MATCH NOTES - DAY 5 - THURSAY, MAY 29

[Q] Tereza Valentova (CZE #172) vs. [2] Coco Gauff (USA #2)

First meeting

Valentova:

- Making debut appearance at Roland Garros
- Qualified for the main draw this week in her first career Grand Slam qualifying draw
- Looking to earn first Top 10 win of her career
- Highest career win by ranking came this week over No.95 Galfi in qualifying; also her first career match at any level against a Top 100 player
- Bidding to become the youngest qualifier to defeat an opponent ranked Top 2 at a Major since Jelena Dokic in Wimbledon 1999 (Martina Hingis)
- Won the Girl's Singles title at Roland Garros 2024 (d. Samson in F)

Gauff:

- Making 6th appearance at Roland Garros, where she was R-Up in 2022, also a semifinalist in 2024 (I. eventual champion Iga Swiatek on both occasions)
- Won US Open in 2023 (d. Sabalenka in F); also reached SF at 2024 Australian Open (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- Has 12 match wins (12-3) on clay in 2025, ranked No.2 on tour for clay match wins, along with Sabalenka (12-2), only second to Svitolina (13-2)
- Has won 21 matches at Roland Garros overall, her highest career tally in a single tournament
- Has won 8 of her 10 career Grand Slam meetings against qualifiers, only losing to Martina Trevisan (Roland Garros 2020) and Sofia Kenin (Wimbledon 2023)

Ann Li (USA #55) vs. [3] Jessica Pegula (USA #3)

Li leads 1-0

This is their first meeting at Tour level after Li won their only previous meeting at ITF level - W60 Lexington in 2018

Li:

- Making 3rd appearance at Roland Garros, where her best result was reaching 2r in 2021 (I. Svitolina)
- Looking to equal her best career Grand Slam result by reaching 3r (US Open 2020, I. Kerber and Australian Open 2021, I. Sabalenka)
- Owns 1 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.7 Anett Kontaveit at Miami 2022
- Best career result on clay is QF run at Rabat in 2025; Palermo in 2024

Pegula:

- Making sixth appearance at Roland Garros, with a best result of QF in 2022 (I. eventual champion Swiatek)
- Holds 9-5 record at Roland Garros, but undefeated at this event against unseeded opponents (8-0)
- Bidding to win her 30th match of the 2025 season quickest she reached 30th win of the year in previous seasons was at Wimbledon 2023
- Won first clay court title of career earlier this year at Charleston

[6] Mirra Andreeva (#6) vs. Ashlyn Krueger (USA #35)

Krueger leads 1-0

Andreeva:

- Making her 3rd appearance at Roland Garros, with best result here and across the Majors coming with SF run in 2024 (I. Swiatek)
- Overall, this is her ninth Grand Slam main draw appearance, and has made R16 at Australian Open (twice) and also at Wimbledon
- Is the youngest player (18 years, 26 days) to win a main draw match at Roland Garros as a Top 10 player since Serena Williams (17 years, 240 days) in 1999
- The youngest Top 6 seed at Roland Garros since 2007 (Nicole Vaidisova)
- In the past 40 years, only two players have claimed more wins than M.Andreeva (8) from their first 10 matches at Roland Garros Seles and Swiatek (9-1)

Krueger:

- Making 2nd appearance at Roland Garros, where her previous result was reaching 1r in 2024 (I. Korpatsch)
- Overall, this is her 11th Grand Slam main draw appearance with her best result reaching 3r at US Open 2024 (l. Samsonova)
- Won the only previous meeting against M.Andreeva at US Open 2024 in straight sets
- Best career result on clay is R16 run at Strasbourg, Charleston in 2025
- Has played 14 three-set matches in 2025

[7] Madison Keys (USA #8) vs. Katie Boulter (GBR #38)

First meeting

Keys:

- Making 13th appearance at Roland Garros, where her best result was reaching SF run in 2018 (I. Stephens); also made QF run in 2019 (I. eventual champion Barty) and R16 in 2022 (I. V.Kudermetova)
- Owns a 3-1 record in 2r matches at Roland Garros
- Having won her first Grand Slam title at the Australian Open, looking to become the sixth woman to win in Melbourne and at Roland Garros in the same year following Court, Graf, Seles, Capriati and S.Williams
- Since making a 2r exit here in 2023, has not failed to reached at least 3r at every Grand Slam contested
- Last year, won her first red clay title at Strasbourg, defeating fellow American Danielle Collins in final; was also victorious on the green clay of Charleston in 2019 (d. Wozniacki in F)

Boulter:

