MATCH NOTES – DAY 4 – FRIDAY, MARCH 21

Caroline Garcia (FRA #74) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

Swiatek leads 5-1

Garcia:

- Has beaten Anna Bondar so far this week to reach her first 2r since 2r at Indian Wells 2025 where she fell to Swiatek 62 60
- Garcia could claim her first WTA 1000 match win over a former WTA 1000 champion since Miami last year, where she defeated Naomi Osaka and Coco Gauff
- Garcia is looking for her second win in career over Swiatek and her first since Warsaw 2022
- Is looking for her 26th win in career over a Top 10 player with a win today (most recently No.3 Coco Gauff at Miami 2024)
- Since winning the WTA Finals in 2022, is 1-9 against WTA top 10 opponents, with three of Garcia's losses in that span coming to Iga Swiatek

Swiatek

- Making her 4th appearance at Miami, where her previous result was reaching 4r in 2024 (l. Alexandrova)
- Since the format's introduction in 2009, Swiatek (currently 24) could become the first player to win 25 consecutive opening matches at WTA-1000 events
- Swiatek has won five of her previous six head-to-head meetings against Garcia at WTA level, including their last meeting in Indian Wells (R64) this month, where Swiatek conceded two games

[5] Madison Keys (USA #5) v. Elina Avanesyan (ARM #36)

First meeting

Keys:

- Making 14th appearance at Miami, where her previous best result was QF run in 2016 (l. Kerber)
- Record against opponents outside Top 10 stands at 13-1 in 2025, with the only loss coming against Tauson at Auckland 2025
- Is currently ranked at career best No.5 after winning Australian Open; this time last year was ranked No.18
- Has achieved a winning streak of 16 matches in 2025, winning Adelaide and Australian Open, and reached SF at Indian Wells (l. Sabalenka)
- Has won 18 matches so far in 2025; ranked No.2 on Tour for match wins, only second to Mirra Andreeva (19)
- Three American players are seeded in the top-5 in the Women's Singles draw at the Miami Open for the first time since 2004 when Williams sisters and Jennifer Capriati were seeded in the top-5.
- Is 9-0 in 3-set match wins in 2025

Avanesyan

- Making 2nd appearance at Miami, where previous result was reaching 3r in 2024 (l. eventual champion Collins)
- Owns 3 wins in career over Top 10 players, having defeated No.8 Qinwen Zheng at Roland Garros 2024, No.8 Maria Sakkari at Australian Open 2024 and No.6 Ons Jabeur at Miami 2024
- With a win today would be her career best win by rank (No.5)
- Currently ranked at career high No.36, achieved just this week on March 17; this time last year was ranked No.65

[9] Emma Navarro (USA #10) v. Emma Raducanu (GBR #60)

First meeting

Navarro:

- Making 2nd appearance at Miami, where her previous result was reaching 4r in 2024 (l. Pegula)
- Best result at WTA-1000 events was SF run at Toronto 2024 (l. Anisimova)
- Both of her two career singles titles have come on hard court - Merida in 2025; Hobart in 2024
- Is currently ranked No.10; this time last year was ranked No.20

Raducanu

- Making 3rd appearance at Miami, where she played opening matches in 2023 (l. Andreescu in 1r) and in 2022 (l. Siniakova in 2r after 1r bye as No.11 seed)
- Owns 2 wins in career over Top 10 players, having defeated No.5 Jessica Pegula at Eastbourne 2024 and No.9 Maria Sakkari at Wimbledon 2024
- Owns one singles title on hard court at US Open 2021
- Best result by United Kingdom at Miami was Champion run by Johanna Konta in 2017

[Q] Bernarda Pera (USA #84) vs. [4] Jessica Pegula (USA #4)

Pegula leads 2-0

Pera:

- Pera has managed to reach the second round of the Miami Open Women's Singles for the second time in her career after 2018; she is looking to progress past the second round at Miami for the first time in her career
- Pera has one win against top-5 in WTA events (1-7), it was against Anett Kontaveit at Hamburg in 2022; looking for her second with a win today
- Making her 5th appearance at Miami, where her previous result was reaching 1r in 2024 (l. eventual 2024 champion Collins)
- This is 36th WTA 1000 main draw appearance (16th time as a qualifier); only three players – Polona Hercog, Varvara Lepchenko and Christina McHale – have reached the main draw at a WTA 1000 via qualifying more times (17 each)

