[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. Marketa Vondrousova (CZE #60)

Sabalenka leads 5-4

Sabalenka:

- Returning to New York this year as defending champion, having defeated Pegula in last year's final
- Was also R-Up here in 2023 (I. Gauff) and made the SF in 2021 and 2022
- Seeking to become the first player to win consecutive US Open women's singles titles since Serena Williams from 2012-2014
- Is now the first player to reach the quarterfinals at both the Australian Open and US Open in three consecutive years since Victoria Azarenka between 2012-14
- Is the first player to reach the QFs at all four Grand Slam events of the season as World No.1 since Serena Williams in 2016
- Has won her last 30 matches against opponents ranked No.50 or lower at Grand Slam events, last losing to Kaia Kanepi at Australian Open 2022.
- Overall, this is her 30th Grand Slam main-draw appearance – she has also won the Australian Open twice (2023-24), finished R-Up at Roland Garros (2025, I. Gauff) and has made the Wimbledon SFs three times
- Is closing in on 100 Grand Slam main-draw wins – now up to 98-26 at majors after her four victories this week
- Has now reached at least the QF stage of the last 12 Grand Slam events she has contested
- By reaching the QF has secured stay at the top of WTA Rankings regardless of any other results

Vondrousova:

- Has reached her fifth Grand Slam QF, and her second at the US Open after 2023 (I. Keys)
- Is the first unseeded player to claim multiple Top 10 wins en route to a Grand Slam QF (having defeated No.8 Paolini and No.10 Rybakina) since Muguruza, who went on to reach the final at the Australian Open in 2020
- Also the first unseeded player to claim multiple Top 10 wins en route to QF at the US Open since Caroline Wozniacki (2016)
- Record against the reigning PIF WTA World No.1 stands at 1-6 - the only win was defeating today's opponent Sabalenka at Berlin 2025 en route to title
- Contesting her 28th Grand Slam main draw of career; has won one Grand Slam title (2023 Wimbledon, d. Jabeur in final) and reached one other Grand Slam final (2019 Roland Garros, I. Barty)

Barbora Krejčíková (CZE #62) vs. [4] Jessica Pegula (USA #4)

Krejčíková leads 2-1

Krejčíková:

- Making her 5th main draw appearance at US Open, and is through to QF for the second time after 2021 (l. Sabalenka)
- This is her 22nd Grand Slam main draw appearance and is through to her sixth Slam QF overall
- She is a two-time Grand Slam singles champion, winning titles at 2021 Roland Garros (d. Pavlyuchenkova in final) and 2024 Wimbledon (d. Paolini in final)
- Teamed with Katerina Siniakova to win the 2022 US Open women's doubles title; that title gave them the Career Grand Slam in women's doubles
- In Krejčíková's 12 previous matches against Americans at Grand Slams events, she has nine wins and three losses
- Saved eight match points during R16 win over Townsend
- Looking to score her first Top 10 win since defeating No.3 Coco Gauff at 2024 WTA Finals

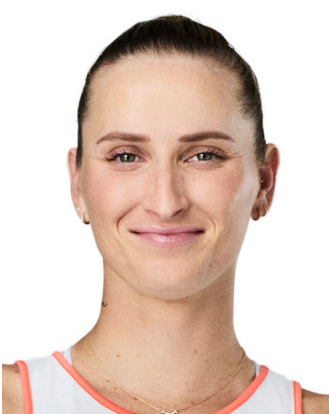
Pegula:

- Making her 9th main draw appearance at the US Open, where her best result was reaching final in 2024 (l. Sabalenka)
- Overall, this is her 27th Grand Slam main draw appearance; prior to R-Up run here last year, had reached QFs across all the Slams but never further
- A win today would be her 16th straight victory against an opponent ranked outside the Top 50 at the US Open (last loss was against No.64 Cornet in 2019)
- Owns the joint-most singles titles this season (3) at Austin, Charleston, and Bad Homburg (same as Sabalenka)
- Results this week move her to 42 wins this season, the 4th fourth player to register 40+ wins in 2025 after Aryna Sabalenka, Iga Swiatek and Elena Rybakina.

- Contesting her 28th Grand Slam main draw of career; she has won 1 Grand Slam title (2023 Wimbledon, d. Jabeur in final) and reached 1 other Grand Slam final (2019 Roland Garros, l. Barty)
- Has beaten qualifier Oksana Selekhmeteva, No.32 seed McCartney Kessler, No.7 seed Jasmine Paolini and No.9 seed Elena Rybakina to make her 5th Grand Slam QF of career, 2nd at US Open - with a win today will be through to her career first SF at US Open
- Also her first QF of 2025 season since she won Berlin
- Faces No.1 Aryna Sabalenka in QF today; record against world No.1 stands at 1-6 - the only win was defeating today's opponent Sabalenka at Berlin 2025 en route to title
- Record in WTA QF matches at Grand Slams stands at 2-2
- 1 of her 3 career WTA singles titles has come on hard court, 2017 Biel
- Karolina Pliskova in 2016 was the last Czech to make the final here (l. Kerber)
- Is currently ranked No.60; this time last year was ranked No.22. Reached career-high ranking of No.6 after the 2023 US Open
- During this year's North American summer hard-court swing, made 2r at both Montreal (l. Kostyuk) and Cincinnati (l. No.1 Sabalenka)

