MATCH NOTES - DAY 3 - THURSDAY, MARCH 20

[3] Coco Gauff (USA #3) vs. Sofia Kenin (USA #46) Gauff:

Tied 2-2

- Rematch of the 2025 Australian Open opening round, a match won by Gauff in straight-sets
- 1 of 3 Americans in Top 5 of PIF WTA Rankings; there have been 3 Americans in Top 5 since February 24, 2025; prior to that the last time three Americans were ranked in the Top 5 was November 2003
- Making 6th appearance at Miami, where her best result was reaching 4r in 2024 (I. Garcia) and 2022 (I. Swiatek)
- Has won 73 matches at the WTA 1000 level
- Has won 8 of 9 career titles on hard courts, including two WTA 1000 titles, at 2023 Cincinnati and 2024 Beijing
- This is Gauff's seventh opening match at a WTA event against a former Grand Slam champion following her win over Sofia Kenin at the Australian Open this year, Gauff is 5-1 in such matches.

Kenin:

- Making 6th appearance at Miami, previously making 3r on three occasions: 2023 (I. Andreescu), 2021 (I. Jabeur), and 2018 (I. Kvitova)
- Competing in her 41st WTA 1000 event having reached the semifinals three times 2019 Toronto, 2019
 Cincinnati, and 2023 Guadalajara
- Owns 13 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.4 Jasmine Paolini at Dubai 2025
- Best WTA 1000 result of the season so far came at Dubai with QF (I. Rybakina)
- Winner of today's match will face either Lucia Bronzetti or No.28 seed Maria Sakkari

[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs Viktoriya Tomova (BUL #64) Sabalenka:

Tomova leads 1-0

- Making 7th appearance at Miami, where her best result was reaching QF in 2023 (I. Cirstea) and 2021 (I. Barty)
- Faces No.64 Viktoriya Tomova in 2r today
- 16-time hard court champion: Brisbane in 2025 (d. Kudermetova in F)
- Is No. 1 seed this week; has been top seed at 26 tournaments in her career
- Since 1985, the WTA World No.1 is undefeated in opening matches at Miami with 25 of 29 previous wins coming
 in straight sets
- Since the start of 2024, is 25-1 against opponents ranked outside the Top 50 with sole loss coming against Amanda Anisimova at 2024 Toronto

Tomova:

- Won only previous meeting in 2016 at ITF Level event in Budapest
- Making 3rd main draw appearance at Miami, where her best result was reaching 2r in 2024 (I. Garcia) and 2023 (I. Collins); also competed in qualifying five times (2010, 2017, 2018, 2021, 2023)
- Faces No.1 Aryna Sabalenka in 2r today; she has yet to defeat a Top 10 player with a career record of 0-11 with 10
 of those losses coming in straight sets
- Last Bulgarian woman to defeat a WTA No.1 was Magdalena Maleeva (d. Seles, 1993 Hamburg QF)

Sorana Cirstea (ROU #101) vs [14] Danielle Collins (USA #15) Cirstea:

Collins leads 2-0

- Making her 15th appearance at Miami, where her best result has been a semifinal run in 2023 (I. Kvitova)
- Last year, following a 1r bye, lost in the 4r to today's opponent and defending champion Danielle Collins
- Owns 56 wins against Top 20 players, most recent win coming in against No.13 Diana Shnaider at Austin 2025
- Head-to-head against players from the USA stands at 41-33, with this season record standing at 2-2 (d. Parks and Navarro at Dubai; I. Kessler at Austin and Navarro at Indian Wells)

Collins

- Is making her 7th appearance at Miami, where she returns this year as the defending champion
- Further Miami highlights include semifinals in 2018 (I. Ostapenko) and quarterfinals in 2022 (I. Osaka)
- Won the event ranked No.53, the lowest ranked champion to win the title in Miami
- Won both encounters against today's opponent, having first defeated her in 2018 Rome and then 4r at Miami last year on her champions run
- Owns a 10-3 career record against Romanian players

[9] Qinwen Zheng (CHN #9) vs Lauren Davis (USA #229) Zhena:

First meeting

- Making 24th WTA 1000 appearance, highlighted by a runner-up finish at 2024 Wuhan
- This is her 4th appearance at Miami having reached R16 in 2023, her best result at the tournament

