women's Singles semifinal at a Grand Slam event, alongside Arantxa Sanchez-Vicario, Conchita Martinez and Garbine Muguruza
- Is the second No.11 seed to reach the semifinals at the Australian Open in the Open Era after Kim Clijsters (2012)
- Badosa (27 years, 72 days) would become the third-oldest player to defeat the WTA #1 at the Australian Open, younger only than Serena Williams and Angelique Kerber

Swiatek leads 4-1

Keys:

- Making 11th appearance at the Australian Open, and through to her third semifinal (also 2015 and 2022)
- Career-best Grand Slam performance was her run to the 2017 US Open final (losing to Stephens)
- Is currently on a 10-match winning streak, having won five matches en route to Adelaide title and five matches to reach Australian Open SF
- Since 2015, only Serena Williams (15), Aryna Sabalenka (10) and Simona Halep (eight) have made more Grand Slam semi-finals than Madison Keys (both Keys and Swiatek are on seven)
- Five wins this fortnight move Keys to 114 Grand Slam wins – now the sixth most among active players, having overtaken Halep (112)
- Has won 32 matches at the Australian Open; this century, only Victoria Azarenka (50), Venus Williams (46) and Caroline Wozniacki (37) have won more matches at the Australian Open
- The No.19 seed has made the semifinals at the Australian Open for the second time in the Open Era after Nathalie Dechy 2005.
- Keys is the first player with a 10-years gap between their first (2015) and last (2025) semifinal at the Australian Open since Victoria Azarenka (2012-2023).

Swiatek:

- Five-time Grand Slam champion, winning Roland-Garros (2020, 2022-24) and US Open (2022)
- Is through to her second Australian Open semifinal – fell at this stage in 2022 to Danielle Collins
- Third year out of four that a Polish woman has made the SF here, after Swiatek in 2022 and Linette in 2023
- Is the youngest player to reach Grand Slam semifinals on seven occasions since Maria Sharapova in 2008 who had 10 such appearances
- Has dropped 14 games en route to the SF - only Sharapova in 2013 (nine), Seles in 1991 (12) and Graf in 1989 (13) have dropped fewer games to make the SFs at the Australian Open in a 128-players draw during the Open Era
- Is looking to become the first player to make their sixth Women's Singles Grand Slam final before turning 24 since Justine Henin at the Australian Open 2006.
- Has not conceded a single game on serve in their last four matches (against Sramkova, Raducanu, Lys and Navarro), achieving this for the first time in her career.

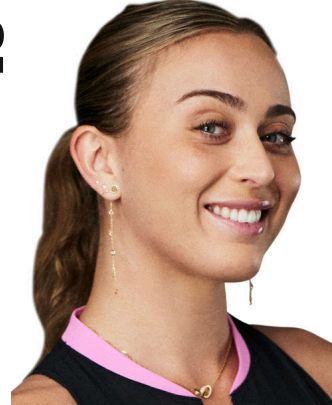

- Making eighth appearance at the Australian Open, where she is two-time defending champion (2023 - d. Rybakina in final; 2024 - d. Qinwen Zheng in final)
- Has beaten Sloane Stephens, Jessica Bouzas Maneiro, Clara Tauson, Mirra Andreeva, and Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova so far this week to reach her second semifinal of the 2025 season (also reached the same stage at Brisbane)
- Faces No.12 Paula Badosa in SF today; owns 81 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.15 Mirra Andreeva in 4r at the Australian Open this year
- Has won the last five meetings against Badosa, but only one of those meetings came on hard courts (Miami 2024)
- Owns 13-5 career record against players from Spain, with record in 2025 standing at 1-0
- Record in WTA SF matches stands at 31-17
- Has won 16 of her 18 titles on hard courts: Brisbane in 2025; Wuhan, US Open, Cincinnati, and Australian Open in 2024; Australian Open and Adelaide #1 in 2023; Abu Dhabi in 2021; Linz, Ostrava, and Doha in 2020; Zhuhai, Wuhan, and Shenzhen in 2019; Wuhan and New Haven in 2018
- Is currently ranked No.1; competing at the Australian Open as the No.1 seed for the first time
- Is currently on a 10-match winning streak; longest winning streak of her career was 16 matches in 2024
- Has won 10 matches so far in 2025
- Has been involved in two three-set matches in 2025 - against Polina Kudermetova in the Brisbane final, and against Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova in the previous round at Australian Open

