[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. Marie Bouzkova (CZE #48)

Sabalenka leads 2-1

Sabalenka:

- Making 6th appearance at Wimbledon, where her previous best result was reaching SF in 2023 (I. Jabeur) and 2021 (I. Ka.Pliskova)
- Record against opponents outside Top 20 is 28-4 in 2025, with the most recent loss coming to No. 164 Vondrousova at Berlin 2025
- Record in 2r matches at Grand Slams is 19-4 (2-1 at Wimbledon)
- With a win today will face 2021 US Open champion Raducanu or 2023 Wimbledon champion Vondrousova in 3r
- Is currently ranked No.1; is playing Wimbledon as No.1 seed for the first time in her career and 3rd consecutive Grand Slam as seed No.1

Bouzkova:

- Making 6th appearance at Wimbledon and posted her best result in 2022 with QF (I. eventual R-Up Jabeur) also her best result across all majors
- Has beaten Lulu Sun in 1r to score first win on grass of 2025 season, raising her record in opening matches at Wimbledon to 5-1 only loss to Zvonareva in 2021
- Is playing world No.1 for the 4th time, having failed all previous meetings (I. Swiatek at Roland Garros 2024, Sabalenka at Brisbane 2024, Barty at Yarra Valley Classic 2021)
- Career best win by ranking was defeating world No.3 three times Svitolina at Guangzhou 2019, Pegula at Cincinnati 2023 and today's opponent Sabalenka at Washington DC 2024 (en route to final)
- Best career result on grass is QF run at Wimbledon 2022 and Birmingham 2021

[4] Jasmine Paolini (ITA #5) vs. Kamilla Rakhimova (#80)

Paolini:

- Making 5th main draw appearance at Wimbledon; lost 1r in first three main draw showings (twice to former champion Kvitova) before reaching the final in 2024 (I. Krejcikova)
- Has beaten Anastasija Sevastova in 1r; she is 7-0 in Grand Slam 1r matches after 2023 (11-12 in total)
- Record against opponents outside Top 20 is 15-3 in 2025 season, with the most recent loss to No.61 Jabeur at Berlin
- Record in 2r matches at Grand Slams is 6-4 (1-0 at Wimbledon)
- Has won 28 tour-level matches so far in 2025

Rakhimova:

- Making 2nd appearance at Wimbledon and previously reached 1r as a qualifier in 2023 (I. Bucsa)
- Her QF run at Eastbourne last week is her career best result on grass
- Has beaten Aoi Ito to score her first main draw win at Wimbledon
- Looking for her first win against a Top 10 opponent, having failed in all seven previous meetings against such players

Olga Danilovic (SRB #37) vs. [6] Madison Keys (USA #8)

Danilovic:

- Has advanced to 2r at Wimbledon for the first time record in Grand Slam 2r matches currently stands at 4-3
- Looking for fourth career win over a Top 10 opponent, having most recently defeated No.6 Pegula at this year's Australian Open
- Including Pegula, has a 3-1 record against American opponents this year with other wins being over Parks (Cluj-Napoca) and Collins (Roland Garros)
- Former Wimbledon girls' doubles champion, winning with Slovenia's Kaja Juvan in 2017

Keys:

- Record in 2r matches at Wimbledon stands at 8-2 hasn't lost at this stage in SW19 since 2019
- Before heading to Wimbledon, lost to the eventual champions on grass at both Queen's (Maria, SF) and Berlin (Vondrousova, 1r)
- Looking to become the first woman to win the Australian Open and Wimbledon in the same year since Serena Williams in 2015
- Winner of three grass court titles, having won at Eastbourne twice (captured first WTA title of career in 2014 and also 2023) and Birmingham once (2016)

Anisimova leads 2-0

Renata Zarazua (MEX #71) vs. [13] Amanda Anisimova (USA #12)

Zarazua:

- Making her 2nd main draw appearance at Wimbledon and is through to 2r for the first time after falling 1r as a lucky loser last year to Raducanu
- Faces No.12 Amanda Anisimova in 2r today; looking for her first career win over a Top 20 player
- Best result by Mexico at Wimbledon were the R32 runs by Angelica Gavaldon in 1995, Angelica Gavaldon in 1990
- Is the only player from Mexico to feature in the main draw

Anisimova:

