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QUARTERFINAL QUICK HITS

- Following Sabalenka's R16 exit, Rybakina could rise to World No.1 by reaching the final; a runner-up finish would give her 8,576 points - one more than Sabalenka's 8,575
- Rybakina is the first player since Karolina Pliskova in 2019 to reach the QFs at all four North American WTA 1000 events in the same year: Indian Wells, Miami, Canadian Open and Cincinnati. She could become the third player since the WTA 1000 format introduction in 2009 to reach the SFs at all four North American WTA 1000 events in the same year, joining Halep and Serena Williams who both achieved the feat in 2015
- Swiatek is the fourth-youngest player to reach 30 Tier I / WTA 1000 QFs since 1990, older only than Hingis, Radwanska and Sharapova
- Since 2009, only S.Williams (45) and Radwanska (46) have made 30 WTA 1000 QFs from fewer appearances than Swiatek (48)
- Four Americans (Keys, Gauff, Pegula and Anisimova) have made the QFs at Cincinnati for the first time since 1988 (six - Kathy Rinaldi Stunkel, Susan Sloane Lundy, Barbara Potter, Mareen Louie Harper, Halle Cioffi and Beth Herr)
- This is the third time since 2009 that four Americans have made the QFs at a WTA 1000 event, after 2024 Toronto (5 - Pegula, Stearns, Navarro, Townsend, Anisimova) and 2025 Beijing (4 - Navarro, Pegula, Anisimova, Gauff)
- The Anisimova vs. Pegula match will be the third all-American QF at Cincinnati since 2000, following S.Williams vs. Amy Frazier in 2006 and Madison Keys vs. Venus Williams in 2019
- Among this year's Cincinnati quarterfinalists born in the 2000s, Swiatek (23) has reached the most WTA 1000 SFs, followed by Gauff (16) and Anisimova (4)
- Pegula is the fourth player since 2009 to reach 5+ WTA 1000 quarterfinals after having turned 30 years old after Na Li (2012), S.Williams (2013, 2014 and 2015) and Svetlana Kuznetsova (2016)
- Among Americans, only S.Williams (5) has made more quarterfinals at Cincinnati than Pegula in the Open Era (4 - 2020, 2022, 2024 and 2026)
- Gauff is the youngest player to reach back-to-back QFs at Cincinnati (2025-2026) since Svitolina (2014-2015)
- Since 1990, only Hingis (39) has reached more QFs at Tier I / WTA 1000 events than Gauff (26) before turning 23
- Kostyuk has reached Cincinnati QF for the first time in her career; she could equal the best result by a Ukrainian at the event in the Open Era by reaching the SFs, matching Svitolina's 2015 run
- Keys has reached her fourth Cincinnati Open QF (2018, 2019, 2022, 2026); only four players have made more in the Open Era: Jankovic, Halep, Sabalenka and S.Williams
- Bejlek is the youngest of this year's eight quarterfinalists (20 years 194 days); since the event's reinauguration in 2004, she could become the youngest left-handed player to reach the semifinals at Cincinnati
- Bejlek is the only quarterfinalist at this year's Cincinnati Open to have not won a WTA 1000 title

Pegula leads 5-0

Anisimova:

- Making 5th appearance at Cincinnati and she is through to QF for the first time after her previous best result of R16 in 2018 (l. Svitolina)
- Two of her 4 career titles have come at WTA 1000 level, at Doha (d. Ostapenko in F) and Beijing (d. Noskova in F) in 2025
- Contesting her 7th career WTA 1000 QF today, her second of the season after Dubai and first on American soil
- After losing her first two career WTA 1000 QFs at Madrid and Rome in 2022, she has won her last four consecutively, all on hard court
- Through to her 4th QF of the season after SF at Dubai (l. Pegula) and QF at London (l. Jovic) and Australian Open (l. Pegula)
- She is 2-4 so far this season against Top 10 players, with both wins coming on hard court over No.8 Noskova in the R16 here and No.7 Andreeva at Dubai
- Three of her 4 titles were won on hard court; her two WTA 1000 titles, as well as Melbourne 250 #2 in 2022 (d. Sasnovich in F)
- Looking to reach her 5th career WTA 1000 SF, and second this season after SF at Dubai (l. eventual champion Pegula)

Pegula:

- Making 8th main draw appearance at Cincinnati with her best result in 2024 with R-Up (l. Sabalenka in F)
- Owns 4 WTA 1000 titles, capturing her fourth this year at Dubai (d. Svitolina in F)
- Has won 43 matches in 2026, leading the WTA in Tour-level match wins so far this year
- Holds a 27-6 record on hard court in 2026, highlighted by the title at Dubai, a runner-up finish at Washington DC, and semifinal appearances at Brisbane and Australian Open
- Contesting her 26th career WTA 1000 QF and fifth of the season, equaling her best career tally in a single year (also five in 2022)
- This is her 11th Tour-level QF of the season, the most on Tour alongside Svitolina; only Svitolina (seven) has reached more SFs than Pegula (six) so far this year
- Pegula is looking to become the oldest semifinalist at Cincinnati since Angelique Kerber in 2021 and the second-oldest American in the Open Era, younger only than Serena Williams (2014, 2015)
- She has equaled the Williams sisters (11 each) for the most WTA 1000 QF appearances by an American on home soil since the format's introduction in 2009
- Pegula is 5-5 against Top 10 opponents this season; her most recent Top 10 win on hard court came in the Dubai final, where she defeated No.9 Svitolina
- Looking to reach her 15th career WTA 1000 SF; and a second this season after title run at Dubai