Davis:

- Last Top 10 win came at 2021 Charleston (d. No.4 Sofia Kenin); owns five career Top 10 wins with only one coming on hardcourts, a win over No.4 Victoria Azarenka at 2014 Indian Wells
- Making 48th appearance at WTA 1000 with a QF run at 2017 Dubai standing as her best result

Linda Fruhvirtova (CZE #215) vs [16] Beatriz Haddad Maia (BRA #18) Haddad Maia leads 1-0 *L.Fruhvirtova:*

- Is making her 4th appearance at Miami, where her best result has been a 4r run in 2022 (I. Badosa)
- Has now beaten Claire Liu in the 1r to make her first 2r appearance in Miami since 2022
- Owns one career win against Top 20 players, d. No. 14 Azarenka at Miami in 2022

Haddad Maia:

- Following a 1r bye is now set to make her seventh appearance at Miami, where her best performances have been four 3r runs in 2022-24 and 2018
- Currently holds a 2-8 win record this season, with two of her wins coming in at Australian Open, she is yet to win a WTA Tour match this season
- Holds a 13-9 win record against players from Czechia, with one win coming in against today's opponent Linda Fruhvirtova, who she defeated at Australian open in 2024
- Is also making an appearance in doubles (along w/ Siegemund), and the pair are set to face the American-Australian duo of Dolehide/Hunter

CAREER MILESTONES

- Went three for three in finals in 2024, winning Auckland, Beijing and a historic first WTA Finals Riyadh title. Success in Saudi Arabia saw her win a record \$4.8m in prize money, the most ever awarded in women s professional sports, and defeat the World No.1 and No.2 at the same event. Posted a new career-high of No.2 in June
- Won debut Grand Slam singles crown in 2023 lifting title on home soil at US Open (d. Sabalenka in F). Picked up another three titles in 2023, marking first WTA 1000 title at Cincinnati and debut WTA 500 title at Washington DC, in addition to WTA 250 Auckland. In doubles was co-ranked No.1 with Pegula after US Open.
- In 2022, reached maiden Grand Slam final at Roland-Garros (l. Swiatek); was the youngest major finalist since Sharapova won 2004 Wimbledon
- Made Top-10 debut on September 12, 2022, following QF run at US Open (l. Garcia)
- Highlight of 2021 campaign was completing singles-doubles title sweep at Parma; defeated Q.Wang in singles final and teamed up w/McNally to win doubles
- In 2021 also reached SF at Adelaide and Rome, while at the Slams made QF at Roland-Garros and R16 at Wimbledon
- Finished R-Up in doubles at 2021 US Open (w/McNally, l. Stosur/Zhang)
- First cracked the Top 50 on February 24, 2020 at No.49, following a R16 appearance at Australian Open to tie her career best Grand Slam result during run, defeated V.Williams in 1r and her first Top-5 opponent in No.4 Osaka in 3r (l. eventual champion Kenin in 3s)
- Enjoyed breakout season in 2019, highlighted by maiden WTA singles title at Linz (as lucky loser, d. Ostapenko in F) - earned her first Top-10 win en route to title over No.8 Bertens in QF
- At 15y 214d, her title run in Linz made her youngest to win a WTA tour-level title since Vaidisova (15y 177d) won Tashkent in 2004
- Also claimed maiden WTA doubles titles at Washington, DC (w/McNally, d. Sanchez/Stollar in F) and Luxembourg (w/McNally, d. Christian/Guarachi in F)
- By winning the doubles title at Washington, DC at 15y 144d, became the youngest player to win a doubles title since May 1995 (Hingis won Hamburg at 14y 219d)
- Reached R16 at 2019 Wimbledon on Grand Slam main draw debut defeating V.Williams in 1r (l.

