MATCH NOTES – DAY 6 – SUNDAY, MARCH 23

[27] Elise Mertens (BEL #28) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

Swiatek leads 1-0

Mertens:

- Could reach her 15th WTA-1000 round of 16 and her second of 2025, after Doha
- Has lost her past 10 matches against WTA top 10 opponents, with her last win coming against Jessica Pegula at Roland Garros (R32) in 2023
- At WTA-1000 events, Elise Mertens is 2-6 for her career against WTA top five opponents, with her last win coming against Simona Halep in Madrid (R16) in 2021
- Is looking to her first career win against Top 2 opponents, after failing all of her previous 9 attempts

Swiatek:

- Won her only previous head-to-head meeting against Elise Mertens at WTA level, claiming a straight-sets victory on clay in Stuttgart (R16) last year
- Has advanced to the R16 at a WTA 1000 28 times in her career; since 2019 when she made her R16 debut at a WTA 1000, only Jessica Pegula and Aryna Sabalenka have reached more R16
- Since 2009, Iga Swiatek (81.9%, 195-43) only trails Serena Williams (357-57) for combined win rate at WTA-1000 and Grand Slam events
- Of 19 WTA match wins so far in 2025, 17 have come in straight sets – the most straight-sets wins of any player so far this season
- Since last year's Olympics, Iga Swiatek is 25-1 against opponents ranked outside the WTA's top 20, with her sole loss coming to Jelena Ostapenko in Doha (SF) this year

[17] Amanda Anisimova (USA #17) vs. [11] Mirra Andreeva (#6)

First meeting

Anisimova:

- Playing this week on a career-high ranking of No.17
- Could reach 10th WTA 1000 R16 and a first R16 at Miami
- Bidding for 10th WTA Top 10 win of career and second of 2025, after defeating Paula Badosa en route to tournament victory in Doha (R32)
- This will be Amanda Anisimova's 25th WTA-1000 match against a former WTA-1000 event winner – Anisimova holds a career win-loss record of 11-13 in such matches

Andreeva:

- Has won 13-straight matches
- Since 2000, Mirra Andreeva could become the third player under the age of 18 to claim 14+ consecutive WTA match wins after Maria Sharapova and Nicole Pietrangeli
- Since the format's introduction in 2009, Mirra Andreeva could become the first teenager to claim 14+ consecutive WTA-1000 match wins
- Bidding to reach eighth WTA 1000 R16 – the most of any player before turning 18 since 2009
- Since 2009, only three players have achieved 30 WTA 1000 match wins in fewer matches than Mirra Andreeva (40) – Bianca Andreescu (38), Venus Williams and Maria Sharapova (39 each)



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[5] Madison Keys (USA #5) vs. Alexandra Eala (PHI #140)

First meeting

Keys:

- Since 2009, only Serena Williams (357) has recorded more combined WTA 1000 and Grand Slam match wins than Keys (214) among American players
- With a win Keys would reach a 24th WTA 1000 R16 and a third at the Miami Open, after 2016 and 2024
- Since the format's introduction in 2009, Keys (98, now level with Sloane Stephens) trails only two American players for WTA 1000 match wins – Serena Williams (148) and Venus Williams (112)
- Has claimed 19 WTA match wins so far in 2025 – level with Iga Swiatek; Keys only trails Mirra Andreeva (20) for WTA match wins this season.
- Has won her past seven matches against opponents ranked outside the Top 50, with her last defeat coming via retirement to Peyton Stearns in Toronto (R32) last year.

Eala:

- Could become first Filipino player in the Open Era to defeat a former Grand Slam champion at WTA level, and the first at either WTA/ATP level since Eric Taino defeated Michael Chang in Indianapolis (R64) in 2003.
- In the past decade, Eala could become third Asian teenager to defeat a former Grand Slam champion after Naomi Osaka and Zheng Qinwen
- Since 1990, could become the first Filipino player to defeat a WTA Top 10 opponent

[32] Anna Kalinskaya (#33) vs. [4] Jessica Pegula (USA #4)

Pegula leads 2-0

Kalinskaya:

- With a win would reach R16 at Miami for the second time in her career after 2024
- Could reach the R16 at WTA 1000 events for the seventh time in her career and for the first time in 2025
- Has a 10-8 record against Top 10 opponents in WTA events, it is her first match against a Top 10 in 2025
- This is only the second WTA event that she has moved past the opening match in 2025 after Singapore

Pegula:

- With a win would be through to a WTA 1000 R16 for 31st time in her career; has reached the R16 30 times since start of 2020 season, the most of any player in that time frame
- Has reached the R16 four times at Miami
- Has won both matches against Kalinskaya, the duo last faced each other in the final of Berlin 2024
- Has won 16 matches this season, 15 of those wins have come against players ranked 20+
- With a win would reach the R16 in all four WTA 1000 events at the start of the season for the third time in her career after 2021 and 2023



