QUARTERFINALS – THURSDAY, FEBRUARY 12

Jelena Ostapenko (LAT #24) vs. [LL] Elisabetta Cocciaretto (ITA #57) Cocciaretto leads 1-0

Ostapenko:

- Making her 10th appearance at this tournament, where she has been a two-time runner-up in 2016 (tournament debut ranked No.88, I. Suarez Navarro in final) and last year (I. Anisimova in final)
- With her R16 win over Osorio, Ostapenko became the player with the most wins at this tournament since its inception in 2001 (23), eclipsing Victoria Azarenka and Petra Kvitova (22 each)
- Contesting her 77th career WTA 1000 main draw; her best WTA 1000 results are 3 runner-up finishes, adding 2018 Miami (I. Stephens in final) to her two Doha finals
- Into her 13th career WTA 1000 quarterfinal, and seeking her 9th career WTA 1000 semifinal
- Has an undefeated 3-0 record in quarterfinal matches at this tournament
- This is her first Tour-level quarterfinal appearance since her run to the 2025 Stuttgart title (d. Sabalenka in F)

Cocciaretto:

- Making her debut at Doha; replaced McCartney Kessler (low back injury) in the main draw as a lucky loser
- Contesting her 25th career WTA 1000 main draw; she has advanced to R16 and beyond at a WTA 1000 event for the first time in her career
- Attempting to become the first Italian to make the quarterfinals at this tournament – Italian women have gone 0-9 in Doha quarterfinal matches
- She is the 2nd lucky loser to reach a WTA 1000 quarterfinal since the format was introduced in 2009, joining Taylor Townsend (2024 Toronto) – now trying to become the first lucky loser to make a WTA 1000 semifinal
- Equaled the best result by a lucky loser at this event: Klara Koukalova also posted a QF finish in 2011 at WTA 500-level (I. Jankovic)
- Made title run earlier this year at Hobart (d. Jovic in final), which was her first hard-court Tour-level title

[1] Iga Swiatek (POL #2) vs. Maria Sakkari (GRE #52) Swiatek leads 4-3

Swiatek:

- Making her 6th appearance at Doha, where she has won the title a tournament-leading three times (2022-24)
- Has won 18 of her 20 career matches at Doha (15 of the 18 wins have come in straight sets)
- Has reached the Doha QF for the 5th consecutive year; she has never lost in this round at Doha
- Since this tournament began in 2001, Swiatek (2022-26) is only the second woman to reach the tournament's quarterfinals in five consecutive years, joining her compatriot Agnieszka Radwanska (2012-16)
- Contesting her 42nd WTA 1000 main draw of career, and seeking a trip to her 22nd WTA 1000 semifinal
- Aiming for her 12th career WTA 1000 title and first since 2025 Cincinnati (d. Paolini in final)
- Since 2023 Wimbledon, Swiatek has lost only one match against a player ranked outside the Top 50 (the one loss was to No.140 Eala at 2025 Miami)

Sakkari:

- Making her 8th main draw appearance at Doha; her best results here are semifinal runs in 2022 (l. eventual champion Swiatek) and 2023 (l. eventual runner-up Pegula)
- Contesting her 59th career WTA 1000 main draw; she has won one WTA 1000 title at 2023 Guadalajara (d. Dolehide in final)
- She has reached her 16th career WTA 1000 quarterfinal, and first since 2024 Miami
- Seeking 11th career WTA 1000 semifinal, and first since she was 2024 Indian Wells runner-up (l. Swiatek in final)
- Owns a 3-10 career record against players ranked inside the Top 2 at the time of their meeting (her Top 2 wins are over No.2 Osaka at 2021 Miami, No.2 Sabalenka at 2021 WTA Finals, and No.2 Jabeur at 2022 WTA Finals)
- Has won three consecutive WTA main draw matches for the first time since reaching the Round of 16 in Madrid last year, and for the first time on hard court since she made the final at 2024 Indian Wells
- Having defeated Jasmine Paolini earlier in the week, Sakkari is now trying to claim multiple Top 10 wins at a single event for the first time since the 2022 WTA Finals

