MATCH NOTES – DAY 3 – THURSDAY, APRIL 23

[4] Iga Swiatek (POL #4) vs. [Q] Daria Snigur (UKR #98)

First meeting

Swiatek:

- Making 5th appearance at this event; she won this title in 2024 (d. Sabalenka in F, in 3rd-set TB) and was runner-up in 2023 (l. Sabalenka in F)
- She has won 11 WTA 1000 titles in her career (4 of those on clay); her most recent WTA 1000 title is 2025 Cincinnati on hard court (d. Paolini in F)
- Since the WTA 1000 format was introduced in 2009, only Serena Williams (5) has won more clay-court WTA 1000 titles than Swiatek (4, level with Sharapova)
- 10 of her 25 career WTA singles titles have come on clay; her most recent clay-court title is her fourth Roland Garros title in 2024 (d. Paolini in F)
- Contesting her 2nd clay-court event of the year; she reached Stuttgart QF last week (l. Andreeva)

Snigur:

- Successfully qualified to make her Madrid main draw debut (fell in qualifying here last year, l. Carle)
- Defeated former Top 10 player Daria Kasatkina in 1r for her first clay-court Tour-level match-win (Snigur saved 4 match points in the third set)
- In her victory over Kasatkina, Snigur won the final-set tiebreak 15-13 – that is the longest ‘first-to-7’ tiebreak at Tour-level in 8 years, since Vekic d. Stollar 6-2, 3-6, 7-6(13) in 2018 Washington 2r
- Holds a 2-0 career record vs. Top 10 players – her Top 10 wins are over No.7 Halep at 2022 US Open, and No.10 Haddad Maia at 2023 Nottingham
- Made her WTA Rankings Top 100 debut on March 30 of this year, one of 7 players to make their Top 100 debuts so far in 2026
- Best Tour-level result so far this year is SF run at Cluj-Napoca (l. eventual champion Cirstea), which was her 1st Tour-level SF of career

[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. Peyton Stearns (USA #43)

Sabalenka leads 2-0

Sabalenka:

- Making 8th appearance at this event, where she is the defending champion (d. Gauff in last year’s final)
- Sabalenka has won this title 3 times (2021, 2023 and 2025), tied with Petra Kvitová (2011, 2015 and 2018) for the most Mutua Madrid Open women’s singles titles
- Among currently active players, Sabalenka (23) has claimed the most match wins at the Mutua Madrid Open - she only trails Kvitová (32) and Simona Halep (30) among all players at the event
- Has won 11 WTA 1000 titles in her career, including two this year - the Sunshine Double of Indian Wells (d. Rybakina in F) and Miami (d. Gauff in F)
- Currently on a 12-match winning streak, with her last 2 events being her title runs at Indian Wells and Miami
- The week of April 20 marks her 79th consecutive week at World No.1, the 11th-longest streak in WTA Rankings history

Stearns:

- Making 3rd appearance at this event; her best performance at this tournament is reaching R16 last year (l. today's opponent and eventual champion Sabalenka)
- Her career-best showing at a WTA 1000 event is SF at Rome last year (l. eventual champion Paolini)
- Owns 2 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.6 Madison Keys en route to 2025 Rome SF
- Has played a reigning World No.1 once before - her loss to Sabalenka here last year
- Her first WTA singles title came on clay (2024 Rabat, d. Sherif in F), as did her first WTA singles final (2023 Bogota, l. Maria in F)
- Earlier this year, won her 2nd career WTA singles title at Austin, on hard court (d. fellow American Townsend in F)

[9] Mirra Andreeva (#8) vs. [LL] Panna Udvardy (HUN #78)

First meeting

Andreeva:

- Making 4th appearance at this event; she reached QF in both 2024 (l. eventual R-Up Sabalenka) and 2025 (l. eventual R-Up Gauff)
- She has reached R16 or better in all of her previous Mutua Madrid Open appearances - in her 2023 tournament debut, she made R16 as a No.194-ranked wild card (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- Has won two WTA 1000 titles, back-to-back at 2025 Dubai (d. Tauson in F) and 2025 Indian Wells (d. Sabalenka in F) - the 2025 Dubai title made Andreeva the youngest WTA 1000 champion since the WTA 1000 format began in 2009
- Has won 7 clay-court matches at Tour-level so far in 2026, currently leading all players on the surface this year - won Linz title (d. Potapova in F) and made Stuttgart SF (l. eventual champion Rybakina)
- Holds a 10-0 record this year vs. players ranked outside the Top 50

