[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. [13] Amanda Anisimova (USA #12)

Anisimova leads 5-3

Sabalenka:

- This is her 12th Grand Slam semifinal and third at Wimbledon (I. Jabeur in 2023; I. Ka.Pliskova in 2021)
- Is the first player to reach semifinals in all her first three Grand Slams as World No. 1 since Serena Williams (US Open 2002, Australian Open 2003 and Roland Garros 2003)
- Is looking to become the first player since S.Williams (2014-2015) to reach four consecutive Grand Slam finals
- Could become the first player to reach three Grand Slam finals in a single calendar year since Angelique Kerber and S.Williams in 2016
- Has a semifinal record in 2025 of 7-1 with her only loss at Berlin to Vondrousova
- Has a career Grand Slam semifinal record of 6-5
- Is 15-4 against Top 20 players this season with her only such meeting on grass a victory over No.11 Rybakina at Berlin
- Will remain the PIF WTA World No.1 after Wimbledon, regardless of results this fortnight
- By reaching Wimbledon semifinal has become the first player this season to qualify for the year-ending WTA Finals Riyadh

Anisimova:

- Through to her first Wimbledon semifinal and second career Grand Slam semifinal after 2019 Roland Garros (I. Barty)
- Is the youngest American female to reach Wimbledon semifinal since S.Williams in 2004 (eventual R-Up)
- Is 2-1 in semifinal matches so far this season (only loss at Charleston to Kenin)
- Has a record on grass this season of 11-2, the most wins she has achieved in a single season on grass
- This is her third meeting against the current World No.1 and looking for her first win today (I. Sabalenka at 2025 Roland Garros; I. Barty at 2025 Australian Open)
- Has defeated no other player more on Tour than Sabalenka (also has five wins over Kasatkina); also has the most meetings against Sabalenka than any other player (today is their ninth meeting)
- Today is her first meeting against Sabalenka on grass
- Posted her career best grass court result recently on grass at Queen's with runner-up (I. Maria in the final)
- Won her maiden WTA 1000 title this season at Doha (d. Ostapenko)
- Is currently ranked at a career high of No.12 and will make her Top 10 debut after Wimbledon

Belinda Bencic (SUI #35) vs. [8] Iga Swiatek (POL #4)

Swiatek leads 3-1

Bencic:

- Through to her second Grand Slam semifinal (l. eventual champion Andreescu at 2019 US Open) and first at Wimbledon
- An unseeded player has reached Wimbledon SF for the fourth consecutive edition
- Has spent the most time on court of any player in the ladies' singles at Wimbledon this year (10 hours 10 minutes)
- Looking to become the second Swiss woman to reach the Wimbledon final after Martina Hingis won the title in 1997
- Holds a career record of 7-9 against Top 10 opponents at Grand Slam events; defeated No.7 M.Andreeva in QF here this fortnight and before that, against No.1 Swiatek at 2021 US Open (R16)
- Owns one grass court title, winning 10 years ago at Eastbourne in 2015
- Started the year ranked No.489; projected to return to the Top 20 after Wimbledon

Swiatek:

- This is her ninth Grand Slam semifinal and first at Wimbledon
- Previous best result at Wimbledon was QF in 2023 (l. Svitolina)
- Holds 5-3 record in Grand Slam SF matches, having lost last two appearances at Roland Garros (l. Keys) and Australian Open (l. Sabalenka) this season
- Sabalenka and Swiatek are the first duo to reach SF at all three Grand Slams of the season since Justine Henin and Kim Clijsters in 2006
- Becomes the first Polish player in the Open Era to reach SF at each of the Grand Slams
- Has won 8 grass court matches so far this season; the most of any season in her career
- Defeated Bencic in their most recent meeting which was R16 at 2023 Wimbledon; also their only previous meeting on grass
- Her last loss to a player ranked No.35 or lower was to No.35 Collins at Rome this year
- Lowest ranked loss at Grand Slam SF was to No.30 Collins at 2022 Australian Open
- A win today would be her sixth career Grand Slam final; she is undefeated in Grand Slam final matches
- Reached first final of the season the week before Wimbledon at Bad Homburg, her first final since 2024 Roland Garros; as a result climbed from No.8 to No.4 in this week's PIF WTA Rankings