- Making her 4th appearance at Wimbledon, where her best result was reaching the quarterfinal in 2022 (I. Halep)
- Defeated Yulia Putintseva so far this week with a 60 60 victory
- Faces No.71 Renata Zarazua in their first main draw Tour level match and also their first meeting on grass
- Best career result on grass is reaching the finals at Queen's this year (I. Maria in final)

[Q] Aliaksandra Sasnovich (#107) vs. [14] Elina Svitolina (UKR #13)

Sasnovich leads 2-1

Sasnovich:

- Making 8th appearance at Wimbledon, where her previous best result was reaching 4r in 2018 (l. Ostapenko), which is also her best run across all majors, having also done so at Roland Garros 2022 (l. Trevisan)
- Owns 22 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.18 Ekaterina Alexandrova at Rome 2024
- Career best win by ranking is defeating today's opponent No.4 Svitolina at Brisbane 2019
- Best career result on grass is SF run at 'S-Hertogenbosch in 2023

Svitolina:

- Making 11th appearance at Wimbledon, where her best results were reaching SF in 2019 (I. Halep) and 2023 (I. Vondrousova), which is also her best run at all majors ,along with SF run at US Open 2019 (I. S. Williams)
- Is playing her second event on grass of 2025 season, having reached 2r at Bad Homburg (I. Haddad Maia)
- Last time she lost to an opponent outside Top 100 was to No. 112 Wozniacki at Bad Homburg 2024
- Her Wimbledon SFs are her best career grass court results, also Ukraine's best result at Wimbledon
- Has won 29 matches so far in 2025 including winning the title at Rouen

[Q] Diane Parry (FRA #118) vs. [12] Diana Shnaider (#15)

Parry:

- In her fourth Wimbledon main draw appearance is looking to equal her best previous result with 3r in 2022 (I. Jabeur)
- Owns one career win over a Top 20 player: No.2 Barbora Krejickova at Roland Garros 2022
- Best career result on grass is SF which she has reached once: Nottingham in 2024

Shnaider:

- Making 2nd main draw appearance at Wimbledon, where her previous result was reaching 3r in 2024 (I. Navarro)
- Her best Slam result is 4r at 2024 US Open
- Owns one grass court title: Bad Homburg in 2024
- Her last loss to a player ranked outside the Top 100 was to No.256 Soboleva at Roland Garros this year

Marketa Vondrousova (CZE #73) vs. Emma Raducanu (GBR #40)

Vondrousova leads 2-1

Vondrousova:

- One of the four Wimbledon champions in this year's main draw Kvitova (2014, 2011), Krejcikova (2024), Rybakina (2022)
- Is 8-4 against Top 50 players so far in 2025, on a 6-match winning streak against such opponents, defeating five Top 50 players at Berlin en route to title (including No.1 Sabalenka and No.7 Keys) and No.30 McCartney Kessler here in 1r at Wimbledon 2025
- Record in 2r matches at Grand Slams is 10-7 (1-1 at Wimbledon)
- Won the Berlin title on grass two weeks ago, which was her first title at any level since 2023 Wimbledon (on the same day, her opponent Kessler won 2025 Nottingham title)

Raducanu:

- The 2021 US Open champion is making 4th main-draw appearance at Wimbledon, where she has twice reached R16 in 2021 (I. Tomljanovic) and last year (I. Sun)
- Defeated Mingge (Mimi) Xu in 1r, raising her record in Grand Slam 1r matches to 11-3
- Record against opponents outside Top 50 is 7-3 in 2025, with the most recent loss to No. 51 Joint at Eastbourne
- Record in 2r matches at Grand Slams is 4-6 (2-1 at Wimbledon)
- Owns 6-3 career record against players from Czech Republic (0-2 in 2025), playing today's opponent Vondrousova for the 4th time, having won their only meeting on grass at Wimbledon 2021 (1-2 overall)
- Career best Grand Slam showing is her run to the 2021 US Open title; she became the first qualifier to win a Grand Slam singles title in the Open Era

Katie Boulter (GBR #43) vs. Solana Sierra (ARG #101)

Boulter:

- Competing in her 7th main draw a Wimbledon, her best result is 3r which she reached in 2022 (I. Harmony Tan) and 2023 (I. Rybakina)
- Is undefeated against players ranked outside the Top 100 so far this season; her last such loss was to No.155 Sofia Kenin at 2024 Tokyo
- Has faced a player from Argentina at Tour level only once before defeating Nadia Podoroska at this year's United Cup
- Her first round win over No.9 Badosa was the fourth Top 10 win of her career three of those wins came on grass (No.7 Pliskova at 2022 Eastbourne & 2022 Wimbledon)