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Emma Raducanu (GBR #60) vs. McCartney Kessler (USA #48)

First meeting

Raducanu:

- With a win would equal best career result at a WTA 1000 having previously reached R16 at 2022 Madrid, 2022 Cincinnati and 2023 Indian Wells
- Among the British women, only Johanna Konta (19) has reached more R16 at WTA 1000 level; Raducanu and Watson have both reached R16 three times
- Has won back-to-back matches for the first time since Australian Open

Kessler:

- With a win would equal best result at a WTA 1000 having previously reached R16 at 2025 Dubai
- Has won 15 matches already this year, her most in a season and currently tied for 8th most on Tour
- Is 8-2 this season against players ranked outside the Top 50
- Kessler is projected to move to a career-high ranking after the tournament, moving into the Top 45 sliding as high as No.42 by reaching the third round

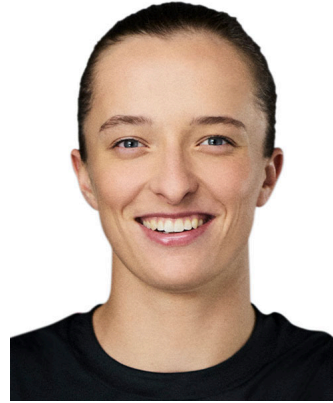

- Making 7th appearance at Miami, where her previous best result was R16 run in 2021 (l. Osaka) and 2023 (l. eventual R-Up Rybakina)
- Best result at a WTA-1000 event was title run at Doha 2019 (d. Halep in F)
- After 1r bye, has beaten Peyton Stearns to reach 3r
- Faces No.2 Iga Swiatek in 3r today; owns 11 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.3 Jessica Pegula at Roland Garros 2023
- Is looking to her first career win against Top 2 opponents, after failing all of her previous 9 attempts
- Owns 2-3 career record against players from Poland (0-0 in 2025), having played and lost to today's opponent Swiatek once at Stuttgart 2024
- Owns 48-86 career record against seeded opponents (2-3 in 2025)
- 7 out of her 8 singles titles have come on hard court, most recently at Singapore 2025
- Only player from Belgium to reach 3r
- Best result by Belgium at Miami was Champion run by Kim Clijsters in 2010 and 2005
- Is currently ranked No.28; this time last year was ranked No.28
- Has won 15 matches so far in 2025, ranked No.8 for match wins

- Making 4th appearance at Miami, where she was champion in 2022 (d. Osaka in F)
- Owns 10 titles at WTA-1000 events, including the double sunshine in 2022, ranked at No.2 among all players, tied with Victoria Azarenka (10) and following S. Williams (13)
- After 1r Bye, has beaten Caroline Garcia to reach 3r
- Faces No.28 Elise Mertens in 3r today; record against opponents outside Top 20 stands at 41-2 in the last 52 weeks, with the only two losses coming against No.37 Ostapenko at Doha 2025 and No. 35 Putintseva at Wimbledon 2024
- Owns 2-1 career record against players from Belgium (0-0 in 2025), having played and defeated today's opponent Mertens at Stuttgart 2024
- Owns 112-40 career record against seeded opponents (8-4 in 2025)
- Owns 12 singles titles on hard court - Indian Wells, Doha in 2024; WTA Finals, Beijing, Warsaw, Doha in 2023; San Diego, US Open, Miami, Indian Wells, Doha in 2022; Adelaide 500 in 2021
- One of 2 players from Poland to reach 3r (along with Linette)
- Best result by Poland at Miami was her own title run in 2022, Agnieszka Radwanska in 2012
- Is currently ranked No.2; this time last year was ranked No.1
- Has won 19 matches so far in 2025; she is ranked No.2 on tour for match wins, second to Mirra Andreeva (20)