- Has beaten Carson Branstine, Marie Bouzkova, Emma Raducanu, Elise Mertens and Laura Siegemund so far this week to reach her 8th semifinal this season
- Has a 7-1 record in SF matches this year with only loss at Berlin (l. Berlin)
- She is the first player to make Wimbledon SF for 3+ consecutive appearances (2025, 2023 and 2021) since Serena Williams (four - 2015, 2016, 2018 and 2019). Did not play at Wimbledon in 2024 and 2022
- The first player to reach SF in all her first three Grand Slams as World No. 1 since S. Williams (US Open 2002, Australian Open 2003 and Roland Garros 2003)
- Faces No.12 Amanda Anisimova in SF today; owns 94 Tour-level wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.11 Elena Rybakina at Berlin 2025
- Owns 67-20 career Tour-level record against players from United States of America, with record in 2025 standing at 9-2
- Record in Tour-level SF matches stands at 38-19
- Record in Grand Slam semifinals of 6-5
- Best career result on grass is Runner-Up which she has reached twice: 's-Hertogenbosch in 2022 and Eastbourne in 2018
- Is currently ranked No.1; this time last year was ranked No.3; will remain No.1 after Wimbledon, regardless of results this fortnight
- Has won 47 matches so far in 2025; she is ranked No.1 on Tour for match wins

- Fourth semifinal at WTA-level during 2025 (Wimbledon, Queens Club, Charleston and Doha), as many as she managed between 2020-24 in her career
- Faces No.1 Aryna Sabalenka in SF today; owns 12 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.5 Qinwen Zheng at Queens 2025
- Has a 5-3 record against Sabalenka at WTA-level, against no player has she won more matches in her career than against the current World No.1 at WTA-level (also 5-0 against Kasatkina)
- Record in Tour-level SF matches stands at 6-4
- Best career result on grass R-Up at Queen's 2025
- In the Open Era, six American women have triumphed at the All England Club: Billie Jean King, Chris Evert, Martina Navratilova, Lindsay Davenport, V. Williams and S. Williams
- Last time a player from United States of America reached SF at Wimbledon was 2019 (Serena Williams)
- Youngest American to reach Wimbledon SF since S. Williams in 2004
- Is currently ranked No.12; this time last year was ranked No.189
- Has won 28 matches so far in 2025; 11 of those on grass

CAREER MILESTONES

- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan. Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid.
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- Rose to career-high No.2 in rankings on August 23, 2021
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10
- Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitová in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Shenzhen in doubles (w/Mertens), going 1-2 in the round-robin stage
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2018, lifting two titles, at New Haven (d. Suarez Navarro in F) and
- In 2024 made first WTA 1000 final of career at Toronto, finishing R-Up to Pegula (defeated No.3 Sabalenka en route). Also enjoyed run to R16 at Australian Open, her third time reaching that stage in Melbourne
- Played a small number of tournaments in 2023 before taking a break away from the sport after Madrid in April
- Lifted second career title at Melbourne Summer Set 2 (d. Sasnovich in F) in January 2022
- In 2022, also made SF at Charleston (l. Jabeur) and five further QFs, including at Wimbledon (l. Halep)
- Ended 2021 season with 3r run at Indian Wells to secure her fourth consecutive Top-100 finish. Best results were QF runs at Parma and Bad Homburg
- Opened 2020 with SF showing at Auckland, going on to reach 3r at US Open, Roland Garros and Doha; during Doha run, earned third career Top 10 win over No.7 Svitolina (l. Kuznetsova in 3r due to walkover)
- Finished 2019 ranked No.24 - the youngest of three teenagers in the Top 50 (also Andreescu and Yastremska)
- Posted career best Grand Slam result with SF run at 2019 Roland Garros - first player (man or woman) born in 2000s to advance to this stage of a major. Scored maiden win over a Top 5 player during 2019 Roland Garros, upsetting No.3 and defending champion Halep in QF
- Result boosted her into Top 50 for first time at No.26 on June 10, 2019

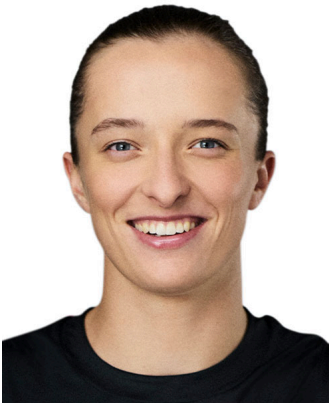

- Claimed five titles in 2024, making it a three-peat at Roland-Garros and also winning Doha, Indian Wells, Madrid and Rome. Crossed \$30m in prize money and qualified for her fourth WTA Finals