- Earned her first main draw match win here earlier in the week after falling in the 1r in her Roland Garros main draw debut last year (I. Badosa)
- One of six British players through to second round three women (Boulter, Raducanu, Kartal) and three men (Draper, Norrie, Fearnley) the best showing by the nation here in Paris since 1973
- Best result across all Slams is reaching R32 at Wimbledon 2023 (I. Rybakina), US Open 2023 (I. Stearns) and Wimbledon 2022 (I. Tan)
- Looking for her fourth career win over a Top 10 opponent, having most recently defeated No.5 Pegula at 2024 United Cup
- Recent clay form includes winning the WTA 125 Paris tournament earlier this month (d. Paquet in F)

Elena-Gabriela Ruse (ROU #80) vs. [10] Paula Badosa (ESP #10)

Tied 1-1

Ruse:

- Looking for third career win over a Top 10 opponent today, having most recently posted a win over No.8 Krejcikova at 2024 US Open
- Has improved her ranking by 10 places over the past 12 months
- Collected her sole WTA Tour title on clay at Hamburg in 2021 (d. Petkovic in F)
- Follows in the footsteps of two Romania women who have won the Roland Garros title: Virginia Ruzici (1978) and Simona Halep (2018)

Badosa:

- A quarterfinalist here in Paris in 2021, reached first Grand Slam SF of career at this year's Australian Open
- Has never failed to advance to at least 3r here at Roland Garros
- Has reached at least the R16 at all the majors
- After an injury-stricken 2023 (back injury), worked her way back to No.12 in 2024 and was named WTA Comeback Player of the Year
- Looking to emulate Arantxa Sanchez Vicario and Garbine Muguruza as the two Spanish women who've lifted the Coupe Suzanne Lenglen in the Open Era

[15] Barbora Krejcikova (CZE #15) vs. Veronika Kudermetova (#46) Kudermetova leads 3-2

Krejcikova:

- Two-time Grand Slam singles champion, having captured the title here in 2021 and Wimbledon last year; owns 12 majors across all three disciplines
- First round win over Tatjana Maria marks first time she has advanced past first round here in Paris since her title run (three Ir exits)
- Narrowly defeated her opponent today, Kudermetova, in 1r of her victorious 2024 Wimbledon run 7-5 in third set, in a match lasting 3h14m
- Returning from a back injury that kept her sidelined this season until her first event at Strasbourg last week this is her third match of the year

Kudermetova:

- Reached sole Grand Slam QF of career to date here at Roland Garros in 2022 (I. Kasatkina)
- Looking for her 30th career win over a Top 20 opponent today against Krejcikova; most recently defeated No.17 Anisimova at Rome a couple of weeks ago
- Champion on the green clay of Charleston in 2021 (d. Kovinic in F)
- Recently reunited with Elise Mertens in doubles and competing here as No.6 seeds

[17] Daria Kasatkina (AUS #17) vs. (WC) Leolia Jeanjean (FRA #100)

First meeting

Azarenka leads 2-1

Kasatkina:

- Making 10th appearance at Roland Garros, with her SF result here in 2022 (I. eventual champion Swiatek) also her best result across Slams
- Also reached quarterfinal at 2018 Roland Garros (I. Stephens) and 2018 Wimbledon (I. Kerber)
- Owns one clay court title: Charleston in 2017
- Has a 3-1 record so far in 2025 against players ranked No. 100 or above with the only loss at Brisbane to eventual runner-up No.107 Polina Kudermetova

Jeanjean:

- Making 4th appearance at Roland Garros, where her previous best result was 3r in 2022 (l. Begu), which is also her best result across all majors
- Defeated Begu in 1r match via retirement to reach 2r at Tour level for the second time this season after reaching QF at Bogota (I. Pareja); this is also her best career result on clay
- Owns one career win over a Top 20 player: No.8 Ka. Pliskova at Roland Garros 2022
- Has defeated a player from Australia in a main draw Tour level match once before at 2023 Roland Garros (Kimberly Birrell)
- Is currently ranked at her career-best No.100 (just achieved on May 25); this time last year was ranked No.148

Victoria Azarenka (#75) vs. [31] Sofia Kenin (USA #30)

Azarenka:


- In her 18th Roland Garros, achieved her best result in 2013 with semifinal (I. Sharapova); also made quarterfinal in 2009 and 2011
- Two time Grand Slam champion claimed the titles at 2012 and 2013 Australian Open
- Owns the most Grand Slam wins of any active player with a record of 164-63
- Defeated Yanina Wickmayer 6-0 6-0 in the opening round match here to become the oldest player (35) in the Open Era to win a Grand Slam main draw match with a 6-0 6-0 scoreline (surpassing previous record held by V.Williams in Wimbledon 2015)
- Holds a 6-0 6-0 victory over Kenin at 2020 Rome, also their only previous meeting on clay

