MATCH NOTES - DAY 7 - SUNDAY, JULY 6

[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. vs. [24] Elise Mertens (BEL #23)

Sabalenka leads 10-2

Sabalenka:

- Has reached 4r in all her last 11 Grand Slam appearances the last time she failed to reach this stage at a major was at Roland Garros 2022 (I. Giorgi in 3r)
- She is the first player to reach 4r for 11+ consecutive Grand Slam appearances since S.Williams (14 between US Open 2014 and Australian Open 2019)
- Since 2018, when she made 4r for the first time at a Slam (US Open), only Swiatek (*18 prior to 3r match here*) has made more Grand Slam R16 appearances than Sabalenka (16)
- In her 13th meeting with Mertens, has defeated no other player on Tour more (10); has faced only one other player on as many occasions Swiatek (13 in total, with a win-loss record of 5-8)
- Has won 45 WTA level main draw matches in 2025: in 2024, only four players had more at the end of the season (Swiatek, Sabalenka herself, Gauff and Zheng)
- Has won 15 Grand Slam matches in 2025, more than any other player
- Will remain No.1 after Wimbledon, regardless of results this fortnight

Mertens:

- Making 8th main draw appearance at Wimbledon, where her best previous result was reaching 4r in 2022 (I. Jabeur) and 2019 (I. Strycova)
- Career best result across all majors was semifinal at Australian Open 2018 (I. eventual champion Wozniacki)
- Looking for her first career win over the current World No.1, having failed her previous five meetings (I. Sabalenka at 2025 Stuttgart & 2025 Madrid; I. Swiatek at 2024 Stuttgart; I. Halep at 2018 Roland Garros & 2018 Madrid)
- Her most recent Top 10 win was over No.4 Pegula at 2025 Rome
- Is looking for her first Top 10 win on grass (0-3)
- Has faced no other player on Tour more than Sabalenka her next most is against Sakkari (11, with a win-loss record of 5-6)
- Owns one grass court title: 's-Hertogenbosch in 2023
- Best result by Belgium at Wimbledon was runner-up by Justine Henin in 2006 and 2001

[30] Linda Noskova (CZE #27) vs. [13] Amanda Anisimova (USA #12)

Noskova:

- In her third Wimbledon main draw appearance has reached 4r for the first time (2r in 2024; 1r in 2023)
- Best result across Slams is quarterfinal at 2024 Australian Open (I. Yastremska)
- Owns 14 wins in career over Top 20 players; her most recent and only such win on grass was over No.7 Mirra Andreeva in QF at Bad Homburg 2025
- The Wimbledon title has gone to a player from Czech Republic five times (Barbora Krejcikova in 2024, Marketa Vondrousova in 2023, Petra Kvitova in 2014 & 2011, Jana Novotna in 1998)
- Recently achieved her career best result on grass with semifinal at 2025 Bad Homburg (I. Pegula)

Anisimova:

- Making her 4th appearance at Wimbledon, where her best result was reaching the quarterfinal in 2022 (I. Halep)
- Posted her best Slam result at 2019 Roland Garros (I. Barty)
- Has raised her record on grass in the 2025 season to 9-2, having reached the final at Queen's (I. Maria; also her best career result on grass) and quarterfinal at Berlin (I. Samsonova)
- Won her maiden WTA 1000 title this season at Doha (d. Ostapenko)
- Is currently ranked at a career high of No.12; this time last year was ranked No.189

Sonay Kartal (GBR #51) vs. Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova (#50)

Kartal:

- Making sixth main draw appearance at a Grand Slam and is through to R16 for the first time
- A win today would make her the first British woman to reach QF at Wimbledon since Johanna Konta in 2019 (I. Strycova); Konta went as far as the semifinals in 2017
- Regardless of match outcome today, is set to attain a new career high ranking after Wimbledon should she advance to QF, would become the new British No.1
- Owns five career wins over Top 50 players, most recently defeating No.21 Ostapenko in 1r here; her best win by ranking was over No.16 Kasatkina at 2025 Queen's
- Has won 11 main draw matches so far in 2025 with five of those achieved on grass

Pavlyuchenkova:

- Former Roland Garros finalist (in 2021, I. Krejcikova) who is bidding to reach QF at Wimbledon for the second time in her career (2016, I. S.Williams)
- Recently reached her best career result on grass with SF at Eastbourne 2025 (I. eventual champion Joint)
- At 34 years of age, is the second oldest player through to reach R16, after Siegemund (37)
- Owns the second most Grand Slam main draw appearances among players in this year's main draw with 65 (most is Azarenka with 68)
- Reached a career high ranking of No.11 in November 2021

First meeting

Sierra:

- Has become the first lucky loser to reach the ladies' singles R16 at Wimbledon in the Open Era
- She is the 7th lucky loser to reach R16 at a Grand Slam event, and the second this year (Lys made R16 at 2025 Australian Open)
- With a win today would become the first lucky loser to reach QF at a Grand Slam
- This is her first Wimbledon main draw after playing qualifying in 2024; entered the main draw as lucky loser following the withdrawal of Greet Minnen
- Playing her first main draw Tour level event here at Wimbledon
- She is the first Argentine woman to make Wimbledon R16 since Paola Suarez reached 2004 QF, and the first Argentine woman to make any Grand Slam R16 since Nadia Podoroska made 2020 Roland Garros SF as a qualifier
- Entered 2025 Wimbledon 0-2 in Grand Slam main draw matches (lost 1r at 2024 US Open and 2025 Roland Garros)

Siegemund:

- Making 6th main-draw appearance at Wimbledon; had never advanced beyond 2r of Wimbledon until this year
- Contesting her 29th career Grand Slam main draw; her best Grand Slam singles performance was QF at 2020 Roland Garros (I. Kvitova)
- Has posted two Top 10 wins at Grand Slam events this year (d. Zheng at 2025 Australian Open and Keys in previous round here)
- Second-oldest woman in the singles starting field at Wimbledon this year, after her countrywoman Tatjana Maria (also 37, made 1r exit)
- Best singles result on grass in career to date was QF at Bad Homburg in 2021 (I. Siniakova)
- Wimbledon title has been won by two German players in the Open Era Stefanie Graf (7 titles) and Angelique Kerber (1)

- Making sixth appearance at Wimbledon, where her previous best results have been SF runs in 2021 (l. Ka. Pliskova) and 2023 (l. Jabeur)
- Has beaten Carson Branstine, Marie Bouzkova and Emma Raducanu to reach 4r - the first player to reach 4r for 11+ consecutive Grand Slam appearances since S.Williams (14 between the US Open 2014 and the Australian Open 2019)
- Has made 4r in all her last 11 Grand Slam appearances - the last time she failed to reach this stage in a Major was at Roland Garros 2022 when she lost to Camila Giorgi in 3r
- First player to make R16 in all their first three Grand Slam appearances as World No. 1 since Ashleigh Barty (Wimbledon 2019, Australian Open 2020 and 2021)
- Record in 4r matches at Grand Slams is 12-3 (2-0 at Wimbledon)
- Faces No.23 Elise Mertens in 4r today; record against opponents outside Top 20 stands at 30-4 in 2025, with the most recent loss to No.164 Voudrousova at Berlin
- Owns 13-4 career record against players from Belgium (2-0 in 2025) - has won 10 of the previous 12 meetings against Mertens: she is the opponent against whom she claimed the most WTA level main draw wins so far in her career
- Has reached two grass court finals in her career: 2018 Eastbourne and 2022 's-Hertogenbosch
- Is currently ranked No.1; this time last year was ranked No.3; will remain No.1 after Wimbledon, regardless of results this fortnight
- Has won 45 matches so far in 2025; she is ranked No.1 on tour for match wins

CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan. Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid.
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- Rose to career-high No.2 in rankings on August 23, 2021
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejcikova/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10
- Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitova in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). CAREER MILESTONES

- Highlights of 2024 were reaching her first Grand Slam main draw at US Open as a qualifier (l. Maria in 1r) and making quarterfinal at WTA 125 Barranquilla (l. Ruzic). On the ITF circuit won six ITF titles bringing her career total to 12 as of 2024 year-end. Broke into the Top 150 for the first time reaching a career high of No.145 in October
- Opened 2023 by winning ITF \$25K title at Tucuman and broke into Top 200 at the end of the season after reaching QF at WTA 125 Buenos Aires (l. Pigossi).
- Claimed three ITF \$15K titles in 2022.
- Began on ITF circuit in 2018 at age of 14 playing a small number of tournaments each year until playing a full season in 2022.

- Best results of 2024 came in the second half of the season achieving runner-up at Hua Hin 2 and reaching semifinal at Jiujiang. Also made quarterfinals across the season at Adelaide, Bogota and Rabat.
- 2023 season highlights include a final in Warsaw (l. Swiatek) and a QF at Zhengzhou (l. Paolini) and Nanchang (l. Siniakova)
- Ended her 2023 singles season ranked at No. 86
- In the 2023 season reached a doubles careerhigh of No.5 and lifted doubles title at the GNP Seguros WTA Finals Cancun title (w/ Zvonareva)
- Best result of 2022 was QF run at Stuttgart (as WC, l. Samsonova)
- Reached first career QF on grass, at 2021 Bad Homburg (l. Siniakova). Also made 3r at Gippsland Trophy (l. Halep) and 2r on four occasions in 2021
- Advanced to first Grand Slam singles quarterfinal of career at 2020 Roland Garros (l. Kvitova); previous best results at a Slam were 3r runs at 2016 Australian Open (l. Beck) and 2016 US Open (l. V.Williams)
- Captured first Grand Slam doubles title at 2020 US Open (w/Zvonareva)
- Opened 2020 season by reaching QF at Auckland (l. eventual champion S.Williams)
- Standout results of 2019 season included SF run at Bucharest (l. Tig) and QF showings at Hiroshima and Luxembourg
- After 10 months sidelined by knee injury, returned to Tour-level action at 2018 Charleston; went on to reach two QF later that summer, at Bucharest and Moscow [River Cup]; also reached three finals on the ITF Circuit, including a title run at \$25K Bad Saulgau-GER
- Won second (and biggest title) of career to date on home soil at 2017 Stuttgart (d. Mladenovic in F). Scored three wins over Top 10 opponents en route (No.9 Kuznetsova, No.3 Ka.Pliskova and No.5 Halep) but promising season halted by serious right knee injury (tore right anterior cruciate ligament) sustained a few weeks later at Nürnberg (ret. vs. Krejcikova)
- Enjoyed tour-level breakthrough in 2016, registering 30 Tour-level match wins and first WTA singles title on clay at Bastad (d. Siniakova in F)
- Earlier in 2016, reached maiden WTA final as a qualifier at 2016 Stuttgart (as qualifier, l. Kerber); result led to Top 50 debut at No.42 (week of April 25)

- Quarterfinalist at Rio Olympics (l. eventual gold medalist Puig)
- Won 2016 US Open mixed doubles title (w/Pavic)
- Advanced to first two QF at WTA level in 2015, at Florianopolis and Luxembourg
- Won first WTA doubles title at 2015 's-Hertogenbosch (w/Muhammad)
- Made WTA qualifying debut at 2003 Leipzig and finally main draw debut seven years later, at 2010 Bastad
- On ITF Circuit, winner of 12 singles titles and 20 doubles titles
- Played first pro events of career on ITF Circuit in 2002