Swiatek leads 7-6

Swiatek:

- Defending Cincinnati champion (d. Paolini in F) is competing in her 8th main draw here
- Has made at least the semifinals in each of her last three appearances here, reaching the SF in 2024 (l. eventual champion Sabalenka) and 2023 (l. eventual champion Gauff)
- A win today would see her equal Halep's Open Era record of four consecutive QF wins at the event (2015-18)
- Has won 12 WTA 1000 titles in her career, most recently last week at Toronto (d. Rybakina in F)
- Following her tournament victory in Toronto, she has now won eight of the 10 current WTA 1000 events on the calendar, with Dubai and Wuhan the only exceptions
- Contesting her 30th WTA 1000 QF from 48 appearances, only S.Williams (45) and Agnieszka Radwanska (46) have reached as many QFs from fewer appearances since the format's introduction in 2009
- This is her fifth WTA 1000 QF of the season after title run at Toronto, SF at Rome and QF at Indian Wells and Doha
- She is 3-5 so far this season against Top 10 players, with her most recent a win over No.2 Rybakina in the final at Toronto
- Looking to reach her 24th career WTA 1000 SF today, and a third this season after her title run at Toronto and SF at Rome (l. eventual champion Svitolina)

Rybakina:

- Making 7th main draw appearance at Cincinnati, where she reached her best result last year with SF (l. Swiatek)
- She is through to the QF here for the third time in her career after SF last year and QF in 2022 (l. Keys)
- Owns two WTA 1000 titles, winning 2023 Indian Wells (d. Sabalenka in F) and 2023 Rome (d. Kalinina in F via ret.)
- Contesting her 23rd career WTA 1000 QF today; and her 6th this season after R-Up finishes at Toronto and Indian Wells, SF at Miami and QFs at Doha and Rome
- She is 8-4 so far this season against Top 10 players; most recent win came over No.4 Gauff at Toronto
- Seven of her 13 titles were won on hard court, including winning her second Grand Slam this year at Australian Open (d. Sabalenka in F)
- Has claimed the most WTA 1000 match wins (25) and the most Tour-level match wins on hard court (29) of any player this season
- Seeking her 15th career WTA 1000 SF, and fourth of the season after Toronto, Indian Wells and Miami

- Faces No.3 Jessica Pegula in QF today; she's 2-4 so far this season against Top 10 players, with wins over No.8 Noskova in the 4r here and No.7 Andreeva at Dubai
- Owns 24-21 career record against players from United States of America, 2-4 this season with wins over Kenin at Wimbledon and Stearns at Australian Open
- Her four losses to fellow Americans this season have come against Pegula (Australian Open, Dubai), Jovic (London) and Keys (Wimbledon)
- 3 of her 4 career Tour-level titles have come on hard court: her two WTA 1000 titles, as well as Melbourne 250 #2 in 2022 (d. Sasnovich in F)
- One of 4 players from United States of America to reach the quarterfinals alongside Pegula, Gauff and Keys
- Is currently ranked No.10; this time last year was ranked No.8. Reached career-high ranking of No.3 in January of this year
- She is 15-7 so far this season on hard court, with her best result on the surface being the Dubai SF

- After a 1r bye, has defeated WALTERT, NAVARRO and Cirstea this week to reach her 26th career WTA 1000 QF and fifth of the season, equalling her career-best tally in a single year (also five in 2022)
- Faces No.10 Amanda Anisimova in QF today; Pegula is 5-5 so far this season against Top 10 players, most recent was a loss to No.7 Gauff at Wimbledon. Her most recent win came over No.1 Sabalenka at Berlin
- She's 9-1 this season against fellow Americans, with her only loss coming to Gauff at Wimbledon
- 7 of her 11 career titles have come on hard court: Dubai 2026, Austin 2025, Toronto 2024, Seoul 2023, Montreal 2023, Guadalajara 2022 and Washington DC 2019
- Has won 2 WTA titles this year, one on clay at WTA 500 Charleston (d. Starodubtseva in F) and one on hard court at WTA 1000 Dubai (d. Svitolina in F)
- Is currently ranked at a career-high of No.3 (first achieved in October 2022); this time last year was ranked No.4

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CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2025, won first two WTA 1000 titles of her career at Doha (d. Ostapenko in final) and Beijing (d. Noskova in final), and reached her first two Grand Slam finals at Wimbledon (l. Swiatek) and US Open (l. Sabalenka)
- Made Top 20, Top 10 and Top 5 debuts during 2025, finishing the season at a career-high No.4 ranking
- In 2024 made first WTA 1000 final of career at Toronto, finishing R-Up to Pegula (defeated No.3 Sabalenka en route). Also enjoyed run to R16 at Australian Open, her third time reaching that stage in Melbourne
- Played a small number of tournaments in 2023 before taking a break away from the sport after Madrid in April
- Lifted second career title at Melbourne Summer Set 2 (d. Sasnovich in F) in January 2022. Also in 2022, made SF at Charleston (l. Jabeur) and five further QFs, including at Wimbledon (l. Halep)
- Ended 2021 season with 3r run at Indian Wells to secure her fourth consecutive Top-100 finish. Best results were QF runs at Parma and Bad Homburg