- Making sixth appearance at Australian Open, where her previous result was reaching 3r in 2024 (l. Anisimova); previous best result here came during a 4r run in 2022 (l. Keys)
- Has beaten Xinyu Wang, Talia Gibson, Marta Kostyuk, Olga Danilovic and Coco Gauff so far this week to reach her first SF since reaching the same stage at Ningbo 2024
- Faces No.1 Aryna Sabalenka in SF today; owns 14 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.3 Coco Gauff in the previous round at this year's Australian Open
- Owns 2-1 record against Sabalenka on hard courts
- Record in WTA semifinal matches stands at 4-11
- Has won three of her four titles on hard courts: Washington DC in 2024 (d. Bouzkova in final); Sydney in 2022 (d. Krejčíková in final); Indian Wells in 2021 (d. Azarenka in final)
- Only player from Spain to reach SF
- Best results by Spanish players at Australian Open were Runner-Up runs by Garbiñe Muguruza in 2020, Conchita Martínez in 1998, and Arantxa Sanchez-Vicario in 1995 and 1994
- Last time a player from Spain reached the semifinal at the Australian Open was 2020
- Is currently ranked No.12; this time last year was ranked No.100
- Is competing in her first-ever Grand Slam semifinal

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CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan. Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid.
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- Rose to career-high No.2 in rankings on August 23, 2021
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10
- Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitová in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Shenzhen in doubles (w/Mertens), going 1-2 in the round-robin stage
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2018, lifting two titles, at New Haven (d. Suárez Navarro in F) and Wuhan (d. Kontaveit in F), winning 46 matches and finishing at No.11 in the rankings
- Voted 2024 WTA Comeback Player of the Year after finishing the year at No.12 (after finishing 2023 at No.66); won 4th career title at Washington DC and also reached SF at Cincinnati, Beijing and Ningbo; also advanced to QF at US Open
- 2023 was a difficult season for Badosa; while she made the SF at Adelaide #2, reached back-to-back QF at Charleston and Stuttgart and an additional QF at Rome, she withdrew from Roland Garros with a back injury. Her last match of the year was at Wimbledon, where she fell in the R64. She ended her season afterwards due to continuing injury
- In 2022, Badosa rose to career-high ranking of No.2 (April 25), won one title, at Sydney and advanced to SF at Indian Wells, Stuttgart and San Jose
- Captured the first two WTA singles titles of her career in 2021 at Belgrade (d. Konjuh in F) and Indian Wells (d. Azarenka in F)
- Qualified for AKRON WTA Finals Guadalajara, where she advanced to the SF stage
- Broke into the WTA Top 20 on October 18, 2021 after winning the Indian Wells title and reached the Top 10 on November 8, 2021
- Nominated for 2021 WTA Most Improved Player of the Year (won by Krejčíková), as voted on by members of the media
- In 2021 also advanced to SF at Madrid, Charleston and Lyon and QFs at Roland-Garros, Cincinnati and Olympics
- At 2020 Roland Garros, upset former finalist Stephens and 2017 champion Ostapenko en route to reaching R16 for the first time at a major. That year also reached SF at Istanbul (l. Bouchard)
- Campaign in 2019 highlighted by SF run at Palermo (l. Bertens) and QF showing at Seoul (l. Y.Wang); also fell 1r on Grand Slam main draw debut at Australian Open (as qualifier, l. Birrell)
- Finished 2018 inside Top 200 for the first time (at No.143); picked up three ITF titles at \$25k ITF/Glasgow-UK, ITF/\$25k Les Franqueses del Valles - FRA and ITF/\$60k Valencia-ESP
- Fell in qualifying at 2018 Wimbledon, Madrid and US Open
- Claimed third title on ITF Circuit in 2017 at ITF/\$25k El Espinar; Fell 1r at Miami and in qualifying at Madrid
- In 2016, fell 1r at Miami, Madrid and Mallorca and in qualifying at Rio de Janeiro
- As wildcard, made breakthrough on WTA Tour with 3r run at 2015 Miami Open (l. Ka.Pliskova)

- Also in 2018, was R-Up at Lugano (l. Mertens) and Eastbourne (l. Wozniacki), made SF at Cincinnati, reached five QFs and produced a career-best Grand Slam run to R16 at US Open

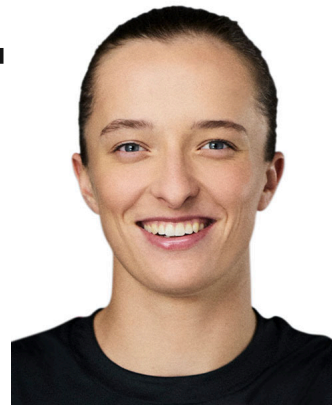
