MATCH NOTES - DAY 9 - MONDAY, JUNE 2

[20] Ekaterina Alexandrova (#20) vs. [2] Coco Gauff (USA #2)

Alexandrova:

- Making 9th appearance at Roland Garros, and has advanced to R16 for the first time having previously reached 3r in 2019, 2020, 2023
- Has equaled her career best result at a Grand Slam also R16 at Wimbledon 2023 (I. Sabalenka)
- Last player to make more Roland Garros appearances to reach their maiden R16 was Schmiedlova in 2023 (10)
- Best career result on clay is SF run at Stuttgart and Charleston in 2025, Madrid and Charleston in 2022
- Owns 5 wins against Top 10 opponents in 2025 season only Sabalenka has more (6)
- Currently ranked No.20 (career best at No.15 in April 2024); this time last year was ranked No.18
- Could become the first player to reach her maiden QF at Grand Slams after having turned 30 since Magda Linette at the Australian Open 2023 and the first to do so at Roland Garros since Laura Siegemund in 2020
- Only Coco Gauff (four) has made more clay court top-10 wins in 2025 than Ekaterina Alexandrova (three Jessica Pegula and Mirra Andreeva in Stuttgart and Qinwen Zheng in Charleston)
- Career best win by ranking was defeating No.1 Swiatek at Miami 2024 and No.1 Sabalenka at Doha 2025

Gauff:

- Gauff has won 3 of the 4 previous meetings, including the last two 2023 Beijing (R64) and 2024 Berlin (R16); this is their first meeting on clay
- Has won 23 main draw matches at the French Open: this is her highest tally in a single tournament in her career
- Owns one singles title on clay at Parma 202
- Is the youngest American player to reach 4r for 7+ consecutive events at Grand slams since Venus Williams (nine in a row between the US Open 1997 and 1999)
- Only Elina Svitolina (15) has won more clay court matches than Gauff so far in 2025 (14, level with Sabalenka)
- Is the player with the most break points converted at Roland Garros 2025 (20)
- One of five Americans through to the R16, the most at a Slam since 2022 Roland Garros

Boisson:

- Making Grand Slam main draw debut this week (competed in qualifying here in 2021, 2022 and 2023) •
- Competed in her first Tour level main draw earlier this year at Rouen making 2r (I. Uchijima) •
- Posted her career best win by ranking earlier this tournament by defeating No.24 Elise Mertens •
- Lifted her maiden WTA 125 title last season at Saint Malo (clay) •
- The last French wild card to reach R16 at Roland Garros was Parmentier in 2014 (I. Muguruza in R16) •
- The last French wildcard to reach QF at Roland Garros was 2002 Mary Pierce (QF) •
- Is the lowest-ranked player to reach the Fourth Round at Roland Garros since Serena Williams in 2018 (No.451) .
- With a win would be lowest ranked player to reach QF at a Slam since 2017 US Open (Kanepi, QF at No.418) •

Pegula:

- Making sixth appearance at Roland Garros, with a best result of QF in 2022 (I. eventual champion Swiatek)
- Last loss to a player ranked outside Top 90 was to No.168 Raducanu at 2024 Eastbourne •
- Won first clay court title of career earlier this year at Charleston (d. Kenin in final) •
- The oldest player to reach the R16 this year at 31y, 104d
- Holds 10-5 record at Roland Garros, but undefeated at this event against unseeded opponents (9-0) •
- Could become the fourth American in the Open Era to reach the Women's Singles quarterfinals at Roland • Garros after having turned 31 after Billie Jean King, Chris Evert and Serena Williams.

