**First meeting** 

#### M. Andreeva:

- Andreeva is the first teenager to reach the QF at Wimbledon since Victoria Azarenka and Sabine Lisicki in 2009
- Based on tournament end date, Andreeva (18 years, 75 days old) would become the youngest player to reach the Wimbledon QF since 2007 (Nicole Vaidisova at 18 years, 75 days old also)

- Projected to move into the PIF WTA Rankings Top 5 (unless Andreeva loses in QF and Anisimova wins title)
- Making 3rd main draw appearance at Wimbledon; through to the QF at a Slam for the third time both at Roland Garros 2024 (SF) and 2025 (QF)
- Best career result on grass is a QF appearance at Bad Homburg in 2025
- Only Sabalenka (47) and Swiatek (39) have won more WTA level main draw matches than M.Andreeva (36) in 2025
- After defeating No.10 Emma Navarro in R16 now owns 10 wins over Top 10 opponents, including 6 this year (6-4 record)
- Only Sabalenka (8), Gauff (7) have more Top 10 wins this year than Andreeva (6); Swiatek also has 6

#### Bencic:

- Making her 9th appearance at Wimbledon; previous best result was R16 in 2023, 2018, and 2015
- Through to QF at a Slam for 4th time with all 3 previous QF appearance at US Open QF in 2014 and 2021 and SF in 2019
- Is the fourth player competing for Switzerland to reach this stage at the Championships in Women's Singles in the Open Era after Martina Hingis (1997, 1998 and 2000), Timea Bacsinszky (2015) and Viktorija Golubic (2021).
- Looking to be the second Swiss woman to reach the semifinals at Wimbledon Martina Hingis (1998, SF; 1997, Won)
- Owns one grass-court title, winning 10 years ago at Eastbourne in 2015
- 1 of 9 moms in draw at Wimbledon this year
- Started the year ranked No.489; projected to move to No.23 with QF and would return to the Top 20 with a win today
- Has been on court 8 hours, 2 minutes nearly 3 hours more than Andreeva

### [8] Iga Swiatek (POL #4) vs. [19] Liudmila Samsonova (#19)

### Swiatek leads 4-0

#### Swiatek:

- Playing in 26th main draw of a Slam (6th time at Wimbledon main draw)
- Through to QF for 12th time at a Slam and second time at Wimbledon (also in 2023)
- Bidding for 9th SF appearance at a Slam (and first at Wimbledon)
- Along with Sabalenka, Swiatek is the only other player to reach QF at all three Grand Slams played in 2025
- Holds 8-3 record in Grand Slam QF matches, having won her last two appearances at Roland Garros and Australian Open in 2025
- Lowest ranked losses at Grand Slam QF have come in against No.76 Svitolina at 2023 Wimbledon and against No.18 Sakkari at 2021 Roland Garros
- Would be the fourth active player to reach the SF at all four Slams along with Aryna Sabalenka, Victoria Azarenka and Karolina Pliskova
- Reached first final of the season the week before Wimbledon at Bad Homburg, her first final since 2024 Roland Garros; as a result climbed from No.8 to No.4 in this week's PIF WTA Rankings

#### Samsonova:

- Making 21st Grand Slam main draw appearance, including fourth at Wimbledon
- Having reached the QF at Wimbledon this fortnight, she is making her best Grand Slam showing to date
- With a win today, has a chance to equal her career-high ranking of No.12 (also impacted by other results)
- Has claimed nine main draw victories at Wimbledon, equaling her US Open and Berlin runs (9 each) so far in her career at WTA Tour events
- Owns 3-5 career record against Polish players, with four of those losses against Swiatek
- 2 of her 5 WTA singles titles have come on grass (2021 Berlin and 2024 's-Hertogenbosch)

