Sabalenka leads 1-0

Sabalenka:

- Making 8th appearance at this event, where she is the defending champion (d. Gauff in last year's final)
- Has won the Madrid title 3 times (2021, 2023, 2025), tied with Petra Kvitova (2011, 2015, 2018) for the most Madrid Open women's singles titles
- Has equalled the longest streak of consecutive quarterfinals reached at Madrid (four equalling Sharapova, Halep and Serena Williams)
- Since the tournament's inception in 2009, only Serena Williams (87.0%) holds a higher winning percentage than Sabalenka (86.7%, 26-4) at Madrid: if she wins this match, she would be the player with the highest ratio
- Has a 21-1 record against Top 50 players this season with her only loss to No.5 Rybakina at the Australian Open final
- Undefeated against players from USA this season with a record of 7-0
- Three of her 24 career WTA singles titles have come on clay - all at Madrid

Baptiste:

- Making 3rd appearance at Madrid and is through to the quarterfinals for the first time; her previous best tournament result was reaching 2r in 2025 (l. Vekic)
- Contesting her 22nd career WTA 1000 main draw where she has equalled her best result with quarterfinal at 2026 Miami (l. eventual Champion Sabalenka)
- Has claimed eight WTA 1000 main draw wins in 2026, already equalling her highest career tally in a single entire calendar year (eight also in 2025)
- This has become her best career Tour level result on clay after reaching R16 four times before: Rouen in 2026; Roland Garros and Rabat in 2025; Bogota in 2024
- Has hit the most aces this fortnight in Madrid with 26
- This week, she reached a new career-high ranking of No.32; this time last year was ranked No.88

Tied 1-1

Fernandez:

- Making 5th appearance at Madrid where her best previous result was 3r in 2024 (l. Jabeur)
- Has equalled her best WTA 1000 result, also reaching QFs at 2024 Cincinnati (l. Pegula), 2024 Doha (l. Rybakina) and 2023 Guadalajara (l. Kenin)
- Since the introduction of the format in 1990, only Bianca Andreescu (5) has made more quarterfinals in Tier I/WTA 1000 events than Fernandez among Canadian players (4, equalling Victoria Mboko)
- Could become the second player from Canada to reach a clay court Tier I/WTA 1000 SF since the format's introduction in 1990 after Helen Kelesi in Rome 1990
- Owns 7 Tour wins in career over Top 10 players, most recently No.4 Jessica Pegula at Washington DC 2025
- Becomes the second Canadian since the tournament's inception in 2009 to reach Madrid quarterfinal after Eugenie Bouchard in 2017; she could become the first semifinalist (Bouchard lost to Svetlana Kuznetsova in QF)
- Looking for her first semifinal since Hong Kong 2025 (l. Mboko)

Andreeva:

- Making 4th appearance at Madrid; she reached QF in 2024 (l. eventual R-Up Sabalenka) and 2025 (l. eventual R-Up Gauff)
- This is her third consecutive Madrid quarterfinal; she is the youngest player to achieve this feat at a single Tier I/WTA 1000 event since Martina Hingis in Miami between 1997 and 1999
- Could become the second youngest semifinalist at Madrid since the tournament's inception in 2009, older only than Caroline Wozniacki in 2009
- Owns two WTA 1000 titles which she won back-to-back in 2025 at Dubai (d. Tauson in F) and Indian Wells (d. Sabalenka in F)
- Has a 10-1 match record on clay this season, claiming the Linz title and reaching semifinal at Stuttgart
- Linz was her second title of the season after Adelaide (d. Mboko in F)

