MATCH NOTES – DAY 7 – MONDAY, APRIL 27

[1] Aryna Sabalenka (#1) vs. [14] Naomi Osaka (JPN #15)

Tied 1-1

Sabalenka:

- Making 8th appearance at this event, where she is the defending champion (d. Gauff in last year's final)
- Has won the Madrid title 3 times (2021, 2023, 2025), tied with Petra Kvitova (2011, 2015, 2018) for the most Mutua Madrid Open women's singles titles
- Among currently active players, Sabalenka (25) has claimed the most match-wins at the Madrid Open - she trails only Kvitova (32) and Simona Halep (30) among all players at the event
- Currently on a 14-match winning streak, with her last 2 events being her title runs at Indian Wells and Miami
- Has won her last 29 matches vs. players ranked outside the Top 10 (her most recent loss to a player ranked outside the Top 10 was to No.12 Anisimova in 2025 Wimbledon SF)
- Among currently active players, only Victoria Azarenka (209) has claimed more career match-wins at WTA 1000 events than Aryna Sabalenka (149)
- Three of her 24 career WTA singles titles have come on clay - all at Madrid

Osaka:

- Making 7th main draw appearance at this event, where her best result was reaching QF in 2019 (l. Bencic)
- Has won two WTA 1000 titles in her career, both on hard court: 2018 Indian Wells (d. Kasatkina in F) and 2019 Beijing (d. Barty in F)
- Owns 14 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.3 Coco Gauff at US Open 2025
- Holds a 2-5 career record vs. players ranked World No.1 at the time of their meeting; her last meeting vs. a current World No.1 was a loss to today's opponent Sabalenka at 2026 Indian Wells
- Career-best Tour-level finish on clay is SF which she has reached once: Stuttgart in 2019 (gave walkover vs. eventual R-Up Kontaveit)
- Seeking her 13th career WTA 1000 QF, and her first since R-Up finish at 2025 Montreal (l. Mboko in F)

[13] Linda Noskova (CZE #13) vs. [3] Coco Gauff (USA #3)

Gauff leads 2-0

Noskova:

- Making 3rd appearance at Madrid and is into R16 for the first time; her previous best result was 3r in 2025 (l. Swiatek)
- Contesting her 26th career WTA 1000 main draw; her best WTA 1000 result is R-Up finish at Beijing last year (l. Anisimova in F)
- Owns 11 career wins over Top 10 players, most recently No.5 Pegula in 2025 Beijing SF (0-3 vs. Top 10 players in 2026)
- Best career Tour-level result on clay is SF run at Prague in 2024 (l. eventual champion Linette)
- Her top result so far this season is reaching SF at WTA 1000 Indian Wells (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- Best results by Czech Republic at Madrid were the 3 title runs by Petra Kvitova in 2011 (d. Azarenka in F), 2015 (d. Kuznetsova in F), and 2018 (d. Bertens in F)

Gauff:

- Making 6th appearance at this event; she finished as runner-up here last year (l. Sabalenka in F)
- Has won 3 WTA 1000 titles in her career, at 2023 Cincinnati (d. Muchova in F), 2024 Beijing (d. Muchova in F) and 2025 Wuhan (d. Pegula in F)
- Contesting her 2nd clay-court event of the season; she made Stuttgart QF last week (l. eventual R-Up Muchova)
- 2 of her 11 career WTA singles titles have come on clay, at 2025 Roland Garros (d. Sabalenka in F) and 2021 Parma (d. Wang Qiang in F)
- Since the WTA 1000 format began in 2009, only Iga Swiatek (33) has claimed more WTA 1000 match-wins on clay than Coco Gauff (29) before the age of 23
- Last year, Gauff was the player with the most WTA Tour-level clay-court match-wins (18) – her highest career tally in a single calendar year

[LL] Anastasia Potapova (AUT #56) vs. [2] Elena Rybakina (KAZ #2)

Tied 1-1

Potapova:

- Making 5th main draw appearance at Madrid and has equaled her best tournament performance by reaching R16; she made R16 last year as well (l. Kostyuk)
- Her career-best WTA 1000 results are QF runs at 2024 Indian Wells (l. Kostyuk), 2023 Miami (l. Pegula) and 2021 Dubai (l. eventual R-Up Krejčíková)
- Reached her first career WTA 500 final earlier this month on clay at Linz (l. M. Andrejeva in F) – Potapova is 6-1 in clay-court Tour-level matches so far this year
- Owns 7 wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.8 Zheng Qinwen here at Madrid last year (0-6 vs. Top 10 players since then)
- She has become the first lucky loser to make R16 at this event (the previous best finish by a lucky loser at this event was Madison Keys reaching R32 in 2013)

Rybakina:

- Making 6th appearance at Madrid, where her best result is reaching SF in 2024 (l. eventual R-Up Sabalenka)
- Contesting her 46th career WTA 1000 main draw; she is a 2-time WTA 1000 champion at 2023 Indian Wells (d. Sabalenka in F) and 2023 Rome (d. Kalinina in F via ret.)
- Currently on a 6-match winning streak, having just claimed her 2nd title of the year at Stuttgart last week (6-0 on clay in 2026)
- Claimed both of her wins this week in 3 sets; she has won her last four 3-set matches (7-4 in 3-set matches in 2026)
- Holds a 9-1 record this year vs. players ranked outside the Top 50 (the one loss was to No.67 Ruzic at Dubai via ret.)
- Has won 27 matches so far in 2026; she is ranked No.1 on Tour for match-wins so far this year

[11] Belinda Bencic (SUI #12) vs. [30] Hailey Baptiste (USA #32)

First meeting

Bencic:

- Making 7th appearance at Madrid; her best tournament result came in 2019 with SF run (l. eventual R-Up Halep)
- She has also made QF in 2021 (l. Badosa) and R16 three times (2022, 2025 and this year) at Madrid
- Contesting her 68th career WTA 1000 main draw; she has won 2 WTA 1000 titles at 2015 Toronto (d. Halep in F via ret.) and 2019 Dubai (d. Kvitová in F)
- Seeking her 13th career WTA 1000 QF, and second of the year (l. eventual R-Up Gauff in 2026 Miami QF)
- Holds a 10-1 record at Tour-level events this year vs. players ranked outside the Top 20 (the one loss was to No.126 Bartunková at Australian Open)
- Earlier this year, she returned to the WTA Rankings Top 10 for the first time since April 2023 (currently ranked No.12)

Baptiste:

- Making 3rd appearance at Madrid and is into R16 for the first time; her previous best tournament result was reaching 2r in 2025 (l. Vekic)
- Contesting her 22nd career WTA 1000 main draw; her career-best WTA 1000 finish is reaching QF at 2026 Miami (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- This is the first time that Baptiste has reached multiple WTA 1000 R16s in one calendar year
- Owns 7 wins in career over Top 20 players, most recently No.9 Jasmine Paolini in the previous round this week (which was also her 3rd career Top 10 win)
- Best career Tour-level result on clay is R16, which she has now reached 5 times including this week: also Rouen in 2026; Roland Garros and Rabat in 2025; Bogota in 2024
- This week, she reached a new career-high ranking of No.32; this time last year was ranked No.88

[26] Marta Kostyuk (UKR #23) vs. Caty McNally (USA #76)

Kostyuk leads 1-0

Kostyuk:

- Making 7th main draw appearance at this event; her tournament-best result is reaching last year's QF (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- With her wins over Putintseva and No.5 seed Pegula this week, she improved to 7-0 on clay at Tour events so far this year (victory over Pegula was her 13th career Top 10 win)
- Currently on a 7-match winning streak at WTA Tour events; she claimed her 2nd career WTA singles title last week at Rouen on clay (d. Podrez in first all-Ukrainian WTA singles final)
- Defeated today's opponent McNally in 3 sets during her Rouen title run, which is their only previous meeting
- She is 6-0 vs. American players this year, including her win over Pegula in the previous round and her win over McNally at Rouen
- Holds an 8-1 record this year in Tour-level matches vs. players ranked outside the Top 50 (the 1 loss was to No.60 Jacquemot at Australian Open, in 3 tiebreak sets)

McNally:

- Making 2nd appearance at this event and is into R16 for the first time; she previously reached 2r in 2023 (l. Zheng Qinwen)
- Contesting her 18th career WTA 1000 main draw, and has reached the R16 at a WTA 1000 event for the first time (previously 0-3 in WTA 1000 R32 matches)
- Earned her first career Top 10 win in this week's 2r by defeating No.10 Mboko (previously 0-8 vs. Top 10 players)
- Facing Kostyuk for the 2nd consecutive event after falling to her in 3 sets during Kostyuk's Rouen title run last week
- Has equaled her career-best Tour-level result on clay this week; she also reached R16 at 2021 Charleston (l. Badosa) and 2026 Rouen (l. eventual champion Kostyuk)
- Bidding for her 2nd WTA QF of the year, after QF finish on hard court at WTA 250 Ostrava (l. eventual R-Up Korpatsch)

- Owns 3-1 career Tour-level record against players from Japan (2-0 in 2026: d. Sakatsume and today's opponent Osaka en route to Indian Wells title)
- Three of her 24 career WTA singles titles have come on clay - all at Madrid