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CAREER MILESTONES

- Kicked off 2024 season with R-Up finish at Hobart (l. Navarro) which marked her 13th WTA singles final. In doubles won Australian Open, Indian Wells and Birmingham all w/ Hsieh Su-Wei and qualified for WTA Finals for sixth consecutive time
- Ended 2023 as only Top 100 player to finish year exactly where she started, at No. 29. Strongest singles results came at Monastir, successfully defending her title (d. Paolini), and SF at Monterrey (l. Garcia). Achieved a year-end doubles ranking of No. 2 after lifting two titles at Guadalajara and Rome (w/Hunter) and SF at WTA Finals Cancun (l. eventual champions Siegemund/Zvonareva).
- Finished 2022 ranked No.29 in singles, her sixth consecutive Top 50 finish; also finished No.5 in doubles for her fourth consecutive Top 10 finish in doubles and second consecutive Top 5 finish
- Lifted seventh WTA title, at 2022 Monastir (d. Cornet in F), while in doubles alongside partner Kudermetova won Dubai and WTA Finals, as well as finished R-Up at Wimbledon
- Enjoyed a productive start to 2021 season in Melbourne, triumphing at the Gippsland Trophy (d. Kanepi in F) to lift sixth WTA singles title, then teamed up w/Sabalenka at Australian Open to claim second Grand Slam doubles title (d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F). Later in the year, won third career Grand Slam doubles title, at Wimbledon w/Hsieh
- Won the most matches on Tour in 2020, going 34-13 across the season and finishing as R-Up at both Prague (l. Halep) and Linz (l. Sabalenka)
- Earned her milestone 200th career main draw win with victory over Kalinina in 1r at 2020 Linz
- Singles highlights in 2019 were winning biggest title of career at Doha (d. No.3 Halep in final) and advancing to QF at US Open for the first time (l. eventual champion Andreescu in 3s)
- Enjoyed standout season in doubles in 2019 - won maiden major doubles title at US Open w/Sabalenka (d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Also Completed 'Sunshine Double' in doubles (w/Sabalenka), lifting the back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejčíková/Siniakova) and Miami (d. Stosur/Zhang), and qualified for Shiseido WTA Finals Shenzhen (went 1-2 in RR)
- Advanced to first Grand Slam SF of career at 2018 Australian Open (l. eventual champion Wozniacki)
- During 2018, lifted titles at Hobart, Rabat and Lugano, finishing with 46 main-draw match wins
- Claimed five titles in 2024, making it a three-peat at Roland-Garros and also winning Doha, Indian Wells, Madrid and Rome. Crossed \$30m in prize money and qualified for her fourth WTA Finals
- Won six titles across 2023, including winning fourth Grand Slam title at Roland-Garros (d. Muchova in F) and going undefeated at the WTA Finals in Cancun (d. Pegula in F). Finished season as WTA World No.1 player for second consecutive year.
- In 2022, lifted second and third Grand Slam titles, at Roland-Garros (d. Gauff in F) and US Open (d. Jabeur in F)
- Triumph in Paris was the last of six straight titles during 37-match winning streak - joint-longest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990
- Won two titles in 2021, at Adelaide and Rome. Other highlights included QF at Roland-Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage)
- Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland-Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, l. Krejčíková/Siniakova)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland - man or woman - to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since A.Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Ranked No.54, she became the lowest-ranked woman to win the Roland-Garros title in the Open Era and the lowest-ranked finalist since 1977 (No.56 Mihai). At 19y 132d, is the youngest champion in Paris since Monica Seles (18y 187d) in 1992
- Also became the first player to win her debut Tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Jelena Ostapenko at 2017 Roland-Garros
- Won WTA Most Improved Player of the Year for 2020, as voted on by members of the media. Also won the 2020 WTA Fan Favorite Award
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.61 after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Lugano (l. Hercog) and R16 run at Roland-Garros (l. Halep). That year also reached 3r at Toronto (l. Osaka) and made 2r five times (incl. Australian and US Open)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.88 after R-Up finish at 2019 Lugano
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 Auckland
- Ended 2018 season ranked No.175 (up from No.690 in 2017), after posting 42-6 record and winning four titles on ITF Circuit

- across the campaign - only Ka.Pliskova (49) and Kvitova (47) registered more. By contrast, prior to 2018 season owned only 36 wins at this level across entire career
- In doubles in 2018, won four titles and reached QF at WTA Finals (w/Schuurs)
 - Finished 2017 season at No.35, up from No.120 in 2016 - first Top 50 and Top 100 year-end finish. Season highlighted by first career singles title at Hobart (as a qualifier, d. Niculescu in F)
 - Registered first Top-10 win of career over No.10 Cibulkova in 1r at 2017 Beijing
 - Made WTA singles main draw debut at 2016 's-Hertogenbosch - made QF (as qualifier, l. Mladenovic)
 - Won first WTA title of any kind in doubles at 2016 Auckland (w/Mestach)
 - Played first Tour-level event of career at 2015 Antwerp (fell in qualifying)
 - Played first events of career on ITF Circuit in Belgium in 2010; owns 11 singles and 14 doubles titles on ITF Circuit

- Member of Poland's Billie Jean King Cup team, 2018-20, 2021-22
- On professional debut, came through qualifying to win title at \$10k ITF/Stockholm-SWE in 2016; owns seven singles titles at this level
- Enjoyed stellar junior career, including winning girls' singles at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Kung in F) and leading Poland to Junior Fed Cup in 2016

