MATCH NOTES - DAY 2 - MONDAY, MAY 26

Rebecca Sramkova (SVK #42) vs. [5] Iga Swiatek (POL #5)

Swiatek leads 1-0

Sramkova:

- Bidding for her first win over a Top 10 opponent today, as well as her first main draw win here
- Also faced Swiatek in 2r at this year's Australian Open
- Has improved her ranking by 60 places over the past year, up from No.101 to No.41
- Slovakia's best result in Paris to date was Dominika Cibulkova's SF run in 2009

Swiatek:

- Owns a 23-1 record in 1r matches at Grand Slams (95.8%), the sole defeat coming in 1r at 2019 Wimbledon (I.
- Is on a 21 match win streak here in Paris, following her title three-peat (2022-24)
- Looking to become the first woman to win four successive Roland Garros titles in the Open Era; Seles and Henin both won three in a row
- Has won 10 clay court titles; this is the first year since 2020 that she hasn't won a title heading into the French Open

[7] Madison Keys (USA #8) vs. [Q] Daria Saville (AUS #137)

Tied 1-1

Keys:

- Making 13th appearance at Roland Garros, where her best result was reaching SF run in 2018 (I. Stephens); also made QF run in 2019 (I. eventual champion Barty) and R16 in 2022 (I. V.Kudermetova)
- Won first career meeting against Saville (Fed Cup 2016) however lost the most recent meeting on clay at 2017 Rome
- Overall, this is her 47th Grand Slam main draw appearance won her first Grand Slam title earlier this year at Australian Open (d. Sabalenka in F)
- Since 2000, only three occasions Australian Open Women's singles champion lost in 1r at Roland Garros: Lindsay Davenport in 2000, Li Na in 2014, and Angelique Kerber in 2016
- Owns two clay titles at Strasbourg in 2024, Charleston in 2019
- Only Clara Tauson (174) has served more aces than Madison Keys so far in 2025 (139)

Saville:

- Making 9th appearance at Roland Garros, where her previous best result was reaching R32 on two occasions in 2022 (I. Trevisan) and 2018 (I. Mertens)
- Best result across all Slams is reaching R16 twice at Australian Open (2017, 2016)
- Has won 5 of her 8 career clay meetings against Top 10 opponents, with her last such win coming at Rome 2018 (Muguruza)
- Is 15-19 in opening round at a Slam (4-4 at Roland Garros)
- Best career result on clay is runner-up run at Strasbourg in 2017 (I. Stosur)

Jessica Bouzas Maneiro (#68) vs. [9] Emma Navarro (USA #9)

First meeting

Bouzas Maneiro:

- Making second Roland Garros appearance, previously playing 1r in 2024 (I. Fett)
- This is her sixth Grand Slam main draw with a best result of 3r at Wimbledon and US Open last season
- Has won 6 clay court matches so far in 2025 including QF at Rouen (I. Svitolina) and Rabat (I. Tomljanovic)
- This is her sixth career meeting against a Top 10 player and owns one such win: No.6 Marketa Vondrousova at Wimbledon 2024

Navarro:

- Making 3rd appearance at Roland Garros where her best previous result was 4r in 2024 (I. Sabalenka)
- Her best Slam result was SF at 2024 US Open (I. Sabalenka)
- Is Top 10 seeded at a Grand Slam for the second time in her career after having reached QF at Australian Open 2025 (I. Swiatek)
- Is the only player to reach at least QF at each of the last three Grand Slams (QF at Wimbledon 2024, SF at US Open 2024 and QF at AO 2025)
- Is currently ranked No.9; this time last year was ranked No.24

Naomi Osaka (JPN #49) vs. [10] Paula Badosa (ESP #10)

First meeting

Osaka:

- Is a four-time Slam champion, winning the US Open (2018, 2020) and Australian Open (2019, 2021)
- Best result here in Paris is making the 3r twice, in 2018 and 2019
- Held match points in 2r tie with Swiatek last year before falling in three sets
- Owns a 23-5 record in Slam 1r matches, two such losses coming here in Paris, in 2017 and 2022

