MATCH NOTES - DAY 1 - MONDAY, JUNE 30

[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. (Q) Carson Branstine (CAN) #194)

First meeting

Sabalenka:

- The world No.1 is making 6th appearance at Wimbledon, previously reaching SF in 2023 (I. Jabeur) and 2021 (I. Ka.Pliskova)
- Own three singles titles at Grand Slams, winning Australian Open (2024-2023) and US Open 2024; also reached another three finals at Roland Garros 2025 (I. Gauff), Australian Open 2025 (I. Keys) and US Open 2023 (I. Gauff)
 the most finals reached at Slams among all active players, followed by Azarenka (5) and Swiatek (5)
- Is playing Wimbledon as No.1 seed for the first time in her career and 3rd consecutive Grand Slam as seed No.1
- Record in 1r matches at Grand Slams stands at 23-5 hasn't lost one opening match since Australian Open 2020 (I. Suarez Navarro in 1r)
- Looking for her first grass court title after reaching two finals: Eastbourne in 2018 and 's-Hertogenbosch in 2022

Branstine:

- Making tournament debut at Wimbledon; also her main draw debut across all Grand Slams, having played Roland Garros 2025 in qualifying
- Owns one main draw win in her career which came on grass at 's-Hertogenbosch 2025 (d. No.1 seed Samsonova in Ir)
- As a qualifier, has beaten Boisson, Andreescu and Serban to reach this year's main draw
- First time facing a Top 10 opponent career best win by ranking is defeating No.18 Samsonova at 's-Hertogenbosch 2025
- Best career result on grass is R16 at 's-Hertogenbosch 2025 (as qualifier, I. Ruse)

Paolini leads 2-0

Siniakova leads 1-0

[4] Jasmine Paolini (ITA #5) vs. Anastasija Sevastova (LAT #402)

Paolini:

- Making 5th main draw appearance at Wimbledon; lost 1r in first three main draw showings (twice to former champion Kvitova) before reaching the final in 2024 (I. Krejcikova)
- Reached back-to-back Grand Slam finals last year at Roland Garros (I. Swiatek) and Wimbledon
- Contesting her 23rd Grand Slam main draw of career; she is 10-12 in Grand Slam 1r matches overall, but 6-0 in Grand Slam 1r matches since 2023
- Since the start of 2024, Paolini is 13-0 vs. players ranked outside the Top 100
- One of 5 women to have reached 3r or better at each of the last six Grand Slam events (along with Iga Swiatek, Elina Svitolina, Coco Gauff and Paula Badosa)

Sevastova:

- Making 9th main draw appearance at Wimbledon; this is her first showing at the event since 2021, when she reached a career best 3r (I. Krejcikova)
- Contesting her 35th Grand Slam main draw and her first since the 2022 Australian Open
- Career best Grand Slam result is making the 2018 US Open SF (I. S. Williams); also made US Open QF in 2016 and 2017
- Holds 3-15 career record vs. Top 5 players; her last Top 5 win was over defending champion Stephens in 2018 US Open QF (Sevastova had lost to Stephens at 2017 US Open)
- One of her 4 career WTA singles titles has come on grass (2017 Mallorca)

Katerina Siniakova (CZE #81) vs. [5] Qinwen Zheng (CHN #6)

Siniakova:

- Making 10th appearance at Wimbledon, where her previous best result was reaching 3r in 2024 (I. Putintseva), 2021 (I. Barty), 2018 (I. Giorgi) and 2016 (I. A. Radwanska)
- Is a three-time Wimbledon doubles champion, winning doubles title in 2024 (w/Townsend), 2022 and 2021 (both w/Krejcikova)
- Is making 42nd Grand Slam main draw appearance, ranked No.1 on tour among active players (tied with Putintseva)
- Best result at any major was R16 run at Roland Garros (I. Keys) in 2019
- Owns 9 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently against today's opponent No.8 Zheng at Berlin 2024

Zheng:

- Making 4th appearance at Wimbledon, where her previous best result was reaching 3r in 2022 (I. eventual champion Rybakina)
- Best result across all Grand Slams was R-Up at Australian Open 2024 (I. Sabalenka in F); also made two QFs at US Open 2024 and Roland Garros 2025 (both I. Sabalenka)
- Record against opponents outside Top 50 stands at 7-1 in 2025, with the only loss coming to No.97 Siegemund at Australian Open 2025
- Record in 1r matches at Grand Slams stands at 12-2, with the only two losses both coming at Wimbledon 2023 (I. Siniakova) and 2024 (I. Sun)
- Best career result on grass is SF run at London 2025 (I. Anisimova)

