[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. [31] Leylah Fernandez (CAN #30)

Fernandez leads 1-0

Sabalenka:

- Returning this year as defending champion, having defeated Pegula in last year's final
- Was also R-Up here in 2023 (I. Gauff) and made the SF in 2021 and 2022
- Seeking to become the first player to win consecutive US Open women's singles titles since Serena Williams from 2012-2014
- Overall, this is her 30th Grand Slam main-draw appearance – she has also won the Australian Open twice (2023-24), finished R-Up at Roland Garros (2025, I. Gauff) and has made the Wimbledon SFs three times
- Is closing in on 100 Grand Slam main-draw wins – now up to 96-26 at majors after her two victories this week
- Has reached at least the QF stage of the last 11 Grand Slam events she has contested
- Owns a 16-4 record in Grand Slam 3r matches; she is 5-0 in 3r matches here at US Open

Fernandez:

- Making her 6th appearance at US Open, where she reached her first Grand Slam final in 2021 (finished runner-up to Raducanu in all-teenage final)
- Is through to her first 3r at US Open since that run to the final in 2021
- In their only prior meeting, Fernandez defeated then-No.2 Sabalenka in the SF of that 2021 US Open – which is her career-best win by opponent ranking
- She has faced a reigning World No.1 once before, falling to then-No.1 Iga Swiatek 6-1 6-1 at 2023 Dubai
- Bidding to reach the R16 of a Slam for the first time since 2022 Roland Garros (QF)
- During this year's North American summer hard-court swing, she won the first WTA 500 title of her career at Washington D.C. (d. Kalinskaya in final) – she owns 4 WTA singles titles overall, all on hard court

[4] Jessica Pegula (USA #4) vs. Victoria Azarenka (#132)

Tied 3-3

Pegula:

- Making 9th main draw appearance at US Open, where her best result was reaching final in 2024 (l. Sabalenka)
- Overall, this is her 27th Grand Slam main draw appearance; prior to R-Up run here last year, had reached QFs across all the Slams but never further
- Seeking her 10th trip to a Grand Slam R16; she is 9-6 in Grand Slam 3r matches (3-2 in US Open 3r matches)
- Has won 3 of her 6 encounters with Azarenka, including their most recent match at 2024 Charleston
- A win today would be her 14th straight victory against an opponent ranked outside the Top 50 at US Open (last loss was against Alize Cornet in 2019)
- Owns the joint-most singles titles this season (3) at Austin, Charleston, and Bad Homburg (same amount of titles in 2025 as Sabalenka)

Azarenka:

- Making 18th appearance at US Open, where she is a three-time finalist, in 2012-13 (l. S. Williams in F both times) and 2020 (l. Osaka in F)
- Owns two Grand Slam singles titles at Australian Open in 2012 (d. Sharapova in final) and 2013 (d. Li Na in final)
- Playing her first event since 2025 Wimbledon (l. 1r to Zakharova)
- Seeking consecutive Top 50 wins for the first time this season (beat No.45 Pavlyuchenkova in previous round)
- Owns 80 wins in career over Top 10 players (0-3 vs. Top 10 players this year)
- 20 out of her 21 WTA singles titles have come on hard court, most recently Cincinnati (NYC) in 2020
- Currently ranked No.132; this time last year was ranked No.20. Has spent 51 weeks of her career ranked World No.1

Taylor Townsend (USA #139) vs. [5] Mirra Andreeva (#5)

Andreeva leads 1-0

Townsend:

- Making 10th main-draw appearance at US Open, where her best result was reaching 4r in 2019 (l. eventual champion Bianca Andreescu)
- Defeated Antonia Ruzic and No.25 seed Jelena Ostapenko so far this week, reaching her first 3r at a Grand Slam since US Open 2023. Overall, this is her third appearance in 3r at US Open
- Seeking her third career win over a Top 10 player, with her most recent such victory coming against No.3 Jessica Pegula at Rome 2023. Also defeated No.4 Simona Halep at US Open 2019
- During this year's North American summer hard-court swing, reached Washington QF as a qualifier (l. eventual champion Fernandez), then made Cincinnati 3r (l. Bouzas Maneiro)
- Currently holds World No.1 doubles ranking; she reached the top spot in doubles for the first time on July 28