Badosa:

- Her best previous result here is reaching QF in 2021 (I. Zidansek)
- Has reached at least the R16 at all the majors, in addition making the SF at Australian Open in 2025, the QF at the US Open in 2024 and the R16 three times at Wimbledon
- Is 15-5 in Slam 1r matches, and hasn't lost at this stage since 2021 Australian Open (a run of 13 1r wins)

[12] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #11) vs. [Q] Julia Riera (ARG #202)

First meeting

Rybakina:

- Making 7th appearance at Roland Garros, where her previous best result was reaching QF in 2024 (I. eventual R-Up Paolini) and 2021 (I. eventual R-Up Pavlyuchenkova)
- At other majors, won Wimbledon in 2022 (d. Jabeur in F); also reached champion match at Australian Open 2023 (I. Sabalenka in F)
- Record in 1r matches at Roland Garros stands at 5-1 (19-3 overall), with the sole loss to Siniakova in 2019
- Coming off winning her first title of 2025 season at Strasbourg 2025, also owns another three titles on clay at Stuttgart 2024, Rome 2023, Bucharest 2019
- Is currently ranked No.11; this time last year was ranked No.4

Riera:

- Making 2nd appearance at Roland Garros, where her previous result was reaching 1r in 2024 (as qualifier, I. Begu)
- Is playing her 4th Grand Slam event, after Australian 2025 (Haddad Maia), Wimbledon 2024 (I. Bouzkova) and Roland Garros 2024 (I. Begu); has yet to score her first Grand Slam main draw win
- As a qualifier, has beaten Ryser, Gibson and Bulgaru to make main draw; failed her previous only meeting against a Top 20 opponent to No.17 Haddad Maia at Australian Open 2025
- Career best win by ranking was defeating No.21 Alexandrova at Brisbane 2024
- Best career result on clay is SF run at Bogota 2025 and Rabat 2023

[15] Barbora Krejcikova (CZE #15) vs. Tatjana Maria (GER #79)

First meeting

Krejcikova:

- Former Roland Garros champion, lifting the title in 2021 (d. Pavlyuchenkova in F)
- Since lifting title in 2021, has lost each of her last three opening matches here in Paris
- Faces No.84 Tatjana Maria in 1r today this is just second match of the 2025 season, falling to Linette in 1r at Strasbourg
- Prior to that, last competitive match came with SF loss at 2024 WTA Finals (I. Zheng)

Maria:

- Making her 11th appearance at Roland Garros, having made debut here back in 2010
- Has reached the 2r here twice, in 2016 and 2017
- Has suffered eight 1r exits here, including losing openers on last three outings; overall 1r Slam record is 15-30
- Best result across the Slams came with SF run at 2022 Wimbledon (I. Jabeur)

Polina Kudermetova (#58) vs. [21] Jelena Ostapenko (LAT #21)

First meeting

Kudermetova:

- Making tournament debut at Roland Garros, having played qualifying in 2024 and 2023
- This is her 3rd appearance overall across all majors, having played 1r at Australian Open in 2025 (as qualifier, I. Frech) and 2023 (as qualifier, I. Gadecki)
- Owns 5 wins in career over Top 50 players, most recently No.19 Ekaterina Alexandrova at Indian Wells 2025
- Career best win by ranking was defeating No.9 Kasatkina at Brisbane 2025 (as qualifier, en route to R-Up)
- Is currently ranked No.58 (career high at No.54 on April 14 2025); this time last year was ranked No.168

Ostapenko:

- Making 10th appearance at Roland Garros, where she was champion in 2017 (d. Halep in F)
- One of the three former Roland Garros champions in main draw (along with Swiatek and Krejcikova),
 Ostapenko also reached SF at Wimbledon 2018 (I. eventual champion Kerber)
- Besides Roland Garros 2017, also owns a second title on clay at Stuttgart 2025
- Has won 13 matches so far in 2025, 7 of those were on clay

[Q] Carole Monnet (FRA #231) vs. Katie Boulter (GBR #38)

First meeting

Monnet:

