More on Anisimova:

- Anisimova is only the second player in the Open Era to reach a Women's Singles final at a Grand Slam after losing in qualifying at the previous year's event, along with Bianca Andreescu (US Open 2019)
- The winner of today's final will capture their first grass court WTA-level title of their career
- Anisimova has become the third American in the Open Era to reach her maiden Women's Singles final in a Grand Slam at Wimbledon after Billie Jean King (1968) and Zina Garrison (1990)
- Since 1990, Amanda Anisimova is the fourth player to defeat the WTA #1 at Wimbledon en route to a maiden Grand Slam final after Zina Garrison (1990), Marion Bartoli (2007) and Sabine Lisicki (2013)
- Has 5 wins against Top 10 opponents in 2025, already more than any of her previous season
- Anisimova could become the youngest player to register four wins against Top 10 opponents on grass during a single season since Serena Williams in 2012
- Only Sabalenka (185) has more winners in Women's Singles at Wimbledon 2025 than Amanda Anisimova (164)

More on Swiatek:

- Swiatek is the second Polish player in the Open Era to reach the Women's or Men's Singles final in Wimbledon after Agnieszka Radwanska in 2012
- Playing in her 120th Grand Slam match, Swiatek (99-20) is bidding to claim her 100th Grand Slam win; she would be the fastest to 100 Grand Slam wins since Serena Williams in 2004 (116)
- Iga Swiatek is the youngest player to reach final on all three surfaces in Women's Singles Grand Slam events since Justine Henin in 2003
- Is the youngest woman to reach six Grand Slam finals since Justin Henin at the Australian Open 2006
- Since 2020, Iga Swiatek is the third player to reach the final on all three surfaces in Women's Singles Grand Slam events along with Garbine Muguruza and Ashleigh Barty
- Is the fourth player in the last 20 years to make their first two WTA level finals of the year (Bad Homburg and Wimbledon) on grass court after Belinda Bencic in 2015, Karolina Pliskova in 2016 and Beatriz Haddad Maia in 2022
- Is the only active player to reach the final on all three surfaces in Women's Singles Grand Slam events

If Anisimova wins the title...

- Will be making her PIF WTA Rankings Top 10 debut after Wimbledon; with a title at No.5, otherwise No.7
- After sitting at No.13 on the PIF WTA Finals Leaderboard entering Roland Garros, Anisimova will move to No.4 on the Leaderboard with a title (otherwise No.6)
- Would be the second woman to win a Grand Slam title as the No.13 seed (along with Maria Sharapova, 2004 Wimbledon)
- Would be the third player during the Open Era to win the Women's Singles at Wimbledon title after winning their
 first match 6-0 6-0 along with Steffi Graf (twice: 1988, 1993) and Amelie Mauresmo 2006. The last time a player
 won the opening match 6-0 6-0 at a Slam and went on to win the women's singles title was Roland Garros 2012
 (Maria Sharapova)
- As it would be her first Grand Slam singles title, Anisimova could become the third player during the last decade to win their first Slam title at Wimbledon after Elena Rybakina 2022 and Marketa Vondrousova 2023.
- Would be the first American to win their first Women's Singles Grand Slam title at Wimbledon was Venus Williams in 2000
- Bidding to become the first American to win the Women's Singles title at Wimbledon since Serena Williams in 2016 and the youngest American to do so since Serena Williams in 2003
- Since 1990, Amanda Anisimova is only the 4th player representing the United States to reach multiple WTA-level finals on grass in a season, after Martina Navratilova (1990-91), Zina Garrison (1990) and Serena Williams (2012)

If Swiatek wins the title...

- Would move to No.3 in the PIF WTA Rankings after Wimbledon; otherwise will remain at No.4
- By reaching the final, has moved to No.2 on the PIF Race to WTA Finals Leaderboard
- Would be the third woman to win a Grand Slam title as the No.8 seed along with Ashleigh Barty (2019 Roland Garros) and Petra Kvitova (2011 Wimbledon)
- Would become the first Polish player to win the Wimbledon title during the Open Era.
- Would become the youngest player since Serena Williams in 2002 to win Women's Singles Grand Slam titles on all three surfaces
- Would become the third player in the Open Era to win all their first six Women's Singles Grand Slam finals after Margaret Court and Monica Seles.

- Result boosted her into Top 50 for first time at No.26 on June 10, 2019
