MATCH NOTES – DAY 7 – MONDAY, MARCH 24

[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. [14] Danielle Collins (USA #15)

Sabalenka leads 6-0

Sabalenka:

- The WTA Top 4 players have reached the round of 16 at the Miami Open for the first time since 2016 - Serena Williams, Agnieszka Radwanska, Angelique Kerber and Garbine Muguruza.
- Owns 6-0 record in the series with last victory coming over Collins on hardcourt came at 2022 US Open (R16)
- Danielle Collins is one of three opponents Sabalenka is undefeated against at WTA level with 5+ matches head-to-head, along with Anett Kontaveit (5-0) and Qinwen Zheng (5-0)
- With a win would reach 26th WTA 1000 quarterfinal and would be third at this event (also 2021, 2023)
- While ranked as the WTA World No.1, Sabalenka holds a win-loss record of 8-7 against opponents ranked in the WTA Top 20, losing her last match to Mirra Andreeva in Indian Wells (F)
- Has spent only 1 hour, 38 minutes on court through first two matches, compared to Collins 4+ hours
- Has won 19 tour-level matches so far this year, trailing only Mirra Andreeva and Iga Swiatek (20 each) in total tour-level wins in 2025

Collins:

- With a win, would reach seventh WTA 1000 quarterfinal and fourth at Miami (also 2018, 2022, 2024)
- Bidding for first Top 10 win since defeating Maria Sakkari at 2024 Charleston
- With a win would become the oldest player to defeat the WTA World No.1 since 2022 Wimbledon (Alize Cornet) and the oldest to achieve the feat at a WTA-1000 event since Hsieh Su-wei (Miami 2019)
- Danielle Collins could claim her second career victory over the WTA #1 after defeating Ashleigh Barty in Adelaide (R16) in 2021 – Collins is 1-9 for her career
- Last time a player successfully defended her title at Miami was 2022 (Swiatek); Azarenka (2016) is the only other player to successfully defend Miami title as a WTA 1000

[3] Coco Gauff (USA #3) vs. Magda Linette (POL #34)

Gauff leads 2-0

Gauff:

- Coco Gauff is one of five Americans in the Women's Singles round of 16 at the Miami Open – it is the first time this has happened at consecutive editions of the event since 2002-03
- Is the youngest American player to reach back-to-back R16 at Miami Open since Serena Williams in 2001-2002
- Bidding to reach first career QF at Miami; Miami is one of the two WTA 1000 events where she has yet to reach the QF stage (along with Madrid)
- Is the youngest player to secure 75 main draw wins at WTA 1000 events since the format's introduction in 2009
- Gauff won both of their previous meetings on hard court, at the US Open (R128) and in Wuhan (QF 2024)
- With a win would become youngest American to reach quarterfinal at Miami since Madison Keys in 2016
- Is 11-3 in 2025 against opponents ranked outside WTA Top 20



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Linette:

- With a win today, along with a win by Swiatek, it would be the second time two Polish women reach the quarterfinal at a WTA 1000 event after 2024 Wuhan (Linette, Frech)
- Since 2000, would become the third-oldest player to reach a maiden quarterfinal at Miami after Mirjana Lucic (2017) and Hsieh Su-Wei (2019)
- Could claim her first WTA Top 10 win since defeating Jasmine Paolini in straight sets at 2024 Beijing (R32) – Linette holds a career win-loss record of 5-28 vs. Top 10

[22] Elina Svitolina (UKR #22) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

Swiatek leads 2-1

Svitolina:

- Currently level with Swiatek (21), Svitolina could also reach a 22nd WTA 1000 quarterfinal, and her third at Miami after 2018 and 2021
- At WTA 1000 events, Svitolina holds a career win rate of 49.1% (27-28) against former WTA-1000 champions, following her win over Belinda Bencic in the second round
- Svitolina could claim consecutive WTA Top 10 wins for the first time since the WTA Finals in 2019 – Karolina Pliskova, Simona Halep and Belinda Bencic
- Holds a 10-11 record against players ranked inside the Top 2 at the time of their meeting
- Contesting her 81st WTA 1000 main draw of career; she is a 4-time WTA 1000 champion (2017 Dubai, 2017 Rome, 2017 Toronto and 2018 Rome -- she is a perfect 4-0 in WTA 1000 finals)