- Making 2nd appearance at Roland Garros, where her previous result was reaching 1r in 2022 (I. Muchova)
- Best career result on clay is R16 run at Budapest in 2024 (I. Lamens)
- Looking to earn first Tour-level win of 2025

Boulter:

- Making 2nd appearance at Roland Garros, where her previous result was reaching 1r in 2024 (I. Badosa)
- Overall, this is her 16th Grand Slam main draw appearance
- Best result across all Slams is reaching R32 at Wimbledon 2023 (I. Rybakina), US Open 2023 (I. Stearns) and Wimbledon 2022 (I. Tan)
- Best career result on clay is R64 which she has reached on four occasions: Madrid in 2025; Paris Olympics, Rome, and Madrid in 2024
- Best result by United Kingdom at Roland Garros was SF by Johanna Konta in 2019 and Jo Durie in 1983

Caroline Garcia (FRA #144) vs. Bernanda Pera (USA #83)

Pera leads 3-1

Garcia:

- Making 15th appearance at Roland Garros, where her previous best result was reaching QF in 2017 (I. Ka. Pliskova)
- Best result at Grand Slams was SF run at US Open 2022 (I. Jabeur)
- Is playing her first tournament on clay of 2025 season
- Record in 1r matches at Roland Garros is 11-3, with the three losses coming against Pfizenmaier in 2012, Ivanovic in 2014 and Vekic in 2015
- Owns three singles titles on clay at Warsaw 2022; Strasbourg 2016; Bogota 2014

Pera:

- Making 8th appearance at Roland Garros, where her previous best result was reaching R16 in 2023 (I. Jabeur),
 which is also her best result across all Grand Slams
- Record against opponents outside Top 100 is 9-3 in 2025
- Record in 1r matches at Grand Slams stands at 12-16 (4-3 at Roland Garros)
- Both of her two singles titles have come on clay at Hamburg and Budapest in 2022

(WC) Leolia Jeanjean (FRA #100) vs. Irina-Camelia Begu (ROU #92)

Begu leads 1-0

Jeanjean:

- Making 4th appearance at Roland Garros, where her previous best result was 3r run in 2022 (I. today's opponent Begu), which is also her best result across all majors
- Career best win by ranking was defeating No.8 Ka. Pliskova at Roland Garros 2022
- Best career result on clay is QF run at Bogota 2025
- Is currently ranked at her career-best No.100 (just achieved on May 25); this time last year was ranked No.148
- Has won 2 matches so far in 2025, both on clay at Bogota 2025 (en route to QF)

Begu:

- Making 14th appearance at Roland Garros, with a best result of 4r in 2016 (I. Rogers) and 2022 (I. Pegula); also her best results across all majors along with R16 at Australian Open 2015 (I. Bouchard)
- Record in 1r matches at Roland Garros stands at 10-3, with the most recent loss to Serena Williams at Roland Garros 2021
- Owns two singles titles on clay at Palermo 2022 and Bucharest in 2017
- Has yet to score one win at tour-level events on clay of 2025 season, but reached SF at Parma 125 (I. Mboko)

(WC) Diane Parry (FRA #93) vs. Robin Montgomery (USA #115)

Parry leads 1-0

Parry:

- Making 7th appearance at Roland Garros, where her best result was reaching 3r in 2022 (I. Stephens)
- Best result across all Slams is reaching R32 at 2024 Australian Open (I. M.Andreeva), 2022 Wimbledon (I. eventual Runner-Up Jabeur), 2022 Roland Garros (I. Stephens)
- Owns 4-2 record in opening round at Roland Garros, only losing in 2021 (Sasnovich) and 2020 (Hercog)
- Owns 3-5 career record against players from United States of America
- Best career result on clay is SF run at Palermo in 2024; Lausanne in 2023

Montgomery:

- Making main draw debut at Roland Garros
- Overall, this is her 4th Grand Slam main draw appearance, with best result coming at 2024 Wimbledon where she reached 2r (I. Jabeur)
- Best career result on clay is R32 run at Charleston in 2025; Madrid, Rouen in 2024
- United States of America won Roland Garros 17 times, most recently by Serena Williams in 2015
- Winner of today's match will face Jessica Bouzas Maneiro or No. 9 seed Emma Navarro in 2r

