[13] Ekaterina Alexandrova (#12) vs. [2] Iga Swiatek (POL #2)

Swiatek leads 4-2

Alexandrova:

- Making 9th main draw appearance at US Open; she is into the US Open R16 for the first time after 3r finishes in the last two years
- This is her third straight Grand Slam R16, having also reached this round at 2025 Roland Garros and Wimbledon
- Seeking a trip to her first Grand Slam QF after going 0-3 in her previous Slam R16s (2023 Wimbledon, 2025 Roland Garros and 2025 Wimbledon)
- Has only dropped 10 games total in her first three rounds; averaging 63.6 minutes on court per match
- Has posted 19 Top 10 wins in her career, but she is 0-8 vs. Top 10 players at Grand Slam events
- Three of her 5 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court, and she also reached a hard court final last week at WTA 500 Monterrey (I. Shnaider in final)
- Entered the US Open at a new career-high singles ranking of No.12, as well as in 10th place in the PIF Race to the WTA Finals
- Trails 4-2 in head-to-head vs. Swiatek, although both of Alexandrova's wins have been on hard court (2021 Melbourne Gippstand Trophy 3r and 2024 Miami R16)

Swiatek:

- 2022 US Open champion (d. Jabeur in final)
- She is a six-time Grand Slam singles champion; her other five Slam titles coming at Roland Garros (2020, 2022-2024) and most recently 2025 Wimbledon (d. Anisimova in final)
- Bidding to become the first player since Serena Williams in 2012 to win Wimbledon and US Open in the same calendar year
- Aiming to make a 13th career Grand Slam QF, and her 3rd QF at the US Open after 2022 (won title) and 2024 (QF, l. eventual finalist Pegula)
- Since the start of Wimbledon, Swiatek is the player with the most Tour-level match wins (17)
- This fortnight, she became the first woman to claim 30+ hard court wins for four consecutive seasons (2022-2025) since Elina Svitolina (2016-2019)
- 24-year-old Swiatek could become the youngest woman to reach all four QFs at Grand Slams in a single season since 18-year-old Maria Sharapova in 2005
- Holds the highest win rate of any currently active player in women's singles matches at Grand Slam events (83.7%, 103-20 -- minimum 10 matches played)

[23] Naomi Osaka (JPN #24) vs. [3] Coco Gauff (USA #3)

Gauff leads 3-2

Osaka:

- Making 9th main-draw appearance at US Open, where she is a two-time champion (2018, d. S. Williams in F and 2020, d. Azarenka in F)
- The former World No.1 has won 4 Grand Slam titles overall (all on hard court), also claiming the Australian Open title in 2019 (d. Kvitova in F) and 2021 (d. Brady in F)
- Among players still in the draw, only Iga Swiatek (6) has claimed more Grand Slam titles than Osaka (4)
- Is into the R16 at a Grand Slam event for the first time since her title run at 2021 Australian Open
- Seeking a trip to her 5th career Grand Slam QF (4-2 record in Grand Slam R16 matches) – so far in her career, every time Osaka has reached a Grand Slam QF, she has gone on to win the title
- Owns 13 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.10 Jelena Ostapenko at last year's US Open
- All of her seven Hologic WTA Tour-level titles have come on hard court; in addition to her 4 Grand Slam titles, she won Indian Wells in 2018, and Beijing and Osaka in 2019
- One of two mothers to make the R16 at this year's US Open, along with Taylor Townsend
- Osaka's first win over Gauff came here at the US Open in the 2019 3r; they are 1-1 in Grand Slam meetings, with Gauff getting a 3r win over Osaka at the very next Slam, the 2020 Australian Open

Gauff:

- Making 7th US Open appearance; she won her first Grand Slam title here in 2023 (d. Sabalenka in final)
- With her 2023 victory in New York at age 19, Gauff became the first American teenager to win the women's singles title at the US Open since Serena Williams in 1999
- Overall, this is her 25th Grand Slam main draw appearance, and she has won one additional Grand Slam singles title, prevailing at 2025 Roland Garros (d. Sabalenka in F)
- If she can reach the QF here, this would be the first time Gauff makes 3 Slam QFs in a single calendar year (already in 2025, she won Roland Garros title and made QF at Australian Open)
- Seeking her 10th Grand Slam QF overall – she could become the youngest woman to reach 10 total Slam QFs since Maria Sharapova in 2008
- Since 2000, only Maria Sharapova (85) has claimed more match wins at Grand Slams than Coco Gauff (74) while aged 21 or under
- Gauff is the youngest woman to reach R16 at 4 straight US Opens since Caroline Wozniacki between 2008-11
- Since the start of 2023, Gauff is 38-2 at Grand Slams vs. opponents ranked outside the Top 20 (both losses came in the Wimbledon 1r, to Kenin in 2023 and Yastremska in 2025)
- Leads Osaka 3-2 in their head-to-head including wins in their last two meetings (2022 San Jose, and 2024 Beijing via ret.); all of their meetings have been on hard court

[8] Amanda Anisimova (USA #9) vs. [18] Beatriz Haddad Maia (BRA #22)

Anisimova leads 2-1

Anisimova:

- Making 6th main draw appearance at US Open and is into R16 for the first time; she has now reached R16 or better at all four Grand Slam events in her career
- Best result across all Grand Slams is a trip to the final earlier this summer at 2025 Wimbledon (l. Swiatek in F)
- She has won her last 11 Grand Slam matches against opponents ranked outside the Top 20
- Bidding to become the sixth American woman in the past 20 years to reach the QFs on all three surfaces at Grand Slam events, joining S. Williams, V. Williams, Stephens, Keys and Pegula
- First time being seeded among Top 8 at a Grand Slam event
- Made her Top 10 debut on July 14, following the Wimbledon final; this time last year was ranked No.50

Haddad Maia:

- Making 5th main-draw appearance at US Open, where her best result is reaching last year's QF (l. Muchova)
- Contesting her 22nd Grand Slam main-draw appearance; best result across all majors is SF run at 2023 Roland Garros (l. eventual champion Swiatek)
- 2 of her 4 career WTA singles titles have come on hard court (2023 Zhuhai and 2024 Seoul)
- Owns 12 total wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.9 Emma Navarro at Strasbourg 2025
- Looking to claim her second Top 10 win at a Grand Slam event, after defeating No.7 Jabeur from a set down in the 2023 Roland Garros QF
- Aiming to become the first Brazilian woman in the Open Era to reach multiple QFs at a single Grand Slam event

[27] Marta Kostyuk (UKR #28) vs. [11] Karolina Muchova (CZE #13)

First meeting

Kostyuk:

- Making 6th main draw appearance at US Open; after 3r finishes in 2020 (l. eventual champion Osaka) and 2024 (l. Navarro), she is into the R16 in New York for the first time
- Seeking her 2nd career Grand Slam QF; best result across all Grand Slams is 2024 Australian Open QF (l. Gauff)
- Two of her 13 career Top 20 wins have occurred at Grand Slams: d. No.13 Muguruza in 2021 Roland Garros 1r, and d. No.8 Sakkari in 2023 Wimbledon 1r
- Before this year, last time a woman from Ukraine reached 4r at US Open was 2021 (Svitolina made QF that year)
- Lost in the first round of the previous two Grand Slams to qualifiers ranked outside the Top 100 (l. No.188 Bejlek at 2025 Roland Garros; l. No.171 Erjavec at 2025 Wimbledon)
- Her one career WTA singles title was earned on hard court at Austin 2023

Muchova:

- Making 8th main-draw appearance at US Open, where she advanced to SF the past two years - l. Gauff in 2023 and Pegula in 2024
- Trying to become the first Czech woman to reach the US Open QF in three consecutive years since Karolina Pliskova from 2016-18
- Best result at Grand Slams has been runner-up finish at Roland Garros in 2023 (l. Swiatek)
- Seeking her 7th career Grand Slam QF; she has already reached the QF or better at all four Grand Slam events
- Record in R16 matches at Grand Slams stands at 6-1, with the one loss coming at 2020 US Open (l. Azarenka)
- Her one career WTA singles title came on hard court at Seoul 2019
- Is currently ranked No.13; this time last year was ranked No.52 and was unseeded when she made her 2024 run to the semifinals. Reached her career-high ranking of No.8 following her 2023 US Open SF result