Udvardy:

- Making 2nd main draw appearance at this event; she lost to Blinkova in last year's 1r in an all-qualifier meeting
- After entering main draw as a lucky loser, defeated Kimberly Birrell in 1r for her 5th Tour-level win on clay this season
- On clay at Bogota last month, she reached her first career WTA singles final (l. Bouzkova in F), and posted a new career-high ranking of No.71 following that performance
- Has faced a Top 10 player only once before, losing to No.2 Sabalenka in the 2023 Wimbledon 1r
- Attempting to become the first Hungarian woman to defeat a Top 10 player since Timea Babos defeated CoCo Vandeweghe at 2018 Australian Open (Anna Bondar can also achieve this feat today vs. Svitolina)

Anna Bondar (HUN #63) vs. [7] Elina Svitolina (UKR #7)

Svitolina leads 2-1

Bondar:

- Making 3rd main draw appearance at Madrid, and has won a main draw match at this event for the first time
- Has beaten Viktorija Golubic so far this week to reach her second 2r at a WTA 1000 this year (Indian Wells)
- Seeking first career win versus a Top 10 player; 0-1 in such matches (l. No.3 Paula Badosa at Charleston in 2022)
- Attempting to become the first Hungarian woman to defeat a Top 10 player since Timea Babos defeated CoCo Vandeweghe at 2018 Australian Open (Panna Udvardy can also achieve this feat today vs. Andreeva)
- Best career Tour-level result on clay was a Runner-Up finish at Hamburg in 2025 (l. Lois Boisson in F)
- Has won 10 Tour-level matches in 2026; with a victory, would surpass her Tour-level win total from 2025

Svitolina:

- Appearing at Madrid for an 11th time; she is coming off her best result at this event with a SF appearance in 2025 (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- Holds a 2-1 record in matches versus Bondar, winning their lone meeting on clay at Roland Garros in 2025 (all three of their previous meetings occurred at Grand Slam events last year)
- Seven of her 19 career Tour-level titles have come on clay, most recently at Rouen in 2025
- One of five players from Ukraine in this week's 2r, joining Anhelina Kalinina, Marta Kostyuk, Daria Snigur and Yuliia Starodubtseva
- Has won 22 Tour-level matches so far in 2026, which is tied for fourth on Tour behind Elena Rybakina, Jessica Pegula and Aryna Sabalenka
- Owns four WTA 1000 titles in her career; her most recent WTA 1000 title is 2018 Rome (d. Halep in final)

Camila Osorio (COL #83) vs. [14] Naomi Osaka (JPN #15)

Osaka leads 2-1

Osorio:

- Appearing in the main draw at Madrid for a 3rd time, where she is looking to match her best result at this event after reaching 3r in 2023 (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- Defeated Anastasia Zakharova so far this week; has advanced to 2r-or-better at each WTA 1000 event she has played this year (Doha, Indian Wells, Miami and Madrid)
- Owns 6 Tour-level wins (two on clay) in her career over Top 20 players, most recently No.18 Jovic at Indian Wells 2026
- All three of her WTA singles titles have come on clay at Bogota (2021, 2024 and 2025)
- Six of her eight Tour-level wins in 2026 have come against opponents who held a higher ranking

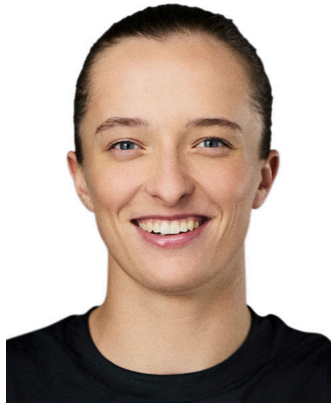
Osaka:

- Making 7th main-draw appearance at Madrid, where her best result was reaching QF in 2019 (l. Bencic)
- Holds a 2-1 career record versus Osorio (all on hard court), winning their most recent meeting at Indian Wells 2026
- Seeking first career Tour-level title on clay; best career Tour-level result on clay is SF at Stuttgart in 2019 (l. Kontaveit)
- Has won two WTA 1000 titles in her career: 2018 Indian Wells (d. Kasatkina in F) and 2019 Beijing (d. Barty in F)
- Currently ranked No.15; this time last year was ranked No.55. She is a former World No.1 and held the top ranking for 25 weeks

- One of 3 players from Poland in the main draw (No.34 seed Frech and Linette are also in the 2r)
- Best result by Poland at this event was Swiatek's title run in 2024
- Is currently ranked No.4; this time last year was ranked No.2. Reached World No.1 for the first time on April 4, 2022, and spent 125 weeks at the top ranking

- That is the longest 'first-to-7' third-set TB at Tour-level in 8 years, since Vekic d. Stollar 6-2, 3-6, 7-6(13) in 2018 Washington 2r
- Her victory over Kasatkina was Snigur's first clay-court Tour-level match-win
- Faces No.4 Iga Swiatek in 2r today; Snigur has a 2-0 career record vs. Top 10 players
- Her Top 10 wins were over No.7 Halep in 2022 US Open 1r, and No.10 Haddad Maia at 2023 Nottingham
- First Tour-level meeting vs. a player from Poland
- One of 5 players from Ukraine contesting this week's 2r (also No.7 seed Svitolina, No.26 seed Kostyuk, Starodubtseva and Kalinina)
- Best result by Ukraine at this event was SF run by Elina Svitolina last year (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- Best results by qualifiers at this event were SF runs by Ekaterina Alexandrova in 2022, Louisa Chirico in 2016 and Lucie Hradecka in 2012
- Is currently ranked No.98; this time last year was ranked No.147. Reached career-high ranking of No.93 last month
- Made her WTA Rankings Top 100 debut on March 30 of this year, one of 7 players to make their Top 100 debuts so far in 2026
- Best Tour-level result so far this year is SF run at Cluj-Napoca (l. eventual champion Cirstea), which was her 1st Tour-level SF of career

CAREER MILESTONES

- Won three singles titles in 2025, including her first Wimbledon title (her 6th Grand Slam title overall), Cincinnati and Seoul; finished at World No.2 for the second straight season
- Posted 62 Tour match wins in 2025, becoming the first player to achieve four consecutive 60-win seasons at Tour level since Martina Hingis (1997-2001) and Lindsay Davenport (1998-2001)
- Claimed five titles in 2024, making it a three-peat at Roland-Garros and also winning Doha, Indian Wells, Madrid and Rome. Crossed \$30m in prize money and qualified for her fourth WTA Finals
- Won six titles across 2023, including winning fourth Grand Slam title at Roland-Garros (d. Muchova in F) and going undefeated at the WTA Finals in Cancun (d. Pegula in F). Finished season as WTA World No.1 player for second consecutive year.
- In 2022, lifted second and third Grand Slam titles, at Roland-Garros (d. Gauff in F) and US Open (d. Jabeur in F). Triumph in Paris was the last of six straight titles during 37-match winning streak - joint-longest unbeaten run on Tour since 1990
- Won two titles in 2021, at Adelaide and Rome. Other highlights included QF at Roland-Garros and SF at Ostrava and qualifying for WTA Finals Guadalajara (fell in group stage). Also finished doubles R-Up at 2021 Roland-Garros (w/Mattek-Sands, l. Krejčíková/Siniakova)
- Won her maiden Tour-level title at 2020 Roland-Garros without dropping a set, becoming the first player from Poland - man or woman - to win a Grand Slam singles title and first from her country to reach a major final since Agnieszka Radwanska at 2012 Wimbledon
- Ranked No.54, she became the lowest-ranked woman to win the Roland-Garros title in the Open Era and the lowest-ranked finalist since 1977 (No.56 Mihai). At 19y 132d, is the youngest champion in Paris since Monica Seles (18y 187d) in 1992
- Also became the first player to win her debut Tour-level title at a Grand Slam since Jelena Ostapenko at 2017 Roland-Garros
- Won WTA Most Improved Player of the Year for 2020, as voted on by members of the media. Also won the 2020 WTA Fan Favorite Award
- Ended 2019 season ranked No.61 after a campaign highlighted by R-Up finish at Lugano (l. Hecog) and R16 run at Roland-Garros (l. Halep). That year also reached 3r at Toronto (l. 2025 highlights include qualifying for Australian Open main draw (l. Collins in 1r) and Cluj-Napoca main draw (l. Dolehide in 1r). Also reached QF at WTA 125 Warsaw and Caldas Da Rainha and won 11th career ITF title at W75 Glasgow
- In 2024 achieved her best Tour results on her favorite surface of grass at Wimbledon and Nottingham with 2r; also made Australian Open main draw for the first time reaching 1r as a qualifier
- On the ITF circuit in 2024 won W50 Lopota title and was runner-up at W75 Ricany and W75 Ismaning
- 2023 season highlighted by QF appearance at Cluj Napoca in October (l. eventual champion Korpatsch). Also qualified at Nottingham and defeated No.2 seed Haddad Maia in opening round.
- Fell on WTA main-draw debut at 1r at Nottingham 2022 (as qualifier, l. Riske-Armitraj)
- Finished 2022 with 32-18 record and won two ITF Circuit titles, including at W100 tournament in Dubai at the end of the year
- In 2021, also contested qualifying at all four Grand Slams
- Made Tour-level qualifying debut at 2020 Roland Garros
- Owns six ITF Circuit singles titles
- Won Wimbledon girls' singles title in 2019 (d. Noel in F); rose to No.2 on the ITF Junior Circuit at the end of that year