Elena-Gabriela Ruse (ROU #58) vs. [6] Madison Keys (USA #8)

Ruse:

- Pushed today's opponent Keys in three sets at this year's Australian Open, which Keys went on to win
- Looking for third career win over a Top 10 opponent, having most recently posted a win over No.8 Krejcikova at 2024 US Open
- Best win by ranking this season has been over No.27 Frech at Miami
- Is currently ranked No.58; this time last year was ranked No.152

Keys:

- Has never lost a first round match at Wimbledon (10-0)
- Among the 2025 field, only Kvitova and Azarenka have played and won more matches at Wimbledon than Keys (25-10 record)
- Owns three grass court titles, having won at Eastbourne twice (2014 & 2023) and Birmingham once (2016)
- Looking to become the first woman to win the Australian Open and Wimbledon in the same year since Serena Williams in 2015

[9] Paula Badosa (ESP #9) vs. Katie Boulter (GBR #43)

Badosa:

- Achieved Grand Slam breakthrough at this year's Australian Open, when she advanced to semifinals for the first time (I. Sabalenka)
- This time last year was ranked No.93 after an injury-stricken 2023 (back injury); worked her way back to No.12 by end of 2024 and was named WTA Comeback Player of the Year
- Solid record at Wimbledon has seen her reach R16 on three of five previous outings
- Advanced to QF at Berlin a couple of weeks ago, but retired after the first set with a hip injury

Boulter:

- British No.2 (relinquished top spot to Raducanu after Queen's, London earlier this month)
- One of 10 players from the host nation in the Wimbledon field this year most in contention since 1992 when none of the 11 progressed further than 2r (Clare Wood, Shirli-Ann Siddall, Sarah Loosemore, Valda Lake, Monique Javer, Colette Hall, Virginia Humphrey-Davies, Amanda Grunfield, Sara Gomer, Jo Durie, Sarah Bentley)
- Looking for her fourth career win over a Top 10 opponent, having most recently defeated No.5 Pegula at 2024 United Cup
- Was on a 12-match winning streak on the lawns of Nottingham, taking in titles in 2023-24, until eventual champion McCartney Kessler ended her run in the quarterfinals at this year's event
- Heads into today's match with 11-5 record in Grand Slam first round matches

Anna Bondar (HUN #75) vs. [14] Elina Svitolina (UKR #13)

Bondar:

- Making third Wimbledon main draw appearance and looking to reach 2r for the first time (fell first round in 2022 & 2023
- Best result across Slams is 2r which she has reached three times: 2023 Australian Open, 2024 US Open and 2025 Roland Garros (I. Svitolina in 2r Roland Garros in their only previous meeting)
- Owns one career win over Top 20 players: Karolina Pliskova at 2023 Rome
- Best career result on grass is R32 which she has reached once: Bad Homburg in 2022

Svitolina:

- Two-time Wimbledon semifinalist making her 11th main draw appearance here
- Has a 7-3 record in Wimbledon opening matches
- Has reached the quarterfinals of both Australian Open and Roland Garros so far this season; she has never managed the quarterfinals of the Australian Open, Roland Garros and Wimbledon during a single season
- Has progressed past the 1r in her last 21 Grand Slam appearances (her most recent 1r loss was 2018 Wimbledon)

Sonay Kartal (GBR #51) vs. [20] Jelena Ostapenko (LAT #21)

Kartal:

- Making 4th appearance at Wimbledon, where her previous result was reaching 3r in 2024 (as qualifier, I. Gauff), which is also her best result across all majors
- Owns 2 wins in career over Top 20 players, having defeated No.16 Daria Kasatkina at London 2025 and No.17 Beatriz Haddad Maia at Indian Wells 2025
- Best career result on grass is R16 run at Nottingham and Queen's, London in 2025
- One of 10 players from Great Britain in the starting field, first time since 1992
- Is currently ranked at a career-high of No.49; this time last year was ranked No.298

Ostapenko:

- Making 10th appearance at Wimbledon, with a best result of SF in 2018 (I. eventual champion Kerber)
- The 2017 Roland Garros champion owns 20 wins at Wimbledon, ranked No.4 for Wimbledon wins in this year's field after Kvitova (38), Azarenka (36) and Keys (25)
- Owns 10-4 career record against players from Great Britain (1-0 in 2025), having defeated today's opponent Kartal in their sole meeting last week at Eastbourne
- Record in 1r matches at Wimbledon is 7-2, with the two losses coming in 2016 (I. Bertens) and 2019 (I. Hsieh)
- Owns two singles titles on grass at Birmingham 2023 and Eastbourne 2021

[29] Leylah Fernandez (CAN #38) vs. [WC] Hannah Klugman (GBR #573)