[10] Victoria Mboko (CAN #13) vs. [2] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #3)

Rybakina leads 2-1

Mboko:

- Making her tournament debut at Doha
- Contesting just her 6th career WTA 1000 main draw, and has already won one WTA 1000 title (2025 Montreal)
- Seeking her 4th career Top 10 win and second straight, having beaten No.7 Andreeva in the previous round (also defeated No.9 Keys during run to the final at 2026 Adelaide and No.2 Gauff during 2025 Montreal title run)
- Both of her two career WTA singles titles were achieved on hard court: Hong Kong 2025 (d. Bucsa in final) and Montreal 2025 (as an 18-year-old wildcard, d. Osaka in final)
- Has become the first teenager to reach the Doha quarterfinals in their first appearance at the event since Coco Gauff in 2022
- Attempting to become the first teenager to make the Doha WTA semifinals since Jelena Ostapenko reached the final in 2016

Rybakina:

- Making 6th appearance at Doha and is into the QF for the third straight year; her tournament-best result is finishing as the 2024 runner-up (l. Swiatek in final)
- Currently on a 9-match winning streak, having just won her second career Grand Slam title at the 2026 Australian Open (d. Sabalenka in final)
- Contesting her 42nd career WTA 1000 main draw; she is a two-time WTA 1000 champion, winning titles at 2023 Rome (d. Kalinina in final) and 2023 Indian Wells (d. Sabalenka in final)
- Into her 18th career WTA 1000 quarterfinal and is seeking her 12th career WTA 1000 semifinal
- Owns the most match-wins on Tour since the end of Wimbledon last year (39) and has won 22 of her last 24 matches
- Since last August, Elena Rybakina has claimed 14 Top 20 wins, the most of any player on Tour

[14] Karolina Muchova (CZE #19) vs. Anna Kalinskaya (#28)

Muchova leads 3-0

Muchova:

- Making her 4th appearance at Doha, where she has matched her tournament-best result by reaching the quarterfinals; she also made the 2019 quarterfinals as a qualifier ranked No.132 (I. Svitolina)
- Contesting her 27th career WTA 1000 main draw; she is a two-time WTA 1000 runner-up at 2023 Cincinnati and 2024 Beijing (I. Gauff in both finals)
- She has reached her 7th career WTA 1000 quarterfinal, and is seeking her 4th career WTA 1000 semifinal
- Career-best finish on hard court is her one career WTA singles title at 2019 Seoul (d. Linette in final)
- Best results by Czech Republic at Doha are title runs by Petra Kvitova in 2018 and 2021, Karolina Pliskova in 2017, and Lucie Safarova in 2015

Kalinskaya:

- Making her 3rd main draw appearance at Doha; prior to this year had never won a match at this event
- Contesting her 32nd career WTA 1000 main draw; her career-best WTA 1000 result is runner-up at 2024 Dubai (I. Paolini in final)
- Has reached her 4th career WTA 1000 quarterfinal; along with her 2024 Dubai runner-up, she also made WTA 1000 quarterfinals at 2022 Guadalajara (ret. vs. Bouzkova) and 2025 Cincinnati (I. Swiatek)
- Seeking her 3rd straight Top 20 win, having defeated No.18 Emma Navarro and No.9 Elina Svitolina in the last two rounds
- She has posted 3 consecutive Top 20 wins at the same event on two occasions, at 2024 Dubai and 2024 Berlin (finished runner-up both times)
- Seeking her first Tour-level semifinal since a runner-up finish at 2025 Washington DC (I. Fernandez in final)