Sierra:

- Making her main draw debut at Wimbledon after playing qualifying in 2024; entered the main draw as lucky loser following the withdrawal of Greet Minnen
- Defeated Olivia Gadecki in 1r to post her first Grand Slam main draw match win
- Faces No.43 Katie Boulter in 2r today; looking for her first career win over a Top 50 player
- Best result by an Argentinian player at Wimbledon was the Runner-Up run by Gabriela Sabatini in 1991
- Looking for her first Tour-level win over a player from the United Kingdom

Viktoriya Tomova (BUL #111) vs. Sonay Kartal (GBR #51)

Tomova:

- Through to 2r at Wimbledon for fourth time and looking to reach 3r at a Grand Slam for the first time in career
- Moved past Ons Jabeur in Ir, after the Tunisian retired with scoreline standing at 7-6 2-0; represents first main draw win of this grass swing, although she did win through qualifying to main draw at Berlin
- Ranking dropped 30 places this week, down from No.81, after she failed to defend points from SF run at Bad Homburg last year
- Best performance to date by a Bulgarian woman at Wimbledon was Tsvetana Pironkova's semifinal run in 2010

Kartal:

- Bidding to reach 3r at Wimbledon for the second year in a row (as qualifier, I. Gauff in 3r last year)
- Defeated No.20 seed Ostapenko in three sets to reach 2r (won first set from a 2-5 deficit) after the Latvian prevailed in their 1r encounter at Eastbourne last week
- One of seven British players (three women and four men) who won their Ir openers on Monday, which is a singleday record for the host nation in the Open Era
- This grass swing has reached 2r at London and Nottingham
- Is currently ranked No.51, just shy of career-high of No.49; this time last year was ranked No.298

Naomi Osaka (JPN #53) vs. Katerina Siniakova (CZE #81)

Osaka:

- Making 5th main draw appearance at Wimbledon; a win today would equal her best previous results of 3r in 2017 (I. eventual finalist V. Williams) and 2018 (I. eventual champion Kerber)
- Four time Grand Slam singles champion, all at hard court majors: 2018 and 2020 US Opens; and 2019 and 2021 Australian Opens (4-0 in Grand Slam finals)
- Facing Siniakova for a third time, but it will be their first meeting on grass
- Career best Tour level result on grass is reaching 2018 Nottingham SF (I. eventual champion Barty)
- This is her third grass tournament of the season after Berlin (I. Samsonova in Ir) and Bad Homburg (I. Navarro in 2r)

Siniakova:

- Making 10th appearance at Wimbledon, where her previous best result was reaching 3r in 2024 (I. Putintseva), 2021 (I. Barty), 2018 (I. Giorgi) and 2016 (I. A. Radwanska)
- Is a three-time Wimbledon doubles champion, winning doubles title in 2024 (w/Townsend), 2022 and 2021 (both w/Krejcikova)
- Is making 42nd Grand Slam main draw appearance, ranked No.1 on tour among active players (tied with Putintseva)
- Best result at any major was R16 run at Roland Garros (I. Keys) in 2019
- Posted the tenth Top 10 win of her career over No.6 Zheng in the 1r here this week
- Defeated Osaka in their most recent meeting at 2019 Roland Garros

- In 2024 made first WTA 1000 final of career at Toronto, finishing R-Up to Pegula (defeated No.3 Sabalenka en route). Also enjoyed run to R16 at Australian Open, her third time reaching that stage in Melbourne
- Played a small number of tournaments in 2023 before taking a break away from the sport after Madrid in April
- Lifted second career title at Melbourne Summer Set 2 (d. Sasnovich in F) in January 2022
- In 2022, also made SF at Charleston (l. Jabeur) and five further QFs, including at Wimbledon (l. Halep)
- Ended 2021 season with 3r run at Indian Wells to secure her fourth consecutive Top-100 finish. Best results were QF runs at Parma and Bad Homburg
- Opened 2020 with SF showing at Auckland, going on to reach 3r at US Open, Roland Garros and Doha; during Doha run, earned third career Top 10 win over No.7 Svitolina (l. Kuznetsova in 3r due to walkover)