Swiatek:

- Won the only previous meeting on hard court in Dubai (R16) last year
- With a win would reach 22nd WTA-1000 quarterfinal from 35 draws, along with a second at Miami (2022, Won)
- Since the format's introduction in 2009, Swiatek has reached the highest percentage of WTA 1000 quarterfinal from main draws entered (61.8%, 28/34)
- Since the format's introduction in 2009, Swiatek could equal Petra Kvitova (37) for the second-most WTA-1000 match wins over WTA 1000 champions, trailing only Victoria Azarenka (41)
- With a win, Swiatek would claim a 21st WTA match win of 2025, surpassing Mirra Andreeva (20)
- Contesting 35th WTA 1000 main draw of career; is a 10-time WTA 1000 champion, most recently 2024 Rome

Naomi Osaka (JPN #61) vs. [6] Jasmine Paolini (ITA #7)

First meeting

Osaka:

- Could reach a 12th WTA 1000 quarterfinal and her third at the Miami Open, after 2021 and 2022
- Since returning to active status, Osaka holds a 1-4 record against WTA top 10 opponents, with her sole victory coming against Jelena Ostapenko at the US Open (R128)
- Osaka has been on court this week for nearly seven hours (6h, 49m) compared to Paolini at 2 hours, 12 minutes
- Owns 13 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.10 Jelena Ostapenko at US Open 2024

Paolini:

- One of three players to have reached the round of 16 at each of the four WTA 1000 events in 2025, along with Iga Swiatek and Jessica Pegula
- Could reach fourth career WTA 1000 quarterfinal and her first of 2025
- Best result by Italians at Miami have been QF runs by Martina Trevisan in 2023, Roberta Vinci in 2013, Sara Errani in 2013, Tathiana Garbin in 2007, Silvia Farina Elia in 1998, Raffaella Reggi in 1989



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[WC] Alexandra Eala (PHI #140) vs. [10] Paula Badosa (ESP #11)

First meeting

Eala:

- Projected to move into Top 120 (approximately No.117) by reaching the R16 and could climb as high as No.102 with a win today
- Competed in the WTA Future Stars event in 2016 and 2017 in Singapore
- Made WTA Tour debut at 2021 Miami in qualifying
- Win over No.25 Ostapenko was her first-ever win over a Top 40 player (previously 0-4 vs. Top 40 players), then followed up by defeating No.5 Keys in her first career meeting with a Top 20 player
- The wins over Ostapenko and Keys made her the first Filipino player in the Open Era to defeat former Grand Slam champions at WTA Tour-level

Badosa:

- Will return to Top 10 in the PIF WTA Rankings after Miami, climbing to at least No.9; could climb as high as No.7 if she wins the title
- Contesting the 34th WTA 1000 main draw of her career; her career-best WTA 1000 result is her run to the Indian Wells title in 2021
- Seeking a spot in her 9th career WTA 1000 quarterfinals