Pegula:

- Pegula has won both matches against Bernarda Pera in WTA events, the duo last met at Adelaide 2024
- In her previous five appearances in the main draw at the Miami Open, Pegula lost her opening match only in her first appearance at the tournament in 2019
- Pegula is making sixth appearance in the Women's Singles draw at Miami Open, she managed to reach the semi-finals of this event twice (2022 & 2023)
- Her previous result in Miami was reaching QF in 2024 (l. Alexandrova)
- Has won her last eight opening matches in WTA-1000 events, last losing in an opening match in such an event at Indian Wells 2024
- Has lost two of her last 20 matches against opponents ranked 50+ in WTA events, it was against Olga Danilovic at Australian Open 2025 and Win Yu Wang at Wuhan 2024.

Veronica Kudermetova (#52) v. [11] Mirra Andreeva (#6)

First meeting

Kudermetova:

- Making 5th appearance at Miami, where her previous best result was reaching 4r in 2022 (l. Kvitova)
- Best result at WTA-1000 events was R-Up at Dubai 2022 (l. Ostapenko)
- Owns 16 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently at Tokyo 2023 where she defeated No.4 Jessica Pegula (F) and No.2 Iga Swiatek (F)
- At WTA-1000 events, Veronika Kudermetova is 5-11 against opponents ranked in the WTA's top 10, with her last such win also coming against Jessica Pegula in Madrid (QF) in 2023
- Owns one singles title on hard court at Tokyo 2023

Andreeva:

- Making tournament debut
- Mirra Andreeva is bidding to become the youngest woman to complete the Sunshine Double. At Indian Wells, M.Andreeva became the second youngest player to defeat the reigning WTA World No.1 and No.2 at the same event (only Tracy Austin was younger, who achieved that feat twice in 1979).
- Having won back-to-back WTA 1000 titles (Dubai, Indian Wells), has won 12-straight matches
- Could become the fourth player to win three consecutive WTA-1000 titles after Caroline Wozniacki, Iga Swiatek and Serena Williams, since the format's introduction in 2009
- Is currently ranked at career-high No.6; this time last year was ranked No.38
- Has won 19 matches so far in 2025; she is ranked No.1 on tour for match wins

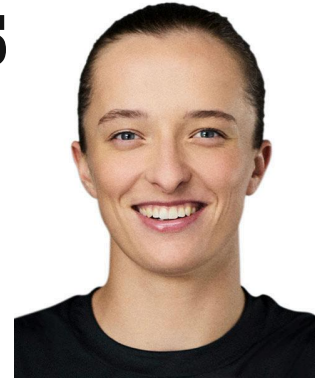

CAREER MILESTONES

- 2024 season highlight was making SF at Guadalajara (l. eventual champion Frech). Also reached QF at Miami (l. eventual champion Collins)
- Opened 2023 well with two R-Up performances on hard court at Lyon (l. Parks) and Monterrey (l. Vekic), as well as QFs at Adelaide and Doha. Went on to reach a further seven QFs throughout the season across all three surfaces, bringing a total of nine QFs (Stuttgart, Berlin, Eastbourne, Cleveland, San Diego, Tokyo and Beijing).

Her strongest WTA 1000 result of 2023 came with SF at Guadalajara (l. eventual winner Sakkari), and qualified for year ending Zhuhai Elite Trophy for a third time (also in 2016 & 2018), defeated by eventual champion Haddad Maia in group stage.

- Served highest number of aces of all players in 2023, with a total of 462 (nearest challenger was Rybakina with 455).
- Returned to form in second half of 2022, winning four tournaments, including a run through qualifying to Cincinnati title (d. Kvitova in F) and victory at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (d. Sabalenka in F)
- Only player to win titles on all three surfaces in 2022, having also triumphed on grass at Bad Homburg (d. Andreescu in F) and on clay at Warsaw (d. Bogdan in F). Summer form saw her return to Top 10 on September 12, following US Open SF
- Best win of her career came over No.1 Swiatek in QF at 2022 Warsaw
- At 2022 Roland-Garros, won first doubles title in almost six years (w/Mladenovic, d. Gauff/Pegula in F)
- Highlights in 2021 came on clay, with SF at Lausanne and QF at Parma
- Best results in 2020 were at Slams, reaching R16 at Roland-Garros (l. Svitolina) and 3r at US Open (l. Brady); defeated No.3 Ka.Pliskova in 2r at Flushing Meadows to record her first Top-10 win since late 2018
- Highlights of 2019 campaign include capturing her seventh career WTA singles title at Nottingham (d. Vekic in F) and finishing R-Up at Strasbourg (l. Yastremska)
- Member of French Billie Jean King Cup team that won the 2019 competition final vs. Australia, teaming up with Mladenovic to win the decisive doubles runner against

