Two occasions 2 different American women won Miami title in back-to-back years - Martina (she was a US citizen by then) and Evert (1985 & 1986) and Williams sisters (2001 & 2002).

Pegula (31 years, 34 days old at end of tournament) is the 10th oldest woman to reach the Miami final. Additionally, Pegula is 3rd oldest first time Miami finalist, after Kvitova (2023, Won at 33 years, 25 days) and Li Na (2014, R-Up at 32 years, 31 days).

The WTA World No.1 has won the Miami title 11 times – Martina Navratilova (1985), Stefanie Graf (1988, 1994, 1996), Monica Seles (1991), Serena Williams (2003, 2013, 2014, 2015) and most recently Ashleigh Barty (2021).

This is the first Women’s Singles final at the Miami Open between two players ranked in the WTA’s top five since 2014 – Serena Williams and Li Na

Sabalenka is through to her 12th final at the WTA 1000 level.

PIF Race to the WTA Finals Leaderboard Watch

By reaching the final, Sabalenka will overtake Madison Keys atop the PIF Race to the WTA Finals Leaderboard. She will hold the No.1 spot, followed by Madison Keys, Mirra Andrejeva, Iga Swiatek and Jessica Pegula.

Pegula entered the Sunshine Double at No.10 on the Leaderboard; her R16 finish at Indian Wells and her run to the final here in Miami will push her to No.5 on the Leaderboard after the tournament.

Clara Tauson, Elena Rybakina and Amanda Anisimova will round out the Top 8 on the Leaderboard.

Sabalenka leads 6-2

Sabalenka:

- Won last two meetings on hard court, in Cincinnati (F) and at the US Open (F) last year
- 7 years since World No 1 last reached final in back-to-back WTA 1000 hard court events - Halep (Montreal and Cincinnati 2018)
- Is only the third WTA #1 to reach the Women's Singles finals at Indian Wells, Miami and the Australian Open in the same season after Steffi Graf (1994) and Martina Hingis (2000)
- With 12 overall in her career so far, Aryna Sabalenka has reached now the final at seven different WTA-1000 events – only Dubai, Beijing and Montreal/Toronto remain among current WTA-1000 events
- In the past 20 years, Aryna Sabalenka is the sixth player to reach the Women's Singles finals at Indian Wells and Miami in the same season, after Kim Clijsters (2005), Maria Sharapova (2006, 2012-13), Victoria Azarenka (2016), Iga Swiatek (2022) and Elena Rybakina (2023)
- Bidding to claim three WTA top 10 wins at a single event for the second time in her career, after the WTA Finals in 2022 – Jessica Pegula, Ons Jabeur and Iga Swiatek

Pegula:

- The oldest player to face the WTA No.1 in a final at WTA-1000 level or higher since Li Na (Serena Williams, Miami 2014).
- Since the format's introduction in 2009, only two players have reached more WTA-1000 finals than Pegula (three) after their 30th birthday – Serena Williams (16) and Li Na (four).
- Only Serena Williams (18) has reached more WTA-1000 finals than Pegula (six) among American players, since the format's introduction in 2009.
- For the third consecutive year, a player aged 30+ has reached the Miami final after Petra Kvitová (2023) and Danielle Collins (2024).
- Trying to win 4th WTA 1000 title and 4th on hard court – Guadalajara 2022, Montreal 2023, Toronto 2024
- Since the format's introduction in 2009, Jessica Pegula could become only the second player to win multiple WTA-1000 titles after turning 30, along with Serena Williams.
- With a win would become the third player to claim multiple WTA event titles in 2025 along with Mirra Andrejeva and Madison Keys – Aryna Sabalenka could also achieve this feat.
- Pegula (31 years, 34 days) could become the oldest player to defeat the WTA No.1 in a WTA event final since Martina Navratilová (36 years, 120 days) defeated Monica Seles in Paris in 1993; she could become the oldest player to defeat the WTA No.1 at a WTA-1000 event since Hsieh Su-wei (33 years and 73 days), who defeated Naomi Osaka at the Miami Open in 2019
- With a win Pegula will move to No.3 in the PIF WTA Rankings after the tournament, surpassing Coco Gauff to become the top-ranked American

CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan. Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
 - Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid.
 - Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
 - Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
 - Rose to career-high No.2 in rankings on August 23, 2021
 - In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F)
 - Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10

 - Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
 - Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
 - Qualified for WTA Finals Shenzhen in doubles (w/Mertens), going 1-2 in the round-robin stage
 - Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2018, lifting two titles, at New Haven (d. Suarez Navarro in F) and
 - In 2024, won two singles titles - Toronto (WTA 1000) and Berlin - en route to year-end ranking of No.7, her third-straight year-end Top 10 finish; two-time runner-up at Cincinnati and US Open; joined Rosie Casals (1970), Evonne Goolagong Cawley (1973) and Serena Williams (2013) as the only women in the Open Era to make the final at the Canadian Open, Cincinnati Open and US Open in the same season
 - Also qualified for the 2024 WTA Finals (withdrew during round-robin play due to left knee injury)
 - Won two titles in 2023, her second WTA 1000 tournament at Montreal and also WTA 250 Seoul. Also finished R-Up at Doha, Tokyo and at the WTA Finals in Cancun.
- In doubles ascended to No.1 ranking (co-ranked with Coco Gauff) after 2023 US Open.
- Achieved career-high No. 3 in October 2022 after defeating four Grand Slam champions at Guadalajara, en route to ending three-year wait for second WTA title (d. Sakkari in F)
 - Qualified for WTA Finals Fort Worth in both singles and doubles (w/Gauff), thus becoming the first Americans to debut in singles and doubles at the season-ending showpiece since Davenport in 1994

 - Broke into Top 100 at No.76 on October 16, 2017 after reaching first Tour-level final at Tianjin (l. Sharapova). Also in 2017 made SF at Tashkent (l. Babos) and lifting WTA 125k Series title at Mumbai (d. Jakupovic)
 - Made Grand Slam main draw debut 2017 Wimbledon, falling in 2r (as qualifier, d. Khromacheva, l. Witthoeft)
 - Fell 1r on main draw debut at 2017 Dubai (as qualifier, l. Ka.Bondarenko)
 - Member of Belarus Billie Jean King Cup team that lost to USA in 2017 final - scored first Top-20 win of career with defeat of No.13 Stephens during final in Minsk
 - WTA qualifying debut came at 2016 Rabat