- Bidding to become the first woman in the Open Era to win Roland Garros four years running (Seles and Henin both won three straight titles also)
- Owns 3-0 career record against players from Slovakia, with record in 2025 standing at 1-0 defeated Sramkova at this year's Australian Open
- Including her four Roland Garros victories has won 10 Tour-level clay court titles - also Stuttgart in 2022 and 2023; Madrid in 2024; and Rome in 2021, 2022 and 2024
- One of 3 players from Poland in the starting line-up, along with Linette and Frech Is currently ranked No.5; this time last year was ranked No.1

During last year's European clay swing reached SF at Stuttgart before sweeping to victories at Madrid, Rome and Roland Garros Heads into Roland Garros without a clay court

- Finished the 2024 season at No.10 in the year-end rankings, her second consecutive year-end Top 10 finish; lone singles title in 2024 came at Wimbledon; over the first six months of the season, won just 7 matches, including 4 at the Australian Open; qualified for the WTA Finals as a Grand Slam champion, securing the final qualifying spot where she advanced to SF (l. Zheng)
- Reached four finals across 2023, winning first WTA 1000 title at Dubai (d. No.1 Swiatek in F) in addition to San Diego (d. Kenin in F), and finishing R-Up at Birmingham (l. Ostapenko) and Zhengzhou (l. Zheng Qinwen).



CAREER MILESTONES

- 2024 season highlight was posting best result at a WTA 1000 by reaching R16 at Indian Wells and first time reaching 3r at Australian Open and 2r at US Open. Also made three SF runs at Osaka, Palermo, and Nottingham. Broke into the Top 50 for the first time and achieved new career-high ranking of No.48 in October
- The 2023 Grand Slam season included two 2r runs at Roland Garros (l. Andreeva) and Wimbledon (l. Martic); fell in 1r at Australian Open (l. Townsend) and US Open (l. Boulter)
- Best Tour level showing in 2023 was a SF run at Lausanne (l. Burel)
- In 2022, lifted the WTA 125 Paris title (d. McNally via W/O) and further reached another WTA 125 final at Colina (l. Bejlek)
- Broke into Top 100 on February 28, 2022 and continued steady progress for remainder of season
- First notable 2022 performance was 3r run at Roland Garros (l. Stephens) beating defending champion Krejcikova in 1r
- In the 2022 grass season, made SF at Gaiba 125 and 3r at Wimbledon (l. Jabeur)
- Series of impressive performances in 2022 started from QF at Palermo (l. Camelia Begu) followed by SF at Granby (l. Kasatkina), QF at Portoroz (l. Lena Friedsam), and QF at Monastir before 1r exits at Cluj Napoca, Rouen 125, and W80 Poitiers
- Finished 2021 in fine form, winning 18 of last 20 matches, highlighted by two WTA 125K Series finals, winning title in Montevideo, Uruguay and finishing R-Up at Buenos Aries, Argentina
- Overall, compiled 50-23 win-loss record last year, lifting three ITF Circuit titles and rising nearly 200 places in the rankings during second half of campaign. Also fell 1r at Roland Garros (as WC, l. Sasnovich) and Strasbourg (as qualifier, l. Niemeier)
- Lifted first ITF Circuit title in 2020, at W15 tournament in Antalya, Turkey
- Reached 2r on WTA main-draw debut at 2019 Roland Garros (as WC, d. Lapko, l. Mertens)
- First contested WTA qualifying at 2018 Roland Garros
- Owns four titles in singles and three in doubles on ITF Circuit
- Made professional debut at W15 ITF Circuit event in Le Havre in 2017

- In 2024 earned two consecutive Tour-level main draw wins for the first time in her career at Madrid, before taking No.2 seed Sabalenka to 3 sets in the 3r. Additional standout results of the year came with quarterfinal performances at s'Hertogenbosch and Washington, as well as earning her first Grand Slam main draw match win at Wimbledon.