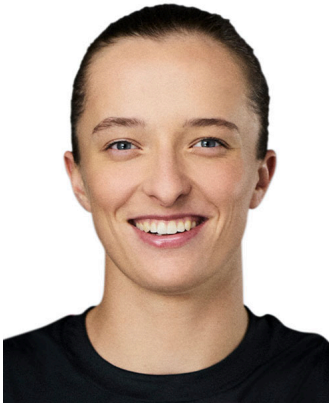

PLAYER NOTES

- Making 9th main draw appearance at US Open; this is the first time she has reached the 4r here
- Prior to this year, her previous tournament-best result had been two 3r runs in 2024 (l. eventual champion Sabalenka) and 2023 (l. Vondrousova)
- Contesting her 34th Grand Slam career main draw; she is bidding to reach her first career Grand Slam QF after 4r losses at Wimbledon 2023, Roland Garros 2025 and Wimbledon 2025
- Could become the 12th player aged 30+ in the Open Era to reach a maiden Grand Slam QF, and the first to achieve this feat at the US Open
- Has beaten Anastasija Sevastova, Wang Xinyu and Laura Siegemund so far at this tournament; Alexandrova has dropped only 10 games in her first 3 rounds
- Faces No.2 Iga Swiatek in 4r today; looking to register her first Top 10 win at a Grand Slam event (0-8 record), her last Top 10 defeat at a Slam was against No.2 Gauff at Roland Garros this year
- Outside of Grand Slams, owns 19 career wins over Top 10 players, most recently No.3 Jessica Pegula at Stuttgart 2025
- Owns 5-10 career tour-level record against players from Poland, most recent was loss against today's opponent Swiatek at Bad Homburg 2025
- 3 of her 5 career titles have come on hard court (2020 Shenzhen, 2022 Seoul and 2025 Linz)
- Also reached a hard court final last week at WTA 500 Monterrey (l. Shnaider in F)
- Posted a new career-high ranking of No.12 this week; this time last year was ranked No.31
- Has won 38 tour-level matches so far in 2025, tied for 5th-most match-wins on tour this year
- Enters the US Open in 10th position in the PIF Race to the WTA Finals

- Making her 7th main draw appearance at US Open, where she is a former champion, lifting the title in 2022 (d. Jabeur in F); also reached QF in 2024
- Title here in 2022 is one of six Grand Slam crowns, the other five coming at Roland Garros (2020, 2022-2024) and Wimbledon (2025)
- Bidding to be first player since Serena Williams in 2012 to win Wimbledon and US Open in the same calendar year
- Was R-Up w/Ruud in US Open Mixed Doubles event held last week (l. Errani/Vavassori in F)
- Won her 24th career title at Cincinnati earlier this month - the last two US Open champions also won Cincinnati prior to coming to New York, Gauff in 2023 and Sabalenka in 2024
- Contesting her 27th career Grand Slam main draw; bidding to reach a 13th career Grand Slam QF, and a third QF at the US Open after 2022 and 2024
- Holds a 12-7 career record in Grand Slam 4r matches (2-2 at US Open)
- Could become the youngest player to reach all four QFs at Grand Slams in a season since Maria Sharapova in 2005
- Faces No.12 Ekaterina Alexandrova in 4r today; owns 15-8 record in 2025 against Top 20 opponents, most recently defeated No.9 Paolini in the 2025 Cincinnati final
- 13 of her 24 WTA singles titles have come on hard court, most recently Cincinnati 2025
- Best result by a player from Poland at US Open was Swiatek's title run in 2022
- Is currently ranked No.2; this time last year was ranked No.1. She has spent 125 weeks of her career ranked World No.1
- Has won 52 matches so far in 2025; she is ranked No.2 on tour for match wins, behind Aryna Sabalenka (53)