Andreeva:

- Making 3rd main-draw appearance at US Open, where she has surpassed her previous best results of reaching the 2r in 2023 and 2024
- Has beaten Alycia Parks and Anastasia Potapova so far this week; she has now appeared in 3r or better at all four Grand Slams
- She is one win away from making R16 or better at every Grand Slam event this year (finished R16 at Australian Open, QF at Roland Garros and QF at Wimbledon)
- Contesting her 11th Grand Slam main draw of career; her career-best Grand Slam performance is reaching 2024 Roland Garros SF (l. Paolini)
- Has claimed 2 of her 3 career WTA singles titles on hard court, winning back-to-back WTA 1000s at Dubai and Indian Wells this season
- Won her lone career meeting against Townsend on clay at Madrid 2024

Marketa Vondrousova (CZE #60) vs. [7] Jasmine Paolini (ITA #8)

Vondrousova leads 1-0

Vondrousova:

- Making 6th appearance at US Open, where her best result was reaching QF in 2023 (l. Keys)
- Contesting her 28th Grand Slam main draw of career; she has won 1 Grand Slam title (2023 Wimbledon, d. Jabeur in final) and reached 1 other Grand Slam final (2019 Roland Garros, l. Barty)
- Has advanced to 3r at a Grand Slam for the 11th time in her career (7-3 in her previous Grand Slam 3r matches)
- Looking to advance to the 4r of a Grand Slam for the first time since her QF finish at Roland Garros 2024
- Seeking her 15th career win against a Top 10 player; her most recent Top 10 win came over World No.1 Aryna Sabalenka during her title run at Berlin 2025
- Her last Grand Slam win against a Top 10 opponent was in the 2023 Wimbledon final against No.6 Ons Jabeur
- Won lone prior meeting against Paolini in qualifying at Biel 2017 – Vondrousova went on to win her first career WTA singles title that week

Paolini:

- Making 6th main-draw appearance at US Open, where her best result is reaching 4r in 2024 (l. Muchova)
- Contesting her 24th Grand Slam main draw of career; her career-best Grand Slam singles results are reaching back-to-back finals at 2024 Roland Garros (l. Swiatek) and 2024 Wimbledon (l. Krejčíková)
- With her two victories this week, she became the tenth Italian player in the Open Era to claim 30+ Women's Singles Grand Slam main-draw wins
- Since the start of the 2024 season, she is 18-3 at Grand Slams against players ranked outside the Top 50
- Looking to become the first Italian player to reach back-to-back Women's Singles Fourth Rounds at the US Open since Roberta Vinci (2015-2016)
- Two of her three WTA singles titles have come on hard court: Dubai 2024 and Portoroz 2021

[9] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #10) vs. Emma Raducanu (GBR #36)

Rybakina leads 1-0

Rybakina:

- Making 7th main-draw appearance at US Open; she has matched her career-best US Open results, 3r showings in 2021 and 2023 (this is the only Grand Slam where she has yet to make the QF)
- Contesting her 25th career Grand Slam main draw; she has won one Grand Slam title (2022 Wimbledon, d. Jabeur in final) and reached one other Grand Slam final (2023 Australian Open, l. Sabalenka)
- In this summer's North American hard-court swing, has lost in the SF of all 3 of her prior events, each time to the eventual champion (l. Fernandez in Washington; l. Mboko in Montreal; and l. Swiatek in Cincinnati)
- Dropped only one game vs. Raducanu in their only previous meeting (Rybakina won 6-0, 6-1 at 2022 Sydney)
- Has posted 41 tour-level match-wins this year, 3rd-most on tour (trailing only No.1 Sabalenka and No.2 Swiatek)

Raducanu:

- Making 4th appearance at US Open, where she won the title on debut in 2021 (as qualifier, d. Fernandez in final)
- At 2021 US Open, became the first qualifier to win a Grand Slam title in the Open Era – and did it without dropping a set (including in her 3 qualifying victories)
- Contesting her 14th career Grand Slam main draw; aside from her 2021 US Open title, her best Grand Slam results are R16 runs at Wimbledon 2021 (l. Tomljanovic) and 2024 (l. Sun)
- Owns 3 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.10 Emma Navarro at 2025 Miami (0-7 vs. Top 10 players since then)
- Has won 26 tour-level main-draw matches so far in 2025 – already her highest career tally in a single season
- In her first two rounds, has lost only 6 games in total, and averaged 61 minutes on court per match