[6] Mirra Andreeva (#6) vs. [17] Daria Kasatkina (AUS #17)


Andreeva:

- Best result here and across the Majors came with SF run in 2024 (I. Swiatek) •
- Owns a 21-8 record across the Slams (with 10 of those wins coming at Roland Garros) •
- Is currently ranked No.6; this time last year was ranked No.38 •
- Has lost to opposition outside the Top 30 only once this season, falling to No.46 Sramkova at Doha •
- Could become the youngest player to reach back-to-back Women's Singles quarter-finals at Roland Garros • since Martina Hingis (1997-1998)

Kasatkina:

- Kasatkina won the only previous meeting in 3-sets at 2024 Ningbo championship match
- Making 10th appearance at Roland Garros, with her SF result here in 2022 (I. eventual champion Swiatek) also her best result across Slams
- Also reached quarterfinal at 2018 Roland Garros (I. Stephens) and 2018 Wimbledon (I. Kerber) •
- Owns one clay court title: Charleston in 2017 •
- Looking for her second Top 10 win of the season after defeating Paula Badosa in the previous round
- Began representing Australia in March 2025; this is the first time in 37 years that an Australian has advanced to • the R16 in the men's and women's draw in the same year

[7] Madison Keys (USA #8) vs. vs. Hailey Baptiste (USA #70)

Keys leads 2-1

Keys:

- Won the last two meetings against Baptiste 2024 Indian Wells and 2023 Charleston; Baptiste's lone win in series came at 2019 Washington DC
- 2025 Roland Garros marks 47th main draw appearance at a Grand Slam
- Making 13th appearance at Roland Garros, where her best result was reaching SF run in 2018 (I. Stephens); also made QF run in 2019 (I. eventual champion Barty) and R16 in 2022 (I. V.Kudermetova)
- Having won her first Grand Slam title at the Australian Open, looking to become the sixth woman to win in Melbourne and at Roland Garros in the same year following Court, Graf, Seles, Capriati and S.Williams
- The oldest player to win 10+ consecutive matches (10) at Grand Slams since Serena Williams between the Australian Open 2017 and Wimbledon 2018 (16 wins in a row)
- Record against opponents outside Top 50 is 8-1, with the sole loss coming to No. 140 Eala at Miami 2025
- Last year, won her first red clay title at Strasbourg, defeating fellow American Danielle Collins in final; was also victorious on the green clay of Charleston in 2019 (d. Wozniacki in F)

Baptiste:

- Making 4th main draw appearance at Roland Garros and has reached 3r at a Grand Slam for the first time
- Eight of her 14 Tour level main draw match wins this year have come on clay
- Owns 1 win in career over Top 10 players, defeating No.10 Barbora Krejcikova at Wuhan 2024
- Entering R16, Baptiste has served the most aces served at Roland Garros 2025 (18, level with Elena Rybakina)
- This is the first All-American match-up at Roland Garros in R16 since 2015 (Serena Williams def. Sloane Stephens); there have been All-American meetings at later stages of the event

- Ekaterina Alexandrova could become the first player to reach her maiden QF at Grand Slams after having turned 30 since Magda Linette at the Australian Open 2023 and the first to do soat Roland Garros since Laura Siegemund in 2020
- Faces No.2 Coco Gauff in 4r today; owns 5 wins against Top 10 opponents in 2025 season - only Sabalenka has more (6)
- Onlhy Coco Gauff (four) has made more clay court top-10 wins in 2025 than Ekaterina Alexandrova (three -Jessica Pegula and Mirra Andreeva in Stuttgart and Qinwen Zheng in Charleston)
- Career best win by ranking was defeating No.1 Swiatek at Miami 2024 and No.1 Sabalenka at Doha 2025
- Owns 29-22 career record against players from United States of America(3-3 in 2025), playing today's opponent Gauff for the 5th time, winning one of them at Berlin 2023
- Best career result on clay is SF run at Stuttgart and Charleston in 2025, Madrid and Charleston in 2022
- Is currently ranked No.20 (career best at No.15 in April 2024); this time last year was ranked No.18

- Is the player with the most break points converted at Roland Garros 2025 (20)

