Kostyuk leads 1-0

Andreeva:

- Through to Madrid final for the first time and looking for her third title of the season after Adelaide (d. Mboko in F) and Linz (d. Potapova in F)
- Celebrated her 19th birthday on April 29 and is the second youngest finalist at Madrid since the tournament's inception in 2009, older only than Caroline Wozniacki who was runner-up in 2009
- She is the first teenager to reach three WTA 1000 finals (won Indian Wells and Dubai in 2025) since the format's introduction in 2009, and the youngest to make three Tier I/WTA 1000 finals since Maria Sharapova (Zurich 2004, Tokyo and Miami 2005)
- Looking to become the sixth player since 2009 to win each of her first three WTA 1000 finals after Petra Kvitova, Elina Svitolina, Caroline Garcia, Iga Swiatek and Aryna Sabalenka
- Since 2009, only Serena Williams (87.0%) and Aryna Sabalenka (83.9%) have a higher winning percentage at the Madrid Open than Andreeva (83.3%, 15-3)
- Record in WTA Tour finals is 5-1, with her only runner-up finish at 2024 Ningbo (l. Kasatkina in F)
- Her record on clay so far this season is 12-1 with her only loss at Stuttgart in SF (l. eventual champion Rybakina)
- Will move to No.7 in the PIF WTA Rankings after the tournament

Kostyuk:

- Has reached a WTA 1000 final for the first time in her career; she previously made semifinal at Indian Wells in 2024 (l. eventual champion Swiatek)
- Defeated Andreeva in their only previous meeting in the quarterfinal at Brisbane earlier this year
- This is her third final of the season after Brisbane (R-Up) and Rouen (WON)
- Currently on a 10 Tour-match winning streak after securing the title at Rouen; the longest winning streak of her career
- On Tour she is undefeated on clay so far this season (10-0)
- Looking for the 14th Top 10 win of her career, most recently defeating No.5 Pegula here at Madrid this fortnight
- Since 2009, Kostyuk (#23) could become the second player ranked outside the Top 20 to win the Madrid Open, after Arevane Rezai (#24) in 2010
- Only M.Andreeva (12) has claimed more WTA main draw wins on clay than Kostyuk (10) in 2026
- Projected to move as high as No.17 in the PIF WTA Rankings after the tournament, with the possibility of No.15 with the title (the highest ranking of her career is No.16 achieved in June 2024)

- Making 4th appearance at Madrid and is through to the final for the first time
- She made at least R16 in her three previous appearances, making QF in 2024 (l. eventual R-Up Sabalenka) and 2025 (l. eventual R-Up Gauff)
- Has become the second youngest finalist at Madrid since the tournament's inception in 2009, older only than Caroline Wozniacki who made R-Up in 2009
- Owns two WTA 1000 titles which she won back-to-back in 2025 at Dubai (d. Tauson in F) and Indian Wells (d. Sabalenka in F)
- Has become the first teenager to reach three WTA 1000 finals since the format's introduction in 2009
- After 1r bye, has beaten Panna Udvardy, Dalma Galfi, Anna Bondar, Leylah Fernandez and Hailey Baptiste to reach the final
- This is her third final of the season after claiming titles at Adelaide and Linz
- Faces No.23 Marta Kostyuk in F today; has a 7-6 record against Top 30 players in 2026 most recently defeating No.25 Fernandez here at Madrid
- Looking for her first win over a player from Ukraine this season after falling to Svitolina at Australian Open and Kostyuk at Brisbane
- Record in WTA final matches stands at 5-1, with her only R-Up finish at 2024 Ningbo (l. Kasatkina in F)
- Two of her 5 career WTA singles titles have come on clay: 2024 Iasi (d. Avanesyan in F via ret.) and 2026 Linz (d. Potapova in F)
- Is currently ranked No.8; this time last year was ranked No.7. Reached career high ranking of No.5 in July 2025
- Her record on clay so far this season is 12-1 with her only loss at Stuttgart in SF (l. eventual champion Rybakina)

- Making 7th Madrid main draw appearance and has reached SF for the first time
- Her best previous result was reaching last year's QF (l. eventual champion Sabalenka)
- Has reached final at a WTA 1000 for the first time after previously making SF at 2024 Indian Wells (l. eventual champion Swiatek)
- After 1r bye, has beaten Yulia Putintseva, Jessica Pegula, Caty McNally, Linda Noskova and Anastasia Potapova so far this week to reach her third final of the season after Brisbane (R-Up) and Rouen (WON)
- Faces No.8 Mirra Andreeva in F today; owns 13 wins in career and a record of 4-3 in 2026 most recently defeating No.5 Pegula in Madrid this fortnight
- Record in WTA final matches stands at 2-3
- Owns one clay court title: Rouen 2026
- First player from Ukraine to reach the Madrid final: previously Elina Svitolina reached SF in 2025
- Is currently ranked No.23; this time last year was ranked No.36
- Since the Madrid's first year in 2009, Kostyuk could become the second player ranked outside the Top 20 to win the title, after Arevane Rezaï (#24) in 2010
- Is currently on a 10 Tour match winning streak after claiming the title at Rouen
- Is undefeated in clay Tour matches this season (10-0)

