[LL] Eva Lys (GER #128) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

Swiatek leads 1-0

Lys:

- Making 2nd main-draw appearance at Australian Open, where her previous result was reaching 1r in 2023 (l. Bucsa)
- Aiming to become the first woman in the Open Era to reach a Grand Slam quarterfinal as a lucky loser
- By making her first career Grand Slam R16 here, became the first women's singles lucky loser to reach 4r at the Australian Open since event moved to Melbourne Park in 1988
- She is also the first lucky loser to reach a Grand Slam R16 in women's singles since Elina Avanesyan at 2023 Roland Garros
- Her only previous match vs. a Top 10 player was her 6-1, 6-1 loss to Swiatek at 2022 Stuttgart

Swiatek:

- Five-time Slam champion, winning Roland-Garros (2020, 2022-24) and US Open (2022)
- Best result here is semifinal run in 2022, falling to eventual R-Up Collins
- The 23-year-old is aiming to become the youngest woman to achieve 10 Grand Slam singles QFs since Svetlana Kuznetsova at the 2009 Australian Open
- Has the highest winning percentage of any currently active player in women's singles at Grand Slam events (82.7%, 86-18 record), minimum 10 matches
- Holds 9-7 career record in Grand Slam 4r matches (1-3 in Australian Open 4r matches)
- The last time Swiatek lost to an opponent ranked outside the Top 100 was against No.338 Ana Konjuh in 2021 Miami
- Owns 10-0 career tour-level record against players from Germany

[6] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #7) vs. [19] Madison Keys (USA #14)

Tied 2-2

Rybakina:

- Finished runner-up here in 2023, the best-ever Australian Open result by a player from Kazakhstan (I. Sabalenka in final)
- Has reached a further Grand Slam final, lifting the title at Wimbledon in 2022
- Her 2r victory this week was her 50th Grand Slam main-draw win; she is the 5th player with 50+ Slam wins since 2020, joining Iga Swiatek, Aryna Sabalenka, Coco Gauff and Ons Jabeur
- Owns a 6-1 record in Grand Slam 4r matches; her only Slam 4r loss was to Sabalenka at 2021 Wimbledon
- Most recent win over a Top 10 player was No.1 Aryna Sabalenka at the 2024 WTA Finals

Keys:

- Making 11th appearance at the Australian Open, where she is a 2-time semifinalist (2015 and 2022)
- Career-best Grand Slam performance was her run to the 2017 US Open final (I. Stephens)
- Holds a 10-10 win-loss record in Grand Slam 4r matches (3-2 in Australian Open 4r matches)
- Is currently on an 8-match winning streak (Adelaide title and Australian Open 4r); has won a tour-leading 10 matches so far this season
- Owns 30 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.7 Jessica Pegula in last week's Adelaide final
- Since 2015, only Halep (6) has made more 4r appearances at the Australian Open than Keys (5)

[8] Emma Navarro (USA #8) vs. [9] Daria Kasatkina (#10)

First meeting

Navarro:

- Two top-10 seeded players will face each other in the Australian Open 4r for the first time since 2021 (Serena Williams - Aryna Sabalenka)
- Making 2nd appearance at Australian Open, where her previous result was reaching 3r in 2024 (I. Yastremska)
- Best result across all majors was SF run at US Open 2024 (I. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- First time being seeded with Top 8 seeds at a Grand Slam event at No.8
- Navarro is 15-0 after winning the opening set at Grand Slam events, with five of those wins now coming in three sets
- Navarro could become the first player to make the quarterfinals at a Grand Slam with four three-setters in the first four rounds since Jelena Ostapenko at the US Open 2023

Kasatkina:

- Making 10th appearance at the Australian Open; previous best result was 3r in 2016 (I. eventual R-Up Serena Williams) and in 2022 (I. Iga Swiatek)
- Kasatkina and Navarro are the only Top-10 seeded players at the 2025 Australian Open who are in the fourth round for the first time
- Best result across all majors was SF run at Roland Garros 2022 (I. eventual champion Swiatek)
- 6 of her 8 career titles have come on hard court, most recently Ningbo last October
- Is currently ranked No.10 (peak rank No.8 in Oct 2022); this time last year was ranked No.13

[28] Elina Svitolina (UKR #27) vs. Veronika Kudermetova (#75)

Kudermetova leads 2-0

Svitolina:

- Making 12th appearance at Australian Open, where she reached QF stage twice in 2019 (l. eventual champion Osaka) and 2018 (l. Mertens); also reached R16 in 2024, 2021
- Overall competing in her 44th Grand Slam main draw; she has reached at least the QF stage at all majors, with SF runs at Wimbledon in 2023 and 2019, along with the US Open in 2019, and QF at Australian Open in 2018-19
- With a win today would reach her 12th Grand Slam singles quarterfinal and her third at the Australian Open
- Is one of the two players along with Madison Keys still in contention at the Australian Open to register 100+ Grand Slam wins
- With a win today would reach her 76th quarterfinal at WTA level events and her 53rd on hard court
- Owns 11 singles titles on hard court, most recently Chicago 250 in 2021
- With her 2r win over Dolehide, became the first Ukrainian player - male or female - in the Open Era to secure 100 main draw wins at Grand Slam events

Kudermetova:

- Making 7th main-draw appearance at Australian Open, where her previous best result was reaching 3r in 2022 (l. Sakkari) and 2021 (l. Halep)
- Could reach the quarterfinal of a Grand Slam for the second time in her career after Roland Garros 2022 as well as reach the quarterfinals of a WTA level event for the 42nd time in her career and for the 25th time in hard-court events
- With a win today would register her ninth Australian Open match win, her most in a single Grand Slam event; eclipsing Roland Garros where she has eight
- Has won one singles title on hard court at Tokyo in 2023

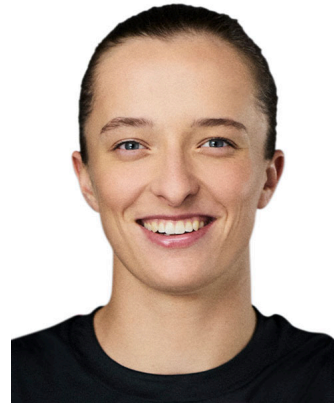

- Making 2nd main-draw appearance at Australian Open, where her previous main-draw result is a 1r loss in 2023 (l. Bucsa)
- Last weekend, lost to Destanee Aiava in the final round of qualifying, but entered main draw as a lucky loser
- In the main draw, defeated Kimberly Birrell, Varvara Gracheva and Jaqueline Cristian to make her first Grand Slam 4r
- Became the first women's singles lucky loser to reach 4r at the Australian Open since the event moved to Melbourne Park in 1988
- Aiming to become the first woman in the Open Era to reach a Grand Slam quarterfinal as a lucky loser
- Contesting just her 6th Grand Slam main draw of career; prior to this week had reached a Slam 2r only once (2023 US Open)
- Faces No.2 Iga Swiatek in 4r today; her only previous match vs. a Top 10 player was her 6-1, 6-1 loss to Swiatek at 2022 Stuttgart
- Best career tour-level result on hard court is SF run which she has accomplished 2 times: Cluj-Napoca in 2023; Monastir in 2024
- Only woman from Germany to reach this fortnight's 4r
- The last German woman to win this title was Angelique Kerber in 2016
- Is currently ranked No.128; this time last year was ranked No.140. Hit career-high ranking of No.105 last September