Kenin:

- Making sixth appearance at Roland Garros, where she is a former finalist (I. Swiatek in 2020 final, having become a Grand Slam champion at the 2020 Australian Open)
- Has won 14 matches at Roland Garros, her highest tally at a tournament
- Reached second clay court final of career at Charleston in April (I. Pegula)
- Has won 18 matches so far in 2025 8 of those came on clay court

COCO GAUFF

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2024 won the French Open junior title in both singles and doubles w/Renata Jamrichova
- Played a handful of tournaments from 2021 to 2023 before a breakout year on the circuit in 2024 winning five ITF titles In 2023 reached the final at the US Open girl's singles (l. Katherine Hui)
- Began her professional career in 2021 playing on ITF circuit and also received a qualification wild card at WTA 250 Prague
- Went three for three in finals in 2024, winning Auckland, Beijing and a historic first WTA Finals Riyadh title. Success in Saudi Arabia saw her win a record \$4.8m in prize money, the most ever awarded in women s professional sports, and defeat the World No.1 and No.2 at the same event. Posted a new career-high of No.2 in June
- Won debut Grand Slam singles crown in 2023 lifting title on home soil at US Open (d. Sabalenka in F). Picked up another three titles in 2023, marking first WTA 1000 title at Cincinnati and debut WTA 500 title at Washington DC, in addition to WTA 250 Auckland. In doubles was co-ranked No.1 with Pegula after US Open.
- In 2022, reached maiden Grand Slam final at Roland-Garros (l. Swiatek); was the youngest major finalist since Sharapova won 2004 Wimbledon
- Made Top-10 debut on September 12, 2022, following QF run at US Open (l. Garcia)
- Highlight of 2021 campaign was completing singles-doubles title sweep at Parma; defeated Q.Wang in singles final and teamed up w/McNally to win doubles
- In 2021 also reached SF at Adelaide and Rome, while at the Slams made QF at Roland-Garros and R16 at Wimbledon
- Finished R-Up in doubles at 2021 US Open (w/McNally, l. Stosur/Zhang)
- First cracked the Top 50 on February 24, 2020 at No.49, following a R16 appearance at Australian Open to tie her career best Grand Slam result during run, defeated V.Williams in 1r and her first Top-5 opponent in No.4 Osaka in 3r (l. eventual champion Kenin in 3s)
- Enjoyed breakout season in 2019, highlighted by maiden WTA singles title at Linz (as lucky loser, d. Ostapenko in F) - earned her first Top-10 win en route to title over No.8 Bertens in QF
- At 15y 214d, her title run in Linz made her youngest to win a WTA tour-level title since Vaidisova (15y 177d) won Tashkent in 2004
- Also claimed maiden WTA doubles titles at Washington, DC (w/McNally, d. Sanchez/Stollar in F) and Luxembourg (w/McNally, d. Christian/Guarachi in F)
- By winning the doubles title at Washington, DC at 15y 144d, became the youngest player to win a doubles title since May 1995 (Hingis won Hamburg at 14y 219d)
- Reached R16 at 2019 Wimbledon on Grand Slam main draw debut defeating V.Williams in 1r (l.

eventual champion Halep) - followed with 3r showing at US Open (as WC, l. Osaka)


- Made WTA main draw debut as a wildcard at 2019 Miami where she earned her first WTA main draw win over good friend McNally (l. Kasatkina in 2r)
- Made professional debut in May 2018 as a qualifier into the \$25K ITF/Osprey, FL-USA
- Member of US Billie Jean King Cup team in 2022
 Former Junior World No.1 (July 2018); won 2018 Roland-Garros girls' title (d. McNally in F) and 2018 US Open doubles title (w/McNally), while finished R-Up at 2017 US Open girls' event (l. Anisimova) becoming the youngest girls' singles finalist in tournament history at 13-years-old





- Lifted maiden WTA title at 2021 Strasbourg, followed by sweep of singles and doubles titles at Roland-Garros. Roland Garros was just her fifth Slam main draw in singles; only two women have won a major with fewer main draw appearances to their name.
- Also won Prague title (d. Martincova in F), reached final at Dubai (l. Muguruza) and qualified for WTA Finals in singles for the first time. Recorded best results at US Open (QF) and Wimbledon (R16) last year
- Posted another record-breaking year in doubles across 2021 - in addition to singles title at Roland Garros, won doubles title too in Paris, along with Madrid, Gippsland Trophy, WTA Finals and the gold medal at Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games (all w/Siniakova)