- Posted career best Grand Slam result with SF run at 2019 Roland Garros - first player (man or woman) born in 2000s to advance to this stage of a major. Scored maiden win over a Top 5 player during 2019 Roland Garros, upsetting No.3 and defending champion Halep in QF
- Result boosted her into Top 50 for first time at No.26 on June 10, 2019
- Won maiden title at 2019 Bogota (d. Sharma in F); at 17y 222d was the youngest American to win a title since S.Williams at 1999 Indian Wells (17y 169d)

- Achieved runner-up in her opening tournament of 2024 at Auckland (l. Gauff in F) before finishing R16 at Australian Open (l. Noskova, retired due to low back injury). Reached QF at Wimbledon (l. Rybakina), 4r at Roland Garros (l. Rybakina) and 3r at US Open (l. Gauff). Ended season after US Open
- Returned to the Tour in April 2023, following birth of daughter Skai. Won Strasbourg (d. Blinkova) for a second time (also in 2020) before achieving Grand Slam results of QF at Roland Garros (l. Sabalenka) and SF at Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Vondrousova)
- 2022 season reached 3r at Australian Open (l. Azarenka) and QF at Monterrey (l. Osorio), before going on maternity leave in spring
- Highlight of 2021 was lifting 16th career title at Chicago [250]. Also made SF at Miami, Stuttgart and the Olympics (won bronze medal)
- Won her 14th and 15th titles in 2020, firstly at Monterrey (d. Bouzkova in F) and then Strasbourg (d. Rybakina in F)
- Contested her 30th consecutive major at 2020 Australian Open (streak broke by skipping 2020 US Open). Is a two-time semifinalist at Grand Slam level, at 2019 Wimbledon (l. eventual champion Halep) and 2019 US Open (l. S.Williams). Became the first woman from Ukraine to reach a major SF; on the men's, Medvedev made that stage at Roland Garros in 1993 (SF) and 1999 (R-Up)
- Highlight of 2019 was reaching the title match as defending champion at the Shiseido WTA Finals (l. Barty)
- In 2018, won 13th and most prestigious career title at 2018 WTA Finals (d. Stephens in F), after going 3-0 during round robin stage. Ended year ranked No.4. Also won titles at Rome (as defending champion, d. No.1 Halep in F), Dubai (as defending champion, d. Kasatkina in F) and Brisbane (d. Sasnovich in F)
- Enjoyed standout 2017, finishing year at No.6, winning a tour-leading five titles and posting second-most wins (53, behind Wozniacki with 60). Season culminated by qualifying for WTA Finals in Singapore, becoming first Ukrainian woman to qualify for the season-ending tournament in singles (fell at round robin stage with 1-2 record)
- In 2017, became first player to win three Premier 5 titles in a single season (Dubai, Rome, Toronto), since such tournaments were introduced in 2009

- Reached fifth WTA singles final of career at 2024 Budapest (l. Shnaider); season also highlighted by run to 3r at Rome as a qualifier (l. Kerber); first non-Top 100 season since 2016. In doubles, reached SF at Dubai (w/Siegemund).
- 2023 Grand Slam results include 1r run at Roland Garros (l. Tauson) and US Open (l. Linette), as well as 2r runs at Australian Open (l. Pegula) and Wimbledon (l. Kvitova)

- Highlights in 2022 were R-Up finishes at Melbourne Summer Set 2 (l. Anisimova) and Cleveland (l. Samsonova)
- Also made QF at St. Petersburg, Berlin and Hamburg, helping her post career-high ranking of No.29 on September 19, 2022
- Best results in 2021 were runs to QFs at Belgrade and Cleveland and R16 at Indian Wells
- Reached first WTA QF in 18 months at 2020 Palermo (as qualifier, l. Martic); also advanced to this stage at Istanbul (l. Martincova) and Linz (l. Krejcikova)
- Made 3r at 2020 US Open-defeating No.19 Vondrousova in 2r was her first Top-20 win in over a year

- Reached first Grand Slam SF in doubles at 2019 US Open (w/Kuzmova, l. Azarenka/Barty)
- In 2018, reached second career WTA final and first at a Premier tournament at Brisbane, as a qualifier - defeated No.11 Mladenovic and No.16 Sevastova en route to final (l. No.6 Svitolina)
- Also in 2018 made SF at Moscow [River Cup] and first Grand Slam R16 at Wimbledon
- First broke into Top 50 on January 29