- Making her 7th appearance at the Australian Open, with career-best result coming in 2022 with run to SF (l. Collins)
- Is a five-time Grand Slam champion, winning titles at Roland Garros (2020, 2022-24) and US Open (2022)
- Has beaten Katerina Siniakova, Rebecca Sramkova and Emma Raducanu so far this week, reaching a Grand Slam 4r for the 17th time in her career
- Holds 9-7 career record in Grand Slam 4r matches (1-3 in Australian Open 4r matches)
- At this event, became the 4th woman in the Open Era to make 3r at 20 consecutive Grand Slam events after Martina Navratilova, Conchita Martinez and Arantxa Sanchez Vicario
- Faces No.128 Eva Lys in 4r today; last time Swiatek lost to an opponent ranked outside Top 50 was against No.76 Svitolina in 2023 Wimbledon QF
- Owns 10-0 career tour-level record against players from Germany (0-0 in 2025)
- 12 of her 22 tour-level titles have come on hard court, most recently 2024 Indian Wells
- Only player from Poland to reach this fortnight's 4r
- Other Polish women to make the SF here are Magda Linette in 2023, and Agnieszka Radwanska in 2014 and 2016
- Is currently ranked No.2; this time last year was ranked No.1. Has spent 125 weeks in her career ranked World No.1 and could reclaim that ranking following this event

CAREER MILESTONES

- Standout results of 2024 came in the second half of the season with semifinals at Budapest (l. eventual champion Shnaider) and Monastir (l. eventual champion Kartal); also made QF at Osaka (l. Ito) and reached a career high ranking of No.105 in September
- Reached first career SF at 2023 Cluj Napoca (l. Korpatsch) and QF at Hamburg (l. Rus); defeated No.1 seed Sorana Cirstea at Cluj Napoca for first Top 30 win of career
- Also in 2023, made Grand Slam main draw debut at Australian Open as a qualifier and reached 2r at US Open as a qualifier
 - Made WTA main draw debut at 2022 Stuttgart reaching 2r as a qualifier and defeated No.38 Viktoria Golubic in 1r while ranked No.342 (l. Swiatek); also in 2022 reached 2r at Lausanne, fell 1r at Hamburg and contested qualifying at Berlin, Wimbledon, US Open and Tallinn
 - Contested first WTA qualifying rounds at Hamburg and Linz in 2021
 - Won first ITF Circuit singles title at W25 event in Altenkirchen, Germany in March 2020; owns three ITF singles titles
 - Made professional debut on ITF Circuit in United States in 2016

- Claimed five titles in 2024, making it a three-peat at Roland-Garros and also winning Doha, Indian Wells, Madrid and Rome. Crossed \$30m in prize money and qualified for her fourth WTA Finals
- Won six titles across 2023, including winning fourth Grand Slam title at Roland-Garros (d. Muchova in F) and going undefeated at the WTA Finals in Cancun (d. Pegula in F). Finished season as WTA World No.1 player for second consecutive year.
- In 2022, lifted second and third Grand Slam titles, at Roland-Garros (d. Gauff in F) and US Open (d. Jabeur in F)
- Triumph in Paris was the last of six straight titles during 37-match winning streak - joint-longest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990
- Won two titles in 2021, at Adelaide and Rome. Other highlights included QF at Roland-Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage)
- Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland-Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, l. Krejciakova/Siniakova)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland - man or woman - to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since A.Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Ranked No.54, she became the lowest-ranked woman to win the Roland-Garros title in the Open Era and the lowest-ranked finalist since 1977 (No.56 Mihai). At 19y 132d, is the youngest champion in Paris since Monica Seles (18y 187d) in 1992
- Also became the first player to win her debut Tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Jelena Ostapenko at 2017 Roland-Garros
- Won WTA Most Improved Player of the Year for 2020, as voted on by members of the media. Also won the 2020 WTA Fan Favorite Award
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.61 after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Lugano (l. Hercog) and R16 run at Roland-Garros (l. Halep). That year also reached 3r at Toronto (l. Osaka) and made 2r five times (incl. Australian and US Open)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.88 after R-Up finish at 2019 Lugano
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 Auckland
- Ended 2018 season ranked No.175 (up from No.690 in 2017), after posting 42-6 record and winning four titles on ITF Circuit