CAREER MILESTONES

- Won a Tour leading four titles in 2025, including her 4th career Grand Slam title at US Open (d. Anisimova in final) as well as Madrid, Miami and Brisbane; also finished runner-up at WTA Finals, Australian Open, Roland Garros, Indian Wells and Stuttgart for a Tour leading nine finals overall
- Ended 2025 by finishing at World No.1 for the second straight year, posting the most Tour match wins of any player with 63 and setting a new WTA single-season record in prize money with \$15,008,519
- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan. Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career

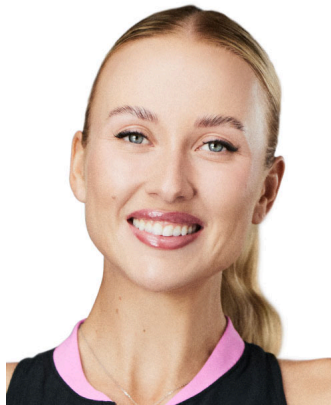

Was also youngest player to reach the 3r at a major since 1997 US Open when Mirjana Lucic-Baroni (15 years, 182 days) reached this stage
- Started 2025 ranked No.540 and returned to Top 100 by year end; made Guangzhou QF and won WTA 125 Newport title (d. Maria in F); posted 2r finishes at US Open and Wimbledon (was the only player to take a set off of eventual Wimbledon champion Swiatek)
- Returned in 2024 after six months away to win her eighth career doubles title at Cluj-Napoca w/Muhammad. Took further time away to undergo elbow surgery, before making 2r at WTA 125 Midland in November
- In 2023, reached career-high singles ranking of No.53; reached SF at Merida in singles (l. Peterson) and claimed the Merida doubles title with partner Parry; reached final of Paris WTA 125 (l. Parry via walkover); ended season after Wimbledon due to injury
- Made Top 100 singles debut on November 7, 2022, following title run at WTA 125 tournament at Midland. Also in 2022 reached QF at 's-Hertogenbosch (as qualifier, l. eventual champion Alexandrova) and Ostrava (as qualifier, l. Swiatek)
- Additionally in 2022, finished R-Up in doubles at US Open for second year in a row (w/Townsend, l. Krejčíková/Siniakova)
- In 2021, reached second WTA singles QF of her career at Guadalajara (l. Bouchard) and 3r at both Charleston 500 and Nottingham
- Doubles highlights in 2021 were a R-Up finish at US Open (w/Gauff, l. Stosur/Zhang) and won titles at Charleston 250 (w/Baptiste) and Parma (w/Gauff)
- Best results of 2020 came at the Slams, reaching 3r at US Open (l. Mertens) and 2r at Australian Open (l. Zhang)
- In 2019, posted first WTA main draw wins of career during SF run at Washington DC, where she also won the doubles title (w/Gauff, d. Sanchez/Stollar in F); with a combined age of 33y 36d, Gauff/McNally became the youngest doubles championship team since 1991 Rome (Capriati/Seles, at 32y 205d)
- Also in 2019, won another WTA Tour doubles title at Luxembourg (w/Gauff), and made Grand Slam main draw debut at Wimbledon as qualifier (l. 1r to Watson). In first appearances at WTA Tour-level tournaments, fell 1r at 2019 Indian Wells (as qualifier, l. Pera) and Miami (as WC, l. Gauff)
- Highlight of 2018 season was winning maiden ITF Circuit title at \$25K Lawrence, KS-USA. Also reached QF on four occasions at this level

- Scored two Top 50 wins in 2018, over No.27 Peng (Australian Open), No.26 Gavrilova (Fed Cup)
- Won first ITF Circuit title of career at \$25k ITF/Dunakeszi-HUN in 2017 (d. Pera in F)
- Played first WTA qualifying at 2017 Mallorca (l. Kalinskaya in 1r)
- Made Fed Cup debut for Ukraine in 2018
- Won 2017 Australian Open girls' singles title (d. Masarova in F) and ITF Junior Masters event in Chengdu, China in October 2017; rose as high as No.3 in junior rankings in June 2017
- Played first professional event at \$10k ITF/Kharkhiv-UKR in August 2016 (fell in 1r)

- Awarded WC w/Glatch into doubles draw at 2017 Cincinnati (l. Barty/Dellacqua in 1r) - first main draw Tour-level match she played
- Owns 4 singles titles and 6 doubles titles on ITF Circuit
- Made professional debut at ITF/\$100K Midland, MI-USA in 2016 (fell in qualifying)
- In her juniors career, won two Grand Slam doubles titles (2018 Roland Garros w/Swiatek, and 2018 US Open w/Gauff) and made three additional Grand Slam doubles finals; also was junior singles R-Up at 2018 Roland Garros (l. Gauff in final-set tiebreak)
