MATCH NOTES - DAY 7 - SATURDAY, MAY 31

Marie Bouzkova (CZE #47) vs. [2] Coco Gauff (USA #2)

Bouzkova leads 2-0

Bouzkova:

- With a win today would reach her third career Grand Slam 4r, having done so at Wimbledon in 2022 and 2023
- Owns 11 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.3 Aryna Sabalenka at Washington DC 2024
- Could become the fifth player to defeat Gauff in all the first three meetings against her, after Iga Swiatek, Anastasija Sevastova, Daria Kasatkina and Simona Halep
- Owns one singles title on clay at Bogota 2024
- Has won 8 matches on clay in 2025 already her highest such tally in a single entire season

Gauff:

- Is the youngest player to reach 3r at Roland Garros for five consecutive years since Maria Sharapova (2004-2008)
- In the past three years, only Iga Swiatek (10/10) has made more 3rs at Grand Slams than Gauff (9/10, equaling Aryna Sabalenka and Elina Svitolina)
- Has won 22 main draw matches at the French Open: this is her highest tally in a single tournament in her career
- Owns one singles title on clay at Parma 202
- Only Elina Svitolina (14) has won more clay court matches than Gauff so far in 2025 (13, level with Sabalenka)

Marketa Vondrousova (CZE #96) vs. [3] Jessica Pegula (USA #3) Vondrousova leads 1-0

Vondrousova:

- 2019 Roland Garros finalist (I. Barty), also reached QF in 2024 (I. eventual champion Swiatek)
- Owns one Grand Slam title at 2023 Wimbledon (d. Jabeur in final)
- Is currently ranked No.96 after missing second half of 2024 season through shoulder injury; this time last year was ranked No.6
- Most recent win over a Top 10 player was over No.2 Sabalenka at Stuttgart 2024

Pegula:

- Making sixth appearance at Roland Garros, with a best result of QF in 2022 (I. eventual champion Swiatek)
- Holds 10-5 record at Roland Garros, but undefeated at this event against unseeded opponents (9-0)
- Last loss to a player ranked outside Top 90 was to No.168 Raducanu at 2024 Eastbourne
- Won first clay court title of career earlier this year at Charleston (d. Kenin in final)

[6] Mirra Andreeva (#6) vs. [32] Yulia Putintseva (KAZ #31)

Andreeva:

- Best result here and across the Majors came with SF run in 2024 (I. Swiatek)
- Owns a 20-8 record across the Slams (with nine of those wins coming at Roland Garros)
- Has lost to opposition outside the Top 30 only once this season, falling to No.46 Sramkova at Doha
- Is currently ranked No.6; this time last year was ranked No.38

Putintseva:

- Has made the QF twice here in Paris, in 2016 and 2018
- Also made QF at 2020 US Open
- Opened 2025 Roland Garros campaign with win over Solana Sierra which was 50th Grand Slam main draw win
- Owns 13 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently defeating No.2 Coco Gauff at Cincinnati in 2024
- Owns two wins over the reigning WTA World No.1, defeating Osaka at 2019 Birmingham and Swiatek at 2024 Wimbledon

[7] Madison Keys (USA #8) vs. [31] Sofia Kenin (USA #30)

Keys:

- Making 13th appearance at Roland Garros, where her best result was reaching SF run in 2018 (I. Stephens); also made QF run in 2019 (I. eventual champion Barty) and R16 in 2022 (I. V.Kudermetova)
- Having won her first Grand Slam title at the Australian Open, looking to become the sixth woman to win in Melbourne and at Roland Garros in the same year following Court, Graf, Seles, Capriati and S.Williams
- Is the player with the most 3r appearances at Grand Slams since 2013, when she made her first at the Australian Open
- Owns 18-4 record against opponents outside Top 20 in 2025, with the most recent loss to No.42 Stearns at Rome 2025
- Last year, won her first red clay title at Strasbourg, defeating fellow American Danielle Collins in final; was also victorious on the green clay of Charleston in 2019 (d. Wozniacki in F)

Kenin:

- Has reached 3r at all five main draw appearances at the French Open (the only exception was at her tournament debut in 2018, defeated by Naomi Osaka in the first round)
- Reached second clay court final of career earlier this year at Charleston (I. Pegula, green clay)
- Looking to reach her first 4r at a Grand Slam since 2021 Roland Garros (I. Sakkari)
- Best career result on clay is runner-up which she reached at Charleston in 2025; Roland Garros in 2020
- Has won 19 matches so far in 2025 9 of those came on clay court

[17] Daria Kasatkina (AUS #17) vs. [10] Paula Badosa (ESP #10)

Kasatkina:

- Making 10th appearance at Roland Garros, with her SF result here in 2022 (I. eventual champion Swiatek) also her best result across Slams
- Also reached quarterfinal at 2018 Roland Garros (I. Stephens) and 2018 Wimbledon (I. Kerber)
- Owns one clay court title: Charleston in 2017
- Looking for her first Top 10 win of the season after falling to No.8 Navarro at Australian Open and No.5 Pegula at Doha

Badosa:

- A quarterfinalist here in Paris in 2021, reached first Grand Slam SF of career at this year's Australian Open
- Has never failed to advance to at least 3r here at Roland Garros
- Has reached at least the R16 at all the majors
- Is 2-3 against Top 20 players so far this season with both wins achieved at Australian Open (Gauff and Kostyuk)
- After an injury-stricken 2023 (back injury), worked her way back to No.12 in 2024 and was named WTA Comeback Player of the Year
- Looking to emulate Arantxa Sanchez Vicario and Garbine Muguruza as the two Spanish women who've lifted the Coupe Suzanne Lenglen in the Open Era

Veronika Kudermetova (#46) vs. [20] Ekaterina Alexandrova (#20)

Kudermetova:

- Making seventh appearance at Roland Garros, where her best result is reaching QF in 2022 (sole Grand Slam QF of career to date)
- With a win today would register multiple wins against Top 20 players in the same tournament for the first time since Tokyo 2023 and for the first time on clay since Madrid 2023
- Has managed four wins against Top 20 opponents during the 2025 season (30 wins overall, most recently No.15 Barbora Krejcikova in 2r) it is the most wins she against Top 20 players since winning eight in 2023
- Looking to reach R16 at Roland Garros for the second time in her career after 2020, she could reach multiple R16 at Grand Slams in the same season for the first time in her career
- Won one career title on clay at 2021 Charleston

Alexandrova:

- Making 9th appearance at Roland Garros, having previously reached 3r in 2019, 2020, 2023
- Career best result at Grand Slams was R16 run at Wimbledon 2023 (I. Sabalenka)
- With a win today would be through to her first QF at Roland Garros in her ninth appearance at this event, the last player to take more appearances to their maiden R16 here was Anna Karolina Schmiedlova in 2023 (10)
- Best career result on clay is SF run at Stuttgart and Charleston in 2025, Madrid and Charleston in 2022
- Is currently ranked No.20 (career best at No.15 in April 2024); this time last year was ranked No.18

Jessica Bouzas Maneiro (#68) vs. Hailey Baptiste (USA #70)

Bouzas leads 1-0

Bouzas Maneiro:

- Making second Roland Garros appearance, previously playing 1r in 2024 (I. Fett)
- This is her sixth Grand Slam main draw with a best result of 3r at Wimbledon and US Open last season
- Defeated Baptiste in their only meeting at ITF level at W50 Morelia (hard court) in 2024
- Has won 8 clay court matches so far in 2025 including QF at Rouen (I. Svitolina) and Rabat (I. Tomljanovic)

Baptiste:

- Making 4th main draw appearance at Roland Garros and has reached 3r at a Grand Slam for the first time
- First Tour-level meeting against a player from Spain
- Seven of her 13 Tour level main draw match wins this year have come on clay
- Is the lowest ranked among the seven players from United States of America to reach 3r (Gauff, Pegula, Keys, Anisimova, Pera, Kenin)

[WC] Elsa Jacquemot (FRA #361) vs. [WC] Lois Boisson (FRA #138) Jacquemot leads 1-0

Jacquemot:


- In her 7th career Grand Slam main draw has reached her best result here this year after previously reaching 2r at 2022 Roland Garros (I. Kerber)
- French Open junior Champion in 2020
- Competing just below her career-high ranking of No.137 and with a win today is projected to move into the Top 100 for the first time
- The last time two women from France faced each other at Roland Garros at this stage or later was in 2017 when Garcia defeated Cornet in R16
- Has won back-to-back Tour level main draw matches for the first time in her career here this week