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2024, highlights included reaching the final at Linz (l. Ostapenko in Final) and semifinals at Adelaide (l. eventual champion Ostapenko), Miami (l. eventual champion Collins), 's-Hertogenbosch (l. eventual champion Samsonova) and Monterrey (l. Sun); also made quarterfinals at Wuhan (l. Xin. Wang) and her best Grand Slam result of the season came during a 3r run at US Open (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- In 2023, won fourth career singles title at 's-Hertogenbosch, successfully defending the title and defeating top seed, Kudrmetova in the final. - Returned to play in 2024 following maternity leave and reached the QF at Doha and 's-Hertogenbosch, as well as R16 at Rome and Beijing
- Played 2022 Tokyo in September before taking a 15 month break to give birth to daughter Shai in early July 2023

CAREER MILESTONES

- Started 2024 season by reaching QF (l. Keys) at Eastbourne, her first event since US Open 2023. Reached two finals at Beijing (l. Gauff in F) and Palermo (l. Zheng in F). Made consecutive SF at US Open (l. Pegula) and reached another SF at Ningbo (l. M. Andreeva, retired in 2nd set).
- Enjoyed break-out season in 2023, reaching debut Slam final at Roland-Garros (l. Swiatek), debut WTA 1000 final at Cincinnati (l. Gauff) and made Top 10 debut in August. Also secured debut qualification for WTA Finals but did not compete due to injury.
- Best result in 2022 was QF showing at Tallinn (l. Kanepi). Also made 3r at Roland Garros and 2r at Ostrava.
- Back, abdominal and ankle injuries restricted her to just four tournaments in first half of 2022.
- Broke into Top 20 for first time in career in 2021, peaking at No.19 (May 17).
- Posted best result at the Grand Slams with SF run at Australian Open (l. Brady) and matched best return at Wimbledon by making QF (l. Kerber, made QF in 2019). Also made last eight at Madrid (l. Pavlyuchenkova).
- Defeated the World No.1 and No.2 during 2021, defeating No.1 Barty at Australian Open and No.2 Osaka at Madrid (only other player to manage this was Badosa).
- Broke into Top 20 for first time in career in 2021, peaking at No.19 (May 17).
- Posted best result at the Grand Slams with SF run at Australian Open (l. Brady) and matched best return at Wimbledon by making QF (l. Kerber, made QF in 2019). Also made last eight at Madrid (l. Pavlyuchenkova).
- Defeated the World No.1 and No.2 during 2021, defeating No.1 Barty at Australian Open and No.2 Osaka at Madrid (only other player to manage this was Badosa).
- Posted best result at US Open by reaching R16 in 2020 - handed V.Williams her first-ever opening round loss in New York in 22 appearances, then saved three MPs vs. Cirstea in 3r, before falling to eventual R-Up Azarenka.
- Finished 2019 season in rich vein of form, winning 18 of last 24 matches, including capturing maiden WTA title at Seoul (d. Linette in F), SFs at Zhuhai (l. eventual champion Sabalenka) and Moscow (l. Pavlyuchenkova) and maiden major QF at Wimbledon (l. Svitolina)
- During run to last eight at 2019 Wimbledon upset No.3 Ka.Pliskova in R16 to record her first

- Reached two WTA 500 finals in 2024 at San Diego and Stuttgart finishing runner-up at both. Also made first Grand Slam quarterfinal at Australian Open and first WTA 1000 semifinal at Indian Wells.
- Earned five Top 10 wins in 2024, entered the year with only three in career and made Top 20 debut on May 6, 2024 finishing the year at No.18
- In 2023, won maiden singles title at Austin (d. Gracheva) and doubles title at Birmingham (w/Krejciikova).

- Played first WTA qualifying at 2017 Mallorca (l. Kalinskaya in 1r)
- Ukrainian Fed Cup Team 2018-20

- Top 10 victory; following the tournament, broke into Top 50 at No.43 on July 15, 2019
- First WTA final appearance came during R-Up finish on home soil at 2019 Prague (l. Teichmann) - made Top 100 debut at No.74 following the tournament (May 6, 2019)
- Advanced to maiden WTA QF at 2019 Doha (as qualifier, l. Svitolina)