- Best results in 2024 were reaching SF at Brisbane (l. Sabalenka), Miami (l. Rybakina) and Berlin (l. Kalinskaya). Made 4r at Australian Open (l. Yastremska). In addition, reached QF another four times at Doha (l. eventual champion Swiatek), Rome (l. Collins), Charleston (l. Pegula) and Washington DC (l. Sabalenka).
- Opened 2023, with QF at Adelaide 1 (l. Noskova) before reaching semifinal at Australian Open (l. Rybakina). Made 4r at Wimbledon (l. Svitolina) and 2r at US Open before earning a QF finish at Guadalajara (l. Garcia)
- Standout result in 2022 was SF in last tournament of her season, at Guadalajara (l. eventual champion Pegula). Also reached QFs at Washington DC and Adelaide, while made R16 at Australian Open and US Open
- Best result in 2021 came in final event when she finished R-Up at Indian Wells (l. Badosa on third set tie-break). Also made SFs at Doha and Bad Homburg
- One of five players to reach three or more finals in 2020, lifting one trophy at the Western & Southern Open - her first title since 2016. Finished year ranked No.13 - her best seasonend ranking since 2013 (No.2)
- Advanced to her fifth career Grand Slam final at 2020 US Open, which helped her return to the Top 20 for the first time since March 2017
- Winner of the 2020 WTA Comeback Player of the Year Award, as voted on by members of the international media
- Last tournament of 2019 was the US Open, where she fell to Sabalenka in 1r; also reached the doubles final w/Barty (l. Mertens/Sabalenka)
- Highlight of 2019 was 37th singles final at Monterrey (l. Muguruza in F via ret. w/leg injury). On February 2, 2019 returned to Top 50 for first time following the birth of her child, Leo
- Made return to tennis in June 2017 following birth of first child in December 2016, reaching 2r of comeback event at Mallorca (d. Ozaki, l. Konjuh)
- Ended 2016 ranked No.13, despite missing second half of season after going on maternity leave (announced pregnancy mid-July). Lifted three titles, at Brisbane and 'Sunshine Double' of Indian Wells and Miami - third woman to achieve feat after Graf in 1994 and 1996 and Clijsters in 2005
- Posted 26-3 record for first six months of 2016 with losses coming at the Australian Open (QF, l. Kerber), Rome (2r, l. Begu) and Roland Garros (ret. vs. Knapp w/right knee injury)

- Achieved best result of 2024 at Tokyo with runner-up (l. Zheng in final). In doubles claimed her third and fourth career titles at Abu Dhabi and Miami w/Bethanie Mattek-Sands.
- Strongest result of 2023 was runner-up at San Diego (l. Krejcikova). Also reached SF at Hobart (l. Cocciaretto) and Guadalajara (l. Dolehide). As a qualifier, posted her best Wimbledon result with 3r (l. Svitolina). Moved 202 positions up the ranking from her 2022 year-end position (from No. 235 to No.33).
- Best results of 2022 were QF at Adelaide (l. eventual champion Barty) and Cleveland (l. Pera). Missed clay and grass swings w/right ankle injury
- Missed second half of 2021 season due to ongoing foot injury and then testing positive for COVID-19
- In opening half of the 2021 campaign, standout results were QFs at Abu Dhabi and Yarra Valley Classic, and a R16 showing at Roland Garros
- Ended 2020 at career high of No.4 which she first hit on March 9, 2020 and came away with the 2020 WTA Player of the Year Award
- In last tournament of the season, finished R-Up at Roland Garros (l. Swiatek) for her first final appearance on clay
- Reached R16 at US Open and was one of only two players (also Kvitova) to reach second week of all three Slams in 2020
- Lifted fifth WTA singles title at Lyon (d. Friedsam in F) becoming the first player in 2020 to win a second title
- Won maiden major at 2020 Australian Open (d. Muguruza in F) to become the youngest champion (21y, 80d) in Melbourne since Sharapova (20y, 283d) in 2008. Defeated No.1 Barty and home favorite in SF for third career win over a reigning World No.1
- Australian Open run helped her break into the Top 10 for the first time at No.7 on February 3, 2020
- Won 2019 WTA Most Improved Player of the Year aware after winning three WTA titles at Hobart (d. Schmiedlova in F), Mallorca (d. Bencic in F) and Guangzhou (d. Stosur in F)
- Finished 2019 at No.14 as US No.2 (behind No.9 S.Williams) and leader in hard court wins (38-tied w/Barty)
- Registered back-to-back SF runs at Toronto (l. eventual champion Andreescu) and Cincinnati (l. eventual champion Keys), subsequently leading to Top 20 debut at No.20 on August 19, 2019

- Limited to total of 23 events over 2014-15 seasons due to variety of injuries