#### PLAYER NOTES

- Making 3rd main draw appearance at Wimbledon, where prior to this year, her best result was reaching 4r in 2023
- Has beaten Mayar Sherif, Lucia Bronzetti, Hailey Baptiste and Emma Navarro so far this week to reach her first QF since QF at Bad Homburg 2025
- Andreeva (18 years, 75 days) is the youngest player to reach the Wimbledon QF since 2007 (Nicole Vaidisova at 18 years, 75 days also)
- She could become the fourth player in 2000s to reach the Women's Singles semi-finals in Wimbledon before turning 19 after Serena Williams (2000), Jelena Dokic (2000) and Maria Sharapova (2004 and 2005)
- Only Aryna Sabalenka and Iga Swiatek (10 each) have reached more WTA level quarter-finals than Mirra Andreeva (eight) in 2025
- Faces No.35 Belinda Bencic in QF today; owns 43 wins in career over Top 50 players, most recently No.10 Emma Navarro at Wimbledon 2025
- First career Tour-level match against a player from Switzerland
- Record in Tour-level QF matches stands at 6-9 (0-1 on grass)
- Prior to her current run at Wimbledon, her best career result on grass was Quarter-Finalist which she had reached once: Bad Homburg in 2025
- Looking to reach her first career WTA level grass court semi-final, becoming the youngest player to make a SF on this surface since Ana Konjuh in Nottingham 2015
- Is currently ranked No.7; this time last year was ranked No.23
- During last year's European grass swing reached 1r at Wimbledon and 1r at Bad Homburg
- Has won 36 Tour-level matches so far in 2025; she is ranked No.3 on Tour for match wins, behind Aryna Sabalenka (47) and Iga Swiatek (39)

- Making 9th main draw appearance at Wimbledon, where, prior to this year, her best result was reaching 4r in 2023, 2018 and 2015
- Has beaten Alycia Parks, Elsa Jacquemot, Elisabetta Cocciaretto and Ekaterina Alexandrova so far this week to reach her first QF since QF at Indian Wells 2025 (l. No.5 Madison Keys)
- Faces No.7 Mirra Andreeva in QF today; owns 34 Tour-level wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.3 Coco Gauff at Indian Wells 2025
- Has won four of her previous eight meetings against top-10 opponent on grass - however, she lost the most recent two in Berlin 2022 (vs Ons Jabeur via RET) and Wimbledon 2023 (vs Iga Swiatek)
- Record in Tour-level QF matches stands at 28-22 (6-1 on grass)
- Best career result on grass is Champion which she has reached once: Eastbourne in 2015 (d. No.13 Agnieszka Radwanska)
- Only player from Switzerland to reach QF
- Best result by Switzerland at Wimbledon was a Champion run by Martina Hingis in 1997
- First time a player from Switzerland reached QF at Wimbledon since Viktorija Golubic in 2021
- Overall, she is the fourth player competing for Switzerland to reach quarter-finals at the Championships in Women's Singles in the Open Era after Martina Hingis (1997, 1998 and 2000), Timea Bacsinszky (2015) and Viktorija Golubic (2021) - only Hingis in 1997 and 1998 made the semi-finals
- Is currently ranked No.35; started the year ranked No.489

## **CAREER MILESTONES**

- Reached first two WTA finals of career in 2024 winning the title at Iasi and finishing runner-up at Ningbo
- Made first Grand Slam semifinal at 2024 Roland Garros beating World No.2 Aryna Sabalenka in the quarterfinals
- Made Top 20 debut on October 8, 2024 finishing the year at World No.16. Also won 2024 Paris Olympic silver medal in women s doubles with Diana Shnaider
- Opened 2023 season in April by winning 13 matches straight to claim back-to-back ITF titles in Switzerland; as WC, advanced to R16 at Madrid with wins over Fernandez, Haddad Maia and Linette (l. Sabalenka); subsequently made debut at Roland Garros (as qualifier, l. Gauff in 3r), Wimbledon (as qualifier, l. Keys in R16) and US Open (l. eventual champion Gauff in 2r)
- Also in 2023 reached R16 at Beijing (l. Rybakina), leading to Top 50 debut (started season just inside Top 300); voted WTA Newcomer of the Year
- In 2022, posted 39-9 win-loss record on ITF Circuit, winning first four titles at this level
- Fell 1r on WTA main-draw debut at 2022 Monastir (as WC, l. Potapova)
- Made professional debut at W15 ITF Circuit event at Sharm El-Sheikh in February 2022
- Owns six ITF Circuit singles titles
- As a junior, finished R-Up at 2023 Australian Open (l. Korneeva)