OTHER INFORMATION

- Formerly worked with Alexander Kneepkens, Robbie Ceyskens, Dieter Kindlmann, Daniel Goffin and Philippe Dehaes
- Previously trained under Belgian Federation until early teens, also spent a year at the Mouratoglou Academy in Paris
- Mother is Liliane Barbe (teaches languages and history); father is Guido Mertens (makes furniture for churches). Began playing tennis at age 4, introduced to game by older sister Lauren, an airline pilot with KLM
- First tennis memory is watching Kim Clijsters playing live
- Was home schooled, enjoyed studying languages; speaks English, Dutch/Flemish and French
- Loves animals and has lots of pets at home
- In 2021, launched a charitable initiative to support the Virunga National Park's efforts to save the gorilla population in the Democratic Republic of Congo. During 2021 season she will be wearing a Virunga Ranger necklace and sporting a badge on her bag to help raise awareness

- Coached by Wim Fissette
- Previously worked with Tomasz Wiktorowski and Piotr Sierzputowski
- Father is former Olympic rower Tomasz Swiatek, who competed in the men's quadruple sculls event at the 1988 Summer Olympics in Seoul

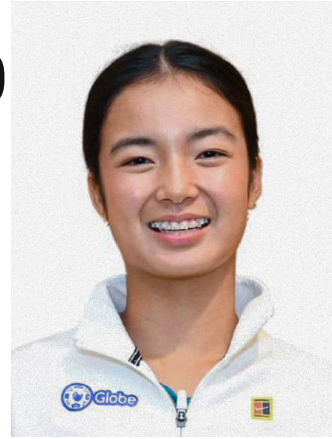

CAREER MILESTONES

- Returned to the courts in 2024 winning opening round matches at Auckland, Australian Open and Abu Dhabi. Went on to reach semifinals at Nottingham, as well as quarterfinals at Stuttgart, Eastbourne, Washington and Seoul. Achieved her first career Top 10 wins over No.5 Jessica Pegula at Eastbourne and No.9 Maria Sakkari at Wimbledon
- In 2023 made fourth round of Indian Wells (l. Swiatek) before falling in opening rounds at Miami and Stuttgart. Ended her season after Stuttgart and took time away to undergo minor surgery on both hands and ankle in May 2023.
- Struggled with injuries and form throughout 2022 dropping as low as No.83 after 1r exit at US Open
- Best performance came late in the year with SF run in Seoul (l. Ostapenko via ret. w/left glute injury). Also made QF at Stuttgart (l. eventual champion Swiatek) and Washington DC (l. eventual champion Samsonova) with best win-by-ranking coming over No.22 Azarenka during 3r run at Cincinnati
- Earned a career best year in 2021 jumping over 300 ranking spots and finishing the season inside the Top 20 at a career high of No.19 earning her the 2021 WTA Newcomer of the Year Award
- Reached QF at Cluj-Napoca 2 (l. Kostyuk) and made appearances at Indian Wells and Linz
- Won the US Open in only her fourth Tour-level appearance (d. fellow teenager Fernandez in F); did not drop a set and upset No.12 Bencic and No.18 Sakkari along the way to become the first qualifier to lift a Grand Slam title
- Fell 1r at San Jose (as WC, l. Zhang) and finished R-Up at WTA 125K Series event in Chicago (l. Tauson)
- At Wimbledon, became the youngest British woman in the Open Era to reach R16 (l. Tomljanovic via ret.); upset Top-50 players Vondrousova and Cirstea en route
- Made debut WTA main draw appearance at 2021 Nottingham (as WC, l. Dart in 1r)
- Ended 2020 by finishing R-Up at \$25k ITF/Sunderland-GBR
- Won title at \$25k ITF/Pune-IND in 2019
- Lifted first two ITF Circuit titles in 2018, at \$15k ITF/Antalya-TUR and \$15k ITF/Tiberias-GRE
- Owns three singles titles on ITF Circuit
- In Juniors she reached back-to-back quarter finals of Wimbledon and US Open in 2018
- 2024 saw a breakthrough year, making her Tour-level main draw debut at Auckland (as a qualifier, l. Lulu Sun), winning her first Tour-level main draw match at the Australian Open and claiming her maiden title at Cleveland. She also claimed her first WTA 125 title at Puerto Vallarta and entered the Top 100 for the first time, peaking at No.63 on August 26, 2024.
- Reached WTA 125 series QF at Angers in 2023 (l. Yastremska)
- Lifted first ITF title in 2023 at Rome \$60K
- Played first Tour level matches as a wild card at 2023 US Open, where she won two qualifying matches before falling in the third and failed to make the main draw
- Reached first ITF final in 2021 at Lubbock \$15K
- Made ITF debut in 2016 at Charleston \$10K at the age of 17