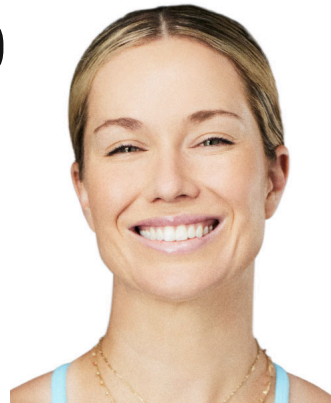

- Making her 7th appearance at Miami; her career-best results at the tournament are QF runs in 2021 and 2023
- After 1r bye, defeated Viktoriya Tomova and Elena-Gabriela Ruse (via retirement) so far this week; has spent a total of only 1 hour and 38 minutes on court in her 2 matches
- Faces No.15 Danielle Collins in 4r today; owns 83 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.5 Madison Keys in last week's Indian Wells SF
- Owns 61-19 career tour-level record against players from the United States (3-1 in 2025)
- Contesting her 55th career WTA 1000 main draw this week; she is a 7-time WTA 1000 champion, with her most recent WTA 1000 title coming at 2024 Wuhan
- A win today would put Sabalenka into her 26th career WTA 1000 QF
- Has won 19 tour-level matches so far this year, trailing only Mirra Andreeva and Iga Swiatek (20 each) in total tour-level wins in 2025
- 16 of her 18 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court, most recently Brisbane this year
- Is currently ranked No.1; this time last year was ranked No.2. Sabalenka is spending her 30th and 31st weeks at World No.1 during Miami
- Is No. 1 seed this week; has been top seed at 26 tournaments in her career
- Winner of this match will face either No.9 seed Zheng Qinwen or Ashlyn Krueger in QF

- Making 7th appearance at Miami, where she comes in as the defending champion; she also made 2018 SF (as qualifier) and 2022 QF
- After 1r bye, defeated Sorana Cirstea and Rebeka Masarova so far this week, increasing her Miami Open winning streak to 9 straight matches
- Faces No.1 Aryna Sabalenka in 4r today; owns 15 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.7 Maria Sakkari at 2024 Charleston
- Holds a 1-9 record against players ranked World No.1 at the time of their meeting; the 1 win came over Ashleigh Barty at 2021 Adelaide
- Contesting her 37th career WTA 1000 main draw, with her run to last year's Miami title being her career-best WTA 1000 showing
- A win today would put Collins into her 7th career WTA 1000 QF
- 2 of her 4 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court (2021 San Jose and 2024 Miami)
- The Miami Open singles title has been won by an American woman on 15 occasions
- Is currently ranked No.15; this time last year was ranked No.53. Reached her career-high ranking of No.7 in 2022
- Winner of this match will face either No.9 seed Zheng Qinwen or Ashlyn Krueger in QF

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CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan. Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid.
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- Rose to career-high No.2 in rankings on August 23, 2021
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10
- Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitová in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Shenzhen in doubles (w/Mertens), going 1-2 in the round-robin stage
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2018, lifting two titles, at New Haven (d. Suarez Navarro in F) and
- Finished the 2024 season ranked No.11, her highest year-end ranking in career; won back-to-back titles at Miami and Charleston in a season with 42 match wins; advanced to R16 at Wimbledon, her best career result at the tournament; also advanced to final at Strasbourg
- 2023 season highlighted by SF runs at both Austin (l. eventual champion Kostyuk) and San Diego (l. eventual champion Krejčíková); also qualified at reached QF at Montreal (l. Swiatek).
- Made Top-10 debut on January 31, 2022, following run to final at Australian Open (l. Barty)
- Other highlights last season were SF at San Diego (l. Vekic) and QF at Miami (l. Osaka)
- Closed out 2021 campaign with QF at Chicago [500] (l. Vondrousova), 3r at Indian Wells (l. Jabeur) and SF at Linz (l. eventual champion Riske). Posted first Top-30 year-end finish at No.29
- Extended winning streak to 12 matches with title run at San Jose (d. Kastkina in F) and then 3r showing at Montreal
- Produced impressive second half of 2022, which started with QF showing at Hamburg (l. eventual champion Ruse), SF at Budapest (l. Kalinina via ret. w/right elbow injury) and then maiden WTA title at Palermo (d. Ruse in F)
- Made QF at 2020 Roland Garros for first time upsetting No.15 Muguruza and No.35 Jabeur en route (l. eventual R-Up Kenin)
- Began 2020 with SF at Adelaide (l. eventual champion Barty) and QF at Brisbane (l. Keys) - scored third and fourth career Top 10 wins over No.5 Svitolina (Brisbane) and No.7 Bencic (Adelaide)
- Produced Grand Slam breakthrough at 2019 Australian Open, advancing to SF (l. Kvitová); had never won a major match in five previous Grand Slam appearances
- Scored first Top 5 win of her career against No.2 Kerber in R16 at 2019 Australian Open
- Rose to career-high No.23 following Melbourne run (January 28, 2019)
- Posted five Top 20 wins in 2019, over No.13 Goerges, No.19 Garcia and No.2 Kerber (all at Australian Open), No.12 Wozniacki (Rome) and No.12 Sevastova (Wimbledon)
- Season highlight in 2018 was at Miami where she became first qualifier to reach SF (l. Ostapenko), scoring first Top 10 win over No.8 V. Williams en route. Earned USD\$327,965 by