- After giving birth to daughter Bella, returned to the courts in October 2024 to play a handful of ITF matches, as well as winning her Billie Jean King Cup Playoff match for Switzerland over Serbia's Lola Radivojevic in November
- Played last tournament of 2023 at San Diego before taking maternity leave
- In 2023, won two titles at Adelaide 2 (d. Kasatkina in F) and Abu Dhabi (d. Samsonova in F); also finished R-Up at Charleston (l. Jabeur)
- Won sixth career title in 2022, triumphing at Charleston, while finishing R-Up at Berlin (l. Jabeur) and helped Switzerland lift Billie Jean King Cup Finals in Glasgow; also reached SF at Miami (l. Osaka) and Tallinn (l. Krejcikova) Captured gold medal for Switzerland at Tokyo Olympics in 2021 (d. Vondrousova in F); also claimed silver in doubles (w/Golubic)
- Other 2021 highlights included R-Up finish at Adelaide (l. Swiatek) and Berlin (l. Samsonova), and six further QFs (including US Open)
- Across a disrupted 2020 reached three QFs, at Adelaide, St. Petersburg and Doha
- Was voted WTA Comeback Player of the Year in 2019 - lifted two titles at Dubai (d. Kvitova in F) and Moscow (d. Pavlyuchenkova in F) and posted a career-best 49 Tour-level match wins in 2019 fourth most among all players and breaking back into Top 10 on September 9
- Earned spot at WTA Finals in Shenzhen becoming first Swiss player to compete in singles at the WTA Finals since Hingis in 2006, going on to reach SF at the season-ending showpiece (l. Svitolina)
- Also in 2019, marked 20th Grand Slam main draw by reaching her maiden major SF at US Open (l. eventual champion Andreescu) and finished R-Up at Mallorca (l. Kenin)
- Led the WTA with six victories over Top 5 players in 2019, including upsets over No.1 Naomi Osaka at Indian Wells, Madrid and US Open
- Standout result in 2018 was R-Up finish at Luxembourg (as qualifier, l. Goerges)
- In first round at 2018 Australian Open, defeated No.5 Venus Williams. Having also upset then-No.1 Serena Williams in SF at 2015 Toronto is one of seven women to defeat both Williams sisters before their 21st birthday (also Hingis, Sharapova, Clijsters, Henin, Chakvetadze and Osaka)
- Underwent left wrist surgery in spring 2017, missing five months - ranking fell outside Top

300; reached QF at Linz as WC in first WTA event back after surgery

- Run to 2016 St. Petersburg final (l. Vinci in F) saw her break into Top 10 at No.9 for the first time in her career. Also in 2016, reached SF at Sydney and [] s-Hertogenbosch.
- Won first career titles in 2015 at Eastbourne (d. Radwanska in F) and Toronto (d. Halep in F); also reached final at 
   S-Hertogenbosch (l. Giorgi) and Tokyo (l. Radwanska)
- At Toronto, beat four Top 10 players en route to the title including World No.1 Serena Williams
- Qualified for 2015 WTA Elite Trophy in Zhuhai however withdrew due to hand injury
- Won second WTA doubles title of career in 2015 at Washington, DC (w/Mladenovic), the first coming earlier in the year at Prague(w/Siniakova)
- Voted 2014 WTA Newcomer of the Year after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Tianjin (l. Riske), SF at Charleston and QF run at 2014 US Open (defeated No.7 Kerber in 3r, No.10 Jankovic in R16); at 17 years of age, was youngest player through to last eight at Flushing Meadows since 1997 when Hingis won the title and broke into Top 50 on Sept 8, 2014
- Won junior singles titles at Roland Garros and Wimbledon in 2013; was named ITF Junior World Champion for 2013
- Played first WTA qualifying event at Luxembourg in October 2011, and first WTA main draw 12 months later at same event as WC (l. V.Williams, 1r); only 15 years, 7 months at the time
- Also in 2022, played qualifying at Brussels and s-Hertogenbosch
- Made professional debut on ITF circuit in 2011; owns five career ITF titles

## **CAREER MILESTONES**

- Claimed five titles in 2024, making it a threepeat at Roland-Garros and also winning Doha, Indian Wells, Madrid and Rome. Crossed \$30m in prize money and qualified for her fourth WTA Finals
- Won six titles across 2023, including winning fourth Grand Slam title at Roland-Garros (d. Muchova in F) and going undefeated at the WTA Finals in Cancun (d. Pegula in F). Finished season as WTA World No.1 player for second consecutive year.
- In 2022, lifted second and third Grand Slam titles, at Roland-Garros (d. Gauff in F) and US Open (d. Jabeur in F)
- Triumph in Paris was the last of six straight titles during 37-match winning streak - jointlongest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990
- Won two titles in 2021, at Adelaide and Rome. Other highlights included QF at Roland-Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage)
- Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland-Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, l. Krejcikova/Siniakova)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland - man or woman - to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since A.Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Ranked No.54, she became the lowest-ranked woman to win the Roland-Garros title in the Open Era and the lowest-ranked finalist since 1977 (No.56 Mihai). At 19y 132d, is the youngest champion in Paris since Monica Seles (18y 187d) in 1992
- Also became the first player to win her debut Tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Jelena Ostapenko at 2017 Roland-Garros
- Won WTA Most Improved Player of the Year for 2020, as voted on by members of the media. Also won the 2020 WTA Fan Favorite Award