- Making her eighth main draw appearance at the US Open, returning this year as defending champion (d. Pegula in last year's final)
- Was also R-Up here in 2023 (l. Gauff) and made the SF in 2021 and 2022
- Has successfully defended titles twice in her career, at Wuhan in 2018-19 and Australian Open from 2023-24
- Has beaten Rebeka Masarova, Polina Kudermetova, Leylah Fernandez and Cristina Bucsa to reach QF
- Faces No.60 Marketa Vondrousova in QF today; record against opponents outside Top 50 stands at 18-1 - the only loss was against today's opponent No.164 Vondrousova at Berlin 2025
- Owns 25-14 career record against players from Czech Republic (3-1 in 2025); is playing today's opponent Vondrousova for the 10th time (5-4)
- Record in WTA QF matches at Grand Slams stands at 12-1 (4-0 at US Open), with the only loss coming at Roland Garros (l. M. Andreeva)
- 17 of her 20 career titles came on hard court, including 2 this year: Miami (d. Pegula in F) & Brisbane (d. P. Kudermetova in F)
- Is currently ranked No.1; this time last year was ranked No.2
- During last year's North American hard court swing won US Open, Cincinnati, reached SF at Washington DC, QF at Toronto
- Claims the most match wins (21) at Grand Slam events in 2025, along with the most tour-level match wins overall (54) this season

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2024 reached QF at Roland Garros (l. eventual champion Swiatek); further highlights included semifinal at Stuttgart and quarterfinals at Strasbourg and Dubai. Ended her season after Wimbledon through shoulder injury
- Following injury issues in second half of 2022, bounced back in 2023 for best-ever season, winning debut Slam title at Wimbledon (d. Jabeur in F - becoming the first unseeded player in the open era to claim the Wimbledon title), making Top 10 debut and qualifying for first WTA Finals.
- Best result of 2022 season was SF run at Dubai (withdrew prior to match vs. w/right adductor injury). Missed most of second half of the season due to left wrist injury, returning in October to play a few ITF Circuit events and Billie Jean King Cup Finals
- Finished 2021 with SF runs at Luxembourg, Chicago [500] and Moscow
- Won silver medal in singles at Olympics in Tokyo (l. Bencic)
- Opened 2021 campaign with SF at Yarra Valley Classic before R16 showing at Australian Open
- Highlights of 2020 include defeating No.6 Svitolina to reach SFs at Rome (l. Ka.Pliskova) as well as a QF run to kick off the season at Adelaide (l. No.1 Barty)
- Enjoyed break-out season in 2019, reaching three finals across the year and posting career-high ranking of No.14 on July 1, 2019
- Finished R-Up at Budapest (l. Van Uytvanck) and Istanbul (l. Martic) before reaching championship match at Roland Garros (l. Barty); did not drop a set en route to final in Paris
- Ranked No.38, was joint-third lowest-ranked woman to reach Roland Garros final, and aged 19, was first teenager to reach title match there since Ivanovic in 2007
- Posted first win of career over a Top 2 player in 2019, defeating No.2 Halep at Indian Wells and then Rome
- Forced to end 2019 season down early due to left wrist injury - did not play again following 1r exit at Wimbledon
- In doubles, has reached SF at 2019 Australian Open (w/Strycova) and QF at 2017 Wimbledon (w/Bellis)
- At 2018 US Open, became the first teenager to reach the last 16 at Flushing Meadows since 2016 (Konjuh, QF - 18) and the youngest Czech player to advance to this stage in New York since 2005 (Vaidisova, R16 - 16)
- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan. Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid.
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- Rose to career-high No.2 in rankings on August 23, 2021
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejickova/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10
- Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitova in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejickova/Siniakova in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
- Qualified for WTA Finals Shenzhen in doubles (w/Mertens), going 1-2 in the round-robin stage
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2018, lifting two titles, at New Haven (d. Suarez Navarro in F) and Wuhan (d. Kontaveit in F), winning 46 matches and finishing at No.11 in the rankings

- Was the biggest ranking mover on tour in 2017, moving from No.376 to No.67 (309 places)
- Made WTA breakthrough by winning International-level title at 2017 Biel/Bienne (d. Kontaveit in F), in just her second WTA main draw. At No.233, was the lowest-ranked title winner in 2017 and aged 17 years, 293 days was the youngest since Konjuh (17 years, 169 days) at 2015 Nottingham
- Advanced to 2r on tour-level debut at 2016 Prague - as wildcard

- Lifted maiden WTA title at 2021 Strasbourg, followed by sweep of singles and doubles titles at Roland-Garros. Roland Garros was just her fifth Slam main draw in singles; only two women have won a major with fewer main draw appearances to their name.
- Also won Prague title (d. Martincova in F), reached final at Dubai (L. Muguruza) and qualified for WTA Finals in singles for the first time. Recorded best results at US Open (QF) and Wimbledon (R16) last year
- Posted another record-breaking year in doubles across 2021 - in addition to singles title at Roland Garros, won doubles title too in Paris, along with Madrid, Gippsland Trophy, WTA Finals and the gold medal at Tokyo 2020 Olympic Games (all w/Siniakova)
- Enjoyed breakout year in singles in 2020, posting career-high ranking of No.65 (November 16) and making R16 at Roland Garros and reaching second WTA SF at Linz