CAREER MILESTONES

- 2025 singles highlights include ninth career title at Stuttgart (d. World No.1 Sabalenka in final) and reaching WTA 1000 Doha final (l. Anisimova in final). In doubles, qualified for WTA Finals Riyadh w/Hsieh after making two Grand Slam finals (R-Up at Australian Open and Wimbledon). Also won doubles titles at Charleston (w/Routliffe) and Abu Dhabi (w/Perez)
- Won seventh and eighth titles of career in 2024 at Adelaide and Linz. In doubles won first Grand Slam title at 2024 Australian Open and qualified for 2024 WTA Finals Riyadh (both with Lyudmyla Kichenok)
- Won sixth career title at 2023 Birmingham (d. Krejčíková in F) and reached SF at Rome; in doubles achieved R-Up at Doha (w/L.Kichenok)
- In 2022, lifted fifth career singles title at Dubai (d. V. Kudrmetova in F) and finished R-Up at Eastbourne (l. Kvitová) and Seoul (l. Alexandrova); in doubles, won two titles w/L. Kichenok at Birmingham and Cincinnati and qualified for WTA Finals (reached SF)
- Lifted first grass court title at 2021 Eastbourne (as WC, d. Kontaveit in F); also that year, finished R-Up at Luxembourg (l. Tauson), represented Latvia at the Tokyo Olympics (l. Vesnina in 1r) and won doubles title at 2021 Moscow (w/Siniakova)
- Highlights of 2020 season included three Top 10 wins and reaching QF at Strasbourg
- 2019 season saw her capture third career title at Luxembourg (d. Goerges in F) right after finishing R-Up at Linz (l. Gauff). Also R-Up in mixed doubles at 2019 Wimbledon w/Lindstedt
- 2018 campaign highlighted by finishing R-Up at Miami (l. Stephens); beat No.9 Petra Kvitová and No.4 Elina Svitolina to register multiple Top 10 wins in the same tournament for the first time
- Also in 2018, reached Wimbledon SF to become first Latvian woman to reach final four at All England Club (l. eventual champion Kerber) and achieved career-high ranking of No.5 on March 19
- Enjoyed career-best season in 2017, making Top 10 debut on Sept. 11 and finishing the year in the Top 10 for the first time (at No.7)
- Champion at 2017 Roland Garros (d. Halep in F) becoming first woman to win first tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Barbara Jordan at 1979 Australian Open. Also became the first unseeded player to lift the trophy in the Open Era and the first Latvian player to reach the championship match at a Grand Slam
- In 2025, made Tour SF at 's-Hertogenbosch and reached Tour QFs at Cluj-Napoca and Guangzhou. Also won WTA 125 Bastad (d. Kawa in F) and earned first Top 5 win of career by defeating No.3 Pegula in Wimbledon 1r
- Highlight of 2024 season was posting best Grand Slam result with a run to R16 at Roland Garros for the first time in her career (l. Gauff) and 2r at US Open. Also made SF run at Birmingham for the first time (l. eventual champion Putintseva)
- In 2023, won first WTA Tour singles title at Lausanne in July (d. Burel in F), and reached first WTA Tour singles final at Hobart in January (l. Davis). Broke into Top 30 for first time, peaking at career-high No.29 in August
- Best Tour-level result of 2022 was QF at Budapest (l. eventual champion Pera). At WTA 125 events in 2022, won title at Tampico and finished R-Up at Makarska
- In 2021, advanced to first career WTA Tour SF at Guadalajara (as qualifier, l. Bouchard); sidelined with knee injury from mid-July until end of season
- During 2020, reached first WTA Tour QF at Palermo (1 of 3 Italians to make QF, along with Errani and Giorgi - the last time 3 Italians made QF at Tour-level event was 2015 Hobart: Giorgi, Knapp and Vinci); also made Palermo doubles final (R-Up w/Trevisan), and was singles R-Up at WTA 125 Prague
- Fell 1r on Grand Slam main draw debut at 2020 Australian Open (as qualifier, l. Kerber)
- In 2019, fell 1r on WTA debut at Rome (as WC, l. Anisimova) and Palermo (as qualifier, l. Kuzmova), and won three titles on ITF Circuit. Rose over 500 ranking spots during the year, finishing season at No.215
- In 2018, won maiden title on ITF Circuit at \$15K Nules-ESP
- Owns six singles titles and one doubles title on ITF Circuit
- Professional debut came on ITF Circuit in Italy in 2017


