Kevs:

- 2025 Roland Garros marks her 47th main draw appearance at a Grand Slam
- Making 13th appearance at Roland Garros, where her best result was reaching SF in 2018 (I. Stephens)
- Won her first Grand Slam title at the 2025 Australian Open; looking to become the sixth woman in Open Era to win titles at Australian Open and Roland Garros in the same year (joining Court, Graf, Seles, Capriati and S.
- Holds 3-15 career record vs. players ranked inside Top 2 at the time of their meeting; two of those wins came at 2025 Australian Open (d. Swiatek in SF and Sabalenka in F)
- Last year, won her first red clay title at Strasbourg, defeating fellow American Danielle Collins in final; was also victorious on the green clay of Charleston in 2019 (d. Wozniacki in F)
- Last time two or more women from the United States reached Roland Garros QF was 2022: Gauff (R-Up), Pegula (QF) and Stephens (QF)

Gauff:

- Contesting her 23rd Grand Slam main draw of career; her career-best Grand Slam performance is winning the 2023 US Open title (d. Sabalenka in final)
- Making 6th main draw appearance at Roland Garros, where she was runner-up in 2022 and made SF in 2024 (I. eventual champion Swiatek on both occasions)
- This is the 5th straight year she has made at least the QF at Roland Garros
- Has won 24 main draw matches at Roland Garros; this is her highest tally at a single tournament in her career

Keys leads 3-2



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- Could become the youngest woman to claim 25 main-draw wins at Roland Garros since Martina Hingis (between 1995 and 2000)
- Owns 28 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.8 Zheng Qinwen at 2025 Rome
- One of her 9 career WTA singles titles has come on clay (2021 Parma); she also reached both of this year's WTA 1000 clay court finals at Madrid and Rome

[6] Mirra Andreeva (#6) vs. [WC] Lois Boisson (FRA #361)

First meeting

Andreeva:

- Best result here and across the Majors came with SF run in 2024 (I. Swiatek)
- Could become the youngest player to reach back-to-back semifinals at a Grand Slam this century the youngest since Martina Hingis at US Open (1996-1998) and the youngest at Roland Garros still since Martina Hingis (1997-1998)
- Could become the fourth youngest player in the Open Era to reach semifinals at Roland Garros in two of her first three main draw appearances at the event, older only than Monica Seles, Andrea Jaeger and Gabriela Sabatini
- This is her third consecutive QF after Madrid and Rome (I. Gauff at the quarterfinal stage at both tournaments)
- Owns a 22-8 record across the Slams (with 11 of those wins coming at Roland Garros)
- Andreeva (currently 73.3%, 22-8) could surpass her coach Conchita Martinez (73.4%, 174-63) for winning percentage at Grand Slam events
- Last loss to a player ranked outside the Top 100 was at 2024 Rome to No.126 Badosa
- Is currently ranked No.6; this time last year was ranked No.38

Boisson:

- Making Grand Slam main draw debut this week at Roland Garros (competed in qualifying here in 2021, 2022 and 2023)
- Competed in her first Tour level main draw earlier this year at Rouen making 2r (I. Uchijima)
- Posted her career best win by ranking here this week over No.3 Jessica Pegula; it was also her first career meeting against a Top 10 player
- Lifted her maiden WTA 125 title last season at Saint Malo (clay)
- Is the first Grand Slam quarterfinalist as a wild card since Svitolina at Wimbledon 2023 (SF) and the second in the Open Era at Roland Garros after Mary Pierce in 2002 (QF)
- Is the first French player to reach a Grand Slam QF since Caroline Garcia at the US Open 2022 (SF) and the first at Roland Garros since 2017 (Kristina Mladenovic and Caroline Garcia); could become the first French semifinalist at Roland Garros since Marion Bartoli in 2011
- Could become the youngest French semifinalist at a Grand Slam event since the 2025 Roland Garros tournament director Amelie Mauresmo at Wimbledon 1999
- Excluding unranked players, Boisson is the lowest ranked (#361) to reach a Grand Slam QF since Kaia Kanepi at 2017 US Open (#418) and the lowest ranked at Roland Garros in the last 40 years; could become the lowest-ranked Major semifinalist in the last 40 years
- Could become the third player since 1980 to make SF at their first Major after Monica Seles (RG 1989) and Jennifer Capriati (RG 1989)
- Will reach a career-high ranking after the tournament, climbing as high as No.120 by reaching QF and as high as No.68 with a win today