[10] Emma Navarro (USA #11) vs. Barbora Krejčíková (CZE #62)

Navarro leads 1-0

Navarro:

- Making 4th main-draw appearance at US Open, where her previous result was reaching SF in 2024 (l. eventual champion Sabalenka), her best result across all majors
- Also reached another two Grand Slam QFs, at Wimbledon 2024 (l. Paolini) and Australian Open 2025 (l. Swiatek)
- Has reached 3r or better at 7 of the last 8 Grand Slam events, including this tournament (fell 1r at 2025 Roland Garros to Bouzas Maneiro)
- This is the first tournament where Navarro has won multiple matches since her R16 run at 2025 Wimbledon
- In their only previous meeting, Navarro ended Krejčíková's title defense in the 3r of 2025 Wimbledon (Navarro also beat another Czech former champion, Petra Kvitová, at 2025 Wimbledon)

Krejčíková:

- Making 5th main-draw appearance at US Open; her tournament-best result is QF in 2021 (l. Sabalenka)
- She is a 2-time Grand Slam singles champion, winning titles at 2021 Roland Garros (d. Pavlyuchenkova in final) and 2024 Wimbledon (d. Paolini in final)
- Holds 8-2 record in Grand Slam 3r matches, although she lost her 3r match at the most recent Slam, 2025 Wimbledon, to today's opponent Navarro (Krejčíková was defending champion)
- Owns 26 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.13 Elina Svitolina at 2025 Cincinnati
- Teamed with Katerina Siniakova to win the 2022 US Open women's doubles title; that title gave them the Career Grand Slam in women's doubles

[19] Elise Mertens (BEL #21) vs. Cristina Bucsa (ESP #95)

Tied 1-1

Mertens:

- Making 10th main-draw appearance at US Open; her tournament-best results are reaching back-to-back QFs in 2019 (l. eventual champion Andreescu) and 2020 (l. eventual finalist Azarenka)
- Contesting her 35th career Grand Slam main draw; her best Grand Slam performance is SF at Australian Open 2018 (l. eventual champion Wozniacki)
- Aiming to reach a Grand Slam R16 for the 16th time in her career (15-10 record in Grand Slam 3r matches)
- Coming off a QF result in Monterrey last week (l. eventual champion Shnaider, after holding 5 match points)
- Belgian women have won the US Open singles title on 5 occasions: 3 times by Kim Clijsters (2005, 2009, 2010) and twice by Justine Henin (2003, 2007)

Bucsa:

- Making 5th main-draw appearance at US Open; her previous tournament-best result was 2r in 2022 (l. Collins)
- Has equaled her best result across all Grand Slams; she also made 3r runs at Wimbledon 2025 (l. Sierra) and Australian Open 2023 (l. Swiatek)
- Contesting her 16th Grand Slam main draw of career and seeking her first trip to a Grand Slam R16
- Owns 10 wins in career over Top 50 players, most recently No.25 Donna Vekic at Wimbledon 2025
- Best singles result by a Spanish woman at US Open was the title run by Arantxa Sanchez-Vicario in 1994

[Q] Priscilla Hon (AUS #126) vs. Ann Li (USA #58)

First meeting

Hon:

- Has reached the 3r of a Grand Slam event for the first time in her career
- Contesting her 9th career Grand Slam main draw; prior to this week, her best Grand Slam performances had been 2r showings at 2019 Roland Garros (I. Keys) and 2020 Australian Open (I. Kerber)
- Her 2r victory over No.17 seed Samsonova was the second Top 20 win of her career (her other Top 20 win was over Kvitova at 2022 Adelaide)
- Her 2 wins this week are her first tour-level main-draw victories of 2025
- Also qualified for this year's Wimbledon main draw (I. 1r to Alexandrova)

Li:

- Making 5th main-draw appearance at US Open; she has equaled her tournament-best result, having reached 3r in her US Open main-draw debut in 2020 (I. Kerber)
- Contesting her 15th career Grand Slam main draw and this is her third 3rd-round showing at a Slam; she also made 3r at 2021 Australian Open (I. Sabalenka)
- Aiming to reach the R16 of a Grand Slam for the first time
- Her 2r victory over No.16 seed Bencic was the 4th Top 20 win of her career
- Her 1 WTA singles title has come on hard court, at 2021 Tenerife; she has also reached 4 additional WTA finals, all on hard court, including last week in Cleveland (finished runner-up to Cirstea)

- Making her eighth main-draw appearance at the US Open, returning this year as defending champion (d. Pegula in last year's final)
- Was also R-Up here in 2023 (l. Gauff) and made the SF in 2021 and 2022
- Has successfully defended titles twice in her career, at Wuhan in 2018-19 and Australian Open from 2023-24
- Serena Williams from 2012-14 was the last player to defend the US Open title
- Won the doubles title here at Flushing Meadows in 2019 (w/Mertens)
- Overall this is her 30th Grand Slam main draw appearance and has won the Australian Open twice (2023-24), finished R-Up at Roland-Garros (2025, l. Gauff) and has made the Wimbledon SFs three times
- Has reached at least the QF stage of last 11 Grand Slams she has contested
- Has beaten Rebeka Masarova and Polina Kudermetova so far this week to close in on 100 Grand Slam main draw wins, currently owning a 96-26 record across the Slams and is 30-6 here at US Open
- Faces No.30 Leylah Fernandez in 3r today; has lost to opposition her rank or lower twice this season, falling to No.164 Vondrousova (Berlin) and No.38 Tauson (Dubai)
- Owns a 16-4 record in Grand Slam 3r matches; she is a perfect 5-0 in 3r matches here in New York
- 17 of her 20 career titles came on hard court, including 2 this year: Miami (d. Pegula in F) & Brisbane (d. P. Kudermetova in F)
- Is currently ranked World No.1; this time last year was ranked No.2
- Contested one event leading up to US Open, reaching QF at Cincinnati (l. Rybakina)
- Last time the No.1 seed lost in the 3r at US Open was 2021 (Barty falling to Rogers)
- Owns 4-1 career record against players from Canada, with record in 2025 standing at 1-0 (d. Branstine at Wimbledon)
- Has won 52 matches so far in 2025; she is ranked No.1 on tour for match wins

- Defeated fellow Canadian Rebecca Marino in this week's 1r to register her 20th tour-level match-win of the season
- Rallied after dropping 1st set to defeat No.91 Jacquemot in 2r - in her last 15 Grand Slam matches where she'd lost the first set, this was the 2nd time she came back to win (other being 2025 Australian Open vs. Bucsa)
- Faces PIF WTA World No.1 Aryna Sabalenka today - has faced a reigning World No.1 once before, falling to Swiatek 6-1 6-1 at 2023 Dubai
- Career-best win rankings-wise came when she defeated No.2 Sabalenka in the 2021 US Open SF, to make her first Slam final
- Owns 7 wins in career over Top 10 players at tour-level events, most recently No.4 Jessica Pegula at 2025 Washington
- Bidding to reach the R16 of a Slam for the first time since 2022 Roland-Garros (QF)
- All 4 of her career titles have come on hard court: Washington DC 2025; Hong Kong 2023; Monterrey 2021 & 2022
- Of the 3 players from Canada that entered the draw, Fernandez is the only player to reach the 3r after 1r losses for Mboko (l. Krejickova) and Marino (l. Fernandez)
- Best result by a player from Canada at US Open was champion run by Bianca Andreescu in 2019
- Is currently ranked No.30; this time last year was ranked No.26. Reached career-high ranking of No.13 in August 2022
- During this year's North American summer hardcourt swing, won 1st career WTA 500-level title at Washington (d. Kalinskaya in final), then played 1r Montreal, 2r Cincinnati and 2r Monterrey

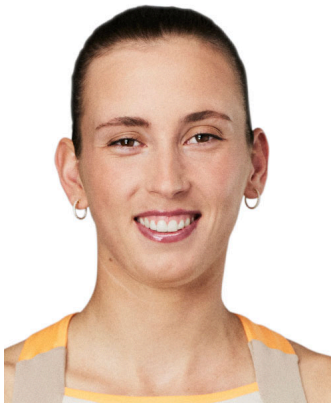