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2024, highlights included reaching the final at Linz (l. Ostapenko in Final) and semifinals at Adelaide (l. eventual champion Ostapenko), Miami (l. eventual champion Collins), 's-Hertogenbosch (l. eventual champion Samsonova) and Monterrey (l. Sun); also made quarterfinals at Wuhan (l. Xin. Wang) and her best Grand Slam result of the season came during a 3r run at US Open (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- In 2023, won fourth career singles title at 's-Hertogenbosch, successfully defending the title and defeating top seed, Kudermetova in the final. A run of successful results followed with SF at Berlin (l. eventual champion, Kvitova), 4r at Wimbledon (l. Sabalenka) - a career best result at any of the majors and runner-up at Cleveland (l. Sorribes Tormo).
- Reached a 2023 peak ranking of No. 16 on February 20, 2023 following a 3r finish at Australian Open (l. Linette), before posting two QF results at Miami (l. eventual champion Kvitova) and Charleston (l. Bencic). Another QF then came in the Asian Swing at Tokyo (l. Pavlyuchenkova).
- In 2022, won titles at
 S-Hertogenbosch (d. Sabalenka in F) and Seoul (d. Ostapenko in F). Also advanced to SF at Charleston, Madrid and Ostrava, making Top-20 debut on October 10, 2022
- Reached third WTA singles final in 2021, enjoying run to final at home tournament of Moscow (l. Kontaveit). Other key result was SF run at Gippsland Trophy (l. Kanepi)
- Posted two best wins-by-ranking of career in 2021, defeating No.2 Halep (Gippsland Trophy) and No.2 Sabalenka (Moscow)
- Reached 2r on Olympic debut at Tokyo 2020
- Opened 2020 season by lifting her maiden WTA singles title, at Shenzhen (d. Rybakina in F)
- Won both singles rubbers on Billie Jean King Cup debut in 3-2 win over Romania in February 2020
- Made Top-50 debut on June 17, 2019 after QF run at 's-Hertogenbosch
- Registered 30 Tour-level match wins during 2019, in which she reached SF at Budapest, Seoul and Linz and made QF at St. Petersburg, 's-Hertogenbosch, Eastbourne and Moscow. Also advanced to 3r at a major for the first time, at Roland Garros
- Won sole WTA doubles title at 2019 Budapest (w/Zvonareva)

- Went three for three in finals in 2024, winning Auckland, Beijing and a historic first WTA Finals Riyadh title. Success in Saudi Arabia saw her win a record \$4.8m in prize money, the most ever awarded in women[] s professional sports, and defeat the World No.1 and No.2 at the same event. Posted a new career-high of No.2 in June
- Won debut Grand Slam singles crown in 2023 lifting title on home soil at US Open (d. Sabalenka in F). Picked up another three titles in 2023, marking first WTA 1000 title at Cincinnati and debut WTA 500 title at Washington DC, in addition to WTA 250 Auckland. In doubles was co-ranked No.1 with Pegula after US Open.
- In 2022, reached maiden Grand Slam final at Roland-Garros (l. Swiatek); was the youngest major finalist since Sharapova won 2004 Wimbledon
- Made Top-10 debut on September 12, 2022, following QF run at US Open (l. Garcia)
- Highlight of 2021 campaign was completing singles-doubles title sweep at Parma; defeated Q.Wang in singles final and teamed up w/McNally to win doubles
- In 2021 also reached SF at Adelaide and Rome, while at the Slams made QF at Roland-Garros and R16 at Wimbledon
- Finished R-Up in doubles at 2021 US Open (w/McNally, l. Stosur/Zhang)
- First cracked the Top 50 on February 24, 2020 at No.49, following a R16 appearance at Australian Open to tie her career best Grand Slam result during run, defeated V.Williams in 1r and her first Top-5 opponent in No.4 Osaka in 3r (l. eventual champion Kenin in 3s)
- Enjoyed breakout season in 2019, highlighted by maiden WTA singles title at Linz (as lucky loser, d. Ostapenko in F) - earned her first Top-10 win en route to title over No.8 Bertens in QF
- At 15y 214d, her title run in Linz made her youngest to win a WTA tour-level title since Vaidisova (15y 177d) won Tashkent in 2004
- Also claimed maiden WTA doubles titles at Washington, DC (w/McNally, d. Sanchez/Stollar in F) and Luxembourg (w/McNally, d. Christian/Guarachi in F)




