Swiatek leads 8-4

Sabalenka:

- Has beaten Kamilla Rakhimova, Jil Teichmann, Olga Danilovic, Amanda Anisimova and Qinwen Zheng to reach her second SF at Roland Garros, overall, the 11th SF at Grand Slams - the most since 2020, with Iga Swiatek (7) the only other player to reach more than five SFs in this time span
- Is the first player to reach both SFs at her first two Grand Slam events as world No.1 since Simona Halep (Australian Open and Roland Garros) in 2018
- Has claimed seven WTA Top 10 wins in 2025 in the past decade, only Carla Suarez Navarro (9, in 2015) and Swiatek (8, in 2024) have claimed more WTA Top 10 wins before the end of Roland Garros
- This is their first meeting of 2025 season and second time playing each other at Grand Slams, having played at US Open 2022 (in SF, with Swiatek eventually winning the title)
- Has won 39 matches so far in 2025; she is ranked No.1 on Tour for match wins
- Has held PIF WTA World No.1 ranking since October 21, 2024; during Roland-Garros, will mark her 40th and 41st total weeks at No.1 (pushing to 33 consecutive); will hold on to No.1 ranking after tournament
- Has reached six singles finals this year – the most entering Roland Garros since 2013 (Serena Williams)
- Has won 3 titles this year – Brisbane, Miami, Madrid

Swiatek:

- The 4-time Roland Garros champion has beaten Rebecca Sramkova, Emma Raducanu, Jaqueline Cristian, Elena Rybakina, and Elina Svitolina to reach SF - the first player to reach 4+ consecutive SFs at the French Open since Maria Sharapova (2011-2014) and the youngest since Martina Hingis (1997-2001)
- Is the player with the highest winning percentage at Roland Garros in the Open Era (95.2%, 40-2), equaling Margaret Court (95.2%)
- Is the second-fastest player to claim 40 main draw wins at Roland Garros in the Open Era (equaling Bjorn Borg) - only Rafael Nadal did it in less matches (41)
- Has won her last 26 matches at Roland Garros equaling the longest winning streak at a Grand Slam event this century (26, Serena Williams at the US Open 2012-2015)
- Bidding to become the first woman in the Open Era to win Roland Garros four years running (Seles and Henin both won three straight titles)
- Has won 10 WTA clay-court titles; this is first year since 2020 that is yet to win a title heading into Roland Garros

[WC] Lois Boisson (FRA #361) vs. [2] Coco Gauff (USA #2)

First meeting

Boisson:

- Has beaten Elise Mertens, Anhelina Kalinina, Elsa Jacquemot, Jessica Pegula and Mirra Andreeva to reach her first career SF across all Tour level events
- The last player who reached career first SF at a Slam was Mirra Andreeva at Roland Garros 2024
- Owns 2 wins in career over Top 10 players, both coming at Roland Garros 2025, defeating No.3 Pegula and No.6 Mirra Andreeva - excluding unranked players, Lois Boisson is the second player ranked outside the Top 300 in the last 40 years to defeat multiple Top 10 opponents in a single event after Serena Williams in Chicago 1997 (vs Mary Pierce and Monica Seles)
- Is the second player in the last 40 years to defeat multiple Top 10 opponents at her maiden Grand Slam event, after Monica Seles at Roland Garros 1989 (Zina Garrison and Manuela Maleeva)
- Is the first French player to reach a Grand Slam SF since Caroline Garcia at the US Open 2022 and the first at Roland Garros since Marion Bartoli in 2011
- Is the first player in the Open Era to reach SF at the French Open as a wild card - with a win today would become the first finalist as a wild card since Justine Henin at the Australian Open 2010
- Excluding unranked players, Boisson is the lowest ranked (#361) to reach a Grand Slam SF in the last 40 years; previously the lowest ranked player (No.131) to reach SF at Roland Garros was Nadia Podoroska in 2020
- Will reach a career-high ranking after the tournament, climbing as high as No.65 by reaching SF and as high as No.35 with a win today

Gauff:

- Has beaten Olivia Gadecki, Tereza Valentova, Marie Bouzkova, Ekaterina Alexandrova and Madison Keys to reach her 5th Grand Slam SF - is the youngest USA player (21 years and 73 days) to reach back-to-back SFs at Roland Garros since Andrea Jaeger (16 years and 354 days) in 1982
- Is the youngest player to reach back-to-back SFs at Roland Garros since Ana Ivanovic (20 years and 202 days) in 2008
- Has claimed her 25th win at Roland Garros, becoming the youngest player to achieve as many wins at the event since Martina Hingis (19 years and 241 days) in 2000
- Also, the youngest player to claim 25+ wins at a single Grand Slam event since Maria Sharapova (20 years and 270 days) at the Australian Open in 2008
- Lost her most recent match against a wild card, losing to Belinda Bencic in Indian Wells (R16) this year
- One of her 9 career WTA singles titles has come on clay (2021 Parma); she also reached both of this year's WTA 1000 clay court finals at Madrid and Rome

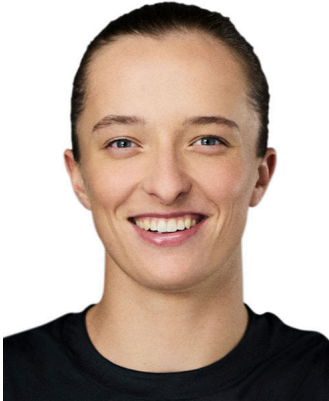

- Has beaten Kamilla Rakhimova, Jil Teichmann, Olga Danilovic, Amanda Anisimova and Qinwen Zheng to reach her 2nd SF at Roland Garros, overall the 11th SF at Grand Slams - the most since 2020, with Iga Swiatek (7) the only other player to reach more than five SFs in this time span
- Is the first player to reach both SFs at her first two Grand Slam events as world No.1 since Simona Halep (Australian Open and Roland Garros) in 2018
- Faces No.5 Iga Swiatek in SF today; has claimed 7 WTA Top 10 wins in 2025 - in the past decade, only Carla Suarez Navarro (9, in 2015) and Iga Swiatek (8, in 2024) have claimed more WTA Top 10 wins before the end of Roland Garros
- Owns 10-8 career record against players from Poland (0-0 in 2025), having played today's opponent Swiatek 12 times and won four of them, including their most recent meeting in SF at Cincinnati 2024
- This is their first meeting of 2025 season and second time playing each other at Grand Slams, having played at US Open 2022 (in SF, with Swiatek winning the title)
- Record in SF matches at Grand Slams stands at 5-5
- Is currently ranked No.1; this time last year was ranked No.2
- No.1 seed has won the title here on 22 occasions, most recently Swiatek last year
- Has won 39 matches so far in 2025; she is ranked No.1 on tour for match wins

- Contesting her 25th Grand Slam main draw; she is a 5-time Grand Slam champion (also won the 2022 US Open along with her 4 Roland Garros titles)
- Has beaten Rebecca Sramkova, Emma Raducanu, Jaqueline Cristian, Elena Rybakina and Elina Svitolina to reach SF - the first player to reach 4+ SFs at the French Open since Maria Sharapova (2011-2014) and the youngest since Martina Hingis (1997-2001)
- Is the player with the highest winning percentage at Roland Garros in Women's Singles in the Open Era (95.2%, 40-2), equaling Margaret Court (95.2%)
- Has won her last 26 matches at Roland Garros equaling the longest winning streak at a Grand Slam event this Century (26, Serena Williams at the US Open 2012-2015)
- Faces No.1 Aryna Sabalenka in SF today, having won 8 of their previous 12 meetings, and 5 of the previous 6 on clay courts (only loss in final at Madrid 2023) - 5 were in finals and one in SF
- Record in SF matches at Grand Slams stands at 5-2
- Including her 4 Roland Garros victories, owned won 10 clay court titles: also Stuttgart in 2022 and 2023; Madrid in 2024; and Rome in 2021, 2022 and 2024
- Bidding to become the first woman in the Open Era to win Roland Garros four years running (Seles and Henin both won three straight titles also)
- Is currently ranked No.5; this time last year was ranked No.1

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CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan. Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid.
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- Rose to career-high No.2 in rankings on August 23, 2021
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10
- Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitová in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Shenzhen in doubles (w/Mertens), going 1-2 in the round-robin stage
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2018, lifting two titles, at New Haven (d. Suarez Navarro in F) and Wuhan (d. Kontaveit in F), winning 46 matches and finishing at No.11 in the rankings
- Claimed five titles in 2024, making it a three-peat at Roland-Garros and also winning Doha, Indian Wells, Madrid and Rome. Crossed \$30m in prize money and qualified for her fourth WTA Finals