- Wuhan (d. Kontaveit in F), winning 46 matches and finishing at No.11 in the rankings
- Also in 2018, was R-Up at Lugano (l. Mertens) and Eastbourne (l. Wozniacki), made SF at Cincinnati, reached five QFs and produced a career-best Grand Slam run to R16 at US Open
 - Entered Top 50 on April 16, 2018, after Lugano run, and Top 20 on August 27 of the same year, following New Haven title
 - Broke into Top 100 at No.76 on October 16, 2017 after reaching first Tour-level final at Tianjin (l. Sharapova). Also in 2017 made SF at Tashkent (l. Babos) and lifting WTA 125k Series title at Mumbai (d. Jakupovic)
 - Made Grand Slam main draw debut 2017 Wimbledon, falling in 2r (as qualifier, d. Khromacheva, l. Witthoeft)
 - Fell 1r on main draw debut at 2017 Dubai (as qualifier, l. Ka.Bondarenko)
 - Member of Belarus Billie Jean King Cup team that lost to USA in 2017 final - scored first Top-20 win of career with defeat of No.13 Stephens during final in Minsk
 - WTA qualifying debut came at 2016 Rabat
 - Lifted first three ITF Circuit titles in 2015, including a 13-match win streak towards the year's end, bringing back-to-back trophies in Antalya, Turkey
 - Made debut on ITF Circuit in Minsk in 2012

- reaching the last four in Miami, more than doubling her career earnings at the time

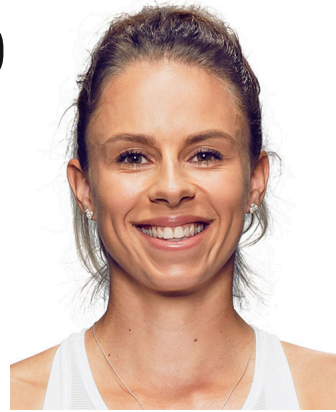

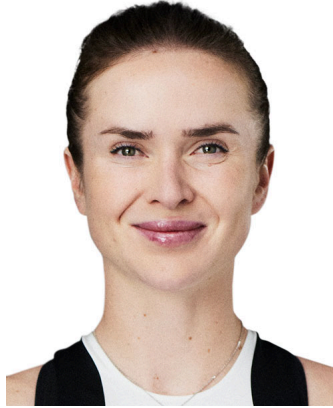

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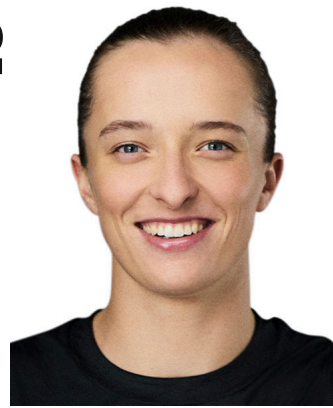

- Returned to play in 2024 following maternity leave and reached the QF at Doha and 's-Hertogenbosch, as well as R16 at Rome and Beijing

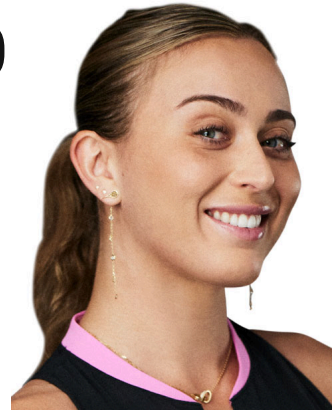
