ROLAND GARROS FINAL OVERVIEW

- The WTA World No. 1 and No. 2 will face each other for the first time since the final in Rome 2024 (Iga Swiatek and Aryna Sabalenka) and the first time at a Grand Slam since the 2018 Australian Open (No.2 Wozniacki d. No.1 Halep)
- For only the fifth time since 1990, the Top-2 seeded players will face each other in Women’s Singles at Roland Garros after Steffi Graf-Monica Seles (1990 and 1992), Arantxa Sanchez Vicario-Steffi Graf (1995) and Serena Williams-Maria Sharapova (2013).
- Coco Gauff and Aryna Sabalenka will be the first players to face each other at both US and French Open finals in Women’s Singles since Justine Henin and Svetlana Kuznetsova (Roland Garros 2006 & US Open 2007).
- Sabalenka (17) and Gauff (17) are the players with the most wins on clay this season at WTA level.

- Sabalenka and Gauff are the players with the most combined clay court wins (34, 17 each) coming into the Women's Singles Roland Garros final since Serena Williams (22) and Maria Sharapova (17) in 2013 (39 combined).
- The two have both won five matches against each other at WTA-level, on clay they have a 1-1 head-to-head record: Gauff won in 2021 Rome Round of 16 while Sabalenka won their most recent clay match-up in the 2025 Madrid final
- They are also tied 1-1 at Grand Slam events: Gauff won in the 2023 US Open final and Sabalenka won in 2024 Australian Open semifinal
- Coco Gauff (40) is the player with the most break points converted in Women's Singles at Roland Garros, Aryna Sabalenka is next best with (30).

Sabalenka:

- Appearing in her sixth career Grand Slam singles final but her first one not on hard courts
- Contesting her 28th career Grand Slam main draw; she is a 3-time Grand Slam champion (2023-2024 Australian Open and 2024 US Open)
- Seeking to become the only active woman on tour to have won singles titles at three of the four Grand Slam events
- Is the fourth player to reach the final in three consecutive Women's Singles Grand Slam events (US Open 2024, Australian and French Open 2025) and first since Serena Williams in 2016 (Australian Open, Roland Garros and Wimbledon 2016); also done by Justine Henin and Venus Williams
- Is now the player with the most Women's Singles Grand Slam finals this decade (six, surpassing Iga Swiatek with five)
- The third player in 2000s to reach multiple Women's Singles Grand Slam finals for 3+ consecutive years after Venus Williams (2000-2003) and Serena Williams (2008-2010)
- Has made seven WTA level finals in 2025, already equaling her highest such tally in a single calendar year (also seven in the entire 2024 campaign).
- Her semifinal victory on Thursday ended four-time champion Iga Swiatek's 26-match winning streak at Roland Garros; win was Sabalenka's 40th tour-level main-draw match-win of the year ranking No.1 on tour for match-wins in 2025
- Has 48 career Top 10 wins, eight of which have come this year; in the past decade, only Carla Suarez Navarro (9, in 2015) has claimed more WTA Top 10 wins before the end of Roland Garros (Sabalenka would tie her with a win in the final)
- Has held PIF WTA World No.1 ranking since October 21, 2024, and has collected her 40th and 41st weeks at World No.1 during this tournament (pushing to 33 consecutive); she will hold on to No.1 ranking after Roland Garros
- Aryna Sabalenka (28) is the player with the most aces in Women's Singles at Roland Garros

Gauff:

- Into her third career Grand Slam singles final, and second at Roland Garros (l. Swiatek in 2022 Roland Garros final)
- Contesting 23rd Grand Slam main draw of career looking for second title after winning the 2023 US Open title (d. Sabalenka in final)
- Could become the first American to win the Roland Garros singles title since Serena Williams in 2015, and the youngest American to win the Roland Garros singles title since Serena Williams in 2002

- Is the fourth player competing for the United States to reach multiple Women’s Singles finals at Roland Garros in the Open Era, after Chris Evert, Martina Navratilova and Serena Williams.
- Is the second-youngest player competing for the United States to reach her second Women’s Singles final at Roland Garros, older only than Chris Evert in 1974.
- Is the youngest player to claim 70 Women’s Singles Grand Slam wins since Maria Sharapova in 2007.
- Owns 3-10 career record vs. a reigning World No.1; her most recent win over a reigning No.1 came over Sabalenka in the semifinals of last year’s WTA Finals Riyadh
- Has won one previous title on clay (2021 Parma); she also reached both of this year’s WTA 1000 clay-court finals at Madrid and Rome
- Since the Mutua Madrid Open’s inception in 2009, 21-year-old Gauff is the youngest player to reach the finals at Madrid, Rome and Roland Garros in a single calendar year

- Making 8th main-draw appearance at Roland Garros and is into the final for the first time; her previous best tournament showing was reaching the 2023 SF (L. Muchova)
- Contesting her 28th career Grand Slam main draw; she is a 3-time Grand Slam champion (2023-2024 Australian Open and 2024 US Open) and a 2-time Grand Slam runner-up
- This fortnight marks her 1st trip to a Grand Slam final not on hard court
- Aiming to become the only active woman on tour to have won singles titles at 3 of the 4 Grand Slam events
- Has defeated Kamilla Rakhimova, Jil Teichmann, Olga Danilovic, No.16 seed Amanda Anisimova, No.8 seed Zheng Qinwen and No.5 seed Iga Swiatek so far this fortnight to make her 7th final of the season (3-3 in finals in 2025)
- Her SF victory on Thursday ended 4-time champion Swiatek's 26-match winning streak at Roland Garros
- Faces No.2 Coco Gauff in today's final; owns 48 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.5 Swiatek in the previous round
- Holds a 7-13 career record vs. players ranked inside the Top 2; in her most recent match against a Top 2 player, d. then-No.1 Swiatek in 2024 Cincinnati SF
- Owns 67-19 career tour-level record against players from the United States (9-1 in 2025)
- 3 of her 20 career WTA singles titles have come on clay: all at Madrid (2021, 2023 and 2025)
- Is currently spending her 41st week ranked World No.1; this time last year was ranked No.2
- Has won 40 main-draw matches on tour in 2025; she is ranked No.1 on tour for match-wins
- The No.1 seed has won the title here on 22 occasions, most recently Swiatek last year

CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan. Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid.
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