Boisson:

- Making Grand Slam main draw debut this week at Roland Garros (competed in qualifying here in 2021, 2022 and 2023)
- Competed in her first Tour level main draw earlier this year at Rouen making 2r (I. Uchijima)
- Posted her career best win by ranking here this week over No.24 Elise Mertens
- Lifted her maiden WTA 125 title last season at Saint Malo (clay)
- The last French wild card to reach R16 at Roland Garros was Parmentier in 2014 (I. Muguruza in R16)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached two WTA singles finals in 2024, at Bogotá (l. Osorio) and Washington, DC (l. Badosa); finished season with SF run at Jiujiang (l. Golubic). In Grand Slam play, achieved best result at Roland Garros to date, advancing to 3r (l. Swiatek).
- Enjoyed better success in second half of 2023 season with 4r at Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Vondrousova) and 3r at US Open (l. Jabeur); also achieved QF at Cincinnati (retired during match against Muchova with right thigh injury), QF at Seoul (l. Yuan Yue) and R-Up at Nanchang (l. Siniakova).
- Lifted two more doubles trophies in 2023 at Beijing (w/Sorribes Tormo) and Seoul (w/Mattek Sands).
- Finished 2022 season on career-high ranking of No.25, having started it only just inside Top 100
- Lifted career maiden singles champion trophy at Prague (d. Potapova in F). Also won third doubles title at Istanbul 2022 (w/Sorribes Tormo)
- Other notable results from 2022 season included R-Up at WTA 250 event in Guadalajara (l. Stephens in F) and SF run later in the year at WTA 1000 event in the same city (l. Sakkari)
- Reached QF at 2022 Wimbledon (l. Jabeur) her best career Slam result
- Scored two Top-10 wins over No. 8 Collins at Wimbledon and No. 7 Ka.Pliskova at Madrid in 2022
- Advanced to second WTA final in 2021 at the Phillip Island Trophy in Melbourne defeating No.8 Andreescu in SF (l. Kasatkina in F), followed it up with SF in Guadalajara(l. Sorribes Tormo)
- Also reached QFs in Birmingham (l. Vandeweghe) and Luxembourg (l. Tauson)
- In doubles in 2022, won first titles of career both w/Hradecka at Birmingham (d.Jabeur/Perez in F) and Prague (d. Stojanovic/Kuzmova in F) and reached an additional final at Charleston w/Hradecka (l. Melichar/Schuurs); also reached QFs at Wimbledon and US Open
- Before tour's hiatus in March 2020, advanced to first career WTA final at Monterrey where she finished R-Up to Svitolina - broke into Top 50 at career-high ranking of No.47 following the tournament (March 9, 2020)
- Other highlight of 2020 came at Lexington, where she made the fourth tour-level QF of her career (l. eventual champion Brady) and reached maiden WTA doubles final (w/Teichmann, l. Carter/Stefani)

- Went three for three in finals in 2024, winning Auckland, Beijing and a historic first WTA Finals Riyadh title. Success in Saudi Arabia saw her win a record \$4.8m in prize money, the most ever awarded in women s professional sports, and defeat the World No.1 and No.2 at the same event. Posted a new career-high of No.2 in June
- Won debut Grand Slam singles crown in 2023 lifting title on home soil at US Open (d. Sabalenka in F). Picked up another three titles in 2023, marking first WTA 1000 title at Cincinnati and debut WTA 500 title at Washington DC, in addition to WTA 250 Auckland. In doubles was co-ranked No.1 with Pegula after US Open.



- In 2024 reached QF at Roland Garros (l. eventual champion Swiatek); further highlights included semifinal at Stuttgart and quarterfinals at Strasbourg and Dubai. Ended her season after Wimbledon through shoulder injury

- Opened 2021 campaign with SF at Yarra Valley Classic before R16 showing at Australian Open
- Highlights of 2020 include defeating No.6 Svitolina to reach SFs at Rome (l. Ka.Pliskova) as well as a QF run to kick off the season at Adelaide (l. No.1 Barty)
- Enjoyed break-out season in 2019, reaching three finals across the year and posting career-high ranking of No.14 on July 1, 2019