- Claimed five titles in 2024, making it a three-peat at Roland-Garros and also winning Doha, Indian Wells, Madrid and Rome. Crossed \$30m in prize money and qualified for her fourth WTA Finals
- Won six titles across 2023, including winning fourth Grand Slam title at Roland-Garros (d. Muchova in F) and going undefeated at the WTA Finals in Cancun (d. Pegula in F). Finished season as WTA World No.1 player for second consecutive year.
- In 2022, lifted second and third Grand Slam titles, at Roland-Garros (d. Gauff in F) and US Open (d. Jabeur in F)
- Triumph in Paris was the last of six straight titles during 37-match winning streak - joint-longest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990
- Won two titles in 2021, at Adelaide and Rome. Other highlights included QF at Roland-Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage)
- Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland-Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, l. Krejciikova/Siniakova)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland - man or woman - to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since A.Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Ranked No.54, she became the lowest-ranked woman to win the Roland-Garros title in the Open Era and the lowest-ranked finalist since 1977 (No.56 Mihai). At 19y 132d, is the youngest champion in Paris since Monica Seles (18y 187d) in 1992
- Also became the first player to win her debut Tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Jelena Ostapenko at 2017 Roland-Garros
- Won WTA Most Improved Player of the Year for 2020, as voted on by members of the media. Also won the 2020 WTA Fan Favorite Award
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.61 after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Lugano (l. Hercog) and R16 run at Roland-Garros (l. Halep). That year also reached 3r at Toronto (l. Osaka) and made 2r five times (incl. Australian and US Open)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.88 after R-Up finish at 2019 Lugano
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 Auckland
- Ended 2018 season ranked No.175 (up from No.690 in 2017), after posting 42-6 record and winning four titles on ITF Circuit

- Barty/Stosur. Also took part in the team that advanced to final vs. Czech Republic in 2016
- Fell out of the Top 20 on March 18, 2019 after holding her position there since August 14, 2017
- In 2018, won sixth career title at Tianjin; also made SF at Stuttgart and Madrid
- Broke into the Top 5 on August 13, 2018 and reached a career-high of No.4 on September 10, 2018
- Became first player to win Wuhan and Beijing back-to-back in 2017. As a result, qualified for WTA Finals. Was ranked No.30 on the Race to Singapore leaderboard in May 2017
- Made Top-10 debut on October 9, 2017, following completion of Wuhan-Beijing title double
- Won a career-best 48 main draw matches in 2017 (48-22 record, two titles), including reaching maiden major QF at Roland-Garros (L. Ka.Pliskova)
- Qualifying for WTA Finals in 2017, became the first Frenchwoman to compete at WTA Finals in singles since Mauresmo in 2006 (L. Henin in F)
- At 2016 Roland Garros w/Mladenovic, won first major doubles title. They were the first French pair to win in Paris since 1971, when Gail Chanfreau and Francoise Durr triumphed
- Represented France at 2016 Rio Olympics in singles and doubles

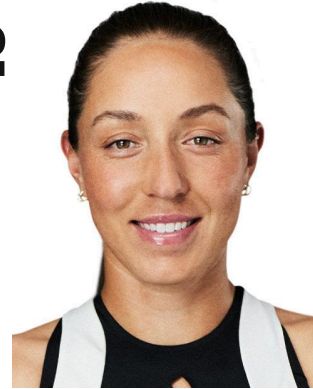

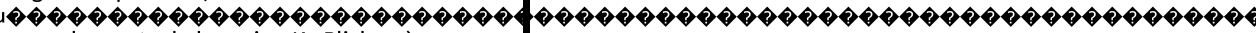