- Member of Poland's Billie Jean King Cup team, 2018-20, 2021-22
- On professional debut, came through qualifying to win title at \$10k ITF/Stockholm-SWE in 2016; owns seven singles titles at this level
- Enjoyed stellar junior career, including winning girls' singles at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Küng in F) and leading Poland to Junior Fed Cup in 2016

OTHER INFORMATION

- Born in Kyiv, family moved to Germany when she was two years old
- Based in Hamburg, father Vladimir continues to coach her and fitness trainer is David Schusmueller
- Mother, Maria, is a lawyer, while father, Vladimir, is a former professional tennis player who represented Ukraine at Davis Cup
- Has an older sister, Lisa Matviyenko (24), and younger sister, Isabella Lys (7). Lisa is also a professional player, competing on ITF Circuit
- Began playing tennis when she was around five years old; father was working as a coach and while her mum studied for her law degree in Germany (had already qualified in Ukraine) they spent a lot of time at the courts
- A member of the Porsche Talent Team, also trains with German Tennis Federation in Stuttgart and former WTA player Barbara Rittner is a close mentor. Her agent is Sandra Reichel, who is tournament director of the WTA events in Linz and Hamburg
- Says her strengths are playing to her own rhythm, taking the ball early, and fighting spirit
- Speaks Russian/Ukrainian, German and English. Has finished top level of in high school in Germany - the 'Abitur', with favorite subject being biology
- Coached by Wim Fissette
- Previously worked with Tomasz Wiktorowski and Piotr Sierzputowski
- Father is former Olympic rower Tomasz Swiatek, who competed in the men's quadruple sculls event at the 1988 Summer Olympics in Seoul
- In summer 2022 organised 'Iga Swiatek and friends for Ukraine' event in Krakow, which featured a mixed doubles match between Agnieszka Radwanska, Sergiy Stakhovsky, Polish junior Martyn Pawelski and herself, and was attended by Poland's First Lady, Agata Kornhauser-Duda, Elina Svitolina and Andriy Shevchenko. The occasion was watched by almost 15,000 people live and a further one million on television, raising more than half a million Euros for Ukrainian children and teenagers affected by the war
- Started playing tennis because her older sister was playing and wanted to beat her
- Enjoys rock music, including AC/DC and Pink Floyd
- Includes PZU, On, Tecnifibre, Rolex and Xiaomi in her endorsement portfolio

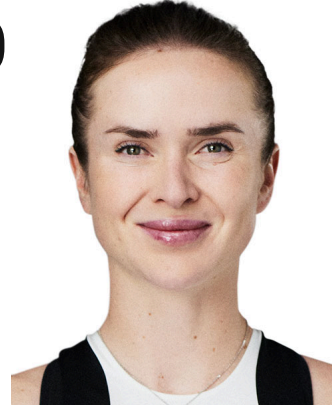

- Highlight of 2019 was reaching the title match as defending champion at the Shiseido WTA Finals (l. Barty)
- In 2018, won 13th - and most prestigious - career title at 2018 WTA Finals (d. Stephens in F), after going 3-0 during round robin stage. Ended year ranked No.4. Also won titles at Rome (as defending champion, d. No.1 Halep in F), Dubai (as defending champion, d. Kasatkina in F) and Brisbane (d. Sasnovich in F)
- Enjoyed standout 2017, finishing year at No.6, winning a tour-leading five titles and posting second-most wins (53, behind Wozniacki with 60). - Owns two career doubles titles: 2014 Istanbul (w/Doi) and 2015 Istanbul (w/Gavrilova)
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2012 Baku (lost in 1r but went on to win title there in both 2013 and 2014)
- Ukrainian Fed Cup Team, 2012-15, 2017, 2020
- Played first ITF Circuit events of career in 2008
- Junior highlights include winning 2010 Roland Garros girls' title at age 15 (d. Jabeur in F)
