[7] Mirra Andreeva (#7) vs. [10] Emma Navarro (USA #10)

Andreeva leads 1-0

M. Andreeva:

- With a win, Andreeva (18 years, 75 days old) would become the youngest player to reach the Wimbledon QF since 2007 (Nicole Vaidisova at 18 years, 75 days old also)
- And reeva is the first teenager to reach QF at Wimbledon since Victoria Azarenka and Sabine Lisicki in 2009
- Making 3rd main draw appearance at Wimbledon; has equalled her best result (also 4r in 2023)
- Through to R16 for 6th time at a Slam (making 10th main draw appearance at a Slam)
- Bidding to reach the QF at a Slam for the third time both at Roland Garros 2024 (SF) and 2025 (QF)
- Best career result on grass is a QF appearance at Bad Homburg in 2025
- Only Aryna Sabalenka (46) and Iga Swiatek (38) have won more WTA level main draw matches than Mirra Andreeva (35) in 2025 (she is equal to Jessica Pegula also with 35 wins)
- Owns 9 wins over Top 10 opponents, including 5 this year (5-4 record)
- Only Sabalenka (8), Gauff (7) and Swiatek (6) have more Top 10 wins this year than Andreeva (5)
- Is youngest player to reach R16 at each of the first three Slams of the season since Nicole Vaidisova in 2006

Navarro:

- Making 3rd appearance at Wimbledon, where her best result was reaching QF stage in 2024 (I. eventual R-Up Paolini)
- Overall making 11th Grand Slam appearance
- Through to R16 for 5th time at a Slam; has made at least the 4r in 5 of the last 6 majors, except at 2025 Roland Garros (I. Bouzas Maneiro in 1r)
- Bidding to reach QF for the 4th time also at 2024 Wimbledon (QF), 2024 US Open (SF) and 2025 Australian Open (QF)
- Has won 5 matches vs. Top 10 ranked opponents, including defeating No.2 Coco Gauff at 2024 Wimbledon

[8] Iga Swiatek (POL #4) vs. [23] Clara Tauson (DEN #22)

Swiatek leads 1-0

Swiatek:

- Playing in 26th main draw of a Slam
- Through to R16 for 19th time in career
- Reached first final of the season last week at Bad Homburg, her first final since 2024 Roland Garros; as a result climbed from No.8 to No.4 in this week's PIF WTA Rankings
- Swiatek has won the only previous tour-level meeting at 2022 Indian Wells in 3-sets

Tauson:

- Has equaled the best result achieved in the Open Era by a player from Denmark in Women's Singles in Wimbledon, made by Caroline Wozniacki six times; would be the first Danish woman to reach QF at Wimbledon in Open Era
- Making 4th appearance at Wimbledon, where previous three results were first-round losses
- Has equaled her best result across all Slams -- R16 run at Roland Garros 2024 (I. Jabeur)
- Entering Wimbledon ranked second on WTA Tour for most aces served this year (223)
- Has served the most aces at Wimbledon 2025 in Women's Singles (27)
- Notched first career Top 20 win on grass last round by defeating No.11 Elena Rybakina (previously 0-3)
- Owns three career Top 10 wins defeating No.7 Anett Kontaveit (2022 Australian Open), No.1 Aryna Sabalenka (2025 Dubai) and No.9 Emma Navarro (2025 Rome)

[18] Ekaterina Alexandrova (#17) vs. Belinda Bencic (SUI #35)

Alexandrova:

- Making 33rd Grand Slam main draw appearance, and has twice reached Grand Slam R16 previously (2023 Wimbledon and 2025 Roland Garros)
- Bidding to make Grand Slam QF debut at 30 years, 240 days old; would be the 13th woman in the Open Era to make her Grand Slam QF debut after turning 30 years old
- Since the start of 2019, has won 37 matches on grass; only Ons Jabeur (41) has won more in that span
- A two-time grass-court title winner both at 's-Hertogenbosch (2022, 2023)

Bencic:

- Making her 9th appearance at Wimbledon; has equaled previous best result (also R16 in 2023, 2018, and 2015)
- Owns one grass-court title, winning 10 years ago at Eastbourne in 2015
- One of nine mothers in the draw at Wimbledon this year
- Through to the R16 for the 11th time at a Slam
- With a win would be through to QF at a Slam for the 4th time with all three previous QF appearance at US Open QF in 2014 and 2021 and SF in 2019
- Bencic is looking to reach her first career quarterfinal at Wimbledon, becoming the fourth player competing for Switzerland to reach this stage at the Championships in Women's Singles in the Open Era after Martina Hingis (1997, 1998 and 2000), Timea Bacsinszky (2015) and Viktorija Golubic (2021)

[19] Liudmila Samsonova (#19) vs. Jessica Bouzas Maneiro (ESP #62)

First meeting

Samsonova:

- Making 21st Grand Slam main draw appearance, including fourth at Wimbledon
- Has equaled her best result at a Slam with a R16 showing reached that round four times including 2021 Wimbledon
- Two of her 5 WTA singles titles have come on grass (2021 Berlin and 2024 's-Hertogenbosch)

Bouzas Maneiro:

- Making 3rd appearance at Wimbledon, where her previous and best result was reaching 3r in 2024 (I. eventual Champion Krejcikova)
- Owns 5 wins in career over Top 50 players, most recently No.9 Emma Navarro at Roland Garros 2025
- Including 2025 there has been a quarterfinalist ranked outside the Top 50 at 9-straight editions of Wimbledon (starting at 2016); Bouzas Maneiro looking to join No.104 Siegemund this year
- Last Spanish woman to reach the Wimbledon QF was Garbine Muguruza in 2017 en route to winning title
- With a win would be the fifth Spanish woman to reach the Wimbledon QF in Open Era Muguruza Conchita Martinez, Aranxta Sanchez-Vicario and Magui Serna
- Facing a Top 20 opponent for the 10th time in her career and currently holds 3-6 record, defeating Marketa Vondrousova at Wimbledon 2024, Beatriz Haddad Maia in BJK Cup and Emma Navarro at Roland Garros this season

- Defeated Petra Kvitova, Veronika Kudermetova and Barbora Krejcikova so far this fortnight; ended defending champion Krejcikova's 9-match Wimbledon winning streak
- Holds a 3-1 record in Grand Slam 4r matches; seeking her 4th career Grand Slam QF (and 2nd straight at Wimbledon)
- Faces No.7 Mirra Andreeva in 4r today; owns 5 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.10 Daria Kasatkina at 2025 Australian Open
- Best career tour-level results on grass are Bad Homburg SFs in both 2023 and 2024
- Has won 7 main-draw matches at Wimbledon; the only tournament where she has more maindraw match-wins in her career is Bad Homburg (8)
- One of 2 American women to reach this fortnight's 4r (along with No.13 seed Anisimova)
- Aiming to become the first American woman to reach the Wimbledon QF in back-to-back seasons since Serena Williams in 2018-2019
- Most recent American woman to win the Wimbledon singles title is Serena Williams in 2016
- Is currently ranked No.10; this time last year was ranked No.17. Reached career-high No.8 for the first time in September 2024
- In this year's grass-court swing, made Queen's Club QF, Berlin 2r and Bad Homburg QF

- Making 3rd appearance at Wimbledon; her best result was reaching 4r in 2023 (as a qualifier, l. Keys), which she has matched this year
- Contesting her 10th career Grand Slam main draw; her career-best Grand Slam result is reaching 2024 Roland Garros SF (l. Paolini)
- In the last 10 years, she is the 3rd player to make 10 Grand Slam main draw appearances before turning 19 (along with Coco Gauff and Ana Konjuh)
- Defeated Mayar Sherif, Lucia Bronzetti and Hailey Baptiste so far this fortnight, making the 4r or better at all 3 Slams this year
- She has become the youngest woman to reach the 4r at each of the first 3 Slams of the season since Nicole Vaidisova in 2006
- Holds a 2-3 record in Grand Slam 4r matches; seeking her 3rd career Grand Slam QF (and 1st outside of Roland Garros)
- Andreeva could become the youngest player to reach the women's singles QF at Wimbledon since Maria Sharapova in 2005, at the exact same age (18 years and 62 days at the start of the tournament)
- Faces No.10 Emma Navarro in 4r today; owns 9 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.1 Aryna Sabalenka in 2025 Indian Wells final
- Owns 11-10 career tour-level record against players from the United States (4-3 in 2025, including a win over Baptiste in previous round)
- Career-best tour-level result on grass is making the Bad Homburg QF earlier this year (l. Noskova)
- Is currently ranked No.7; this time last year was ranked No.23. Reached career-high of No.6 earlier this year, after winning consecutive WTA 1000 titles (Dubai and Indian Wells)
- In this year's grass-court swing, lost 1r in Berlin and made Bad Homburg QF
- Has won 35 tour-level matches so far in 2025, tied for third-most on tour