First meeting

Fernandez:

- Has advanced to 2r at Wimbledon on two previous occasions (2023, 2024), but is yet to go further
- Owns a 13-7 record in Grand Slam first round matches
- Former Grand Slam finalist was defeated by Raducanu in final of 2021 US Open
- Ranking fell nine places this week, after dropping points from Eastbourne finals run last year (her best career result on grass to date)

Klugman:

- At 16, is one of three British teenagers who received wild cards into the draw (along with Xu and Stojsavljevic); lives locally in Wimbledon area
- Making Wimbledon and Grand Slam main draw debut, having fallen in final round of qualifying in 2024
- The highest ranked opponent she has ever defeated is No.147 Linda Fruhvirtova in 2r of Wimbledon qualifying last year
- Recently reached the final of the Roland Garros girls' singles event (I. Austria's Lilli Tagger)

Marketa Vondrousova (CZE #73) vs. [32] McCartney Kessler (USA #30) First meeting

Vondrousova:

- Former Wimbledon champion is making her 7th appearance at The Championships; she won her Grand Slam singles title here in 2023 (d. Jabeur in final)
- Won the Berlin title on grass two weeks ago, which was her first title at any level since 2023 Wimbledon (on the same day, her opponent Kessler won 2025 Nottingham title)
- Has never advanced beyond 2r at Wimbledon other than her 2023 title run (last year, I. 1r to Bouzas Maneiro in title defense)
- Women from the Czech Republic have won the last two Wimbledon singles titles: Vondrousova in 2023 and Barbora Krejcikova in 2024

Kessler:

- Making 2nd appearance at Wimbledon; she successfully qualified for last year's main draw but fell 1r (I. Sakkari)
- Contesting her 6th career Grand Slam main draw (1-4 in Grand Slam 1r matches), and is seeded at a Slam for the first time
- In this year's grass swing, earned her first tour level grass court match win at Queen's Club, then won the title the next week at Nottingham
- Is currently ranked at a career high of No.30; this time last year was ranked No.119

Emma Raducanu (GBR #40) vs. [WC] Mingge Xu (GBR #318)

Raducanu:

- Making 4th main draw appearance at Wimbledon, where she has twice reached R16, in 2021 (I. Tomljanovic) and last year (I. Sun)
- Career best Grand Slam showing is her run to the 2021 US Open title; she became the first qualifier to win a Grand Slam singles title in the Open Era
- Contesting her 13th career Grand Slam main draw; she is 10-2 in Grand Slam 1r matches
- Since the start of 2024, Raducanu is 9-2 vs. players ranked outside Top 100 (the two losses were to Sun at Wimbledon last year, and Bucsa this year in Singapore)

Xu:

- 17-year-old wild card is making Wimbledon and Grand Slam main draw debut; fell in 1r of Wimbledon qualifying in each of the last 3 years
- Won her WTA main draw debut at 2025 Nottingham by beating Volynets to make R16, which is her career best Tour level result on grass
- Seeking her first career Top 50 win in 3rd attempt (I. Linette at 2025 Nottingham; I. Stearns at 2025 Eastbourne)
- Two British women will face each other in the first round of Wimbledon for the first time since 2011 (Anne Keothavong and Naomi Broady)

Naomi Osaka (JPN #53) vs. [Q] Talia Gibson (AUS #126)

Osaka:

- Making 5th main draw appearance at Wimbledon; career best showings at this event are 3r in 2017 (I. eventual finalist V. Williams) and 2018 (I. eventual champion Kerber)
- Four time Grand Slam singles champion, all at hard court majors: 2018 and 2020 US Opens; and 2019 and 2021 Australian Opens (4-0 in Grand Slam finals)
- 9-1 this year vs. players ranked outside Top 100 (the one loss was to former Top 5 player Bencic at Australian Open, via retirement)
- Career best Tour level result on grass is reaching 2018 Nottingham SF (I. eventual champion Barty)

Gibson:


- 21-year-old is making her Wimbledon main draw debut after qualifying; she is contesting her 3rd career Grand Slam main draw and first outside Australian Open
- Career best Grand Slam result is making 2r at 2025 Australian Open as a wild card (d. Sonmez), which was also the first tour level main draw win of her career
- Seeking her career best win by ranking today (currently 0-6 vs. players ranked inside Top 90)
- This will be her first career grass court match in a tour level main draw; however, she has gone 5-3 on grass this year in WTA 125 and qualifying matches