- Achieved best result of 2024 at Tokyo with runner-up (l. Zheng in final). In doubles claimed her third and fourth career titles at Abu Dhabi and Miami w/Bethanie Mattek-Sands.
- Strongest result of 2023 was runner-up at San Diego (l. Krejcikova). Also reached SF at Hobart (l. Cocciaretto) and Guadalajara (l. Dolehide). As a qualifier, posted her best Wimbledon result with 3r (l. Svitolina). Moved 202 positions up the ranking from her 2022 year-end position (from No. 235 to No.33).
- Best results of 2022 were QF at Adelaide (l. eventual champion Barty) and Cleveland (l. Pera). Missed clay and grass swings w/right ankle injury
- Missed second half of 2021 season due to ongoing foot injury and then testing positive for COVID-19
- In opening half of the 2021 campaign, standout results were QFs at Abu Dhabi and Yarra Valley Classic, and a R16 showing at Roland Garros
- Ended 2020 at career high of No.4 which she first hit on March 9, 2020 and came away with the 2020 WTA Player of the Year Award
- In last tournament of the season, finished R-Up at Roland Garros (l. Swiatek) for her first final appearance on clay
- Reached R16 at US Open and was one of only two players (also Kvitova) to reach second week of all three Slams in 2020
- Lifted fifth WTA singles title at Lyon (d. Friedsam in F) becoming the first player in 2020 to win a second title
- Won maiden major at 2020 Australian Open (d. Muguruza in F) to become the youngest champion (21y, 80d) in Melbourne since Sharapova (20y, 283d) in 2008. Defeated No.1 Barty and home favorite in SF for third career win over a reigning World No.1
- Australian Open run helped her break into the Top 10 for the first time at No.7 on February 3, 2020
- Won 2019 WTA Most Improved Player of the Year aware after winning three WTA titles at Hobart (d. Schmiedlova in F), Mallorca (d. Bencic in F) and Guangzhou (d. Stosur in F)
- Finished 2019 at No.14 as US No.2 (behind No.9 S.Williams) and leader in hard court wins (38tied w/Barty)
- Registered back-to-back SF runs at Toronto (l. eventual champion Andreescu) and Cincinnati (l. eventual champion Keys), subsequently leading to Top 20 debut at No.20 on August 19, 2019

- eventual champion Halep) followed with 3r showing at US Open (as WC, l. Osaka)
- Made WTA main draw debut as a wildcard at 2019 Miami where she earned her first WTA main draw win over good friend McNally (l. Kasatkina in 2r)
- Made professional debut in May 2018 as a qualifier into the \$25K ITF/Osprey, FL-USA
- Member of US Billie Jean King Cup team in 2022
- Former Junior World No.1 (July 2018); won 2018
 Roland-Garros girls' title (d. McNally in F) and
 2018 US Open doubles title (w/McNally), while
 finished R-Up at 2017 US Open girls' event (l.
 Anisimova) becoming the youngest girls' singles
 finalist in tournament history at 13-years-old
- During this run, defeated No.1 Barty (Toronto) and No.1 Osaka (Cincinnati) to become first player since October 2001 to defeat World No.1s in consecutive weeks (Davenport); also became youngest American to defeat reigning No.1 in eight years (after McHale)
- Advanced to R16 at 2019 Roland Garros (d. S.Williams, l. eventual champion Barty) became first American to defeat Serena at the majors since Stephens at 2013 Australian Open QF
- Also won maiden doubles titles in 2019 at Auckland (w/Bouchard) and Beijing (w/Mattek-Sands)
- Broke into the Top 100 on March 19, 2018 and Top 50 on October 8, 2018
- Member of US Billie Jean King Cup team from 2018-20
- Made WTA main draw debut at 2015 US Open as a wildcard (l. Duque-Marino in 1r)
- Owns four ITF singles titles and two doubles titles
- Played first matches of career on ITF Circuit in 2013, climbing to No.2 in ITF World Junior Rankings
- Represented the USA at the 2014 Youth Olympic Games and competed at the 2016 ITF Junior Masters, both held in China

- In 2024 won main draw matches at Hua Hin, Nottingham and Jiuiiang
- In June 2023, with a ranking of No.49, entered the Top 50 for the first time in her career
- In her 2023 debut Australian Open appearance she reached the 4r (l. Vekic); fell in 1r at all the other Grand Slams of the season
- WTA Tour 2023 highlights include a SF run at Ningbo (l. Shnaider) and a QF run at Birmingham (l. Krejcikova) and Hong Kong (l. Fernandez)

- In May 2019, she was directly accepted in the main draw for Roland Garros girls' singles - the youngest player in the draw and first 2005 born player to play in a junior Grand Slam