CAREER MILESTONES

- Voted 2024 WTA Most Improved Player of the Year Award, finished the year ranked No.8 with a singles record of 54-24, winning her first career title at 2024 Hobart; climbed to a year-end ranking at No.8 after finishing 2023 at No.38 (and No.143 in 2022)
- 2023 was a stand-out year, achieving a career best with semifinal at WTA 500 San Diego (l. Kenin) and ending season with a ranking of No. 32. Also reached two quarterfinals on clay; Strasbourg (l. Blinkova) and Palermo (l. eventual champion Zheng) and one semifinal on grass; Bad Homburg (l. Siniakova).
- In 2022, posted 31-18 win-loss record. At Tourlevel, made 2r at Charleston (as WC, l. Jabeur), fell 1r at Monterrey (as WC, l. Zacarias) and Indian Wells (as WC, l. Anisimova), and contested qualifying at San Diego
- Elsewhere in 2022, reached three ITF Circuit finals, including lifting second career title at this level at W60 tournament in Liepaja, Latvia, while made SF at WTA 125K Series event in Vancouver
- Broke into Top 200 for the first time on March 7, 2022
- Lifted maiden ITF Circuit title at W25 event in Orlando in November 2021
- Won the NCAA division 1 women's singles title in May 2021 to earn a WC into US Open, where she fell 1r (l. McHale)
- In 2021, reached 2r at both Charleston [500] and Charleston [250]
- Fell 1r at 2020 Monterrey (l. Stephens)
- Only other events in 2020 came on ITF Circuit, ending year ranked No.463
- Owns three ITF Circuit titles in singles and one in doubles
- Fell 2r on professional debut at \$10k Charleston, SC-USA (l. Di Lorenzo) in 2015
- Began her collegiate career by winning her first 14 NCAA singles matches and moving up to a No.6 ITA ranking
- Ended 2019 at No.3 in ITF Junior rankings, following a season that included a R-Up finish at Roland Garros (l. Fernandez), a SF run at Wimbledon and victory at the Adidas Easter Bowl
- Also R-Up in girls' doubles at 2019 Australian Open w/Beck

- Reached first two WTA finals of career in 2024 winning the title at Iasi and finishing runner-up at Ningbo
- Made first Grand Slam semifinal at 2024 Roland Garros beating World No.2 Aryna Sabalenka in the quarterfinals
- Made Top 20 debut on October 8, 2024 finishing the year at World No.16. Also won 2024 Paris Olympic silver medal in women s doubles with Diana Shnaider
- Opened 2023 season in April by winning 13 matches straight to claim back-to-back ITF titles in Switzerland; as WC, advanced to R16 at Madrid with wins over Fernandez, Haddad Maia and Linette (l. Sabalenka); subsequently made debut at Roland Garros (as qualifier, l. Gauff in 3r), Wimbledon (as qualifier, l. Keys in R16) and US Open (l. eventual champion Gauff in 2r)
- Also in 2023 reached R16 at Beijing (l. Rybakina), leading to Top 50 debut (started season just inside Top 300); voted WTA Newcomer of the Year
- In 2022, posted 39-9 win-loss record on ITF Circuit, winning first four titles at this level
- Fell 1r on WTA main-draw debut at 2022 Monastir (as WC, l. Potapova)
- Made professional debut at W15 ITF Circuit event at Sharm El-Sheikh in February 2022
- Owns six ITF Circuit singles titles
- As a junior, finished R-Up at 2023 Australian Open (l. Korneeva)

- Holds 1-6 record vs. Top 5 players; her one Top 5 win came over No.1 Sabalenka at 2025 Dubai, en route to her 1st WTA 1000 final (l. M. Andreeva)