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2024, won eighth career title at Strasbourg (d. Collins in F dropping only three games). Reached SF at Madrid (l. eventual champion Swiatek) and Eastbourne (l. Fernandez), and another QF at Rome (l. eventual champion Swiatek). At Grand Slams, reached 4r at Wimbledon (l. Paolini, retired in 3r set due to left thigh injury), made 3r at Roland Garros (l. Navarro) and US Open (l. Mertens).
- In 2023, won seventh career title at Eastbourne (d. Kasatkina in F), reached SF at US Open and reached four QFs including Wimbledon; also qualified for WTA Elite Trophy in Zhuhai (0-2 in group play)
- At 2022 Adelaide, won first title in over two years (d. Riske in F), followed by SF run at Australian Open - best Slam showing since 2018
- Other highlights in 2022 were SF at Cincinnati and two further QF runs, including at Indian Wells
- In Grand Slam play, 2021 season was highlighted by R16 run at Wimbledon (l. Golubic). Finished campaign inside Top 100 for ninth successive year, but outside Top 20 for first time since 2014
- Ended 2020 ranked No.16, with best result being R-Up finish at Brisbane (l. Ka. Pliskova)
- Lifted biggest title of career during 2019 season at WTA 1000 Cincinnati (d. Kuznetsova in F); afterwards returned to Top 10 for first time since week of June 25, 2018
- Also won title at Charleston (d. Wozniacki) and reached QF at 2019 Roland Garros (l. Barty), one of three Americans to make last eight (also Anisimova and Stephens) - the first time since 2004 (Capriati, S.Williams and V.Williams) Reached three SFs in 2018 at Charleston, Roland Garros and US Open
- Reached first Grand Slam final in 2017 at US Open, losing to Sloane Stephens in 10th all-American final in the Open Era. At 22, became the youngest Flushing Meadows finalist since 19-year-old Caroline Wozniacki lost to Kim Clijsters in 2009 Also in 2017, won third WTA title at Stanford (d. Vandeweghe)
- Enjoyed first Top-10 year-end finish in 2016 (at No.8), was youngest player in Top 20; won second title at Birmingham (d. Strycova) and reached final at Rome (l. S.Williams) and Montreal (l. Halep)
- Broke into Top 10 on June 20 as first American to make Top-10 debut since S.Williams in 1999
- Made WTA Finals debut at Singapore in 2016, going 1-2 in round-robin play

- Went three for three in finals in 2024, winning Auckland, Beijing and a historic first WTA Finals Riyadh title. Success in Saudi Arabia saw her win a record \$4.8m in prize money, the most ever awarded in women sprofessional sports, and defeat the World No.1 and No.2 at the same event. Posted a new career-high of No.2 in June
- Won debut Grand Slam singles crown in 2023
 lifting title on home soil at US Open (d.
 Sabalenka in F). Picked up another three titles
 in 2023, marking first WTA 1000 title at
 Cincinnati and debut WTA 500 title at
 Washington DC, in addition to WTA 250
 Auckland. In doubles was co-ranked No.1 with
 Pegula after US Open.
- In 2022, reached maiden Grand Slam final at Roland-Garros (l. Swiatek); was the youngest major finalist since Sharapova won 2004 Wimbledon
- Made Top-10 debut on September 12, 2022, following QF run at US Open (l. Garcia)
- Highlight of 2021 campaign was completing singles-doubles title sweep at Parma; defeated Q.Wang in singles final and teamed up w/McNally to win doubles
- In 2021 also reached SF at Adelaide and Rome, while at the Slams made QF at Roland-Garros and R16 at Wimbledon
- Finished R-Up in doubles at 2021 US Open (w/McNally, l. Stosur/Zhang)
- First cracked the Top 50 on February 24, 2020 at No.49, following a R16 appearance at Australian Open to tie her career best Grand Slam result during run, defeated V.Williams in 1r and her first Top-5 opponent in No.4 Osaka in 3r (l. eventual champion Kenin in 3s)
- Enjoyed breakout season in 2019, highlighted by maiden WTA singles title at Linz (as lucky loser, d. Ostapenko in F) - earned her first Top-10 win en route to title over No.8 Bertens in QF
- At 15y 214d, her title run in Linz made her youngest to win a WTA tour-level title since Vaidisova (15y 177d) won Tashkent in 2004
- Also claimed maiden WTA doubles titles at Washington, DC (w/McNally, d. Sanchez/Stollar in F) and Luxembourg (w/McNally, d. Christian/Guarachi in F)
- By winning the doubles title at Washington, DC at 15y 144d, became the youngest player to win a doubles title since May 1995 (Hingis won Hamburg at 14y 219d)
- Reached R16 at 2019 Wimbledon on Grand Slam main draw debut defeating V.Williams in 1r (l.

- Represented USA at 2016 Rio Olympics, reaching SF (l. Bronze medal match to Petra Kvitova)
- Qualified for WTA Elite Trophy Zhuhai in 2015, 2018-19; went 1-1 in round-robin stage on all three appearances, with best result SF run in 2018 (withdrew before match vs. Muguruza w/left knee injury)
- Advanced to maiden major SF at 2015 Australian Open (l. eventual champion S.Williams); broke into Top 20 following conclusion of tournament, on February 2
- Also in 2015, reached second career title at Charleston (l. Kerber) and reached QF at Wimbledon
