Sabalenka leads 2-0

Sabalenka:

- This is her 11th consecutive Grand Slam quarterfinal the last time she failed to reach this stage at a major was at Roland Garros 2022 (I. Giorgi in 3r)
- She is the first player to reach QF for 11+ consecutive Grand Slam appearances since S.Williams (16 between Wimbledon 2000 and Australian Open 2005)
- Is the eighth player since WTA Rankings were published in 1975 to reach quarterfinals in all their first three Grand Slam appearances as World No. 1 after Chris Evert, Martina Navratilova, Steffi Graf, Monica Seles, Martina Hingis, Serena Williams and Lindsay Davenport
- Is the first player to reach the quarterfinals at each of the first three majors of the season without dropping a set in the first four rounds since Kim Clijsters and Justine Henin in 2006
- Has 2025 quarterfinal record of 8-1 with her only loss at Rome to Qinwen Zheng
- Has a career Grand Slam quarterfinal record of 11-1 with her only loss at 2024 Roland Garros (I. M.Andreeva)
- Her most recent loss to a player ranked outside Top 100 was to No.164 Vondrousova at 2025 Berlin
- Will remain No.1 after Wimbledon, regardless of results this fortnight

Siegemund:

- Equals her best career Grand Slam result with quarterfinal at 2020 Roland Garros (I. Kvitova)
- Making 6th main-draw appearance at Wimbledon; had never advanced beyond 2r of Wimbledon until this year
- Contesting her 29th career Grand Slam main draw; the same as Sabalenka
- Posted two Top 10 wins this year both achieved at Slams (d. Zheng at 2025 Australian Open and Keys in 3r here)
- This is her fifth meeting against the current World No.1 and looking for her first such win today (I. Swiatek at Warsaw 2023; Barty at 2021 Stuttgart & 2020 Doha; S.Williams at 2016 Indian Wells)
- Best singles result on grass in career to date was QF at Bad Homburg in 2021 (I. Siniakova)
- Wimbledon title has been won by two German players in the Open Era Graf (7 titles) and Kerber (1)

[13] Amanda Anisimova (USA #12) vs. Anastasia Pavlyuchenkova (#50) Anisimova leads 3-0

Anisimova:

- Has equalled her best Wimbledon appearance with quarterfinal in 2022 (I. Halep)
- Posted her best Slam result with SF at 2019 Roland Garros (I. Barty)
- Has a 1-1 career record in Grand Slam quarterfinal matches (SF at 2019 Roland Garros; QF at 2022 Wimbledon)
- Is 3-1 in quarterfinal matches so far this season (only loss at Hobart to Avanesyan)
- Has a record on grass this season of 10-2, the most wins she has achieved in a single season on grass
- So far in 2025 has a record against Top 50 players of 16-5
- Is undefeated in her three hard court meetings against Pavlyuchenkova
- Posted her career best grass court result recently on grass at Queen's with runner-up (I. Maria in the final)
- Won her maiden WTA 1000 title this season at Doha (d. Ostapenko)
- Is currently ranked at a career high of No.12 (achieved on Jun 30, 2025; this time last year was ranked No.189)

Pavlyuchenkova:

- Has equalled her best Wimbledon appearance with quarterfinal in 2016 (I. S. Williams)
- Has a 1-8 record in Grand Slam quarterfinal matches (only win was her runner-up performance at 2021 Roland Garros, I. Krejcikova)
- Has a 7-1 match record so far this season on grass, the most wins she achieved in a single season on grass
- Recently reached her best career result on grass with SF at Eastbourne 2025 (I. eventual champion Joint)
- So far in 2025 has a record against Top 20 players of 1-2 with her only victory against No.19 Vekic at Australian Open
- At 34 years of age, is the second oldest player through to reach R16, after Siegemund (37)
- Owns the second most Grand Slam main draw appearances among players in this year's main draw with 65 (most is Azarenka with 68); among active players only Cornet has more (72)
- Reached a career high ranking of No.11 in November 2021

- Contesting her 29th career Grand Slam main draw; has equalled her career best Grand Slam singles showing is making 2020 Roland Garros QF (l. Kvitova)
- Siegemund fell in Grand Slam qualifying 10 times before making her Grand Slam main draw debut here at Wimbledon in 2015
- Second-oldest woman in the singles starting field at Wimbledon this year, after her countrywoman Tatjana Maria (also 37, made 1r exit)
- Has beaten Peyton Stearns, Leylah Fernandez, Madison Keys and Solana Sierra so far this week to reach her second Grand Slam QF
- Faces No.1 Aryna Sabalenka in QF today; owns 12 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.8 Madison Keys at Wimbledon in 3r
- Her 3r victory over No.8 Keys was her 2nd Top 10 win at a Grand Slam event this year (also d. No.5 Zheng at 2025 Australian Open)
- Career record in WTA QF matches stands at 9-16; this year so far she reached QF at United CUp as part of German team (l. Rybakina)
- Her most recent singles QF was 2024 Jiujiang
- Best career result on grass has been a QF run at Bad Homburg in 2021
- Two German women have won Wimbledon in the Open Era - Stefanie Graf (7 titles) and Angelique Kerber (1)
- Lowest ranked player (No.181) to reach QF at Wimbledon was Serena Williams in 2018
- Is currently ranked No.104; this time last year was ranked No.72. Reached career-high No.27 in 2016

CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan. Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid.
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- Rose to career-high No.2 in rankings on August 23, 2021
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejcikova/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10
- Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitova in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejcikova/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Shenzhen in doubles (w/Mertens), going 1-2 in the round-robin stage
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2018, lifting two titles, at New Haven (d. Suarez Navarro in F) and

- Best results of 2024 came in the second half of the season achieving runner-up at Hua Hin 2 and reaching semifinal at Jiujiang. Also made quarterfinals across the season at Adelaide, Bogota and Rabat.
- 2023 season highlights include a final in Warsaw (l. Swiatek) and a QF at Zhengzhou (l. Paolini) and Nanchang (l. Siniakova)
- Ended her 2023 singles season ranked at No. 86
- In the 2023 season reached a doubles careerhigh of No.5 and lifted doubles title at the GNP Seguros WTA Finals Cancun title (w/ Zvonareva)
- Best result of 2022 was QF run at Stuttgart (as WC, l. Samsonova)
- Reached first career QF on grass, at 2021 Bad Homburg (l. Siniakova). Also made 3r at Gippsland Trophy (l. Halep) and 2r on four occasions in 2021
- Advanced to first Grand Slam singles quarterfinal of career at 2020 Roland Garros (l. Kvitova); previous best results at a Slam were 3r runs at 2016 Australian Open (l. Beck) and 2016 US Open (l. V.Williams)
- Captured first Grand Slam doubles title at 2020 US Open (w/Zvonareva)
- Opened 2020 season by reaching QF at Auckland (l. eventual champion S.Williams)