- Osaka) and made 2r five times (incl. Australian and US Open)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.88 after R-Up finish at 2019 Lugano. Made WTA qualifying debut at 2019 Auckland
- Ended 2018 season ranked No.175 (up from No.690 in 2017), after posting 42-6 record and winning four titles on ITF Circuit
- On professional debut, came through qualifying to win title at \$10k ITF/Stockholm-SWE in 2016
- Enjoyed stellar junior career, including winning girls' singles at 2018 Wimbledon (d. Kung in F) and leading Poland to Junior Fed Cup in 2016

- Previously worked with Wim Fissette, Tomasz Wiktorowski and Piotr Sierzputowski
- Father is former Olympic rower Tomasz Swiatek, who competed in the men's quadruple sculls event at the 1988 Summer Olympics in Seoul
- In summer 2022 organised 'Iga Swiatek and friends for Ukraine' event in Krakow, which featured a mixed doubles match between Agnieszka Radwanska, Sergiy Stakhovsky, Polish junior Martyn Pawelski and herself, and was attended by Poland's First Lady, Agata Kornhauser-Duda, Elina Svitolina and Andriy Shevchenko. The occasion was watched by almost 15,000 people live and a further one million on television, raising more than half a million Euros for Ukrainian children and teenagers affected by the war
- Started playing tennis because her older sister was playing and wanted to beat her
- Enjoys rock music, including AC/DC and Pink Floyd
- Includes PZU, On, Tecnifibre, Rolex and Xiaomi in her endorsement portfolio
- Current coach is her father, Sergiy; Previous coach is former World No.13 Larisa Savchenko
- Born in Kyiv but currently living in Warsaw, Poland
- Father, Sergiy, used to play football. Mother Viktoria works in science

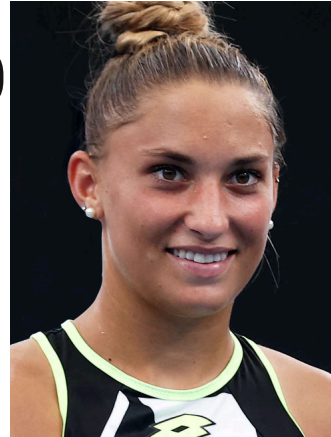

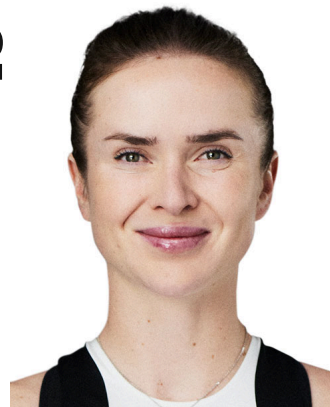