- Best career result on Grass is Runner-Up at 'S-Hertogenbosch in 2022 and Eastbourne in 2018
- Is currently ranked No.1; this time last year was ranked No.3
- During last year's European Grass swing reached QF at Berlin
- Has won 43 matches so far in 2025; she is ranked No.1 on tour for match wins

- Including qualifying, has 6 wins on grass at tourlevel events in 2025 coming into Wimbledon (7 wins across all surfaces in total in 2025) and the only main-draw win is on grass at 's-Hertogenbosch 2025 (d. No.1 seed Samsonova in 1r)
- As a qualifier, has beaten Boisson, Andreescu and Serban to make main draw; faces No.1 Aryna Sabalenka in 1r today - first time facing a Top 10 opponent
- Career best win by ranking is defeating No.18 Samsonova at 's-Hertogenbosch 2025
- Best career result on grass is Round of 16 at 's-Hertogenbosch 2025 (as qualifier, l. Ruse)
- The best result by a qualifier at Wimbledon came in 1999 when Alexandra Stevenson advanced to SF. In 2024 New Zealand's Lulu Sun became the seventh qualifier in the Open Era to reach Wimbledon QF
- One of 2 players from Canada in main draw (along with Fernandez)
- Best result by Canada at Wimbledon was Runner-Up run by Eugenie Bouchard in 2014

CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan. Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid.
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament

CAREER MILESTONES

- Returned to play in 2024 following maternity leave and reached the QF at Doha and 's-Hertogenbosch, as well as R16 at Rome and Beijing
- Played 2022 Tokyo in September before taking a 15 month break to give birth to daughter Shai in early July 2023

In 2022 had success at Miami, where she fell to Swiatek in the final, her first final since the 2021 Australian Open. Also reached the semifinals at Melbourne 250 #1 (withdrew before semifinal with Kudermetova w/abdominal injury)

- Won 2021 Australian Open (d. Brady in F) to become first woman since Seles in the early 1990s to win each of her first four Grand Slam finals - is the 16th woman to win four or more majors in the Open Era
- At 2020 US Open, came from a set and a break down to Azarenka and win third Grand Slam title of career
- Also last season was R-Up at Western & Southern Open - withdrew w/left hamstring injury before final against Azarenka
- Won second Grand Slam at Australian Open (d. Kvitova in F); became first Japanese player to reach World No.1 ranking following the tournament
- In addition, won back-to-back titles for first time in her career at Osaka (d. Pavlyuchenkova in F) and Beijing (d. Barty in F); defeated No.1 Barty in Beijing final for second career victory over world No.1 (also beat Halep at 2018 Indian Wells)
- Enjoyed break-out season in 2018, posting a 40-20 record resulting in a No.5 (first Top 10 season), up from No.68 in 2017
- Won the first two titles of her career in 2018, at Indian Wells (d. Kasatkina in F) and debut Grand Slam crown at US Open (d. S.Williams in F)
- En route to the Indian Wells title, defeated fivetime major champion Sharapova, and A.Radwanska, Ka.Pliskova and Halep. Only set dropped all fortnight was against Sakkari in R16
- Reached one further final in 2018, at Tokyo [PPO] (l. Ka.Pliskova)
- In reaching R16 at 2018 Australian Open, became youngest Japanese player to reach R16 at a Slam since Sugiyama at 1995 Roland Garros (19y, 342d) and the youngest player from Japan to reach R16 in Melbourne since Date in 1990 (197, 122d)

- Broke into Top 200 on April 1, 2024 and Top 150 on September 16, 2024. Won three further titles on ITF circuit in 2024 and made it to the final round of qualifying at both Wimbledon and US Open
- In 2023 played first main draw Tour level matches at Hobart and Australian Open

In 2022 contested qualifying at Australian Open and claimed first ITF titles at W15 Rancho Santa Fe and W15 Caloundra (x2)

Played first ITF tournaments in 2019 and 2020

- Book-ended 2017 season with QF showings at Auckland and Hong Kong; other highlights included 3r runs at Wimbledon and US Open
- Scored first Top 5 win of career when she defeated No.5 V.Williams at 2017 Hong Kong. Upset win over defending champion and No.6ranked Kerber at 2017 US Open marked first career Top 10 win
- Voted 2016 WTA Newcomer of the Year; highlight was career-first WTA final at Tokyo [PPO] (l. Wozniacki). Also reached QF on three occasions and 3r at Australian Open, Roland Garros and US Open
- Ranked No.406, made WTA main draw debut at 2014 Stanford. As an alternate, won through qualifying (achieving first WTA qualifying wins), and came from match point down to shock No.19 Stosur in 1r of main draw, before losing to No.18 Petkovic in 2r
- Made WTA qualifying debut at Quebec City in 2013 (l. Dabrowski)