CAREER MILESTONES

- In 2025 won two WTA 1000 titles back-to-back at Dubai and Indian Wells - becoming the youngest WTA 1000 champion since the tournament tier began in 2009 at 17-years-old. Made her Top 10 debut in February before breaking into the Top 5 for the first time in July
- Won maiden WTA doubles title in 2025 with Diana Shnaider at Brisbane, followed by a second title at Miami and finished the 2025 season making her WTA Finals debut in doubles with Shnaider
- Reached first two WTA finals of career in 2024 winning the title at Iasi and finishing runner-up at Ningbo
- Made first Grand Slam semifinal at 2024 Roland Garros beating World No.2 Aryna Sabalenka in the quarterfinals
- Made Top 20 debut on October 8, 2024 finishing the year at World No.16; also won 2024 Paris Olympic silver medal in women's doubles with Diana Shnaider
- Opened 2023 season in April by winning 13 matches straight to claim back-to-back ITF titles in Switzerland; as WC, advanced to R16 at Madrid with wins over Fernandez, Haddad Maia and Linette (l. Sabalenka); subsequently made debut at Roland Garros (as qualifier, l. Gauff in 3r), Wimbledon (as qualifier, l. Keys in R16) and US Open (l. eventual champion Gauff in 2r)
- Also in 2023 reached R16 at Beijing (l. Rybakina), leading to Top 50 debut (started season just inside Top 300); voted WTA Newcomer of the Year
- In 2022, posted 39-9 win-loss record on ITF Circuit, winning first four titles at this level
- Fell in 1r on WTA main draw debut at 2022 Monastir (as WC, l. Potapova)
- Made professional debut at W15 ITF Circuit event at Sharm El-Sheikh in February 2022
- Owns six ITF Circuit singles titles
- As a junior, finished R-Up at 2023 Australian Open (l. Korneeva)
- Best results in 2025 were three QF finishes all at WTA 1000 events: Doha (l. eventual champion Anisimova), Madrid (l. eventual champion Sabalenka) and Montreal. Made 4r at a Grand Slam for the second time in her career (after QF at 2024 Australian Open) at US Open (l. Muchova)
- Reached two WTA 500 finals in 2024 at San Diego and Stuttgart finishing runner-up at both. Also made first Grand Slam quarterfinal at Australian Open and first WTA 1000 semifinal at Indian Wells
- Earned five Top 10 wins in 2024, entered the year with only three in career and made Top 20 debut on May 6, 2024 finishing the year at No.18
- In 2023, won maiden singles title at Austin (d. Gracheva) and doubles title at Birmingham (w/Krejčíková)
- Reached QF at two WTA 500 events; Adelaide 1 (l. Jabeur) and Washington (l. Samsonova). Achieved a peak singles ranking of No. 32 on August 7, 2023 and No. 27 in doubles on May 8, 2023
- Best result of 2022 was SF showing at Granby (l. Saville). Also made 3r at Australian Open and Eastbourne
- Highlights in second half of 2021 were QF at Chicago (l. Gracheva) and SF at Cluj-Napoca (l. Halep); broke into Top 50 on November 1, 2021, after Cluj-Napoca
- On clay, enjoyed career-best R16 run at Roland Garros (l. Swiatek) and advanced to SF at Istanbul (l. eventual champion Cirstea)
- Opened 2021 by reaching first career WTA SF, at Abu Dhabi (l. V.Kudermetova)
- Broke into Top 100 at No.97 on November 2, 2020, after reaching back-to-back finals on ITF Circuit in US
- Made 3r at 2020 US Open (l. eventual champion Osaka in 3s)
- In February 2020, picked up third ITF singles title of career, at a \$60k event in Cairo
- Season highlight in 2019 was reaching first WTA QF, at Strasbourg (l. Garcia)
- Made Grand Slam main draw debut at 2018 Australian Open and reached 3r, having received a WC into the qualifying event by virtue of winning the junior title there in 2017 (d. Masarova in F). Was first player born in 2002 to play in a Grand Slam main draw. Was also youngest player to reach the 3r at a major since 1997 US Open when Mirjana Lucic-Baroni (15 years, 182 days) reached this stage

- Scored two Top 50 wins in 2018, over No.27 Peng (Australian Open), No.26 Gavrilova (Fed Cup)
- Won first ITF Circuit title of career at \$25k ITF/Dunakeszi-HUN in 2017 (d. Pera in F)
- Played first WTA qualifying at 2017 Mallorca (l. Kalinskaya in 1r)
- Made Fed Cup debut for Ukraine in 2018
- Won 2017 Australian Open girls' singles title (d. Masarova in F) and ITF Junior Masters event in Chengdu, China in October 2017; rose as high as No.3 in junior rankings in June 2017
- Played first professional event at \$10k ITF/Kharkhiv-UKR in August 2016 (fell in 1r)

- Coached by Conchita Martinez
- Sister Erika is also a professional player
- Originally from Krasnoyarsk and began playing aged six, but moved to Sochi and then Cannes, France, with sister to set up training base with coaches Jean-Rene Lisnard and Jean-Christophe Faurel
- Favorite surface is clay
- Represented by IMG

- Currently coached by Sandra Zaniewska. Previously coached by Andrea Volpini. Consistently works with her mother Talina (a former professional)
- Currently trains in both Monaco and Kiev
- Father is Oleg; has two sisters, Zoryana and Mariya. Began playing tennis at age five
- One of first coaches was her uncle Taras Beyko, a respected player for the USSR and Ukraine in the late 1980s and early 1990s
- Currently managed by IMG
- Favorite shot is her serve