CAREER MILESTONES

- Won a Tour leading four titles in 2025, including her 4th career Grand Slam title at US Open (d. Anisimova in final) as well as Madrid, Miami and Brisbane; also finished runner-up at WTA Finals, Australian Open, Roland Garros, Indian Wells and Stuttgart for a Tour leading nine finals overall
- Ended 2025 by finishing at World No.1 for the second straight year, posting the most Tour match wins of any player with 63 and setting a new WTA single-season record in prize money with \$15,008,519
- Reached seven finals across 2024, defending her Australian Open crown, winning the US Open and also won titles at Cincinnati and Wuhan. Recaptured the No.1 ranking in October and finished the season as the WTA Year-End No.1 for the first time in her career
- Outstanding 2023 saw her win debut Grand Slam title at Australian Open (d. Rybakina in F), reach second Major final at US Open (l. Gauff in F) and become the WTA World No.1 player for the first time in career (after US Open). In addition won titles at Adelaide and Madrid
- Highlight of 2022 season was R-Up finish at WTA Finals in Fort Worth (l. Garcia in F); upset No.1 Swiatek, No.2 Jabeur and No.3 Pegula en route to final - only the fourth woman in history to beat the No.1, No.2 and No.3 at the same tournament
- Lifted two titles during 2021 campaign, at Abu Dhabi and Madrid, while was R-Up at Stuttgart. Also reached a further three SFs, including at Wimbledon and US Open
- In doubles, lifted second major at 2021 Australian Open (w/Mertens, d. Krejčíková/Siniakova in F)
- Won final nine matches of 2020 to end the year with back-to-back titles - at Ostrava (d. Azarenka in F) and Linz (d. Mertens in F) - and ranked at No.10. Having also taken home the silverware at Doha (d. Kvitová in F), was one of two players (also Halep) to lift three singles titles during disrupted 2020 season
- Ended as World No.11 for the second straight year in 2019 after capturing three WTA singles titles at Shenzhen (d. Riske in F), Wuhan (d. Riske in F) and Zhuhai (d. Bertens in F)
- Made Top-10 debut on January 28, 2019 following 3r run at 2019 Australian Open
- Ended 2019 at No.2 in WTA doubles rankings after capturing first Grand Slam doubles trophy at US Open (w/Mertens, d. Azarenka/Barty in F). Earlier in the season, the pair claimed the
- In 2025, reached first WTA Tour QF of career at Auckland (l. Osaka) and first Grand Slam R16 of career at Roland Garros (l. Keys); made Top 50 debut, peaking at a career-high ranking of No.47 on August 25
- During 2024, made Tour-level R16 at Bogota, Seoul and Wuhan as well as reaching 2r at Roland Garros. Also made semifinal at WTA 125 Puerto Vallarta and broke into the Top 100 for the first time, achieving a career high ranking of No.80 in October
- Won back-to-back Tour main draw matches for the first time at 2023 Guadalajara 1000 reaching R16 (l. Garcia)
- During 2022 season, reached 2r at Australian Open (as qualifier, l. Inglis), Guadalajara 250 (as qualifier, l. Osorio) and Charleston (l. Cornet)
- In 2021, made 2r at Roland Garros as qualifier (l. Kenin), and also reached 2r at Chicago 500 (as WC, l. Azarenka) and Charleston (as WC, l. Jabeur); won first WTA Tour doubles title at Charleston 250 w/McNally (d. Perez/Sanders in F)
- In 2020, made Grand Slam main draw debut as wild card at US Open (l. Mladenovic in 1r); also contested qualifying at Australian Open and Lexington
- Highlight of 2019 was 2r showing on WTA main draw debut at Washington DC (as wild card, d. No.17 Keys, l. Mladenovic); also contested qualifying at US Open, and on ITF Circuit won \$25K titles at Tucson, Sumter and Plantation
- As a junior reached career-high ranking of No.38 in 2018
- Made debut on ITF Circuit in Florida in 2017

- 'Sunshine Double' by winning back-to-back titles at Indian Wells (d. Krejčíková/Siniaková in F) and Miami (d. Stosur/ Zhang in F)
- Enjoyed breakthrough season in 2018, lifting two titles, at New Haven (d. Suárez Navarro in F) and Wuhan (d. Kontaveit in F), winning 46 matches and finishing at No.11 in the rankings. Entered Top 50 on April 16 after run to Lugano final, and Top 20 on August 27 following New Haven title
 - Broke into Top 100 at No.76 on October 16, 2017 after reaching first Tour-level final at Tianjin (l. Sharapova). Also in 2017 made SF at Tashkent (l. Babos) and lifted WTA 125k Series title at Mumbai (d. Jakupović)
 - Made Grand Slam main draw debut at 2017 Wimbledon, falling in 2r (as qualifier, d. Khromacheva, l. Wittthoeft)
 - Fell 1r on main draw debut at 2017 Dubai (as qualifier, l. Ka.Bondarenko). WTA qualifying debut came at 2016 Rabat
 - Lifted first three ITF Circuit titles in 2015, including a 13-match win streak towards the year's end, winning back-to-back trophies in Antalya, Turkey
 - Made debut on ITF Circuit in Minsk in 2012
